Volunteer project to help keep river clean



The Cities of Lewiston and Auburn will team up to host a storm drain stenciling event on Sunday, June 28 at 1 p.m. Volunteers will meet at Festival Plaza in Auburn on the banks of the Androscoggin River for a brief clean water discussion before splitting up to conduct the stenciling in the Whitney Street neighborhood of Auburn and

off Webster and Pleasant Streets in Lewiston. Volunteer participants will include 25 members of Girl Scout troops 1524, 2013, and 2012 and their parents. The rain date for the event is July 12.

The stencils will be used to mark the street near city drainage structures. Storm drain stenciling will help educate the public about the fact that storm drains in the area drain directly into local bodies of water. Storm drains do not lead to treatment plants, and any pollution or trash carried from rain events or snowmelt will eventually flow untreated into the Androscoggin River, Lake



Auburn, or other smaller streams in either community. The illegal dumping of waste or trash into the drainage system can create pollution and clog drainage systems, creating backups, nuisance flooding, and requiring expensive cleaning operations.

Over the last 10 years, the Environmental Protection Agency has regulated See River, page 4

Local students win statewide writing contest

Three local high school juniors have been chosen as the winners of the Maine Community College System's A Journey Into Writing contest and named 2015 Governor's Young Writers of the Year. They are Divine Selengbe of Lewiston High School, Addie Monahan-Morang of Freeport High School and Morganne Elkins of Edgecomb, who attends North Yarmouth Academy.

The three students were each presented with an award and a \$2,500 check by Governor Paul LePage in a ceremony at the Blaine House recently. MCCS Interim President Derek Langhauser and Matt Kasper, director of sales for U.S. Cellular in New England, joined the Governor in presenting the awards.

Selengbe won for her essay "That's Just Who I Am," Monahan-Morang won for her short story "Mama," and Elkins won for her short story "Cold House." The judges for the eleventh annual contest were noted Maine authors Susan Kenney, Lewis Robinson and Bill Roorbach. The contest, which is open to high school juniors across the state, is supported by U.S. Cellular, which has provided \$100,000 in prize money to contest finalists since the program was established in 2005.

In all, nine finalists were chosen from 177 entries representing over 60 Maine high schools. The six other finalists were Chandler Clothier of Lewiston High School; Sarah Cooper of Bath, who attends North Yarmouth Academy; Jesse Dunn of Waldoboro and the Watershed School; Park Laflin of New Vineyard, a junior at Mt. Blue High School; Thomas LaJoie of the Van Buren District Secondary School; and Colin Prato of Yarmouth High School. These six students will each receive a plaque and a check for \$500.

Governor's Address: Legislators must stay true to their principles

The single most important issue in last November's election was welfare reform. But legislators didn't get the message. Instead of "welfare-towork," they have created "welfare-to-even-morewelfare."

Dear Maine Taxpayer,

When I worked at a major retail chain, we'd have promotions to get people in the door and make it easier for them to buy our products. This deal in the Legislature's budget is like a clearance sale for welfare benefits: it gets more able-bodied people in the door to sign them up for even more welfare.

Eliminating the welfare cliff to ease people off of welfare is a concept everyone wanted to get behind. But liberals took this common-sense concept and turned it into another way to expand welfare to more people.

I proposed to eliminate the welfare cliff by rewarding the work performed by TANF recipients. In their back-room deal for this budget, legislative leaders stripped out our work provision, making it easier for welfare recipients to stay on the program without

working. This will make it nearly impossible for Maine to meet our federal work requirements. The federal government has already fined Maine over \$20 million for failing to comply with these requirements.

These legislators have turned the welfare cliff into a plateau, putting able-bodied people on welfare cruise control for years. Our goal is to get more welfare recipients working, but this budget is a step backward.

Our unemployment rate is 4.7%, compared to 8% when I took office. With 10,000 jobs on the Maine Job Bank alone, there are plenty of jobs to go around.

When we enforced the federal work requirement for food stamps, people in rural Maine actually complied with it more than people in urban Maine. It's not just about jobs; it's about an attitude.

