

Taylorsville wins 2A South crown with 2nd half defense

On November's last day in 2007, Chuck Robertson stood on Taylorsville's field as an assistant coach while he and the program celebrated it's MHSAA Class 2A South State championship win over Enterprise-Clarke, 49-7.

Almost ten years later to the day, Robertson, now in his second season as Taylorsville's head coach, tried his best to avoid the ice bath that followed his team's 48-32 win over Collins Friday night in the second most populated town in Smith County. The win gives Taylorsville the Class 2A South State title. The Tartars (14-1) will play Winona (11-3) next Friday afternoon at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium in Oxford. Kickoff is scheduled for 3 p.m.

"The craziest thing of the night is we're playing defense and running the football," said Robertson in the midst of an overcrowded field as Taylorsville fans celebrated the win. "Those are things that we have not done well until the last three weeks. Everybody says defense wins championships and ours came through tonight."

Taylorsville and Collins combined for

47 points in the first half. The visitors from 16.9 miles away led at the break, 26-21. In the second half, Taylorsville held Collins to just eight points as its offensive continued to pile on points.

"Our adjustments at halftime were amazing," said Robertson. "I have a great coaching staff, and they do an amazing job. We came out in the second half and held them [Collins] to one score on a bad call. That is just a compliment to my coaches."

If senior running back Tycarius Roberts' 52-yard touchdown run with 4:21 left in the game didn't ice the win for Taylorsville, then his interception of a Collins pass less than two minutes later did.

"In the last two or three weeks, Roberts' play has been outstanding," said Robertson. "I challenged him three or four weeks ago, and he has stepped up.

"He's carried the load for us by taking some of the pressure off our quarterback. We know the better teams you play, the better you have to run the football. Collins made it tough on us to run the football, yet

JCJC holds Grand Opening of the first Haas Tech Center in Mississippi

A ribbon cutting ceremony and open house was held on the campus of Jones County Junior College Wednesday, November 15, to officially announce a public-private partnership with JCJC and Haas Factory Outlet - A Division of Machine Tools, LLC (HFO/Louisiana-Mississippi). HFO has been serving the manufacturing community of Louisiana and Mississippi for over 20 years as the exclusive source for Haas CNC machine tools and rotary products. The event was held at the college's Industrial Services Building in the Precision Machining and Manufacturing lab. The partnership turns the machining lab into a Haas Factory Outlet Showroom in addition to a technical educational center for JCJC students to have an opportunity to learn on the latest and greatest machining and manufacturing equipment available.

"This is an enormous and a significant moment for us here at the college, because this is the first of its kind in Mississippi," exclaimed JCJC president Dr. Jesse Smith. "We think this is a partnership that is

going to yield great benefits for both Jones and Haas Factory Outlet." "We're extremely excited to have a bigger presence here in south Mississippi," said Patrick Kane, general manager of Haas Factory Outlet for Mississippi and Louisiana. "I do believe something great is happening here," said Chase Elmore, JCJC's Precision Machining and Manufacturing Technology instructor. Not a single person here today goes a single day in their life without putting their hands on something that was made by a machinist. Spread the word of what's going on here. If you know anybody that needs a skill, it doesn't matter what age, and it doesn't matter what gender. If you need a skill that can lead to a good career and a good life, I think we can provide that

here."

"When I started calling schools in Mississippi to find out what we could do and how we could work together to help grow programs and support the machining programs in the state of Mississippi, Chase (Elmore) was the first to call me back," explained Toni Neary, HFO-Morris Group, director of education. "I don't think he knew what he was getting in for."







In May JCJC hosted the Haas Technical Education Center's (HTEC) first Mississippi regional conference for educators and industry leaders. "We really wanted to do this educator's conference to showcase what the trade schools in Mississippi are doing and the types of students they're putting out," said Neary.

At the conference, the Gene Haas Foundation donated a total of \$80,000 to nine community/junior colleges and high schools in Mississippi. JCJC's Precision Machining and Manufacturing received \$15,000.

Neary said the first time they walked into the Precision Machining and Manufacturing shop they saw that half of it was empty. "We looked around and the floors and the walls were a little beat up. The lighting was a little dim. And, I asked (Chase) what type of technology would you like to see in here? Chase has worked so hard all summer. Our Haas Factory Outlet folks have stepped up to the plate and epoxied the floors, painted the walls, and worked with a team to get in new lighting. She added that during the open house she heard at least two people comment "this is not what I thought a machine shop would look like." And that's our goal, noted Neary.

HFO-Mississippi spent approximately \$47,000 in remodeling (\$25,000 for painting, \$4,000 to move machines, \$10,000 for labor installation and \$8,000 for rewiring) the almost 6,500 squarefoot JCJC machine shop and lab.

"I need to say a special thanks to Trent Mulloy (Laurel Machine & Foundry owner) because he opened our eyes to what can be - could be," said Smith. He explained that Mulloy encouraged him to go with them to visit the factory where the Haas machines were being built in Oxnard, California. "Then the Board allowed me to go to China," said Smith, "and I went to seven different career and technical schools in China and saw where U.S. companies were vesting in those schools and actually building labs in the same nature of what you see here today. We came back with a vision, and we never could have made it happen until Chase Elmore came along. Chase is always chasing excellence. He is a tremendous asset. We believe in him and what he's doing. We think this is a beginning of something extraordinarily unique and very special. This is going to be a model which all community colleges need to follow . . . to make great partnerships with businesses and industries. We plan to add value back to Haas and learn by their expertise. We plan to grow together and give them a solid pipeline

of talent throughout the country coming through Jones County Junior College."

Smith also recognized those in attendance who continue to support JCJC, starting with his wife, Jennifer Smith, who is also a teacher at JCJC, and members of the Board of Trustees including Ann Tucker, Executive Board vice chairman; Carolyn Smith from Clarke County; Mike Evans, treasurer from Wayne County; and Robert Sullivan, board attorney. Also present were Representative Gary Staples, Representative Donnie Scoggins, Ellisville Mayor Lynn Buckhaults, Jones County Beat 4 Supervisor David Scruggs, and Jones County EDA President and CEO Ross Tucker.

Haas has consigned approximately \$300,000 in new CNC machines at the JCJC HTEC which includes a DT-1 drill/tap center, a ST-30Y CNC lathe with bar-feeder, and a VF-3YT/50 taper vertical machining center. HFO-Mississippi will supply free Blaser coolant to run all three machines and added an air compressor to run the machines. Any Hass consignment machine sold will be replaced with the newest machinery available. In addition to being a NIMS (National Institute for Metalworking Skills) credentialed program, JCJC is now part of the HTEC Network - an industry and education led initiative that enables manufacturing technology educators and their schools to acquire and share information on the newest technology, software, and educational materials.


