A Name Above All Others

Seungdamaroung was his last name. Most of his patients just called him "Doctor Seung," for obvious reasons. I have not seen him in over thirty years. Yet, every time I think of him I still feel a deep sense of appreciation for his sacrificial kindness to my family.

Our oldest son was born five weeks prematurely. That is not always a problem, but it was for him because his lungs were not fully developed. He was quickly placed under oxygen because of his labored breathing. Things went pretty

well for about 24 hours, then one of his lungs ruptured due to his struggle to breathe. An emergency surgical procedure had to be performed which stabilized him- - until twentyfour hours later when the same thing happened to the other lung which required the same ordeal.

It is when the complications started with our newborn that Dr. Seung entered the picture. Interestingly enough, he was a specialist in premature babies and had just moved to town. His skill and expertise (girded by numerous prayers) are truly the reason our son

is alive today! But there is more.

As most of you know, lengthy hospital stays and surgical procedures equal a hefty bill to pay. As I remember, the bottom line was just over \$9000, which to us as a young couple in 1980 seemed like \$90,000! The insurance we had at the time had a lot to be desired in way of benefits, so we figured we would be in debt for a long time. Then, Dr. Seung enters the picture again. Most of what the insurance did not pay was owed to him. Yet, he kindly informed us that whatever the insurance paid would be sufficient- - we would owe no more. Maybe now you can see why Dr. Seung is such a memorable name to us.

Perhaps we all have people in our lives that have gone that extra mile that meant so much to us. For such people we have a profound sense of appreciation and we will never forget their loving kindness.

But when all is said and done, there is no act of kindness by any human being that would begin to compare with all that God has done for us through Jesus! "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). Jesus paid the debt that we could never pay! The gracious gift that He offers is eternal life (Romans 6:23).

"Jesus!" Not just a memorable name, but a name above all names (cf. Philippians 2:9-11).

Our Attention on **Kicking Butts**

he City of Florence and mayor Steve Holt recently decided to address an issue that has been smoldering for far too long. The "No Butts About It" campaign finally puts the issue of cigarette butts into

perspective.

We have been aggressively addressing litter as a nation for over six decades. The advent of drive-in's and drivethru's in the 1950's made it easy for an unprepared and unconcerned public to discard without thinking. Drivers and passengers casually tossed glass bottles, cups, cans, and paper wrappers out of their windows and onto the oncepristine roadways.

More disposable products such as razors, paper towels, diapers, paper plates, and TOM MAGAZZU napkins ushered us into

a more challenging battle against litter. America had been through at least two significant anti-litter campaigns so we were well-past unprepared. We were now lazy and obstinate. It's now a social stigma to litter, but many still do it since it is hard to levy fines without eyewitness or recorded evidence.

Although cigarette butts have been included in litter discussion, there was little in the way of emphasis. They are small and generally deemed inconsequential by some. In fact, a recent Keep America Beautiful survey found that 77% of people don't think of cigarette

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



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

You'll need \$170,000 to go from \$130,000 in savings to \$300,000, right? So, let's start planning. If you save \$60,000 a year, it would take you a little less

than three years to get there. If you set aside \$40,000 a year, it would take a little more than four years. A little division — just divide \$170,000 by the amount you want to save each year — and you've got the beginnings of plan. A dream is a good place to start, but I want you to develop this into a plan that focuses on a goal. Break this down, and figure out how to achieve it.

I see three ways to achieve this home ownership goal. One, you do the long division math and save like crazy for however many years it takes to save up \$170,000. The second is to put \$130,000 down on a \$300,000 home, and take out a \$170,000, 15year fixed rate mortgage. This is the only kind of debt I don't beat up people for having. The good news is, with your income, you could probably pay it off in half that time.

A third possibility is to buy a \$130,000 house. Write a check for nice, modest home now, and in five years saving wildly the whole time, since you'll have no house payments - move up and pay cash for a \$300,000 home. If I'm in your shoes, that's what I'm doing!

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


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

very inexpensive for someone your age. Keep in mind that life insurance becomes costlier as you get older. The reason? Statistically speaking, the older you are the more likely you are to die. It's not a fun thought, but it's the truth.

Life insurance, or at least a burial policy if you're single and have no dependents, isn't one of the Baby Steps in my plan. But in your case, it's a go-get-it-now adult responsibility kind of thing! -Dave
