Preservation Board honors Rails, Kora Shrine

Rails, the new restaurant located at 103 Lincoln Street, will be the site of the Lewiston Historic Preservation Review Board's 2015 Annual Awards presentation on Thursday, May 7 at 3 p.m.

The building housing Rails will be one of two honored by the board for outstanding preservation efforts this year. Previously known as the Grand Trunk Depot, the historic building is owned by the Lewiston-Auburn Railroad Company, which made renovations to the building's interior and exterior. Also slated to be recognized for renovations to its facade will be the Kora Shrine building, located at 11 Sabattus Street.

Governor's Address: Contact your legislators about eliminating the income tax

My bill to eliminate the Maine income tax would make sure it never comes back. This would put 1.2 billion dollars in the pockets of working Mainers.

Dear Maine Taxpayer, Eliminating the income tax is the largest wage increase Mainers could get. You work hard for your money, you earned it and you should keep it.

Liberal politicians tax and spend and tell you they are helping you. There's no amount of your money they won't spend on their follies, expand welfare and reward their friends in special-interest groups.

I have just one special interest: the Maine people. You know much better than government how to spend your own money.

That's why I have proposed a Constitutional amendment to eliminate the income tax. This amendment would prevent politicians from enacting an income tax in the future.

The Constitutional amendment requires a twothirds vote of the Legislature. Maine voters must then approve it at a statewide referendum in November.

Some states tried moving too fast to eliminate their income tax. We are taking a much more cautious approach.

We are phasing it out This generates the reveover time until it is gone. We first reduced the top rate from 8.5 to 7.95 percent, giving tax relief to twothirds of Mainers.

In addition, 70,000 low-income Mainers no longer pay income tax. Opponents said the loss of income tax revenue would hurt government. But revenue has gone up since we reduced the income tax.

This year, my plan cuts the income tax even further, from 7.95 to 5.75%. That's a 40% reduction in the income tax since I took office.

As the income tax goes down, Mainers get more money in their pockets. As they spend that money, it creates economic growth. nue needed to right-size government, resulting in an affordable, efficient and effective governance.

My goal is to reduce the income tax to 4% by the end of 2018. The Constitutional amendment would guarantee it keeps going down after I leave office.

I have been holding town hall meetings all over the state. I am telling Mainers I'm trying to put more money into their paychecks. Most people get it.

But liberal politicians are purposely misrepresenting my plan, saying it will cut education or local services. These are nothing more than ideological fabrications being used to scare the Maine people.

Angry liberals often yell out or strongly object to my plan at the town hall meetings. I asked one man if he would give up \$300,000 in revenue sharing in his town if the residents in that town would get back \$5 million from my income tax cut. He said, "No!" You just can't please some people. But I know the vast majority of Mainers do want their money back. They prefer to spend their own money, rather than have greedy liberal politicians redistribute their earnings on programs we don't all agree with.

Whether you like my plan or not, I urge you to contact your legislators. You hold the true power not me and not the Legislature.

Enough is Enough It's business as usual for Democrats in Augusta

"Democrats said such a rigid standard could cause hardship to people who are willing to repay the money but need emergency assistance before doing so."

Thus wrote reporter Kevin Miller in his article, "Bipartisan effort targets welfare loopholes" (*Portland Press Herald*, April 30, 2015).

The statement is the reported response from the Democrat legislators who sit on the Health and Human Services Committee to a piece of welfare reform legislation, LD 722. If someone is caught committing fraud, they are now removed from General Assistance rolls for 120 days and ordered to reimburse the city or town from which they stole. On the 121st day, those who have abused the system will show up at the General Assistance office and be reinstated, even though they have not made restitution.

The bill, LD 722, would ensure reimbursement is made to the city or town before those who committed fraud could be reinstated on the welfare rolls. Democrats think this is too draconian. They feel that those who abuse welfare should be reinstated, as long as they promise to pay the money back.

Democrats are trying to create legislation that will give those who abuse the welfare system a chance to return, after only 120 days suspension, to the General Assistance rolls without making any restitution. In

short, this legislation will not change anything. It will continue to be business as usual.

Enough is enough. Pass the bill in its original form: make welfare abusers pay full restitution or they cannot return to the General Assistance rolls.

