

School board wrestles with 2019 projected \$6 million dollar deficit

The Evergreen School District submitted a three year budget to the Santa Clara County Office of Education that was conditionally approved.

This means that the school board needs to send additional information as to how the school district will find ways to eliminate the over six million dollar projected deficit (spending more monies than it takes in) for year 2019.

According to a September 15, 2017 letter sent to the Evergreen School District by the Santa Clara County Office of Education,"...the district adopted a budget indicating that it would not be able to meet the State minimum requirements of three percent in the third year FY 2019-2020..."

This triggered board meetings to allow the school board to figure out a plan to cut about six million dollars in 2019. This is considered an educated guess as to how the monies will be cut and as the next year goes by, the plan can be changed.

By having a plan attached to the conditional budget, the district budget will most likely be approved.

On Thursday, October 12, 2017 board meeting (begins at 6:30 p.m. and is open to the public) there is a time for the general public to view the areas of possible proposed cuts that the school district is voting to place in the budget. This will be covered on item 5.1 Approval of Fiscal Stabilization

Report). The board will hear from the general public then vote to add a specific plan of spending cutbacks to be added to the current budget in an effort to get the budget fully approved by the County Office of Education.

Some cutback scenarios can be viewed by looking at the presentation made at the special school board meeting which was held on Thursday, October 8 which should be posted up on Board Docs. Also, this school board meeting as well as all previous ones are audio taped and can be accessed by going to the district website and locating board of trustee minutes tab.

Two schools suggested for repurpose/closure/consolidation

The district is now facing this \$6 million dollar deficit due to many issues. First, there is declining enrollment of children. This has resulted in the Facilities Advisory Committee to suggest the closure of two schools (Laurelwood Elementary and Dove Hill Elementary). The report can be viewed on the district website under FAC. The two suggested schools targeted for repurposing, or closure can be changed out for other schools. Other possible cutbacks are also being considered by the school board such as jobs and all can be seen on the posted reports under Fiscal Stabilization in the previous school board meetings.

This "conditional" approval of the budget let the school board know that the County Office of Education is there to help with decisions in the future. The letter states, "The Santa Clara County Office of Education is committed to working closely with the Evergreen School District to support your efforts to maintain a sound financial status. To that end our office will continue to provide the latest financial information and budget guidance in a timely manner. Our goal is to continue to assist the district in proactively identifying potential fiscal problems as early identification is the most effective mitigation technique available to us..."

The school board will need to find ways to bridge the \$6 million dollar plus looming deficit for year 2019 and also explore how well funding holds out for the future.

School District website presents access to all information

All stakeholders can view budgets and information by going to the district website and reviewing the tabs under Fiscal Services.

Many other contributing factors have contributed to why the school district is projected to spend more than it takes in. In one scenario presented to the school board for a cut, it is shown that there is a belief that if a school closes the district will save 400 thousand a year.

On September 21 the school board was presented with four possible selections of fiscal stabilization scenarios by some of the department heads in the school district. The board was encouraged to select one of

the presented choices of cutbacks to balance the budget in year 2019 however the five member school board did not go along with the limited selections and instead sent the same group back to look at more possible areas of cutbacks including the possible cut backs of worker jobs in the district office. On September 28, the board had another school board meeting and was presented increased choices to cobble together their own tailored list of cutback areas to offset the projected \$6M deficit in year 2019. The result of this school board meeting created three scenarios of plans to cut back \$6M and one of these three scenarios will be selected by the board at the October 12 school board meeting after public comment time has been offered to all.

This situation of deficits is not new to Evergreen School District however this projected \$6M deficit is larger than ever before in the history of the school district. Thus the watchdog, Santa Clara County Office of Education is ensuring that the school board make projected decisions as to how to balance the three year cycle of sending a budget in for their legal review. Again, the budget can be altered next year and it is an educated guess however, just two years away it seems that changes in spending will occur to impact schools, children, parents and other stakeholders.


If you can help reunite him with Ted there is a large monetary reward, \$3,000, waiting for you, no questions asked and you will be returning a precious family member back to Ted's family.

Chaboya Middle School Eighth Graders and sisters Rachel and Brianna Holmes incorporated their love of art into their Girl Scout Silver Award Project, the Art Cart.

