SCVCC HOA traps boars to stop the destruction of lawns

he Homeowners Association at the Silver Creek Valley Country Club (SCVCC) has initiated a plan to stop wild boars from damaging property, specifically lawns.

The HOA has hired trappers in past years with little success. SCVCC HOA Manager, Alma Fasano, confirmed that nearly 60 wild pigs have been caught this year, a rate much improved over last year's efforts, possibly due to the wetter spring this year compared to last year.

There is currently a global explosion of wild pigs destroying natural ecosystems, spreading disease, causing a billion dollars in agricultural damage, and they are difficult to combat.

There are several traps located in various locations in the Country Club which costs approximately \$175 per trapped pig. This is much less than the damage they cause to property. The younger boars seem easier to catch than the older ones, as reported by several homeowners, because the adult pigs have learned to stay away from the traps. *See WILD BOAR, page 3*

The use of traps and chemicals work almost all of the time in protecting the SCVCC neighborhoods. Some homeowners have proposed installing or reinforcing fences to separate the living space of the wild boars from the various neighborhoods. It seems that some boars have been digging under the fences, or pushing them over. Another problem is that some boars are following the creek where there are no fences to keep them out.

A SCVCC homeowner said that many years ago, Club House Chef, Peter Harvey, cooked one of the boars and served pig sausage to the members. If you shoot a wild pig, know where to aim, for a wounded wild pig isn't something you want to tangle with. They instinctively like to charge if they feel threatened and they have tusks.

Environmentally friendly control methods

There are some environmentally friendly control methods available. One popular method is the use of beneficial nematodes. The cost is less than \$30 dollars which will effectively cover approximately 2,000 sq. ft. The nematodes are used to prevent grubs from multiplying. Another environmental safe way to deter wild pigs is to use motion detector sprinkler systems and lights.

Pig facts

Wild Pigs are not native to North America; they were introduced from Eurasia either as domestic hogs brought over for food or as wild boars for hunting. Their weight typically ranges from 110 to 770 lbs., with some domestic breeds reaching almost 1000 lbs. They can grow up to 3 feet tall and 6 feet long. Domestic hogs were released in California in 1769 and wild boars were released in California in 1925. Pigs inhabit 56 of California's 58 counties. Dogs can be hurt or killed by wild pigs if they fight with them.

Evergreen Valley High School Marching Band wins four first place awards

he Evergreen High School (EVHS) Marching Band has earned a total of four first place awards, winning two first place awards at two recent Western Band Association (WBA) competitions.

The EVHS Marching Band, which competes in the 2017 WBA Class 2A, won first place at the James Logan Invitational Band Tournament on Nov. 11 and was awarded an impressive score of (81.0). The band was also awarded four first place caption categories: High Music, High Visual, High General Effect, and High Percussion.

At the Independence Band Tournament on Nov. 4, The EVHS Marching Band was awarded the first place award with a score of (77.5). The band was also awarded four first place caption categories: High Music, High Visual, High General Effect, and High Percussion.

Last month, the EVHS Marching Band competed in the Dublin Irish Guard Band Tournament, held in Dublin, CA on October 21, and The Garlic City Classic Band Tournament, held in Gilroy, CA on Oct 14.

"The Bach compositions require great concentration and musical skill of our 64-member band," said Stephen Barnhill, EVHS Music Director. Barnhill and Rick Pina, EVHS Assistant Music Director, direct the EVHS Marching Band.

The WBA events include more than 12,000 students participating in weekend competitions. Each WBA individual judge is assigned to a specific caption. General Effect and Music are each worth 30 percent of the total score, Visual is worth 20 percent, and Auxiliary and Percussion are each worth 10 percent.

"A special shout out to our dedicated students, our talented staff and all of our amazing volunteers: Band Moms, Pit Dads, and the families that have contributed their efforts to make our program successful year after year," said Barnhill.

Our age is tempted to focus on instant gratifications and receiving what we want. Modern technologies encour-

aged the instant 'on demand' aspects of life for me. What we all want most is meaningful relationships, harmony and community. You can't build a wonderful life in an instant nor by yourself; a thankful spirit is key.

Each Thanksgiving I am reminded of a song frequently sung around this time of year. It is difficult for me to sing as it always brings tears to my eyes.

The song was written by a Pastor living the horrors of the thirty Years War in 17th Century Europe. The story mirrors situations being experienced in many parts of the world today. You will recognize the similarities.

