Lutherville teen awarded major prize for his charity work

Jordan Yaffe of Lutherville, Maryland, was awarded \$36,000 by the Helen Diller Family Foundation in recognition of his commitment to "tikkun olam"—repair the world.

The teen, along with 14 other young leaders from across the nation, received the national 2017 Diller Teen Tikkun Olam Award, a prestigious honor given to youth leaders who have demonstrated exceptional leadership, community service and action.


"It is a remarkable honor to be a recipient along with such an amazing group of people," Jordan said.

"The award and its past recipients represent the commitment to giving to the community that we strive to have 'Dunks for Diabetes,' he said of his annual 3-on-3 basketball tournament that raises money for diabetes research.

The tournaments take place in several locations around the country and Jordan honors Fred Brancati, an influential doctor who researched diabetes at Johns Hopkins.

"My next-door neighbor growing up, Dr. Fred Brancati, was an influential researcher in the field of diabetes at Johns Hopkins and he tragically passed away from ALS [Lou Gehrig's Disease] when I was in eighth grade," Jordan said. "The year before, during the Spring of 2012, I started Dunks for Diabetes to honor his lifelong work. His story not only still inspires me to grow Dunks for Diabetes but also to give to others, in all facets of my life."

The money raised by Dunks for Diabetes has gone to the American Diabetes Association, whose mission is to prevent

and cure diabetes and to improve the lives of all people affected by diabetes.

Jordan has also used a portion of the proceeds from Dunks for Diabetes for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Fund in honor of Will Hauver and the Diabetes Egg Crack Challenge.

He says Hauver was an individual who had a great and positive effect on many

in the Baltimore community.

The progression of Dunks for Diabetes was evident in its year-to-year growth. Five years ago, 16 middle school teams participated and Jordan was able to raise \$2,000 for the American Diabetes Association. Most recently about 48 teams participated helping raise as much as \$5,000. In total, Dunks for Diabetes has raised \$29,207 and has engaged more

than 1,000 players and 100 volunteers over the last 10 tournaments.

"I am energized by finding a genuine sense of purpose and inspiring others to do the same," Jordan said.

Jordan and the others were recognized at a luncheon last month, which also celebrated the culmination of a weekend-long series of business strategy workshops, networking and mentoring initiatives, during which award winners exchanged ideas with other socially conscious peers and interacted with Diller Teen Tikkun Olam Award alumni from years past.

The Helen Diller Family Foundation supports programs and institutions throughout the world, with a focus on education, science, and the arts. The Foundation, which has awarded other major grants and gifts to places and organizations like the University of California Berkeley and Santa Cruz and the De Young Museum, annually recognizes top educators in their field and teens doing charity work.

A highlight of the award presentation was the debut of a special documentary-style video, featuring the accomplishments of Jordan and other teens in a behind-the-scenes chronicle of their leadership achievements. Each participant's projects were showcased illustrating the ability to affect global change through leadership and community and service, and inspiring hope for viable solutions to even the world's toughest problems, according foundation officials.

"Being recognized has and will continue to motivate me to grow the fundraiser and to make the world a better place," Jordan said.

Urgent: Reinstate ban on assault weapons to prevent mass killings

Our thoughts and prayers go out to the nearly 600 victims and their families of the largest mass shooting in US history last Sunday night in Las Vegas. The mass carnage made that city into what can only be described as a war zone. But our response needs to include more than prayers and moments of silence. We need to act to prevent more mass shootings, which are now occurring at an average of more than one per day.

The weapons of choice for such mass shootings are known as assault weapons. They were designed for the battlefield, which is the only place they should be allowed. They can rapidly fire bullets as fast as the shooter can pull the trigger. They were easily adapted by the shooter to become automatic weapons in which a single pull of the trigger can spray bullets with no pause.

The hopeful news in taking on such a monumental but urgent challenge is that New Jersey has banned such weapons since 1991, and they were banned nationally from 1994-2004. Tragically, the national ban had a sunset clause after ten years, so it automatically expired when then President George W. Bush refused to seek its renewal.

