

Candidates for Mayor must submit nomination papers signed by not less than 100 and not more than 200 qualified voters of Lewiston and must have registered and qualified to vote in Lewiston on or prior to March 4, 2015. Candidates for the at-large seat on the School Committee must submit completed nomination papers signed by not

of Lewiston and must have registered and qualified to vote in Lewiston on or prior to June 4, 2015.

Candidates for all other positions must submit nomination papers signed by not less than 50 and not more than 100 qualified voters of the ward the candidate seeks to represent and must have registered and qualified to vote in that ward on or prior to June 4, 2015.

Completed nomination papers must be filed fice no later than Friday, September 4, 2015 at 4:30 p.m. All candidates are encouraged to file their nomination papers early to provide sufficient time to obtain additional signatures if needed. The municipal election will take place on Tuesday, November 3, 2015.

Nomination papers may be picked up at the City Clerk's Office, located on the second floor of City Hall, Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Questions may be directed to the City Clerk's Department, Elections Division, at 513-3124. More election information is also available on the City's website at www.lewistonmaine.

Passenger rail would help improve local economy

I enjoy a peaceful walk in the morning. The crisp, fresh air is not only exhilarating, but helps clear your mind.

Last week the tranquil early morning quiet was shattered by the sound of a train whistle. I love the sound of a train whistle in the morning. It signals the start of a new day. Its toot reminds the populace that it's time to get up and go to work.

Its long, steady whistle announces the start of daily commerce in retail, restaurants and commercial business. It also signals to some layabouts that it's time to go to bed.

Yes, I love the sound of train whistles in the morning: it's the sound of economic development.

The progress of economic development of the past few decades in Lewiston can best be described using medical terms. A while ago, it was hard to find a pulse. The pulse got stronger as a small group of entrepreneurs came to Lewiston with a vision. When those visions were realized, our city progressed to the working-out stage at the gym.

Now as outside developers and businesses start to show interest in Lewiston, we are well on our way to compete in the state bodybuilding championships.

For years, Lewiston's industrial base has been eroding. This has been made worse by the recession. We have lagged woefully behind many areas in southern Maine and Bangor. Thankfully, several local entrepreneurs have had faith in our city, invested and moved us to a point that more investors are currently considering investing in our city. We

have finally become of age.

Last week I was in Augusta to testify in support of LD 438: "An Act To Authorize A General Fund Bond Issue To Invest In Maine's Rail Infrastructure And Expand Passenger Rail Service." This bill was introduced by state Senator Nate Libby, who is also a Lewiston City Councilor.

Once passed, the bill

will appear on this year's November ballot. It will ask Maine voters to approve a \$25 million bond to fund the construction of key rail infrastructure between Lewiston and Portland, as well as other rail projects at the discretion of the Maine Department of Transportation.

Our quest to bring passenger rail service to Lewiston has a wide range of support among state, county, city and town officials. Liberal and conservative groups, which are usually opposing each other, are on board and backing the bill.

Lewiston-Auburn local state legislators are also on board with Senator Nate Libby, Representative Jared Golden and Representative Bruce Bickford as our area point men.

I seldom vote for bonds; however, this bond is an exception. We need passenger rail to help develop and improve our communities' economy. By creating alternative transportation, we will appeal to the young affluent professionals.

In the Marine Corps, we were trained to adapt and overcome. Change is difficult for those of us over 65. But unless we change and adapt to the needs of our young people, we will wither on the vine and our city will die. Yes, change is hard, but it is also necessary. So let's start adapting.

Most young professionals are looking to live in an apartment or condominium located close to work and the area nightlife. They prefer walking, biking and public transportation to cars. The train will open the world to Lewiston, Auburn and our surrounding towns.

It will also allow area residents a safe, reliable and comfortable means of transportation to Portland, Boston, Montreal and beyond. Lastly, the prosperity it will bring will make it difficult for our layabouts to ...lay about.







LAWPC receives grant to continue watershed improvements

The Lake Auburn phorous entering the lake. Watershed Protection Commission has received a Maine DEP grant award of \$148,000 to implement erosion control projects in the Lake Auburn watershed. Combined with contributions of labor and materials by project partners, including the Androscoggin Soil and Water Conservation District and the Towns of Turner and Minot, this brings the total value of slated improvements to

Since an algae bloom that resulted in fish kill in Lake Auburn in 2012, staff and consultants have investigated the watershed for sources of polluted runoff to the lake. Approximately 74 problem sites were identified, with a price tag of \$3 million to fix them. The LAWPC has already addressed the most serious problems.

This grant will allow local partners to complete additional work, including culvert replacements, roadside drainage improvements, and the planting of pollution-capturing buffers along shorelines, all designed to reduce the amount of phos-

The grant also includes funds for education and outreach about lake protection. In addition to helping homeowners establish lakefriendly practices, LAWPC will work closely with students from Edward Little High School's Ag program to grow buffer plants in the school greenhouse. Students will then conduct workshops to teach area residents about the value of shoreline buffer plantings and will help provide and plant the buffers.



Work on grant-funded projects will begin during the summer of 2015 and is expected to continue over the next two to three years.



CMCC, Auburn Rec. to spotlight local sports tourism
