



#### Lehigh Valley business sentiment down for the 3rd quarter in a row

The Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce -Kamran Afshar survey of the Valley businesses is a quarterly survey that we have been doing since 1997. The October survey recorded the 3rd drop in the overall index in as many quarters. Local business sentiment gave back not only all of its January gains, it fell even below its October 2016 level.

The index of hiring plans for the next six months is the only indicator in the model which is still above its January level. This indicator is oscillating closed the bottom of the range which is historically associated with faster growth in the Valley. The long-term trend of this indicator has been knocking on the door of fast growth for the last 4 quarters.

The index of actual hiring over the last six months dropped by a significant 7.5 percent from its July level. This index is now below its January level. It is clear that post-election enthusiasm among businesses in the Valley has vanished. This index which was in the range historically associated with faster growth, has now dropped to the

bottom of this range.

The index for actual purchasing over last six months recorded the largest drop since January, losing 9.4 percent of its value. This index shot into the fast-expansionary range in January, and then, as fast as it went up, it fell out of that range by October.

Purchasing plans for the future also recorded a large loss in October, giving up all its post-election gains and then falling even 8 percent below its October 2016 level.

Local businesses which on average expected an increase of 8.5 percent in their future revenues in April have scale that expectation down to around 3 percent as of October.

Anecdotal information supports the data, as local companies which expected rapid passage of major legislation got dis-enchanted with the reality of Washington and had adopted more of a wait and see attitude.

The survey of Lehigh Valley Businesses shows that their general optimism which exploded up in January is gone and business



exceptions in the Valley has dropped below where it was in October of last year. Businesses clearly expected the congress to pass significant business friendly legislations early on. An expectation that was not fulfilled.

Should the tax bill pass

in a business satisfactory way, expectations will start to go backup. However, if the congress fails to delivery, again, there is no doubt that business sentiment will drop even further.

#### **Drive Safely Around Large Trucks**

Truck transportation is a very important industry to everyone. Everyone depends on a truck daily for your needs. Look around you and everything you see was probably delivered by a truck. Without trucks there would be no food on the shelves of your favorite grocery store and no one to deliver all those most wanted items purchased from online merchants to your homes.

In Pennsylvania the trucking industry employs 1 out of 17 jobs in the state while paying \$2.2 billion dollars in federal and state roadway taxes. The industry pays 41 percent of all taxes owed by Pennsylvania residents even though trucks only represent 9 percent of all vehicle miles traveled in the state.

Large trucks do not operate the same as cars. They are large vehicles which take more time to slow down, more time to stop, and need more space on our roadways. They do not maneuver as well, need extra room to make turns, and have many blind spots.

Time a little time and learn some common mistakes motorists make around trucks and learn how to avoid experiencing these situations. Here are a few tips.

- Stay out of the blind spots or "no zones." Large vehicles have blind spots on all 4 sides of the vehicle. Be careful not to linger in these blind spots, either slow down or pass the truck, but riding along the sides of a truck can put you in those blind spots. Always avoid passing on the truck's right side as this is the largest and most dangerous area to be.
- · Pass safely and do not cut in close. Trucks can weigh up to 40 tons and require a longer stopping distance than a passenger vehicle. Always avoid cutting directly in front of a truck since it does not allow the truck driver to have a

safe stopping distance and can put the car driver in a very dangerous situation. Road conditions such as rain, snow, or ice increase stopping distances even more.

- Tailgating a truck present many dangers. First, you are in a blind spot. Trucks are usually 8 ½' wide while a car is approximately 6' wide. When tailgating behind a truck you have no visibility of traffic conditions because the only thing one can see is the rear door of the trailer. Any conditions which could cause the truck to come to a stop would take away your own safety cushion and be very dangerous. Trucks have a high ground clearance and therefore can straddle debris, such as wood, rubber chunks, or even orange cones on the roadways which a car could not clear and have no time to react before hitting the front of your car.
- Avoid the right turn squeeze play. Trucks need extra turning room at intersections. Stay back and allow the truck to maneuver through the turn. Always stop behind the white lines at intersections giving the truck space to safely complete the turn.
- Avoid the "looming effect". Because of the large size of the vehicle, a truck often will appear to be moving at a slower speed than it actually is. Imagine watching an airplane take off the runway at an airport. Typical air speed at take-off for a jetliner is in the 150-180 MPH range, although they do not appear to be moving that quickly. The same applies to a large truck. When a car is entering an interstate and the truck is approaching, collisions can occur because the driver of the car doesn't realize how quickly the truck is approaching because its speed is underestimated.

Following these few simple tips will help you share the road safely with trucks on our highways. We all need to partner together to be responsible and to put safety first. 坐





In September I met with the Energy and Environment Committee to discuss nuclear plants and why they are critical to Pennsylvania's economy & environment. Recently the committee asked me to share that discussion with you.

Nuclear power is clean, safe, reliable and affordable electricity that generates economic and environmental benefits for everyone. Schools, shops, hotels, restaurants, banks, community centers and homes benefit from the dependability that nuclear provides.

Maintaining a diverse energy portfolio is critical to improving Pennsylvania's economy, protecting the environment and ensuring a resilient electric system. The state's five nuclear power stations represent 38 percent of the state's energy portfolio and more than 90 percent of its clean, carbon-free power.

With onsite fuel supplies of up to 24 months, nuclear plants can run 24 hours a day, 7 days a week without interruption due to severe weather

or events that disrupt fuel delivery. These plants create more than 16,000 Pennsylvania jobs while contributing approximately \$2 billion to the state's gross domestic product each year. In addition, they are responsible for more than \$69 million in tax dollars each year that fund vital community services.

Despite their clear benefits, many nuclear plants are facing an uncertain future due to federal market rules that do not recognize their total value. Continued operation of Pennsylvania's nuclear plants is necessary to enrich our communities and provide for a resilient energy future.

Recently, a coalition of businesses, consumers, industry employees, and leading academics called "Nuclear Powers Pennsylvania" has been formed to educate Pennsylvanians about the benefits of nuclear energy and the value it brings to the state. 

# How do you recommend others get involved to get the value out of their membership?


GO TO THE EVENTS! I cannot say




While the financial obligation is a bargain, participation is not completely "free."


