### **DNR negotiates secret Mille Lacs agreement with tribes** based on severely flawed estimates of hooking mortality according to MLFAC

In advance of the Mille Lacs Lake Walleye season closure on Monday, Sept. 4, the Mille Lacs Fishery Advisory Committee (MLFAC) Co-Chair Dean Hanson confronted Minnesota Department of Natural Resources' Commissioner Tom Landwehr in a Aug. 24 letter about a recent Minnesota Department of Natural Resources agreement

signed with the tribes. The agreement between the DNR, Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission (GLIFWC), the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe, and the Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa entitled, "Consensus: Mille Lacs Fishery Harvest Plan, 2017-2020", was dated March 31, 2017. Hanson's letter to Landwehr

noted that the MLFAC was "shocked to say the least." Adding that, "No one from

the DNR had ever spoken to MLFAC about this agreement, either before or after its signing." Hanson wrote that DNR's secretive agreement "reinforces our position that more transparency is needed in connection with DNR and Band discussions and negotiations."

After his analysis of the agreement, Hanson recognized that the agreement resulted from an over-harvest of 6,800 pounds in 2016. However, the "harvest" was based on severely flawed estimates of hooking mortality, not an actual harvest, which still "may well be within the margin of error of all of these calculations" according to Hanson. "So why," Hanson asks, "given the insignificant overage and its minimal impact, did the DNR give up so much?"

Also problematic was the agreement's boost to treaty harvest quotas, setting harvestable surplus levels, "which could severely reduce our potential harvest in the future" according to Hanson's letter.

Further, the agreement locks anglers into and overage program, using "a hooking mortality based on the suspect hooking mortality study" Hanson wrote. "They locked us into an overage program which all comes due in 2020 and will probably significantly reduce our harvest potential in 2018-2020." Proper Economic Resource

Management (PERM) President Douglas Meyenburg said that making a secret agreement "shows DNR leadership has no regard for the MLFAC members whom they appoint. It ignores constituencies ML-

FAC represents and suggestions they have been making to improve co-management of Mille Lacs."

Meyenburg added that this agreement "leads one to believe all the meetings with Governor Dayton and DNR officials have been nothing more than dog-and-pony shows."

Meyenburg also found it "infuriating" Mille Lacs the co-management of walleye angling has been "hardwired--for the next three years!"

He called it a "one-sided sweetheart deal of a payoff, extracted over a measly 6,800-pound overage."

Meyenburg said that DNR Commissioner Landwehr and Fisheries Chief Don Pereira "must resign."

He added that other parties to this agreement, tribal management and the taxpayer-funded GLIFWC, "should be exposed for breaking trust with the citizens of Minnesota, and violating the spirit of the Supreme Court's affirmation of 1837 Treaty harvest rights."

Other actions Meyenburg suggested included Governor Dayton calling for a priority investigation by the Office of the Legislative Auditor, and Legislative Committees looking back at all DNR-Tribal/GLIFWC meetings since Court ordered negotiations began."

Hanson ended his letter writing, "we believe MLFAC, as well as the public deserves answers to these and many other questions." He asked for an open meeting with the DNR, MLFAC and anyone else who is interested within two weeks.



# Mille Lacs Lake area business owners react to discovery of agreement

Mille Lacs Fishery Advisory Committee (MLFAC) member Steve Johnson released a video on facebook expressing his opinion that the DNR betrayed its own "Advisory" Committee. Johnson feels the betrayal stems from the DNR's secretly negotiating an agreement with the Mille Lacs and Fond du Lac Bands and GLIFWC. Johnson's videos follow MLFAC Co-Chair Dean Hanson's letter to DNR Commissioner Landwehr sent last week.

"No one from the DNR ever mentioned [Consensus: Mille Lacs Fishery Harvest Plan, 2017-2020] to MLFAC either before or after its signing," according to Johnson. It clearly left MLFAC members feeling betrayed.

Johnson found it "disturbing" that the DNR would meet with tribal leaders, and never let on for months. "Not one single word or hint was given to MLFAC members, even though the dispute resolution topic was brought up at almost every meeting." Johnson said it was "nasty" and "completely uncalled for."

"The DNR squandered its relationship and the trust MLFAC members and DNR leadership had painstakingly worked out over the past year" according to Doug Meyenburg, Proper Economic Resource Management (PERM) President. "Loss of trust brings an obvious question: Was this really the first

time? Given clues from the past, MLFAC may wonder how close the DNR's clandestine negoti-

enburg wondered. After being exposed, the DNR told MLFAC the secret agreement is actually a "pub-

lic document." Johnson feels that is a real stretch, given the heavy-handed warning (all initial caps in original) making up the agreement's first page headline:

The live bait restriction remains in place for anglers in watercraft.

Anglers can fish for muskellunge and northern pike at night using artificial lures longer than 8 inches or suck-

er minnows longer than 8 inches. Bowfishing for rough fish also is allowed at night but possession of live bait or angling equipment is not allowed and only rough fish may be in possession.