His town filled with refugees fleeing war became victims of a plague called "The Great Pestilence." Only four pastors served the town. They were the spiritual leaders and healers of the day. One Pastor fled, two others died serving the sick. He continued as the sole Pastor in town consoling the sick and burying the dead. As many as 40 - 50 persons were buried per day so they say. Some 4500 in all. His wife also succumbed to the plague. Eventually the death toll was so great refugees were buried in trenches without services. This Pastor gave service above self. He shared the suffering of all as he saw the human face in each individual life.

In spite of this European tragedy of never ending war and pestilence, when others would curse the darkness, this Pastor could pen a song to give hope to his

children - and give thanks to God. It is a timeless prayer of thanksgiving.

You may recognize the tune as you read the words:

Now thank we all our God With hearts and hands and voices;

Who wondrous things hath done, In whom this world rejoices.

Who, from our mother's arms, Hath led us on our way,

With countless gifts of love, And still is ours today.

O may this bounteous God through all our life be near us,

With ever joyful hearts and blessèd peace to cheer us;

And keep us in His grace, and guide us when perplexed;

And free us from all ills, in this world and the next!

The reason where I am coming from is we don't know if there is going to be a tomorrow or not so we better live each day at a time and be happy and spend some time with family and community.

When I say community I mean all community, all nationalities, not just one community for we are all one. Create situations where you can be stress-less and in peace thinking about some good memory of the life.

Create together moments of happiness without any reason

I have learned by working with people with mental issues what they are going through in everyday life and working with them, we create together moments of happiness without any reason.

I go to a number of nursing homes and hospitals to give Christmas cards to the patients so I see the smile on their faces, because few people visit them. I go there with a bunch of cards to make them happy.

I try to make them laugh during their times of deep depression. I pray for them and I feel and believe they are part of my family. What actually I do is I prepare them to look forward to live and I tell them stories of other people's lives and the positive things they did.

They're dreaming about them

We often speak about children because they like to hear about children a lot because they are missing their grandchildren. They're dreaming about them. We speak about growing up stories and how their children grew up. I ask them questions about when they first took them to school and what was it like at graduation.

Sometimes they are not all there and sometimes they feel they are in the graduation at this moment.

The most beautiful moment of their lives

I also make sure to go over the best moments of their lives. For example, often we speak of the first time they met their girlfriend or wife or the first time they visited their grandchildren. They talk about it and mention about the moment. They sweetly discuss and relive the beautiful memories.

We should set aside each month some moments to visit people in a hospital or nursing home. Your church minister, Mr. Pastor should also visit. When I go I am not carrying any prejudice, I make arrangements with management and I walk in and say hello to patients and pass out cards with smiles.

There was a man who died that I knew and he passed in the hospital. His family called me and I went there and his wife almost passed out. She could not talk. She had trouble breathing and her teeth were chattering. Her daughters were there next to her but no one knew what to do. I don't know where I got the spirit... I got the doctor from another room to save her life. "Doctor, I don't have time to talk," I grabbed his hand and led him to her and he saved her life.

The spirit of God

He was kind of hesitant and a bit surprised when I grabbed him by the arm but he did not say no and that is the spirit of



God. He gave her treatment for her breathing. After that she came back to life. She was so saddened by the death of her husband she almost stopped breathing. There was too much on her mind and she was consumed with sadness. Weeks later the family thanked me for my actions.

Sometimes God will put in your mind no fear. If you believe in God, God will give you the spirit to take action.

Let's all of us make a goal to save life and all of us treat everyone the same. Let's everyone do their part

to make the tradition to pass out cards to the less fortunate who may be alone in hospitals and nursing homes, to give some kind of gift for even if it is small it is welcomed for a holiday visit.

Time is the best gift one can give

On behalf of the city and county, wishing you and your family wonderful time together for time is the best gift one can give.

Tackling blight in unincorporated urban areas a top county priority

n November 14. the Board of Supervisors took a major step forward in dealing with urban blight when they unanimously approved my proposal for a review and update of the County's zoning

and land use ordinances.

Santa Clara County contains multiple pockets of unincorporated land that is surrounded by incorporated cities and is indistinguishable from those cities. Two of the largest pockets are the Burbank and Cambrian areas in my district. Both are surrounded by San Jose.

Unfortunately, existing County ordinances largely focus on dealing with rural issues. As an example, there is no specific County ordinance that defines what constitutes urban property blight. It is time to change that by updating the ordinances to reflect the urban reality of many of our

unincorporated pockets. The County has significantly expanded its Code Enforcement Unit over the past few years. Now we need to give that unit the proper authority and guidance so we can make all of our unincorporated areas inviting, livable spaces for our residents and businesses.