(Photos by Rachel Morin) the Democrats' changes, does absolutely nothing but give liberal politicians an out on Election Day, when they can point to this toothless bill and claim they voted for welfare reform.

But the real outrage, which is not addressed in this bill, is that those who abuse the welfare system can continue to reapply, commit fraud, then reapply again after their penalty time has expired.

Apparently, many in Augusta still don't quite get it. They seem to have forgotten – or just don't care – that this past November election was a call for welfare reform. In Lewiston, these nanny-state policies are slowly killing the city.

While communities in the southern part of the state, which don't have to deal with these problems, enjoy mil rates in the midteens, Lewiston's mil rate is 27-plus. When they build a new school, it's done to provide their students with a nicer facility. In Lewiston, new schools are built to accommodate our growing General Assistance population.

Our high mil rate makes it difficult to attract businesses. Our new vibrant downtown, featuring Lewiston's middle-class and upscale neighborhoods, is overshadowed by a somewhat rundown inner city. But worst of all, our seniors on fixed incomes and our families with school-aged children have been pitted against each other due to increasing budget expenses that are beyond the control of our city councilors and school committee members.

Sadly, things don't appear to be looking up. Most of the welfare legislation introduced by Senator Eric Brakey (R-Auburn) appears to be going down the drain. Two of these bills, LD 368 and LD 369, would bring Lewiston and Auburn into compliance with federal and state regulations.

It appears the Democrats are still turning to liberal activist organizations that make their living off the poor for their marching orders. Why do they fear these organizations more than the wrath of the voters?

It's time to call your local state senators and state representatives and ask them the following:

1. If the federal and state government refuse benefits to undocumented aliens (LD 369) and people reaching their lifetime fiveyear limitation on welfare benefits (LD 368), why are local taxpayers forced to support them?

2. Why are the wellheeled communities to our south exempt from having to share in the cost incurred by this financial support?

Maine Audubon seeks "road watch" volunteers

As the weather warms up, many animals are on the move and are more likely to be spotted on or near Maine roads. This spring, Maine Audubon is seeking volunteers to survey roads in Maine for signs of animal road crossings.

Maine Audubon's Wildlife Road Watch is a web-based map and database designed to record citizen scientists' observations of roadside and road-killed wildlife. Volunteers can participate by submitting roadside observations on the Wildlife Road Watch website. To register and submit observations, visit maineaudubon.org.

Information collected by volunteers about where different animals attempt to cross roads will be used by biologists with Maine Audubon, the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries & Wildlife and the Maine Department of Transportation to identify ways to reduce road-kill and increase safety for people and wildlife.

Since the inception of the Wildlife Road Watch program in 2010, over 460 volunteers have reported over 4,800 wildlife observations of 130 different wildlife species, including some that are rare and endangered. Roads can have a big impact on endangered species by impeding movement and separating populations, as well as killing individuals from collisions. For instance, Maine Audubon biologists report that, unless changes are made, Blanding's turtles and spotted turtles are likely to become extinct in Maine due to road mortality. award-winning author about her latest work, a historical novel set partly in Maine.

Flahive knew many of the people in the audience, who turned out in great numbers for the event. Of special note were several of her former co-workers at Central Maine Technical Institute (now the Central Maine Community College). She introduced us to William Hierstein, former CMTI President, to whom she gave credit for the primary inspiration behind "Railroad to the Moon."

Flahive recalled how her story, partly set in post-Civil War Lewiston and featuring as its main character the fictional Elijah, a freed black slave headed to Maine, was stalled while she searched for an authentic voice to spark the narrative.

Hierstein, who knew of her penchant for researching lesser known historical details to flesh out her characters and bring their stories to life, reminded her that Oren Cheney, the founder and first president of what soon became Bates College, was a Freewill Baptist who had helped runaway slaves and was instrumental in helping to establish education for freed slaves.

That was it! Now needing a genuine voice for Cheney, she enlisted the scholarly research of Pastor J. Trent Boyd of

As the location of the former Maine State Seminary, now Bates College, Lewiston plays a prominent role in the book, and local readers will enjoy imagining what their city, with its familiar natural and man-made landmarks, looked like a century and a half ago.

With Cheney potentially adding the role of matchmaker to his numerous other accomplishments, the book ends hopefully with the birth of a child, always the greatest of new beginnings.