"We wanted to help patients get their mind off of whatever they were going through so we choose art therapy to help" said Rachel Holmes. "We concluded art was the perfect distraction." Their research found that art has been used in healing for centuries. "The nice thing about the arts is our long, long history of using music and arts for healing across thousands of years, and the fact that it's relatively low cost to implement." said Julene Johnson, PhD, a cognitive neuro-

scientist and professor at the UCSF Institute for Health & Aging (UCSF news 2014).

The Cadette Girl Scouts received donations from Target and Lakeshore, and used money they raised from selling Girl Scout Cookies, to put together 75 art packets consisting of paper, pencils, crayons, word searches, and coloring pages. They also created several art lessons with step by step tutorials for those patients wanting to expand their art skills. They teamed up with the Volunteer Department at O'Connor Hospital to add the packets to their "Sunshine Cart."

With the Cadettes help, the Art Cart is now an on-going program at the Hospital. "Our patients at O'Connor Hospital have truly enjoyed the addition of the 'Art Cart' packets available from our

Roadway improvements underway for Yerba Buena Rd pavement resurfacing

The City of San Jose has contracted with MCK Services Inc., to repair and repave (Yerba Buena Rd from Silver Creek Rd to San Felipe Rd)

The majority of the work is expected to be completed the middle part of November depending on weather conditions. Some minor work has already begun. New or upgraded ADA compliant ramps will be placed to improve pedestrian safety, damaged and failing pavement will be removed and replaced with new asphalt concrete increasing the service life of the roadway, and new traffic

striping will be placed for vehicle, bicycle, and pedestrian delineation.

Evergreen residents are encouraged to use an alternative route avoiding Yerba Buena Rd during the construction operation. Traffic control including detours will be in place directing vehicle travel. Stopping signs will be posted at least 48 hours in advance of the day the construction work is to occur.






So far, they have received all positive feedback from patients who said they liked the packets and would use them again.

Continued from page 1another push to legalize marijuana or raise the minimum wage.

We are taking about one of the most hotly contested items ever to go before voters next June. It involves a measure that would change city zoning laws to create a senior housing project called Evergreen Senior homes Initiative.

Real Estate developers Carl Berg and Cho Keenan want to build an elaborate senior homes development in the Evergreen foothills.

They believe there is a need to create more affordable housing for seniors and veterans in the affluent Silicon Valley.

According to the developers, The Evergreen Senior Homes Initiative would allow for the creation of a new housing community for independent seniors in San Jose's Evergreen neighborhood. The project would include up to 910 residential units, at least 20 percent of which would be designated as affordable, with a preference given to military veterans.

Last month, the City Hall was put on notice that there will be intent to gather signatures and place a measure on the ballot that would change zoning restrictions for senior housing near one of Evergreen Valley's upscale neighborhoods.

The proposal would require additional language to the city's Envision San Jose 2040 general plan by creating a "senior

housing overlay" that amends the Evergreen-East Hills Development Policy.

The property was part of a 1982 Berryessa Swap, which allowed homes on industrial property in Berryessa in exchange for reserving land in Evergreen for industry. Typically the city has consistently opposed changing land use from industrial to residential, so some city officials are not pleased.

City officials question whether the proposal will truly offer affordable housing. They say the homes may be too expensive for the average senior. San Jose City Mayor Sam Liccardo says the "affordable senior housing proposal is billionaires building a gated community for millionaires.' Liccardo recently announced a new ambitious plan to build more than 125,000 affordable homes by 2022. San Jose currently has 7,000 new apartments in the pipeline for development.

If voters approve, the Evergreen Senior Homes Initiative would build more than 900 units across 200 acres of land currently designated for industrial use. To move ahead with the planned development, the developers need to gather more than 22,000 signatures from San Jose City residents.

If successful, a measure will be placed on next summer's ballot. If voters approve the measure, the city would have to cough up money to build out infrastructure for traffic, water and electricity.

Bert Smith, President of the Senior Advisory Council of the Evergreen Community Center, addressed seniors attending a meeting at the Community Center on Oct 5. "The developer knew City Hall would not approve the project so they decided to move forward with a ballot initiative bypassing the City Council," said Smith. "It is wrong to bypass City Hall. The developer knows that it sounds persuasive to voters to provide housing priorities to veterans."

Some Evergreen residents say the proposal is better than a possible 17-acre shopping center from an out-of-state developer. "I want to see more information before making a decision," said an Evergreen senior resident.

