

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
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## New Guidelines for Young Athletes with Concussions

As we get ready to send the kids back to school, parents of athletes may worry about things like sports injuries, particularly concussions. Concussions can be very scary for any parent. Important new research is changing the game plan for how to respond to and treat concussions in children and adolescents.

As concussions in adolescent athletes have grown over the past few decades, there has been a good bit of debate over the best way to treat them. In the past, guidelines recommended that young athletes who sustained a concussion should rest and avoid all physical activity until their concussion symptoms were gone, or what is referred to as "cocooning". Cocooning is stopping any type of physical activity or activities that stimulate the brain, to include reading, watching television, or using other electronic devices. However, new research indicates that moving more after a concussion can actually result in a faster and even better recovery.

If your child has suffered a concussion, their symptoms could include headaches, fatigue, confusion, dizziness, and so forth. These usually go away after a couple of days, and most young athletes have no further issues from the concussion. The doctor would recommend several days of rest and no activity to allow the brain to heal. However, new guidelines are reversing this advice.



But new guidelines, published in the "British Journal of Sports Medicine," challenge the old method of cocooning. According to the new research, the brain actually heals faster through stimulation, activation and physical activities. The new research indicates that extended rest time may prolong the concussion and cocooning may even be harmful.

"The brain benefits from movement and exercise, including after a concussion," said John Leddy, a professor of orthopedics at the Jacobs School of Medicine and Biomedical Sciences at the University at Buffalo, and one of the co-authors of the new guidelines.

The guidelines still advise a 24-72 hour period of modified but not total rest and monitoring of symptoms, but not longer. The children should not immediately jump back into strenuous activity, but should start by simple daily exercise that is enough to encourage healing, like taking walks, but does not add too much stress, until the symptoms are gone. Once they do return to normal activity, parents should continue to monitor their children for signs of lingering issues. As with all brain injuries, parents should consult with a neurologist throughout this process.

#### Kids Need a Little Dirt for their Health

Research shows that some germs found inside are actually good for your kids. YES! This is a win for parents who don't like to spend all of their time cleaning. For parents who spend a lot of time disinfecting their homes, while you may be ensuring that viruses that may linger



on cupboard doors are all disinfected away, you are also killing good germs with the bad germs.

So, experts are now saying a little bit of dirt is not only OK, it's actually GOOD for your little ones. Some germs actually help our bodies and scientists have been trying to understand the impact of the indoor micriobiome (the ecosystem of microbes inside the built environment) and how it impacts our health. Jack Gilbert, a professor of surgery and faculty director of the

Microbiome Center at the University of Chicago and co-author of the new book, the new book "Dirt Is Good: The Advantage of Germs for Your Child's Developing Immune System," explains the micribiome as the bacteria, fungi and viruses that live and breed in indoor spaces. "The exposures to microbes that we get from that environment are likely crucial to our health and wellness," he said. "Our immune systems are trained as children based on the microbes we are exposed to."

So why is maintaining a less than sterile environment good for your kids? Research published in the "New England Journal of Medicine" showed that children who grow up in environments that are rich in microbial exposures had lower allergy and asthma rates and the exposure to these "germs" is most important in the first six months of life. Having animals in the house, particularly dogs, is also helpful.

Joan W. Bennett, a fungal geneticist and professor of plant biology and pathology at Rutgers University-New Brunswick. Bennett is chairing a National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine, warns that in our attempt to keep everything super clean, we are actually doing the opposite of what we need to be doing. "To develop a robust human microbiome, we have to be surrounded by an appropriate microbiome in our environment."

However, that doesn't mean that a clean house is unhealthy and certainly a really dirty home is hazardous to your health. While scientists are trying to figure out how to harness the positive effects of the microbiome, a good solution – keep a clean home with a dog!

## Middleschoolers Brains Are Too Immature for Social Media

If you're looking for a reason to say "no" to your 'tween's request to set up a social media account, here is food for thought: In an article on PsychologyToday.com, Melanie Hempe,

founder of Families Managing Media, explains that 'tweens use social media differently than teens and adults and their immature brains are not prepared for the world of social media. Their frontal cortex is not developed and continues to need stimulation. There is no learning involved with social media since it is pure entertainment.


Social media negatively impacts social development,



Hempe said. It replaces the important social element of face-to-face interaction and connection with peers and their family. 'Tweens still need strong attachment to their family for social development.

Social media is addictive. The average teen spends nine hours a day on social media. During this time when their brain should be learning new things, this time spent on social media is literally a brain drain.

You choose the entertainment in your home, so delay the smart phone and social media as long as you can to help your child develop both socially and mentally.