We have to change the culture from giving lifetime welfare benefits to people who choose not work into a system that expects and enables them to work. Giving people more welfare benefits with no time limit and no work requirement is not going to accomplish that.

Politicians in Augusta must think Mainers have the same work ethic as some of the welfare recipients they are trying to enable. These politicians come to the State House and accomplish nothing for five months. They cram together a budget in secret at the last minute and then complain about staying up late to do the work they didn't get done since January. But Maine taxpayers have a stronger work ethic than that. We can't weaken that work ethic with a looser welfare system.

I came here to reform welfare and make it more accountable, and the Maine people sent me back here to keep doing exactly that. This

budget does the opposite. I used my authority to lineitem veto over \$4 million to provide SNAP, TANF and SSI for non-citizens. Legislators put it back in. Increasing welfare increase for non-citizens while 2,000 elderly, disabled and mentally ill Mainers sit on wait lists for medical services is unacceptable.

If you voted for legislators who said they were going to reform welfare, vou need to contact them today. They are not listening to you.



stormwater discharges under the Clean Water Act. The act obligates thirty municipalities in Maine, including the Androscoggin River communities of Auburn, Lewiston, Lisbon, and Sabattus, to develop a stormwater management program and implement a number of pollution control measures. Two of these measures require public education on stormwater impacts and public participation in reduction efforts. The stenciling project is part of this program.

The public education campaign also provides lawn care tips for residents, such as "Mow High and Let the Clippings Lie" instead of using fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides, which are carried into the storm drain system by lawn runoff. Taller grass helps maintain healthy soil, which absorbs more water and reduces polluted runoff from lawns. Grass clippings are a natural

fertilizer. Using rainwater to water lawns instead of public water, which contains chlorine, is another way to reduce the use of chemicals and to protect the quality of local water bodies.

Recent EPA and Maine DEP audits in Lewiston and Auburn will likely require both communities to implement additional clean water efforts and expenditures. Public engagement efforts in pollution prevention, such as environmentally sensitive lawn care, can greatly assist the municipalities in keeping down compliance costs to taxpayers.

Tree Street Youth Changes Lives in Lewiston-Auburn

By Senator Angus King

With World Refugee Day on Saturday, June 20, I would like to highlight an organization that is making a difference in Maine by helping young people - particularly young refugees from Somalia, Sudan, and other African countries - to expand their horizons. As the roots of our refugee and immigrant population continue to grow stronger in Maine - and in the process, strengthen our communities - a group called Tree Street Youth is helping to nurture that growth, one student at a time.

Maine's history, like the rest of America, is inexorably linked to immigration. With the exception of our native tribes, we are all from somewhere else originally. It began with European immigrants from England, Scotland, Ireland, then people with French heritage came down from Canada, and Swedes settled in Aroostook County. For years, immigrants found work in Maine's busy mill towns. Now their descendants are our local leaders, our business owners, our neighbors, friends, and family.

And just as previous waves of immigrants have come to Maine in search of a better life for themselves and their children, newer immigrants - including refugees, asylees and asylum seekers, from Somalia, South Sudan and several Central African countries - are making new homes in Maine and making Maine more diverse, more dynamic, and a better place in the process.

And I think it's important to point out that the refugees are people who we've invited to come to this country because the conditions in their former countries were so unstable or because they feared persecution. These are people looking for a new start who are willing to work hard. But like anyone who finds themselves in a new, wholly unfamiliar situation, they can use some help and support. And groups like Tree Street Youth are so important and can have such significant impact because they smooth the transition and help promote cooperation and understanding within the community.

Founded in 2011 by two former Bates College students - Julia Sleeper and Kim Sullivan - who recognized the need for such a group, Tree Street Youth is dedicated to supporting young people in the Lewiston-Auburn area through academics, the arts and athletics. The organization, which originally grew out of an after school homework help program, now provides local youth with a safe space to promote healthy physical, social, emotional and academic development. Through its flourishing arts, college prep and job training programs, Tree Street is not only giving young people the tools, support and confidence they need to succeed, it's also helping to bring students from all different backgrounds together.