Marissa Currie, Account Supervisor for Singer Associates, Inc. (the firm that represents a voice for the Evergreen Senior Homes Initiative) stated:


On our support of the project:

"Seniors and veterans are among the most vulnerable members of our community. The Evergreen Senior Homes project would designate as many as 182 housing units for affordable housing, offered at below market rates with preference given to those who need them the most — to the fullest extent allowed by law — to those who have served our country. With housing costs skyrocketing across the region, it's become far too expensive for many seniors to live in San Jose. Evergreen Senior Homes takes 200 acres of unused industrial land and upgrades it into senior housing that is designed for active, independent living. '

On going to the ballot:

"We are pursuing this ballot initiative because the City has fallen short on meeting its housing--and affordable housing-obligations. This failure has a profound impact on some of our most vulnerable residents: seniors and veterans. The Mayor's stated commitment to solving the housing crisis and using all the innovative methods we can to do so puts him in agreement with the thousands of San Jose residents who have signed the Evergreen Senior Housing Initiative. This housing plan just proves what we have been saying - that the city isn't doing enough to provide affordable housing, especially for seniors and veterans, and the voters need to act. But setting a goal to try and have affordable projects approved by 2022 doesn't begin to address the crisis we're facing right now. Until the city approves approve actual projects, this is all just talk. The Evergreen Senior Homes Initiative gives voters the ability to directly deliver housing in the quickest timeframe possible for veterans and seniors, 20 percent of it affordable.

We are asking the voters to convert industrially zoned land in an otherwise residential area for the purpose of building a senior housing community including a mandate for 20 percent affordable housing on site with a veterans preference. We believe that creating housing for seniors and veterans - allowing them to age with dignity and remain near family and friends - should be a priority for the City. This initiative asks the voters to decide, just as the













Blade Runner **2049**

young blade runner, LAPD Officer K (Ryan Gosling) discovery of a long-buried secret leads him to track down former blade runner Rick Deckard (Harrison Ford).

Officer K's discovery has the potential to plunge what is left of our society into chaos.

His quest leads him to find Deckard (former LAPD blade runner) who has been missing for 30 years.

The film is visually stunning, sumptuously photographed by legendary cinematographer Roger Deakins in the finest and most astonishing work of his career.

Is Blade Runner 2049 a masterpiece like its predecessor? Definitely Not! It's not even a match for 2016's superb Arrival, the previous film from director Denis Villeneuve. Yet on its own terms, it's a dazzling visual achievement. The special effects are awesome; a unique sensorial experience.

The soundtrack is moody and engaging and puts you into a dreamlike trance.

Gosling and Ford are solid performers but it is Ana de Armas whose star is born. The character of Joi, an AI who somehow seems to genuinely love K, is achingly brought to life by Cuban actress Ana de Armas.

What this lacks in story originality, it makes up for in visually and aurally spectacular framing, perspective, and wondrous lighting.

Where the original was a 1940's detective story set in the near future, this uses biblical Roman epics as a template.

This film possesses finesse in its visual discourse, a language that goes from dream to opiate travel, from dream to malice of an imagined situation. Suffice to say that this one is set 30 years after director Ridley Scott's original, in a period when powerful manufacturer Niander Wallace (Jared Leto) is designing replicants that are comparatively more benign than the previous models. Blade runners still exist, tasked with tracking down these vintage replicants and terminating them with extreme prejudice. One such blade runner is "K" (Ryan Gosling), who's a replicant himself. But a visit to a farm to track down a fugitive leads to the discovery of a box holding shocking material. As K's superior (Robin Wright) gravely intones, "These contents could create a war between AI's and humans and tear apart the very fabric of our socie-

The biggest flaw in this film is the screenplay. Why would the AI (Artificial Intelligence) "K" (Ryan

Gosling), who's a replicant himself track down the first DNA union between humans and AIs? This union was the first baby replicant (The offspring of Harrison Ford – Rick Deckard (human) and Sean Young – Rachael (AI) from the first film). "Ks" job was to terminate this

unique and wonderful child with extreme prejudice? Why would all the bad guy AI's and the bad guy humans want the baby dead? Shouldn't the war be only between the AIs and humans? I think that both sides should lay down their weapons and sing "Kum Ba Yah". Are the humans and AIs afraid that this child would grow up to become a new Messiah with the same rationale as to why King Herod butchered all the children under two years old in the New Testament? Are the humans and Als both afraid of a new evolution and powershift away from humans and AIs? Was it because both sides were so afraid that they both joined up together to locate and exterminate the abomination? Maybe they were afraid of this new DNA integration! In the near future, hatred and fear will be the two biggest enemies of humans, AIs, and aliens from another galaxy (Arrival)!
