Sikhs, Police offer needed disaster relief to North Bay wildfire victims

n India the Sikhs are referred to as "the protectors," just like our police officers.

Everyone is talking about how the Gurdwara on the hill in San Jose is a strong community asset to all in the Evergreen Valley and beyond. Case in point, two weeks ago members of the Sikh communiworked together to send three trucktv loads of relief supplies to five shelters in Sonoma and Napa.

This outreach was done with record speed to respond to those in great need with supplies sent by the truckload to support the tremendous loss of homes and displacement due to the wildfire disaster. The fires whisked across counties and indiscriminately created a path of destruction in the North Bay regions of Sonoma and Napa; perhaps this was the fire of the century.

Many people of all ages had to leave their homes which burned down with only the clothes on their backs and when they returned to where they lived there was

Sikhs to the rescue

Hartaj Johal, a Sikh and San Jose Police Sergeant with positive Sikh Community Activist Jessie Singh helped bring forth the idea for their Sikh brothers and sisters at the Gurdwara to join with the police association to send truckloads of supplies to rapidly support the displaced wildfire victims. Quickly, food, beverages, cereal, toiletry goods, clothing diapers, cups, eye drops (to help those who came in contact with smoke) and many other items were loaded on trucks to give to those in need at the shelters

Volunteers from the Gurdwara and the P.O.A. (Police Officers Association) exhibited great teamwork in quickly obtaining supplies by buying them off the shelf from local stores which resulted in speeding up the actual timeline to get much needed supplies to the five shelter locations. Professional teamwork was witnessed as members of the Gurdwara and the Police loaded the trucks by handing the items hand to hand and person to person.

New 6,000 sq. ft. commercial office/retail building now under construction at Canyon Creek Plaza

The Evergreen Times has received several emails and phone calls inquiring about the grading and construction of a new building next to New Seasons Market at located at the Canyon Creek Plaza on Silver Creek Valley Rd.

The new commercial building's leasable size will total 6,107 sq. ft., according to the Canyon Creek Plaza Management Office. There will be seven small office suites that range from 285 - 302 sq. ft. and also a retail footprint of up to a total of 4,303. The retail space is divisible.

The new commercial building is expected to be completed sometime during the month of May, 2018.

Some residents and business owners have expressed concerns about parking with the new development taking existing spaces. The shopping center's management explained that as soon as construction of the building is complete, most of the recently demolished parking spaces will be rebuilt.

Plaza Management said they will address illegally parked cars owned by local residents skirting Silver Creek Valley Country Club's parking policy which requires all cars to be parked in garages, not in the driveway or on the street.

Currently some residents are moving cars to Canyon Creek Plaza parking lot during the night and there are a few commuters who park cars at the center during daytime hours which is illegal. The parking lot is designated for patrons of businesses located at the shopping center.

Chaboya student arrested for brandishing firearm at classmates

Chaboya Middle School student brought an unloaded gun to school on Thursday, October 26 and was arrested by San Jose police.

Several students told a teacher that a 12year-old boy took the gun out of his backpack and brandished it at them.

The student was taken into custody, said police, who determined that the unloaded firearm belonged to the child's father. It was later determined that the boy's father kept the gun locked and unloaded at home.

Police were called and arrived promptly on the scene and removed the student from campus. The campus did not go on lock down as the student was detained as soon as administration learned of the incident.

According to the Evergreen School District, parents were informed of the incident using school messenger once the student was detained and once SJPD informed the school that the situation was secure.

The School District website stated: "Most often when children get their hands on a weapon, it belongs to their parents. Keeping our kids safe is the top priority for all of us – school and family, alike, and it's imperative that we ensure students cannot get access to dangerous weapons."

SJPD is expected to address the legal side of the incident. The Evergreen Board of Trustees will determine the future of the student regarding possible expulsion.

The student is suspended from school until the legal process is resolved.

Median island cleanup is part of #BeautifySJ initiative

New funding for the landscape cleanup program is a part of his #BeautifySJ initiative which was announced during the budget process.