With the final open water walleye season closure on Mille Lacs, anglers cannot target walleye when fishing for other species.

### CWD found on deer farms prompts new feeding ban in 11 counties

A new deer feeding ban is in place until 2019 for 11 central and north-central Minnesota counties surrounding two farms where multiple captive deer were infected with chronic wasting disease.

"Feeding bans in central and north-central Minnesota are precautionary," said Lou Cornicelli, wildlife research manager for the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. "Wild deer in these areas are not know to have CWD. These feeding bans are a proactive step to keep CWD at bay."

Central Minnesota counties affected by the ban are Kandiyohi; McCloud; Meeker; Stearns; Wright; and the portion of Renville County north of U.S. Highway 212. North-central Minnesota

counties affected are Aitkin; Crow Wing; Morrison; the portion of Cass County south of Minnesota highways 34 and 200; and the portion of Mille Lacs County north of County Road 11.

In Fillmore, Houston, Olmsted, Mower and Winona counties, a ban on deer feeding and deer attractants that has been in place since December 2016 remains in effect through Wednesday, June 27, 2018.

"Feed is not just a pile of corn or grain," Cornicelli said. "It includes salt and mineral blocks that many hunters use as well as fruits, vegetables, nuts, hay and other food that is capable of attracting or enticing deer."

One of the most probable mechanisms for CWD spread among deer is over a food or attractant source that concentrates animals. Feeding bans are intended to reduce the number of areas where deer can come into close contact, either directly or indirectly.

The feeding ban in southeastern Minnesota also includes attractants such as deer urine, blood, gland oil, feces or other bodily fluids. These products include such things as bottled estrus and mock scrape drips.

People who feed birds or small mammals must do so in a manner that prevents access by deer or places the food at least six feet above the ground.

Food placed as a result of normal agricultural practices is generally exempted from the feeding ban. But cattle operators should take steps that minimize contact between deer and cattle.

The new deer feeding ban for central and north-central Minnesota became effective Monday, Aug. 28, and extends through Thursday, Feb. 28, 2019.

"Not feeding deer is a simple step that anyone can take to help prevent the spread of disease," Cornicelli said. "Although well-intentioned, feeding wildlife often does more harm than good."

Mandatory precautionary CWD testing will be done in portions of the new feeding ban areas to determine whether the disease may have spread from captive to wild deer. Samples will be collected from 5,400 deer harvested in permit areas immediately surrounding CWD-infected farms near Merrifield in Crow Wing County and Litchfield in Meeker County.

Precautionary testing also will be mandatory for 1,800 deer harvested in permit areas adjoining southeastern Minnesota's CWD management zone, deer permit area 603.



# **Crosby City Council accepts Mayor Jim Hunter resignation**

At the beginning of the City of Crosby Council meeting on Aug. 28, the council accepted Mayor Hunter's resignation. Councilman Paul Heglund made the motion to accept the resignation with Councilman Jim Traylor seconding. The city received a letter of resignation from Hunter effective Aug. 25.

Councilman Bob Novak spoke about the resignation and said, "I just want to say that, while I will vote in favor of accepting Jim's resignation, that while I know there were many issues surrounding his term, I think that his heart was in the right place. And I would like to just recognize the work that he did. And I think he was trying his best. And I appreciate that he gave his time and energy to it. Sorry it was so contentious. I do appreciate what he tried to do."

The council voted unanimously to accept the resignation of James Hunter.

Then acting Mayor Ron Prushek asked the council to submit a written letter of interest, if any of them wanted to be considered to fill the now vacant mayoral seat.

Novak, who was recently appointed to the council, expressed an interest in serving as mayor.

He said, "Ron, if I may, I'm just going to short circuit the process and I intend to submit a letter saying that I'm interested in the vacancy. And I just want to let you all know that now, so you could think about that. I'd appreciate your support and I understand, if you have other ideas. But I just wanted you to know it was, it's a decision I didn't make easily. But my understanding is the term ends the last day of 2018. In terms of trying to help bridge the gap. I'm going to say that I'm interested in the mayoral job."

Prushek thanked Councilman Novak for his interest. Prushek then asked if there was anybody else. There was no response.

The council will consider written letters of interest for the vacated mayoral seat from current council members at the next council meeting at 6 p.m. on Monday, September 11.

### **Unfinished business**

Novak asked about the Hematite road project. Clerk/ Treasurer Sova said there was some confusion and that road resurfacing project was actually for the 2018 budget year not this year.

Novak asked about the air conditioners if the Hallett Community Center topic was discussed at the finance committee?

Sova indicated it was scheduled to be discussed this coming Wednesday. New business

### Andrew Hook introduced the topic of the Cuyuna Range Youth Center City

Wide Clean up on September 23 from 9 a.m.- noon. Hook then introduced the new Program/Volunteer Coordinator Megan Cummings (pronounced Mee-gan). Megan spoke about developing youth volunteer skills and looking for adult mentor volunteers to help. Linda Peeples later clarified there would not be enough time or volunteers to do a complete citywide cleanup.