I expect the County Counsel's office will present revised and updated ordinances to the Board in the new year, and I am hopeful they will be approved. I look forward to seeing a major County effort to reduce urban blight in 2018.

California proposal would negate taxes for residents without kids in public schools

ee Olson of Huntington Beach, CA is proposing a ballot measure to exempt residents who don't have kids in California state public schools from paying any property, sales, income taxes or fees to fund them. The following is an actual excerpt from the proposed act;

"(a) This Act shall be known as the "California Education Tax Relief Act." (b) Notwithstanding any provision of the Constitution to the contrary, no property, sales or income taxes or fees or other government schemes to extract financial resources shall be levied or assessed against California residents who do not have students they are financially responsible for enrolled in Article IX schools in order to pay for any free school provided for under Section 5 of Article IX, nor to pay for any Public School System or into the State School Fund provided for under Section 6 of Article IX, nor to pay for any bonds or district costs provided for under Section 6 1/20fArticle IX, nor to pay for any textbooks provided for under Section 7.5 of Article IX, nor to pay for the University of California provided for under Section 9 of Article IX."

The California Education Tax Relief Act, proposed by Olson, would allow any resident of California with no children in the public school system to avoid paying taxes and fees designated for state school funding.

To the surprise of school administrators up and down the state, California's Attorney General's Office gave approval for circulation of the initiative, allowing proponents to start collecting the signatures (585,407) necessary to obtain a spot on the November 2018 ballot.

Evergreen resident Jenna Stewart said, "even if I did not have children in a public school, I would not opt out of paying school taxes. We need to support our public schools."

While the measure could reduce revenue from state and local taxes and fees, the proposal, if approved, may lead to increases in other taxes and fees in order for state and local governments to balance their budgets.

Shimmering candle light vigil contacts God in our universe

"History making, No words can describe it. I do not know what to say for it is beyond religion, it is humanity," stated one prayerful visitor. People of all faiths were invited to attend, light candles and speak silently with God. Priests asked for healing of the universe.

The Gurdwara is a Sikh religious place and also is used as a community center to reach out to help all people of all races and faiths. Throughout America and in foreign countries we find Gurdwaras. It is in front of the beautiful building with the special fountain overlook of the valley that the gathering took place.

Prayers are done almost all the hours of the day and night here. When one enters one hears reciting words of special meaning one feels the focus on God and the need to reflect on the meaning of life and to ask for guidance to help all people and one's self.

Priests sing softly during the day poetic words from the Sikh Holy Book called the Granth.

As the day turned slowly into the darkness of dusk, candles were lit to remind all of the light of God and prayers chanted to reinforce the knowledge that he is

"We condemn any type of violence done by anyone and we feel for the families sorrow in this time of grief for their loss," stated director in the Gurdwara, Sukhdev Singh Bainiwal. "We are all human beings and we are all the same inside. It doesn't matter what color, what race, what gender, what ethnic or religious background, we come down to one thing, and we are just humans. No words can replace the family loss in such a tragic event we see that occurred. We got to re-evaluate our rights for if one's right allows the taking away of innocent people's lives, what kind of right is that.

God teaches us we must care and love for the human race," stated community liaison for the Gurdwara, Jessie Singh. "There was no reason for this tragic event in our world, it is nice to have an opportunity to bring different faiths together to share in tragic times," stated a candle light vigil participant. "The teaching of Guru Nanak principles of our faith began over 500 years ago and that's the spirit of the Sikh religious beliefs. I can feel the pain of the families for this situation reminds me of when my brother was senselessly killed in a cross-

I feel for the families and I am very disappointed to hear this kind of news of shootings because we should know better as a human race for we should never hurt anybody at all and that is a principle of life," stated Bob Gill of the Gurdwara. A priest began the vigil by saying simple sentences that resonated strongly to all. "We pray for the well being of the whole world and universe and the hurt families. We pray to protect the world from future incidents of this kind." It was also stated that this vigil is not the first for the priests of the Gurdwara that have done this many times before. "From day zero we pray to God and the taking care of the whole universe," stated the Holy man.

A chant took place over and over again which in translation to English means "God."

A holy prayer was done and it was explained by another religious leader from the Gurdwara, "we all belong to God and our victory is God's victory."

