Bishop Robert P. Deeley, J.C.D., will serve as the principal celebrant and homilist at a Red Mass on Friday, October 13 at 11 a.m. at the Basilica of Ss. Peter & Paul on 122 Ash Street in Lewiston. Judges, lawyers, canonists, government officials, and people of all faiths are invited to attend the annual Red Mass, when the bishop will ask for God's blessing upon those who serve in the legal

profession and public service and for God's guidance in the administration of justice.

"By gathering together at the Red Mass, we will see the practice of the law as service, as our way of bringing God's love into our world," said Bishop Deeley. "By so doing, we will witness to the truth which is Jesus Christ, who is the bearer of God's love, and we will change the world we live in as we faithfully pursue justice."

Bishop Deeley himself has an extensive background in the legal field. In 1978, with his appointment as Secretary to the Metropolitan Tribunal of the Archdiocese of Boston, he began a ministry in the Tribunal which would last for over 20 years, including ten years as Judicial Vicar. He assumed the presidency of the Canon Law Society of America in 2000 and served



## Governor's Address: Taxpayers should not pay to give "free" healthcare for able-bodied adults

Special-interest groups are using the ballot box to push initiatives that are bad for Maine.

Dear Maine Taxpayer, For seven years, I have been leading the charge to change the status quo in Augusta. But the Legislature won't make the tough decisions that are needed to move Maine from poverty to prosperity.

This opens the door for socialists to push their agenda through the ballot box. These citizen referendums punish success, encourage professionals to leave Maine and burden our taxpayers with runaway costs. In the last round of

referendums, the socialists at the Maine People's Alliance tried to tax successful people and hurt small family businesses. They also tried to take away tips from servers in restaurants.

Now they want Maine taxpayers to give free healthcare to able-bodied people who should be working and contributing to the cost of their own healthcare. In Question 2, these socialists are trying to expand Medicaid again.

Medicaid is a \$2.65 billion program that accounts for more than one third of all state spending and nearly one quarter of Maine's General Fund

Before I became Governor, massive Medicaid shortfalls derailed the state budget every year. But my administration eliminated those shortfalls and put Medicaid back on sound financial footing.

We removed most able-bodied adults from the Medicaid rolls and encouraged them to work and contribute to the cost of their healthcare. If they have a job, they can qualify for insurance on the exchange or get insurance through their employer.

Expanding Medicaid to give them "free" healthcare removes this incentive to work. As I always say, "free" is very expensive to somebody. Maine learned this the hard way when it expanded Medicaid in 2002 under then-governor King.

Medicaid expansion did not decrease the number of uninsured Mainers. It did not reduce emergency-room

utilization. Instead, it nearly destroyed the state budget and created a \$750 million debt to our hospitals.

To pay for this "free" healthcare, Maine took money away from our nursing homes, and it put vulnerable people on waitlists for services they need.

My administration finally paid off the hospitals, and we fixed our Medicaid system—without raising taxes. This time around, Medicaid expansion will cost Maine taxpayers an additional \$500 million over the next five years. Once again, it will create massive budget shortfalls every year. Maine should not expand Medicaid for adults who are capable of working. We should continue to direct our limited resources toward the truly needy: the elderly; low-income people; and those with intellectual and physical disabilities.

We must stay on our fiscally responsible path. We cannot let socialists use big money from out of state to reverse all of the progress we have made.

Before you vote in November, please educate yourself about the disastrous effects Medicaid expansion will have on Maine.



## Enough is Enough During a tragedy, police do what they are trained to do: protect and serve

Half a league, half a league, half a league onward, all in the Valley of Death rolled the six hundred. "Forward the Light Brigade! Charge for the guns!"

Thus begins Alfred Lord Tennyson's poem, "The Charge of the Light Brigade," recounting the heroic, some say foolish/suicidal charge on October 25, 1854 of the Russian artillery on Belacava Heights in the Crimea.

The charge made by these brave men was celebrated throughout the British Empire.

Unfortunately, heroic actions performed daily by our police officers in blue and brown is far too often looked at with a jaundiced eve by a large number of the general public.

Unlike the Light Brigade, who charged the guns with the purpose of winning a battle, today's police officers run to the sound of the guns to save lives; contrary to a theme that repeatedly resonates in media coverage, no litmus test is ever used by responding officers. The only thing that is going through their minds is the motto on many of their patrol vehicles: Protect and Serve.

We have all viewed the endless amount of film documenting terrorists flying two airliners into New York City's Twin Towers. Countless law enforcement and public safety personnel are

documented running towards crumbling buildings with only one purpose: to save lives, not to take them. For many officers, their devotion to public safety costs them their lives.

### Absentee ballots now available for Nov. 4 election

Absentee ballots for the State and Municipal Election on Tuesday, November 7 are now available for Lewiston residents who would like to vote early. Registered voters who need an absentee ballot may call the City Clerk's Office, mail in the application form that can be downloaded from the city's website, or pick one up at City Hall. Office hours are Monday through Fri-

day from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

"Voters have been able to order their absentee ballots starting in August, and we have been holding these orders until the ballots were received from the printers," said Lewiston City Clerk Kathy Montejo. "Today, we mailed out approximately 150 absentee ballots from those pending requests." "Absentee voting is increasingly popular with each

election" noted Montejo. "Voters are interested in absentee voting for a variety of reasons - they can have additional time to study and review their ballot, they can avoid going out in bad weather if it is rainy or cold on election day, they can avoid the crowds, and many voters just find it more convenient."

get it at Wal-Mart. It's a bubbling casserole of music as diverse as America itself. You're not sure exactly what's in there, but boy, it sure sounds good. Labels don't work. If it sounds good, if the audience claps, if it feels honest, then it's jug band music."

The Half Moon Jug Band started as a merry band of sidewalk subversives, entertaining passersby and annoying shopkeepers on Exchange Street in Portland more than 15 years ago. Now they can be found playing concerts and festivals at such venues across the state as New Year's Portland, the Maine Festival, the Old Port Festival, the Oddfellow Theatre, the Maine Lobster Festival, and the Fryeburg, Deerfield and Cornish Fairs.

They have made live appearances on numerous television and radio programs, including WCSH's "207," WGME's "Daybreak," WP-FO's "Good Day Maine," WMPG's "Local Motives," and WCTN's "Shine." In 2015, the band released its fifth full-length album, "Don't Bore Us, Get to the Chorus," following 2013's "North Pond Hermit Sessions."