New Jersey's Assault Weapons Ban is a good basis for the feasibility of a renewed national ban. In 1993, after the NRA had helped elect an anti-assault-weapons ban majority in the NJ legislature in 1991, large majorities voted to rescind New Jersey's Ban. Then Governor Florio vetoed the rescission, and a vote to over-ride that veto easily succeeded in the NJ Assembly.

Three weeks later, a vote was scheduled in the NJ Senate. We in Ceasefire NJ mobilized intensively in the faith community and elsewhere. Many of the 70 percent of New Jerseyans who wanted to keep the ban urgently contacted their NJ Senator.

What followed was the closest thing I've ever seen to a legislative miracle: not a single NJ Senator voted to rescind the ban! When the Senator who represented our district, who supported the NRA, was asked why he voted to keep the ban, he said it was because he got 2,000 phone calls and 90 percent urged keeping the ban.

The fact that we were successful in breaking the NRA's stranglehold in New Jersey at least partly inspired the successful effort the next year to pass the National Assault Weapons Ban. Despite that fact that, unlike the New Jersey Ban, that included a grandfather clause, reputable studies showed that the National Ban resulted in a nearly 2/3 reduction in shootings with assault weapons.

We can seek to pass a National Assault Weapons Ban again. We need to press to have it introduced and voted on before the 2018 Congressional elections. In the 2006 midterms, the Coalition for Peace Action, of which Ceasefire NJ is a Project, helped make the Iraq War a litmus test issue, and the majority of those elected were opposed to that war.



MSDE awarded \$45M to strengthen literacy

Baltimore— The Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) has been awarded a three-year, \$45 million federal grant to help advance literacy in students from birth through grade 12.

The grant is MSDE's largest competitive grant in nearly three years.

The Striving Readers' Comprehensive Literacy Grant, awarded by the U.S. Department of Education, will support the State's Comprehensive Literacy Plan (CLP), including pre-literacy skills, reading and writing. The grant will be awarded in three increments, \$15 million each, contingent on funding.

"I believe that every child in Maryland deserves access to a world-class education regardless of what neighborhood they happen to grow up in," said Governor Larry Hogan. "Strong literacy skills are essential to educational success, and this grant will help ensure our students have the tools they need to compete for the jobs of the future."

"Learning starts with literacy, and stronger programs early in a child's life will never stop paying off," said Dr.

Karen Salmon, State Superintendent of Schools. "We are looking forward to the opportunity to provide resources to our local school systems to enhance their literacy programs across reading, writing and mathematics, as well as to increase professional learning development for staff."

The State CLP is based upon five keys: educational leadership; strategic professional learning; continuity of standards-based instruction; comprehensive series of assessments; and tiered instruction and intervention. A statewide workgroup consisting of local system experts and other stakeholders will provide additional input on the Maryland CLP. The first meeting was held on October 5, 2017.

Maryland's local school systems will benefit from the grant, as 95 percent of the funds will be passed to local systems to support their literacy work. The new grant places special emphasis on disadvantaged children, including those living in poverty, English learners, and children with disabilities. The State's plan targets evidence-based strategies and interventions, and alignment of State literacy plans between learning and literacy for birth to age five with kindergarten through grade 12.

Lawmakers seek to end triple-digit interest on payday and car-title loans

A group of Capitol Hill lawmakers are combining efforts and influence to legislatively crack down on predatory lending, nationwide. Seventeen Members of the U.S. House and eight U.S. Senators are supporting companion bills that would slash the cost of payday and car-title loans from their typical 300 percent annual interest rate to no more than 36 percent—the same rate protection that Congress first provided military families in 2006.

Today, 90 million Americans living in 15 states and the District of Columbia benefit from enacted rate caps of 36 percent or lower. But in the other 35 states, residents remain vulnerable to triple-digit interest rates that average 400 percent nationwide on an average loan of only \$350.

