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



appropriate "comfort" therapies.

Several common myths related to Palliative Care (PC) and Hospice need to be cleared up.

1. My doctors have given up and I will receive no more treatment. If a doctor says, "There's nothing more I can do", what he's really saying is he has no "cure" for the problem. A PC/hospice referral is a shift from futile "curative" treatments to more

2. It's only for people with cancer. It's also for many other 'Life Limiting Diseases' (LLD) which are as bad or worse than cancer. Life limiting means the disease eventually causes death unless something else happens first: such as Alzheimer's, Congestive Heart Failure, emphysema, Lou Gehrig's Disease, Strokes.

3. It means I'm close to death. Hospice requires a certification that the patient will die within six months if the disease runs its usual course; but PC is available to anyone with a chronic or LLD. Many people live longer precisely because they receive PC/hospice: by improving comfort, patients eat better, enjoy life more, and often live months longer than expected.

4. They dope you up & you sleep until you die. The main reason both doctors and patients may believe this is that we frequently receive referrals so late that the only option remaining is 'palliative sedation': using continuous morphine and other drugs to induce a state of sleep so that suffering can be relieved, allowing them to die peacefully, with dignity; which also leaves the family with a much

5. If I get morphine, I will stop breathing. Only if it is given in very large doses will breathing stop. Dosages are just enough to control symptoms and suffering. Studies confirm that there is no relationship between the dose given in PC/hospice programs and causing someone to die prematurely.

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

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and fake news that matches our political ideology. There are at least 5 major browsers: Chrome, Firefox

(Now called 'Quantum"), Edge, Internet Explorer, and Safari for you Mac people.

Many of us simply use whatever browser Fisher we are presented with. Generally, that means Edge on Windows 10, Internet Explorer on Windows 7, and Safari on a Mac. But other browsers offer different approaches to security, improved speed, flexibility through the use of "plugins" and convenience with such things as

password keepers. So which of these browsers are "best"? Will using a different browser make your computing experience more joyful? Will it make you smarter or prettier?

There used to be huge differences between browsers. Years ago, Microsoft was slow to update their browser which allowed competitors to step up their game and dominate. Years ago, Firefox was the best alternative to Internet Explorer. Then Google came out with their Chrome browser which blew away the competition. In recent years, all the major players have

been playing leapfrog in making the fastest, most secure, most convenient browser. So who is the "best"? Short answer: all of them are great. But here are some things to ponder when settling on one.

Chrome - My choice but mainly because I am deeply entrenched in the Google universe. I do all my word processing and spreadsheets on Google Drive (a free online suite of software similar to Office) which is much more friendly with Chrome. Chrome also integrates nicely with my Android phone. I enter a password on my phone and it's "remembered" on my computer and vice versa.

Edge - The browser that comes with Windows 10. Many of you still confuse it with Internet Explorer (IE). IE is actually still on Windows 10 computers, it's just hidden. The problem with Edge is that it's weird. The address bar isn't where it should be. The menu bar is gone and many people just don't like new ways. If you sign-in with a Microsoft account, it will give you similar features to Chrome for password keepers and bookmark synchronization between all your devices.

Mozilla Quantum - the newest browser from the makers of FireFox. It's fast, secure, and looks familiar to those who don't like changes. Again, signing in to a free Mozilla account will allow for synchronization across your devices. For those who use a laptop, Quantum offers significantly extended battery life through more efficient use of

resources.

Mac users should immediately dump Safari and PC users should move away from Internet Explorer. They are both full of security holes and just aren't updated often enough to keep up with the miscreants out there on the Internet.

BEFORE YOU SHOP

As I watch people start to ramp up their frantic shopping, I remember doing the same thing and worrying over the bills later. I then started to purchase small items all through the year for stocking stuffers and that eased the burden in November and December. 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A Mistake Avoided

I got a case last week and the family had family friend who is an attorney. This attorney to my knowledge is a fine lawyer who specializes in a particular field of law other than personal injury.

Those of you who have read my column before know that I do not particularly advertise my services in this column. But you need to know that lawyers have specialized fields of practice just like doctors. The difference is that doctors are more clearly labeled. Certainly, there are very good and very competent general practitioners in the legal field. In the past, a family would have a good lawyer that would take

care of ordinary legal matters and then refer them to the best lawyer for their particular problem if a specialist in the law was required.

The facts of this case arise out of a wreck and serious injury requiring immediate surgery and hospitalization. I'd bet the medical charges to date are around \$125,000.00. Remember that the hospital has a lien. Consider that BC/BS would satisfy these bills for less than \$25,000.00 and the medical providers would normally be pleased to be paid promptly by BC/BS. Medical providers have gross charges that are far in excess of what they expect to receive because some insurance companies just pay a percentage and the higher the charge the higher the reimbursement.

The family friend lawyer suggested, with all good intention, just sending the bills to the at fault insurance company in hopes that they would pay the policy limits. They might do that, but because of the hospital lien the money would go from the insurance company to the hospital without the injured party getting any benefit from the payment. That would be a mistake.

The solution is to represent the injured party and that puts an attorney's lien, by law, in front of the hospital lien. Now, the attorney can negotiate the medical bills down from some wildly unexpected overpayment to an amount about BC/BS would have paid. Now, the attorney's fee could be used in some way to benefit the client and the leverage it provides will benefit the client because if things go well, the bills are paid and the client gets

I am not blaming the dogs, it's the owner's irresponsibility of not doing what they are supposed to with these dangerous dogs.


I can't walk grandchildren around my neighborhood anymore for fear of a dog coming after us. Two dogs attacked my daughter on her bike causing her to wreck it.



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Medicare Minute "Prescription Drug Plans 3"

Last week we discussed prescription drug plan premiums, deductibles and coinsurance. This week we will continue to look at Medicare prescription drug plans by looking at copays, formularies and provider networks. When choosing a prescription drug plan these six things are very important

A copay is a fixed amount you pay for each individual prescription. Copays can vary depending on the tier of your prescription. Typically the lower the tier, the lower the copay. A tier 1 drug usually has a lower copay than a tier 2 drug, tier 2 drugs have a lower copay than tier 3, etc. Because different plans may categorize drugs in different tiers it's a good idea to know how your plan treats your prescriptions.

The prescription drug plan's formulary will tell you two important things. First, it will tell you if the prescription you are taking is covered under the plan. Second, it will tell you the tier of the prescription. Knowing the tier of your prescription is important in determining the copay. For example, Plan A may list your prescription as a tier 2 whereas Plan B may have it as a tier 3. This should tell you that Plan A will have a lower copay on your prescription than Plan B. It will also tell you if your drug will fall in the deductible phase of the plan.

The plan's provider network is a list of pharmacies that accepts the plan. All pharmacies do not accept all plans so if you have a particular pharmacy you would like to use check to make sure they accept your plan. You can do this by simply asking your pharmacist. 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
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Just Glad to Matter

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

The title of Congressional Accountability Act 1995 reminds me of the communist nations named Democratic Republics.