It's something most parents don't want to think about and they sure don't want to talk about it.

#### But chances are, their children are talking about suicide.

ast year in Kern County, seven youth under age 18 died by suicide, according to Ellen Eggert, program support supervisor for Kern Behavioral Health and Recovery Services. "It's a public health problem and it's preventable," Eggert said.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, suicide was the second leading cause of death nationwide for children and young adults ages 10 to 24. Suicide has been on the minds of many teenagers across the county, state and nation, thanks to a Netflix series, "13 Reasons Why."

#### Drama goes viral

The Netflix show, which is scheduled to return for a second season, tells the story of Hannah Baker, a high school student who kills herself and leaves behind 13 cassette tapes detailing how some of her classmates contributed to her death.

The show, co-produced by pop star Selena Gomez, is based on Jay Asher's 2007 novel.

Those affiliated with the show say the series can help teens who may be struggling with thoughts of suicide. However, critics raise concerns that teenagers who binge-watch the show without adult guidance may be affected by some of the topics, including bullying, rape and drunk driving, as well as be encouraged by the characters on the show, who fail to tell adults about what is going on.

The series has raised concerns among mental health professionals, school officials and parents over whether it glamorizes suicide. "I would never let my kids watch it alone," Eggert said of the show.

She said the show is fiction, not reality. "You

never depict a suicide scene—it's not pretty and it's not painless," she said, although a scene in the series may suggest otherwise. "And a school counselor would never handle it that way."

But there is one benefit to the show, Eggert admitted. "The best thing that has come out of it is it got people talking about suicide," she said.

#### Lots of factors

According to the National Association of School Psychologists, both schools and parents play a role in preventing youth suicide by being aware of potential risk factors

Odds are watching the TV series won't lead a healthy student to consider suicide, but those who have anxiety and depression issues could be vulnerable. "Ninety percent of people who die by suicide have a diagnosable mental illness," Eggert said. "Most don't ask for help because of the stigma and because it's taboo."

Depression, anxiety and suicide often go hand-inhand and parents are urged to be vigilant about their child's behavior.

"Teens have not lived the life and experiences and failures that [their parents] have. Most things they experience are pretty major in their eyes. It's usually a combination of things that lead to suicide," Eggert said. "A lot of these things were there when we were growing up, but it's very different today. Social media makes so many things worse."

Recent legislation under the California Education Code mandates every local educational agency that

serves students in grades 7-12 adopt a policy on pupil suicide prevention, intervention and postvention. But it's also up to parents to make sure they know what's going on in their children's lives.

#### Don't be afraid to ask

Eggert suggests parents talk to their children about suicide. "The students know a lot about suicide and are usually willing to talk about it," she said.

And if kids want to talk about feelings of depression or anxiety, parents need to listen with a sympathetic ear.

"It's no different than if you child broke his leg and complained of pain, you'd want to do something to get him help. Just because you can't see it doesn't mean it's not there," Eggert said. "We have to get rid of the stigma. Depression and anxiety are real medical illnesses that anybody could get. Parents need to be open and let their children know they can talk to them about anything, even if it's something they don't want to hear."

Eggert said parents shouldn't shy away from talking with their children for fear of being a bad parent or blaming themselves if their kids aren't happy.

And Eggert disputed the idea that bringing up suicide will give kids ideas. "There is no evidence that talking about it plants the idea. All the research shows people usually won't come to us and tell us what they are thinking about suicide.

"Parents must have the courage to speak up. Ask, "Are you thinking about suicide? Are you thinking about killing yourself?" Use those terms," she said.

"If we are non-judgmental and ask in a caring way, they will tell you. And you may have to ask more than once."

Eggert said knowledge is the first step in prevention. "You don't have to solve the problem. You don't have to handle it on your own. You just have to ask and then get them help."

## HOW TO HELP

The National Association of School Psychologists offers the following guide for families:

- Ask your child if they have heard or seen the series 13
  Reasons Why. While we don't recommend that they be
  encouraged to view the series, do tell them you want
  to watch it, with them or to catch up, and discuss their
  thoughts.
- 2. Don't be afraid to ask if they have thought about suicide or if someone is hurting them. Raising the issue of suicide does not increase the risk or plant the idea. On the contrary, it creates the opportunity to offer help.
- 3. Ask your child if they think any of their friends or classmates exhibit warning signs. Talk with them about how to seek help for their friend or classmate. Guide them on how to respond when they see or hear any of the warning signs.
- 4. Listen to your children's comments without judgment. Doing so requires that you fully concentrate, understand, respond, and then remember what is being said. Put your own agenda aside.
- 5. Get help from a school-employed or community-based mental health professional if you are concerned for your child's safety or the safety of one of their peers.