When consumers use their car titles as collateral for a larger and equally costly loan, a loss of personal transportation occurs when borrowers can no longer

keep up with the spiraling high costs. If enacted, the legislation is expected to have an immediate impact on payday and car-title loans, but would ensure that all consumer financial services would end cycles of debt that trick and trap unsuspecting consumers into long-term debt. The bicameral effort is led in the U.S. Senate by Senators Dick Durbin of Illinois and Jeff Merkley of Oregon. Their leadership counterparts in the

would take advantage of them through predatory lending practices that can wreak havoc on people's lives and perpetuate a cycle of indebtedness," said Cohen. "Both justice and morality dictate that reasonable caps on interest be enacted to protect borrowers from devious lenders."

From the Deep South, to the Pacific Coast, and westward to the mid-Atlantic and Midwest states, state payday interest

when it comes to state legislatures, reform efforts are often thwarted by the industry."

Already more than 40 national, state and local organizations have jointly written their members of Congress in support of the legislation. Signers of the correspondence include civil rights organizations, labor, consumer advocates, and research institutes.

In part, the letter states, "Veterans, seniors, women, and communities of color are most often targeted for exploitation by these unaffordable high-cost loans... While the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau is expressly prohibited from setting a rate cap, Congress is not and should do so. A federal rate cap puts all creditors on a level playing field without undermining any additional consumer protections in the states."

Durbin said that, despite the economic gains we have made as a nation in recent years, many working families continue to struggle.

"For some, payday lenders offer a quick way to make ends meet," said Durbin. "But their outrageous interest rate caps and hidden fees can have crippling effects on the people who can least afford it."

Merkley noted that the bill's simple, straightforward approach will protect consumers and ensure that families aren't bankrupted by high interest rates and hidden fees.

"Predatory lending disproportionately harms people who are already struggling financially," noted Rep. Cartwright, where in Pennsylvania these types of predatory and high-cost loans are already banned by state law. "This consumer-friendly legislation would provide relief from exorbitant fees for many low-income consumers across the country."

Rep. Cohen, Cartwright's House colleague, felt similarly.

"Throughout my career, I have always worked to shield people from those who

rates range as high as 662 percent in Texas to California's 460 percent, and Virginia's 601 percent. Likewise, in the Midwest, the states of Illinois, Missouri, Ohio and Wisconsin have comparable high interest rates that all exceed 400 percent. In Alabama and Mississippi, two of the nation's poorest states when it comes to per capita incomes, payday interest rates are respectfully 521 percent and 456 percent.

"What we have encountered across the country is that when voters are given the chance to support a rate cap, large majorities consistently say 'No' to debt-trap lending," said Yana Miles, senior legislative counsel with the Center for Responsible Lending. "Conversely,

Baltimore City Public Schools Superintendent lays out blueprint for success

Over the past 14 months Dr. Sonja Brookins Santelises says she has worked hard to address the many issues facing Baltimore City Schools, which she heard about from community stakeholders and others.

Santelises, who took over more than a year ago from Gregory Thornton, says she has worked in step with the district's new blueprint, which lays out how officials, educators, parents, students and others will move toward the ultimate goal of building a generation of young people with the skills, knowledge and understanding to succeed in college, careers, and the community.

"Not just here in Baltimore, but wherever they go in the world, whatever they do after they graduate high school," Santelises said.

This year, Baltimore City Schools is pursuing a comprehensive approach designed to ensure that all students have access to high-performing schools that "meet their needs and interests, no matter where they live in the city," Santelises said.

The blueprint is designed to focus on three key areas. "Student wholeness, literacy, and staff leadership," Santelises said.

She noted that those three areas are intertwined in that, if students are motivated and excited about learning and they have the foundational skills to think critically, analyze deeply and express themselves powerfully with adults around them who encourage them to persist and excel, they will be positioned to move steadily toward high school graduation and postsecondary success.

"The way we do our work is as important as what the work is," Santelises said. "We're really trying to shift that culture," Santelises said.

Santelises, 49, has spent close to three decades focused on building high-quality teaching and learning to help students excel, including her tenure as chief academic officer for Baltimore City Public Schools from 2010 to 2013, according to her district-issued bio.

She returned to Baltimore City schools in July 2016

after serving three years as vice president for K-12 policy and practice at the Education Trust, a nonprofit focused on closing the achievement gap experienced disproportionately by African-American, Latino, and Native students and those from low-income families.