Council approved extending the campground host position through 2018 to Linda Bosch.

Prushek agreed with Sova to present a \$100 gas gift card to Bosch, since it was an unpaid position.

Linda Peeples of the Hwy. 210 Development Committee talked about a grant they just got from the University of Minnesota Morris and a student researcher to do research on what other cities in Minnesota have done about marketing for their merchants while their road have been close. In 2021, State Highway 210 through Crosby will be closed.

The council approved the use of the cook shack at no charge to the Crow Wing County Soil and Water for the local government tour of the Serpent Lake project.

Planning and Zoning Coordinator Justin Burslie addressed the council about three property line adjustments were approved by the Planning and Zoning Board. The council approved amendment to covenants these subject properties and vacating an old easement on a property owner that owns both the subject property and the property with the easement.

There was a question about the fire department having an old access to the lake for water through this same property. It was decided the old license to the fire department wasn't currently applicable.

Building Inspector Scott Sadusky talked about a structure that was a hazard on a railroad property that had been on lease for a 75 years. Sadusky said the railroad has been trying to find a copy of the lease document for over a year now. He felt compelled to inform the council of the potential hazard.

The council approved the city crew do the demolition of the hazardous structure allowing Sadusky and City Attorney Joesph Langel to work out the details.

Heglund pointed out there are some residents that have also been driving across railroad property.

City Engineer Phil Martin indicated he would produce a feasibility report for the Lakeshore Drive project. The council approved the work for Martin to produce the report.

Sova requested approval amend the authorization form to remove James Hunter from the approved signatures for the Unity Bank checking account. The council approved this action. Then when the new mayor is appointed he or she will be added. Currently two signatures are required on a check. There are three people with the authority to sign checks: Heglund, Sova and Chief of Police Kim Coughlin.

The council approve having Mooers Electric get a firm estimate for the additional electric work to reconfigure camper hookup pedestals in the park.

Sova said that the language in the three year contract with Irondale Township has increases each year. Sova said the rate went from \$8,000 per quarter in 2016 to \$10,000 per quarter in 2017. Sova has been holding their checks this year because they are paying at the 2016 rate. She wanted to make the council aware this is what she was doing. The council instructed City Attorney Langel to send a letter to Irondale Township to find out what their position is.

Novak noticed a fence on city property by parking lot by the DMV and recycling it is in need of repair and possibly be replaced. The council decided to have public works look into it.

# Minnesota fall duck and goose seasons approaching soon

Hunters have a lot to look forward to this fall when the Minnesota waterfowl season opens Saturday, Sept. 23.

"Habitat conditions look good in most areas, wild rice reports are good for hunters in the northern portions of the state and waterfowl numbers are favorable," said Steve Cordts, waterfowl specialist with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

The waterfowl season will open with similar bag limits and season dates that were in place last year. The early goose season will open Saturday, Sept. 2 and extend through Sunday, Sept. 17. Duck seasons and limits

Duck season will again be open for 60 days in each of the three waterfowl zones.

In the north zone, duck season is Saturday, Sept. 23, through Tuesday, Nov. 21.

In the central zone, duck season is Saturday, Sept. 23, through Sunday, Oct. 1, closes for five days, then reopens Saturday, Oct. 7, and runs through Sunday, Nov. 26. In the south zone, duck season is Saturday, Sept. 23, through Sunday, Oct. 1, closes for 12 days, then reopens Saturday, Oct. 14, and runs through Sunday, Dec. 3.

The daily bag limit for ducks remains at six per day and individual species limits are identical to those used last fall: four mallards (only two can be hens), three scaup, three wood ducks, two redheads and two canvasbacks, except the pintail bag limit was reduced to one per day and the black duck limit increased to two per day.

Canada goose seasons and limits

The goose season and limits will also be the same as last fall.

"Our Canada goose population in the state is healthy and it looks like there will be lots of young geese this fall, so hunters should expect a good season. And, the seasons are long and extend late into December or January depending on where you hunt - so lots of opportunity to participate," Cordts said.

The early September goose season will open statewide on Sept. 2 and run through Sept. 17. Bag limits for dark geese are five per day statewide. A \$4 permit is required striction prohibiting hunting within 100 yards of surface water remains in effect in the northwest goose zone, Carlos Avery Wildlife Management Area, Ocheda Lake Game Refuge and an area surrounding Swan Lake in Nicollet County. Early season goose hunters should consult the 2017 Waterfowl Supplement for zone maps and additional details.

Minnesota's regular goose season will open in conjunction with the duck season statewide on Sept. 23, with a bag limit of three dark geese per day the entire season.

"Dark" geese include Canada geese, white-fronted geese and brant. Goose season will be closed in the central and south duck zones when duck season is closed.

### Other seasons

Youth Waterfowl Day will be Saturday Sept. 9. The season for sandhill cranes runs Saturday, Sept. 16, through Sunday, Oct. 22, in the northwest goose and sandhill crane zone only.