Mayor Liccardo allocated \$2,000,000 over two years in his June Budget Message to the cleanup and beautification of Citymaintained landscape.

San Jose residents identified the appearance of the City's public landscape as an area of concern. Maintenance on median islands was being done every 18 months, which was not frequent enough to keep the islands in good shape.

With this funding, the Department of Transportation (D0T) will utilize contracted services to provide regular landscape maintenance to approximately half of its landscape inventory.

By supplementing its in-house crews with contractual staff, DOT can maintain a median island every four months in addition to other beautification efforts across the city.

School board at odds with superintendent's suggestion to close one school next year

It has been a challenging couple of years for the Evergreen School District.

The District has been working to prioritize and leverage critical services for students and families to maximize outcomes for all students throughout the district.

They needed to close gaps in achievement, ensure opportunities for underserved students, and make sure that all students are prepared with the necessary skills to be successful when entering high school (Evergreen school district teaches grades K-8 only), college and the work force.

At the October 12 school board meeting, Evergreen School Board trustees reached a decision as to what might be cut in two years from the school district budget. They were required to include this in this year's three year projection of the district budget to the Santa Clara Office of Education to compensate for a projected shortfall of monies shown in year three (2019-2020).

This suggested list of cuts can be changed by the board in the years ahead for projections can change and fluctuate depending on new revenues that are brought in. The dollar figure the school board arrived at a projected cut is \$6,319,528. Before trying to reach this goal they decided that there will be no new programs and no school consolidations (closures of individual schools with possible reuse in new ways) for at least the next upcoming school year 2018-2019. Some ideas being considered by the school board are shown below at the bottom of the page.

Some parent's complaints have been that loss of student revenue is due to private and other schools luring students away with exotic programs that Evergreen does not offer. They have suggested that Evergreen School District look at ways to lure students back to their home schools. This would take considerable effort by the present board to pursue every lead that would bring programs that would be attractive to parents/students that have left the District for greener pastures.

Also, a demographer report shows projected declines in student enrollment for Evergreen School district as well as many other districts. This could be due primarily to the increased cost of living in the area and declining birth rates. Such decreases in enrollment have a direct effect on the school district budget. The demographer report shows severe projected declines in enrollment and can be found by accessing the Facilities Advisory Committee pages on the school district website as well as previous school board meeting agenda items in months past.

At the October school board meeting it was suggested by the Superintendent Gomez and a group of district office directors referred to as a cabinet that one school should be repurposed (closed, consolidated, changed in use) at the start of the 2018-2019 school year (approximately nine months out) and a second school be repurposed (closed, consolidated, changed in use) in school year 2019-2020, also, still, perhaps another in the following year. The following is quoted from their letter presented to the school board dated October 12, 2017 and can be viewed on agenda item 5.1.

Cabinet Recommendation and Option Considerations

• Implement a dual language program

• Hold on implementing IB programs until fiscal stabilization is achieved

• Use committed one-time funds

• Consolidate school sites (1 in 2018-2019; 1 in 2019-2020; and a likely third in 2020-2021)

• We believe that this plan will have the least impact on students, programs, and people and it gives us time to identify and recommend viable ways to generate revenue.

• Should the Board choose to move forward with a different plan, it should know that implementation of new programs will require the dedicated efforts of a full Cabinet team. New programs will require instructional planning, training, and coordination. They will also require communication and engagement with families and the greater community. Should the Board choose a plan that includes any new program, it is recommended that the current Cabinet configuration remain intact. Regardless of the plan that is adopted, we would like to reiterate that the Board likely would need to take additional stabilization action after the Governor releases his budget in January."

According to the suggestions of the School Facilities Advisory report which can be viewed on the district website, the committee suggested that Laurelwood Elementary and Dove Hill Elementary be repurposed (closed, changed in use).

Moving forward, only the unpaid amount on the first and second installment bills will be treated as delinquent tax on December 10th and April 10th of each year, in the same manner as any other delinquent or defaulted tax. Remember that paying your property taxes to the County is how you pay for your neighborhood schools, libraries and local services. Only 18 percent actually comes back to the County.