Championed by some as a true role model, Santelises first came to city schools in 2010 from Boston, where

she served as assistant superintendent for a network of 23 pilot schools. She also held the position of assistant superintendent for teaching and learning and professional development in Boston.

Santelises began her career in education as director of professional development placement with Teach for America in New York.

Throughout her career as an educator, academic and administrator, Santelises says she has been steadfast in her belief that excellence in urban education is achievable at scale.

"Our students have the same capacity for success as any other students," she said. "We must communicate and demonstrate our complete confidence in that capacity, by charting a pathway to success for each individual child. The real challenge is ours—as educators—to hold ourselves and our students accountable for their achievement."

Becoming the district's fifth superintendent in a decade allows for skepticism because of the high-turnover rate at the position, but Santelises has her share of believers.

In a previously published interview, Freeman A. Hrabowski III, president of the University of Maryland, Baltimore, called Santelises' hiring a good move by the district.

"She's an innovator with the commitment to see big ideas through," Hrabowski said. "She's devoted her career to changing the status quo," he said.

Santelises says change won't occur overnight, but steady improvement should become evident.

"The goal is educating a generation of Baltimoreans to lead; along the way, we have benchmarks," Santelises said. "A method of steady improvement toward that goal is really what the public can expect."

"The other piece is that we have these outlines—a blueprint—that the community should expect to see, she continued. "We've outlined things for every stakeholder group, what their roles are, what individual roles are and it gives you a picture of what you should be able to see as a result of the hard work."

The wheels are falling off the Ravens in Baltimore

After starting the season with a 2-0 record, the Baltimore Ravens were looking forward to a winning year.

The team has been the darling of Baltimore after replacing the Colts who moved to Indianapolis. And, after winning two Super Bowl Championships, the Ravens have been the best show in town.

Loyal fans come out in full force to show support for their team at pep rallies before games and other events. Few cities have the same kind of bond the Ravens have with Baltimore. However, suddenly things have started changing.

Starting with Colin Kaepernick last year, players began to kneel during the playing of the National Anthem before games as a stand against social injustice towards people of color.

President Donald Trump called out the NFL for allowing players to kneel during the National Anthem. He encouraged fans to leave stadiums if they saw a player not standing when the National Anthem was played before games.

NFL teams responded by locking arms when the anthem was played in week 3. The Ravens were one of the teams that took it a step further when they got down on one knee in London, England.

Back home, Ravens fans were appalled by their team's pregame actions and to

make things worse, the Ravens played one of their worst games in team history. Jacksonville handed them a 44-7 loss. The team wasn't the same without two of their best players—left guard Marshal Yanda and defensive tackle Brandon Williams. Both players suffered injuries that have kept them out of the lineup.

More importantly, fans in Baltimore expressed their displeasure with the Ravens by burning team apparel and game tickets. The franchise canceled their pep rally before the week 4 game against their archrival the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Attendance was down at M&T Bank Stadium and the Steelers handed the Ravens a 26-9 loss, adding salt to an already gaping wound.

The common denominator in both losses was poor play by quarterback Joe Flacco. He passed for only 28 yards against the Jaguars and was benched in favor of backup quarterback Ryan Mallett after throwing his second interception in London.

Against Pittsburgh Flacco threw two more interceptions in front of the home crowd.

Head coach John Harbaugh is trying to stay focused on what has been happening on the field despite the tumultuous

circumstances surrounding the team. He feels the direction the team goes is going to depend on Flacco.

"In the end, as far as what happens on the field, it comes back to the quarter-

back," Harbaugh said on Tuesday. "When it is good, he gets a lot of the credit, and when it is bad, he gets a lot of the blame. Everybody has to get better."

Grammy winning musician brings her unique style to Baltimore area

Musician Rhiannon Giddens, a Greensboro, N.C., native, achieved international acclaim in 2010 with a Grammy Award yet, she remains somewhat mystified as to why her music has yet to catch-on with more African-Americans.

During a recent visit to the Baltimore bedroom community of Frederick, Maryland, she showcased her unique blend of bluegrass, folk, jazz, blues and soul at the intimate Weinberg Center for the Arts in downtown Frederick.