Guru Nanak Dev Ji is considered the founder of Sikhism and the first of 10 Sikh Gurus who lived a life bestowing great wisdom. He shared his learnings with the world in the form of the Holy Book called the Guru Granth Sahib. People turn to it to reflect on things especially during times of discomfort as is seen with regard to other religious Holy Books in our world. I close this article with just one of many quotes by the founder of the Sikh religion.

One visitor to the Gurdwara stated before the vigil began, "this is very historic that the Gurdwara held this candlelight vigil and powerful to invite all faiths in our Evergreen Valley. The act is helping to heal the world for when people are brought into a group due to their overlying belief in God and they come from different churches in our valley it's of such excellence it is sublime."

The following quote is from Guru Nanak Dev Ji:

Burn your attachments and grind them into ink. Turn your intelligence into the finest paper. Make the love of God your pen and let your conscious mind be the scribe. Then, seek the Guru's Instructions and write them down. Write the Praises of the Nam. Write over and over that God is infinite and unlimited.

build more affordable housing however the time to achieve fruition of such plans takes years, thus action must be taken to quickly address the geometric need for housing with faith help and with strength of powerful prayer.

"All of us have a strong love for our community. All of that love makes us stronger and unties us to bring action to help others. I appreciate all you do as faith leaders. Graciously this meeting place was offered by the new interim president of Evergreen Valley College, Mr. Keith Aytch.

"I hope our hospitality is generous, we are a community college and this is your home. We welcome you in the whole ecosystem of things and I am here to help the entire community," stated Aytch. Relating to the purpose of the event itself, President Aytch stated," we are establishing an advocacy resource center so when students experience hunger we can have a food pantry to assist." This brought home the hidden understanding that even college

students are sometimes homeless and hungry as all levels of our society can be. Councilwoman Arenas sincerely thanked President Aytch for his efforts in helping the event take place.

It was explained that many religious institutions in San Jose and Evergreen are currently rolling up their sleeves and finding ways to help shelter the homeless and they have been helping for some time now. Gigantic efforts are made on a daily basis and especially in the cold winter months. With successes comes learning and a push

This important summit allowed the faith based groups to contemplate extending how each might contribute more in the future and thanked all for helping thus far. **Some families sleep in cars**

This homeless issue is a ghost like problem for it is seen yet not truly discerned by citizens. It is haunting to know that such homeless situations are growing and things need to be done to combat the pain and sorrow for both adults and children when they face a lack a place to stay.

It seems that our Evergreen area, as well as all other districts, faces the spike in home values which triggered rapid increases in rent prices which in turn caused a growing situation where many live just one or two paychecks from not having a place to stay. It was explained by a faith leader that there are even some situations where women with children have no car and are homeless in our valley.

The Winter Faith Collaboration group comes to the rescue

Representatives from the Winter Faith Collaboration project spoke. This group brings together and engages over 100 faith communities across San Jose and Santa Clara County with the "collective aim to serve and shelter these in the homeless community who are living outdoors." It was explained that Evergreen is not immune from those experiencing the plight of hunger and house-less-ness.

Dignity, respect and stability

Leaders of the Winter Faith Collaborative explained that three things must be in place for any homeless person to pull themselves up from a downward spiral, dignity, respect and stability. That is what volunteers are focused upon for when these three components are achieved and kept intact; the homeless person can once again develop the capacity to "feel love." It was discussed that a lack of stability hinders people from getting back into housing situations.

Arenas thanked all the faith leaders for the work they have achieved and are currently doing to help those in need. It was explained that many proactive measures are in place such as overnight shelters, drop in centers and safe parking which is a place to park for those who live in their car, away from harassment and harm. Arenas kindly expressed that together more can be done and her District 8 office will help too.

Another partner in the assistance to those who are homeless stated that they offer a mobile shower service which helps the less fortunate to have a shower in a safe location. Many opportunities are given to the less fortunate that the common citizen may be unaware of for those that reach out to help are discrete about their assistance.

Hiding

Lots of homeless individuals are in hiding and especially those with children. The faith based leaders do not judge the people, they do not state in a negative way, "Hey why are you living in your car?" Instead they work with individuals in caring, compassionate and deeply respectful ways during the homeless "crisis of housing" situations.

The event went by quickly and Arenas stated, "I wish to thank everyone who came today. We need to continue to collectively talk to each other and we can organize our services and list them on a 'needs sheet' so that those looking for help will know where to get it. Collectively as a group we can do more when all of our efforts are combined. Working together enhances the strength of all!"

Many faith leaders had the opportunity to speak and contribute their thoughts. Many cordially met each other for the first time so that their face to face interaction was made possible for the first time by this important event.