It's now easy and free to get rid of junk

Times Staff Writer f you're living in a residential home or in a condo in the City of San Jose most bulky items can now be picked up free of charge.

This is made possible by the vision of Mayor Liccardo and the city council members. They want to make our city clean, pristine and beautiful and they want all of us to help out too.

The free junk pickup component is part of the far reaching Beautify San Jose initiative created by the mayor. There are many components to the BeautifySj program and you can learn more by web search.

Here are some specifics for you to consider taking advantage of with regard to getting rid of your bulk items.

First, schedule your free junk pick up and ensure the items are approved for pick up.

Remember you must gain an appointment and place the agreed upon items in the street the night before. If you are having a refrigerator picked up, you must remove the doors.

For example, I had a refrigerator picked up and to get the doors off I just used a screwdriver and some hammer hitting and they came off. It was a bit tough but with a little muscle the hinges on the doors came off and one must not worry about damaging the doors for they are being taken away for recycling.

Having personally used the program it is my belief that it is top notch. All items were picked up cleanly from the street and the people I spoke with were very professional and emailed me the information with accuracy.

Here are some specifics about how you can have bulk items picked up free at your curb as stated on the city website;

Residents in single-family homes can have large items (such as mattresses, sofas, refrigerators, tires, and more) picked up curbside by their recycling collection company. Each pickup includes up to three large items.

Schedule a free junk pickup appointment

Call your recycling company to get a date for your pickup.

■ Downtown and north, east, and south San Jose: California Waste Solutions (408) 213-7800

■ West San Jose: GreenTeam of San Jose (408) 282-4400

You will need to call and speak to

either of the two companies listed above to set up and confirm pick up of items. When you call, you have to be exact regarding what the items are and how many items. They will only pick up exactly what you have called to request be picked up and so you cannot add on. Here is an example of the e mail you will receive once you make an appointment for pick up. It is precise.

Bulky item set out instructions

On the scheduled day of pick up, place items curbside in the street the night before or before 6:00 a.m. on the day of pick up. The pick-up time will occur between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on the scheduled day of pick up. DO NOT PLACE ITEMS IN DRIVEWAY. Do not lean items on fences, private property or cars.

If you live in a condo complex set out items next to garbage and recycle carts.

The service is item specific. The driver will only pick up the items that have been listed for pick up. If you want to add, change or cancel your order you must call and speak to a live representative by 3:00 p.m. the business day before the pick-up. If you have a Monday pick up, you must call by 3:00 p.m. the Friday prior.

All items need to be free of liquids, other items and/or debris. This includes, but is not limited to, washers, barbeques, toilets, dressers and lawn mowers. If there is a question about an item being set out on the curb, please call us.

Wood: Needs to be bundled securely in bundles of 5 x 2 x 2 FT under 60lbs. All nails and screws must be removed. Each bundle counts as 1 item.

Carpet: WET- 4 ft. x 2 ft.

DRY - 6 ft. x 2 ft. rolls

The carpet needs to be rolled and tied at both ends. No larger than the above description, carpet and padding must be separate. Each roll counts as 1 item.

Refrigerator: Must be empty of all food items. We do not accept commercial refrigerators or ones that have locking doors. On refrigerators all doors must be removed, otherwise item will be left at curbside. All glass shelves need to be removed; we do not take the glass shelves. Please do not place the glass shelves inside of your recycle bin.

Escape into an imaginary 3-D world to explore real places (e.g. Manhattan, Rio, the Grand Canyon, Mont Saint Michel in France, the Matterhorn). Become Spiderman as you virtually put on a set of gloves with special powers. Visit a space station or roam among dinosaurs. Paint without getting messy, using virtual painting tools and unlimited colors! Starting January 11, Evergreen will host regular Thursday morning sessions where individuals may experience virtual reality with assistance from our adult Virtual Reality Guides. The first images of the 2018 Jeep Wrangler have been leaked to the press just prior to the Los Angeles Auto Show which will be held later this month.