Backed by a sextet featuring her vocal-ist-sister and nephew/hip-hop rapper, Giddens entertained a sold-out audience full of some of her largest supporters—a crowd reflecting about 95-percent white people.

Two of the few black people who attended the show were musician Royce Folks and his sweetheart, Kenya Watkins. The twosome drove from their home in Richmond, Virginia, to catch the act, because a recent performance in Richmond had sold-out.

"We realize there's not a lot of blacks who are into her music. I think it's just because they're not familiar with her stuff," said Folks, the bass player and bandleader with Richmond-based Bush-leage (blues) Band. "If they get a chance to hear her, they'd change their minds."

"It's all about her vibe," said Watkins.

who manages Folks' band. "Rhiannon is here to educate people about the roots of American music. She plays the banjo, but she lets people know that the banjo has African roots. It's just a matter of time—blacks will catch-on. She just needs to keep doing what she does so well.

Along with her original quartet, the

Grammy-winning Carolina Chocolate Drops, Giddens and that group—a self-described string band—actually formed on the premise of espousing the fact that African-Americans were the original purveyors of indigenous American music styles—bluegrass and folk.

During a recent interview, Giddens revealed that during her live tours, her audiences are typically void of African-Americans. She noted that fact again, following her October 1 performance in Frederick.

"It's true. My fan base is mostly white. I've been doing this for ten years, but I don't get much love from the black press. I've been trying to break in, but it has been very difficult," she admits.

At the Weinberg Center, formerly the Tivoli Theater, which opened in December 1926, Rhiannon and crew performed flawlessly in an intimate room which seats about 1200. Though recently renovated, the room's interior shares a close resemblance to the acclaimed Fox Theater in downtown Atlanta, Georgia.

To echo Watkins' earlier statements, I believe that if Giddens stays the course, in time, she will ultimately realize a significant increase in support from black people.





Bishop Bryant has pastored three





I did it and got bit by the acting bug. I never looked back."

She added, "When I first started with this show, I was 'Olivia'. It was humbling for me because I didn't have any solo vocal lines. But I humbled myself, and said 'God, this is the part you gave me, and I am going to do my very best.' I focused myself and told the story from my perspective. And now, I am Shug Avery. You never know who is watching you. This has been an incredible

journey, and I am really grateful."

Annapolis native achieves Hollywood dream and returns for Marvel comic book signing

Award-winning writer and producer Rodney Barnes recalls walking to a convenience store on the corner of Chesapeake Avenue and 6th Street in Annapolis, Maryland, where he would read comics for hours. The Annapolis native can now add Marvel comic book writer to his impressive resume.

Barnes has worked on projects such as Everybody Hates Chris (Chris Rock), the Boondocks, and My Wife and Kids. He is said to be a rising African American creative in Hollywood.

Barnes returns to the area to launch his first ongoing Marvel comic book series called "Falcon #1" on October 11, 2017, at Twilite Zone Comics located at 18 Crain Highway North in Glen Burnie, Maryland from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. The public is also invited to attend an evening social at Mt. Zion United Methodist Church, located at 612 Second Street in Annapolis from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Comic books will be available for sale at both venues.

In the seventies, Barnes shared his hobby of reading and collecting comic books with old friends in Eastport such as John "Bumper" Moyer, who owns Twilite Zone Comics.

"Besides the fun of having a number one comic that is signed by the writer—and that's the memorabilia aspect of that—the kids and even adults will get to see somebody who... made his fame in Los Angeles, and moved there," said "Bumper," when talking about Barnes's upcoming launch event. "A lot of people have that dream. They would love to, in some creative way, go out and be successful and Rodney actually made that dream happen."

Bumper's father and Zastrow Simms made Barnes feel like someone in the community cared. He was among youth they took to basketball games and the movies. Barnes recognizes the value of growing up in a supportive place.

"But the big thing for me, I think if I had not grown up in Annapolis, I would not be doing what I do right now,"

Barnes said. "Growing up in Annapolis when I did, gave me enough space and had the right ingredients of history, and the tenor and temperament of the community."