The meeting was well organized and much was accomplished. There was a depth of collaboration seen to be taking effect in deep ways. This process is not new and it needs kind nurturing which Arenas and her team are facilitating.

As the event came to a close, one reflected on the important and meaningful comment Councilwoman Arenas stated when it first began. She stated, "I am not going to call this an annual event because I want to meet with you all more than once a year. We all have a strong love for our community."

Arenas allowed all the faith leaders to have time to pinpoint some of the most pressing issues they wish to explore in this setting as future meetings take place. About ten other issues were expressed to be of great importance to work together on to help the Evergreen Valley Community. Arenas' staff diligently took notes to follow up on each area of need stated.

The words of Arenas rang strong when she stated, "our county is suffering; join me in the battle to restore humanity and community for the most vulnerable."

The summit was bookmarked with powerful prayer both before and after it took place by different religious faith leaders which reaffirmed that all in Evergreen all reach out to work together as one.

After the event ended many stayed for over a half hour to network and continue to explore with kind conversations how to work together to achieve lofty goals led by themselves with collaboration and nurturing by District 8 Councilwoman Arenas' office.

The man's collection of nick-knacks stretched from cart to cart and seemed to grow each day.

I knew a man named 'Bo Jangles'

s one drives on White Road near Quimby you often see the man with a collection of nick-knacks that stretch from cart to cart and seem to grow each day. Sometimes his things are set up

on one side of the road and other days they move on carts to the opposite side.

It was with great curiosity that I asked him if I could do a small article on him and his beliefs. I explained that I write for the Evergreen Times. He kindly agreed.

Q: How would you describe yourself?

A: "Inventor, collector, creator (meaning he can put things together to make new objects), trader, kind, philosopher and encourager.'

Q: How did you come about creating things?

A: "I was born that way. In kindergarten I created a shock absorber idea for car bumpers so that if they got in a collision the bumper would not get damaged." Q: How would you describe

this collection here?

A: "It tends to grow and when it does, I deal some of it off. I have six bikes and I want to keep three (meaning he was open to selling the other three that were in parts to be built). In pointing to small mattress suspended on the cart, he stated, "This is a Serta fresh mattress and it's sturdy bed gear." He proudly said, "full solar here too, 10 lamps, lantern, plus phone charging and it all came from ground scores." Ground scores were explained as things gotten for free when a person picks things up and finds something of value anywhere in the vicinity or beyond.

Q: What is this cardboard kind of propeller?

"XO atmosphere, propri-A: etary, it's a new day for orbital hardware..." (it was seen that this invention was top secret yet beyond the planning stages and thus questions were asked to be kept to a minimum, I also decided not to take any photos of this "pro-

prietary" item). Q: Is it a bit tough to live out

here? A: "I'm as healthy as a horse...I

exist on limited sleep...I have stuck around because this area has been real good to me. The character of the individuals is good here (Evergreen)."

Q: Have you got in fights with people?

A: "When things get ugly I ended up making friends with them. If you are real close enough to fight you can find out if there is a reason to it and if there ain't maybe you can have a beer with them.

Q: Do people steal from you? A: I'm probably in good enough with the thieves that they leave me alone.'

With that, the eloquent downto-earthy speaking (think cowboy) man said. "I'm on no benefits...ain't interested...don't want to be part of the problem ... ground scores keep me going." Then he added, "Once there were some German graduates who were

backpacking and they gave me their left over camp gear as they were getting on a plane to go home. That was about a month and a half ago and I also got a chess set, backgammon and even a mini soccer ball before they got on their plane to go home."

Q: Have you ever thought about moving?

A: "I know a woman who is like a friend and she has six acres in Castro Valley. All I need is three car park spaces of land and I think about contacting her often. Maybe she might let me live on her land. I could take care of it." He spoke of his bond with nature, fields and open space adding his frustrating observation that, "corn fields have been turned into homes.'

Writer's Note: I told the man that he spoke well and he added that if he would not mind a cup of coffee anytime day or night. Three days later I bought that cup of coffee with the five creams and sugars requested but when I revisited the place to continue our conversation, he was gone and there was no trace of his collection.

The entire experience of him allowing me to interview him reminded me of the song "Bo Jangles Man." Although this guy did not physically dance, he did tap dance moves, pirouettes, summersaults and high leaps with his Americana crafted words that made an encounter friendly and entertaining to any person willing to strike up the conversation.

"He danced so high, then he lightly touched down ... '