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

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# Chronic School Absenteeism: Days Off Add Up-and Subtract From Their Future

When children don't attend school, they can't learn. That seems pretty simple. Yet absenteeism and truancy are problems for schools across the nation. A recent analysis from the U.S. Department of Education shows that chronic absenteeism impacts students in all parts of the country and is prevalent among all races, as well as students with disabilities.

he first-ever national comprehensive data collected on chronic absenteeism found more than 6 million students—or 13 percent of all students—missed at least 15 days of school in the 2013-14 school year.

"Chronic absenteeism is a national problem," said U.S. Secretary of Education John B. King Jr. "Frequent absences from school can be devastating to a child's education. Missing school leads to low academic achievement and triggers drop outs. Millions of young people are missing opportunities in postsecondary education, good careers and a chance to experience the American dream."

Kern County Schools wants to head off an upward trend of absenteeism by kicking off Attendance Awareness Month to remind parents the importance of keeping kids in school and the importance of attendance.

"Attendance has been brought to the forefront as correlational studies have shown that students who miss school tend to have lower grades, lower test scores and lower graduation rates," explained Bryan Campoy, supervising administrator, innovative programs at Kern High School District.

#### Doing the math

School attendance is essential to academic success, but too often students, parents and schools do not realize how quickly absences — excused as well as unexcused — can add up to academic trouble.

According to the California Education Code, chronic absence is missing 10 percent of the school year, or about two to three days every month.

"For most Kern County schools, including Kern high schools, that is 18 or more days of missed school," Campoy explained.

Frequent absences can translate into third-graders unable to master reading, sixth-graders failing courses and ninth-graders dropping out of high school. The impact hits low-income students, who most depend on school for providing opportunities to learn, particularly hard.

This year will be the first year that California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System will collect attendance data, as well as provide schools and districts comparable data. This collection will give local districts a common definition for chronic absenteeism. "As educators, we want students to reach their full potential and graduate with a diploma, while being college and career ready," Campoy said. "High school graduates, on average, make over a million dollars more than a dropout in their lifetime."

#### Making the grade

Truancy isn't just a product of parent irresponsibility or neglect. It can be a result of even the most well-intended parent. Those "mental health days" you allow your middleschooler to take, as well as multiple family vacations? They can add up before you know it.

"The school year is only 180 days, please plan accordingly," Campoy said. "We must make school attendance a top priority in order to ensure high academic success for all students. Bottom line is every day counts."

Campoy is so passionate about keeping kids in school because he has seen the research that has shown attendance in eighth grade is a better predictor of high school graduation than test scores.

"High school chronic absenteeism is the leading warning sign that a student will drop out of school," he said. "That is why it is particularly important that students should only miss school because they have a fever or a contagious illness, and a doctor has deemed a student to stay home and recover."

Attendance Awareness Month, set for mid-August through September, will include evening meetings with parents and students for a Truancy Orientation.

Support will continue through the year as well. "We have an outreach team that goes out door-to-door to follow up on chronically absent students and their families to connect them to additional resources that will lead the student back to school," Campoy said.

"We provide intervention referrals for parent meetings, such as Parent Project and Parents on a Mission, while also encouraging families to access other services such as health services, housing information, transportation and nutrition assistance."

Campoy said the Student Attendance Review Team meets on school sites to support families and provide intervention to get their student to come to school. Cooperation extends throughout the school community, Campoy said.

"We helped bring Kern County's first Truancy Conference to town through partnerships with Kings County and Kern County Superintendent of Schools," he said. "The three-day summit featured state and local expert speakers, panelists, trainings and breakout sessions with an ultimate goal of providing attendees the resources and tools to help reduce truancy and chronic absenteeism in Central Valley schools."

In the end, it's all about student success. "The mission of the KHSD is to graduate students prepared to succeed in the workplace and the post-secondary level," Campoy said. "Attendance is a priority in achieving our mission and we are seeing positive results."

Good Eats with Grapes

Kids (and adults) love grapes! Whether you enjoy them by the handful as a refreshing snack or use them to add color, crunch and a touch of sweetness to a meal, grapes are a heart-healthy option that make eating better easy.

Grapes are a great healthy snack on their own, but why not add them to meals, too? With a juicy burst of flavor, grapes show how simple it can be to make good-for-you-dishes that also taste great. Even though California grapes are a snacking staple in most kitchens, you may not realize how versatile they can be for cooking. For example, grapes add a sweet touch and complement the bold spice on a skewer of grilled shrimp. Fresh, flavorful grapes even put a tangy, fresh twist on a soothing glass of iced tea.