Barnes attended Howard University in Washington, D.C.

His Hollywood dream began in his mid-20s, after a friend asked what he would do if he could achieve his biggest

goal. Barnes replied that he would love to write movies and television shows in Hollywood. He later became a production assistant while working on movies in the area. Barnes met a famous contact in Charlottesville, Virginia, when he worked on a movie called Major Payne.

"I met Damon Wayans. Damon and I hit it off, and he asked me what I wanted to do with my career, and I told him that I wanted to be a writer. He gave me an opportunity to work with him for a few years. Eventually, I [went] to California and I worked on the movie, Bulletproof. He told me that if I was to take this seriously, I had to move [to California] because that's what writers do," Barnes said. "I packed up my stuff and I lived in my car for about eight months and started to ply my trade. By day I would work on movies and TV shows as a production assistant, or assistant director, and then at night I would write. And eventually Damon had a show, My Wife and Kids, and he gave me a job as a punch up writer (a script doctor) for a day, and that day turned into 20 years."

Despite Barnes's success, he acknowledges his previous struggles trying to survive in California around 1997. Even though he was tempted to come home, he decided to stay and take it day-by-day, after speaking with an encouraging friend. Shortly thereafter, things turned around for Barnes with the opportunity to write for the show, "My Wife and Kids."

"What I've come to learn is that if you truly put your heart into something, like really, truly commit, it's limitless what you can do," Barnes said.

When Barnes returns to his hometown to celebrate his Marvel comic book project, he says he is open to discussing other facets of his career and the aspirations of budding writers who are seeking advice.

"Now being where I am, and doing what I am doing, I would love to be able to come back and build a relationship with the community," Barnes said.

Baltimore native serves aboard guided missile cruiser in Japan

Yokosuka, Japan – A Baltimore native and 2004 Chesapeake High School graduate is serving in the U.S. Navy aboard the guided missile cruiser, USS Chancellorsville.

Seaman Alexis Davis is a quartermaster aboard the forward deployed Ticonderoga-class guided missile cruiser operating out of Yokosuka, Japan. Chancellorsville is one of three cruisers forward deployed in Yokosuka.

A Navy quartermaster is responsible for working on the bridge with the captain to help plot the course ensuring the safe navigation of the entire ship.

"Growing up I learned to go after what you want no matter what is," said Davis. "If you want it bad enough you can definitely make it happen."

With more than 50 percent of the world's shipping tonnage and a third of the world's crude oil passing through the region, the United States has historic and enduring interests in this part of the world.

"Our alliance is rooted in shared interests and shared values," said Adm. Harry Harris, Commander, U. S. Pacific Command. "It's not hyperbole to say that the entire world has benefited from the U.S.-Japan alliance. While our alliance helped stabilize the region after the Second World War, it also enabled the Japanese people to bring about an era of unprecedented economic growth. And for the last six decades, our Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines and Coast Guardsmen have worked side by side with the Japan Self Defense Force to protect and advance peace and freedom."

Approximately 300 men and women serve aboard the ship. Their jobs are highly specialized and keep each part of the cruiser running smoothly, according to Navy officials. They do everything from maintaining gas turbine engines

and operating the highly sophisticated Aegis weapons system to driving the ship and operating small boats.

Forward-deployed sailors are crucial to the success of the global Navy mission and earn high praise from their leaders.

"I have two older brothers that currently serve in the Navy," said Davis. "Seeing the opportunity that they have influenced me to join myself. I like that I can say I am serving our country—it makes me very proud."

Sailors serving abroad in Japan are highly motivated, and quickly adapt to changing conditions, according to Navy officials.

"Serving in the Navy means ultimately putting someone else's needs ahead of my own," added Davis.

A Navy cruiser is a multi-mission ship that can operate independently or as part of a larger group of ships at sea. The ship is equipped with a vertical launching system, tomahawk missiles, torpedoes, guns and Phalanx close-in weapons systems.

Sailors play a vital role in the overall military mission around the world.

"The U.S.-Japan alliance remains the cornerstone for peace and stability in the Indo-Asia-Pacific region," said Harris.