Tree Street Youth has proven to be a tremendous resource in Lewiston and Auburn, particularly for young people from immigrant families. The support services and sense of community provided at Tree Street empowers these young people to be independent, productive members of society. And while integrating into the community can be difficult for recent immigrants, refugees and their families, the Tree Street experience helps to connect young people to their peers and the community as a whole. This is a two-way street of understanding that helps bring everyone together.

And just as Tree Street Youth improves young lives, those young people can in turn improve Maine and can improve the rest of this great country. We need motivated, talented, and creative people from all backgrounds if we are going to keep pace with the rest of the world.

This is what America is all about. It's about families from around the world finding a new start, bringing with them new perspectives and new hope for the future. It's about a melting pot of people, cultures and ideas that combine to create a tapestry that is much stronger than any of its individual threads.

Welcoming new people and cultures hasn't always been easy. Sometimes our differences are more immediately apparent than our similarities, but over the years, immigrants and refugees have proven to be an irreplaceable part of America. Tree Street Youth has proven that support and community engagement can help ease the transition and create a brighter future. That's good news for Maine, and good news for the country.


"This grant will allow

Good Shepherd brokers Maine potato purchase by Boston Food Bank

Having already received national acclaim, the Good Shepherd Food Bank's farm purchase program, Mainers Feeding Mainers, has now attracted the attention of the largest food bank in New England.

Good Shepherd re-

cently entered into a pilot project with Irving Farms of Caribou, Maine and the Greater Boston Food Bank to broker the pur-

chase and distribution of one million pounds of potatoes from Irving to the GBFB.

Mainers Feeding Mainers is a partnership between Good Shepherd and various Maine farms, dairies, fisheries and other local food producers to eliminate hunger in Maine. It involves creating local food markets through trusted purchase partnerships and developing strategies to insure safe and efficient distribution of nutritious foods to hunger relief programs throughout the state.

In talks with other New England food banks, Good Shepherd learned that the Greater Boston Food Bank was purchasing over 8 million pounds of produce from Canada and trucking it right through Maine.

Mainers Feeding Mainers program manager Nancy Perry realized that her program could help direct some of that business to Maine farmers.

"Most of the larger potato growers in Maine are scaled for national contracts," Perry noted. "The mid-sized to smaller farmers are too busy farming to cultivate some of these unique purchasing relationships, or they simply don't have the infrastructure, like transportation and storage, to meet the demand. When Good Shepherd can step in to provide additional storage or share transportation costs, everyone wins."

"We are excited to launch this partnership with Good Shepherd and the Greater Boston Food Bank," said Noah Winslow, marketing coordinator for Irving Farms. "These relationships are wonderful for the Maine potato industry and an excellent distribution solution for the potatoes we grow that don't make it to the US #1 fresh market. Not only are these potatoes of good quality and perfectly edible, but they are fresh, local and now readily available to Boston most months of the year. It's nice to know they won't go to waste."

"We will now receive half of our potato acquisition, which typically averages one to two truckloads (20,000 pounds) per month, from Irving Farms," said Ann Cote, product management director for the Greater Boston Food Bank. "We are pleased to support local agriculture and to minimize our environmental footprint by sharing transportation and storage with Good Shepherd. Logistically, this is the most efficient and cost-effective

In 2014, Mainers Feeding Mainers purchased 1,048,000 pounds of produce and received 1,003,000 pounds in donations, vielding 2,051,000 pounds of healthy Maine produce for low-income families while investing nearly \$500,000 in Maine's agricultural sector. This investment also has a multiplier effect that helps strengthen the Maine communities where the farms are located.

The greatest obstacle for most farmers in Maine is the lack of cold storage and an adequate distribution and processing facility in central Maine. The Food Bank is currently promoting bond proposal LD 733, which would support infrastructure upgrades to allow for a significant expansion in the purchasing of Maine produce by the New England charitable food system and potentially other markets.

"I believe that this is the sort of investment the state needs to make for the agricultural sector to play a significant role in an economic recovery," says Kristen Miale, president of Good Shepherd Food