## Sparkling Hibiscus Tea with Grapes and Mint Servings: 8

#### **Ingredients**

6 c. water, divided

1 Tbsp. honey

6 hibiscus tea bags

2 c. green California grapes, divided

10 mint leaves

1 navel orange, sliced

ice

16oz. sparkling water

#### Preparation

- 1. Using tea kettle or saucepan, bring 3 cups water and honey to boil. Add tea bags, turn off heat and steep 6-8 minutes. Remove tea bags and allow remaining liquid to cool 15 minutes.
- 2. In martini shaker or bowl, muddle 1 cup grapes with mint leaves. Add muddled grape and mint mixture to 48-60 ounce pitcher along with remaining water and orange slices. Stir in hibiscus tea mixture. Refrigerate at least 30 minutes. Strain before serving.
- To serve, add ice to 8-ounce glass. Top with 3-4 grapes, 2 ounces sparkling water and hibiscus tea mixture.





#### Zahtar Shrimp and Grape Kabobs

Servings: 6

#### Ingredients

2 Tbsp. zahtar

1 clove garlic, minced

1 tsp. chopped fresh thyme

2 Tbsp. white balsamic vinegar

1 tsp. honey

1/8 tsp. sea salt

1/8 tsp. pepper

2 Tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil

36-40 large shrimp (about 2 lbs.), shelled and deveined

1 c. whole green California grapes

1 c. whole red California grapes

#### Preparation

- 1. In medium bowl, combine zahtar, garlic, thyme, vinegar, honey, salt, pepper and olive oil. Whisk to combine. Add shrimp and toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate at least 30 minutes or up to 4 hours.
- 2. Thread shrimp and grapes onto skewers. Heat grill or grill pan to medium-high.
- 3. Grill skewers, turning once, until shrimp are lightly charred and cooked through and grapes are caramelized but firm, about 2-3 minutes per side.

However in the past, his parents would initially chastise him for his lack of effort, and eventually make a deal with him and allow to complete some, but not all of his assigned chores. "Okay," says, father, "...but you better finish it all tomorrow, or else!" Father's attitude is so forgiving, that brother doesn't seem to worry at all about what he had not done. Brother smiles believing that he has gotten away with something. "Great," he grins, "...now I can keep playing my video game."

Sister has some expected responsibilities such as cleaning her room on a regular basis, helping with the kitchen and oft times putting some of the used dinner dishes in the dishwasher. Tonight, as mother comes to retrieve her to tell her that dinner is ready, the bedroom door can hardly be opened.

Mother attempts to secure an answer, "Why is it that I cannot even open this door?" To which sister replies, "...Come on Mom, I'm busy, just bring me my dinner in here, I'll eat while I'm working." But sister is not working, as much as she is enjoying all her free time by corresponding with peers on her phone.


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## Tips to help your student succeed

There is no magic formula for school success, but there are plenty of things you can do to improve your child's performance at school. Such as:

- 1. Keep a consistent bedtime for your child. Being well-rested enables kids to better focus in school.
- 2. Serve a healthy breakfast. A protein-rich breakfast, such as eggs, or cereal with milk will give your child fuel for his body and brain.
- 3. Initiate regular communication with her teacher. Let her know of any concerns you have or if there are any irregular circumstances at home. Ask for her feedback on how your
- 4. Read regularly with your child. Not only does reading provide a good parent/child bonding time, it also encourages development of reading skills.
- 5. Take a look at her take-home folder or assignment notebook on occasion. Review deadlines and your child's plan for meeting them.
- 6. Encourage your child to explore deeper into topics that interest her. Learning is a lifelong skill and kids need to see that they can find enjoyment in it.
- **7.** Ask open-ended questions about what your child is studying in school. Let him teach you. Passing along skills and information is a good way to reinforce what they're
- **8.** Buy them books. Buy yourself books. Children raised in a print-rich environment are shown to be more proficient readers, according to Educational Testing Service.
- 9. Praise growth rather than achievement. Psychologist and researcher Carol Dweck emphasizes a growth mindset that values learning for its own sake as a better predictor of success than "talent" or IQ.
- **10.** When working with your child on homework, guide them in strategies for completing it without doing the work for
- 11. Talk about current events as a family. Awareness of the world around them and thinking critically about what is happening make children better learners.
- **12.** Get involved in your child's school when you are able. Interacting with other parents can offer insights on what happens in your child's school day and alert you to upcoming big deadlines.



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


