Sparrows Point Terminal is no more. As of Tuesday, Jan. 12, the group announced a rebrand to become Tradepoint Atlantic. Lt. Gov. Boyd Rutherford, County Executive Kevin Kamenetz, members of the Sixth District state delegation and Councilman Todd Crandell were on hand for the unveiling of the new brand and logo.

Tradepoint Atlantic CEO Michael Moore ushered in the new era for the group, stating that "our future lies on the global stage."

"As we make the transition from a local industrial powerhouse to a global transportation and logistics center, our new identity will help us build a global brand for a global economy," Moore said. "Our new brand reflects our values of stewardship, accountability, progress, entrepreneurism and creativity.'

Moore stressed that although they have rebranded, the company will continue to honor the workers who manned the Bethlehem Steel mill for decades.

The new logo, representative of the top portion of a star, forms a "T" and "A" for Tradepoint Atlantic, with the star being a nod to Sparrows Point's heritage. Moore also stated that the "point" in "Tradepoint" was also done to honor

those who worked on the property. This follows the group's decision to keep the Star of Bethlehem - the steel star that hung on the "L" blast furnace - hanging on the property as a tribute.

"Without a doubt, Sparrows Point is one of the most unique and promising areas in our community, in our state and, in fact, the world," said Moore. "With unmatched access to land, water and rail, we've come to the unquestionable conclusion that our future lies on the global stage. Given our unique position, we are confident that 'The Point' will take it's rightful place in the inter-

Rash of Edgemere break-ins troubles North Point communities

On Thursday, Jan. 7, the North Point Peninsula Council met with its highest attendance in recent memory, and the group's president, Fran Taylor, joked that former president Harry Wujek - who recently passed away - would have been ecstatic at the turnout. But the subject that most were there to discuss was a serious one.

Several residents of the Edgemere community have experienced recent burglaries, and residents of other communities on the North Point Peninsula feared they could be next if they do not respond appropriately.

Officer Russ Shipley, the NPPC's community liaison officer, attended the meeting as well to give a report of recent criminal activity in the area and to give advice on how people can secure their homes and neighborhoods.

Shipley started his presentation by giving some crime statistics for the area during the month of December. He noted that many areas of the county receive a lot more calls for police assistance than the Edgemere and North Point Peninsula areas, and as a department, Baltimore County police respond to about 2,000 calls for service per day.

"This is a small, little piece of the pie down here," he said.

Nevertheless, police responded to 196 calls for service in December and wrote 59 police reports from them.

Of particular interest to those in at-

tendance was that Shipley's report noted only one confirmed home burglary in Edgemere, the victims of which were on vacation in Florida when the breakin occurred.

Added to that were one robbery, seven thefts - three of which were from vehicles - 19 calls of suspicious persons or vehicles and six alarm calls for businesses and residences, all of which were faulty, Shipley said.

However, attendees of the meeting contested that only one burglary had occurred. And although official police statistics were not available by press time, several at the meeting had themselves been victims of the incidents and attested to them happening along at least six streets in the Edgemere community.

A similar trend developed in the Bowleys Quarters community - which mirrors Edgemere in many ways - in November 2013, when a string of six burglaries struck the area leading up to the holiday season.

In that instance, residents held a similar meeting with local police, who told them all that they were doing in response, and that they already had a suspect in mind.

Police in that instance had encouraged neighbors to communicate with each other and be especially vigilant while they stepped up their own patrols. And North Point Peninsula residents were informed that they could and should do the same, along with requesting increased vehicle and foot patrols in Edgemere.

Shipley advised residents to secure

their homes and belongings and to not leave valuables in their vehicles. He also encouraged them join the Police and Community Relations Council (PCRC) to keep up with what police are doing and what their work entails.

He was especially happy to see that there were so many calls for suspicious persons and vehicles, though, because that indicated to him that people are calling police when they see something that does not belong.

"I wouldn't care if that number was 200," Shipley commented, because it shows that people care enough to call 911 when they see something that is not normal. He noted that some think they should not bother the police with something so trivial, but that calling them could prevent a break-in or even a homicide. "I urge you to dial 911," he stressed.

He also pointed out that police will visit residences for free upon request to

perform a security survey and recommend ways for residents to better secure their homes.

North Point Village Civic Association President Dave Patro, who has experienced his own issues with crime in his North Point Village neighborhood, was also on hand to give concerned citizens advice on how to keep themselves and their neighborhoods safe.

Patro recommended using security cameras or hunting cameras to surveil your property, and using timers to turn on lights, televisions, radios, etc. when you are not home. He even recommended posting "beware of dog" or security alarm signs in your yard to deter criminals, even if you do not have them.

Additionally, some proactive residents have set up a Facebook crime watch page to help Edgemere, Millers Island and Fort Howard residents to communicate with each other about area crime.

Kamenetz releases legislative priorities for General Assembly session

Baltimore County Executive Kevin Kamenetz announced his legislative priorities for this year's General Assembly session which began Wednesday, Jan. 13, in Annapolis.

Many of his priorities have to do with transportation and, therefore, mirror the list sent to Maryland Transportation Secretary Pete Rahn back in November.

The county's full transportation request consisted of such east-side projects as widening and raising of the road from Mohrs Lane to Campbell Boulevard in Middle River, construction of a sidewalk on Kenwood Avenue from Lillian Holt Road to Hazelwood Avenue in Rosedale, streetscape improvements to Eastern Avenue (MD 150) from Mace Avenue to MD 702 in Essex, and relocation of the MARC station on Eastern Avenue in Middle River.


The \$64.4 million requested from the state for these projects would be an investment in "regional mass transit alternatives, make traffic improvements in Owings Mills and Sparrows Point and provide community development opportunities with streets, streetscapes and sidewalk

improvements," according to a statement from the county.

Other priorities for the east side include ensuring that the state fulfill its remaining \$1.5 million commitment for the new Eastern Family Resource Center in Rosedale and that it clarify bond language permitting state funds to be allocated for Angel Park in Perry Hall.

"Based on the state's prior commitment, the county broke ground on a \$26 million shelter, transitional family housing, and health and vocational services facility utilizing \$16 million in county funds, \$5 million from Medstar Health and \$5 million from the state," the county's statement explained. "The \$1.5 million will fulfill the state's commitment."

"In consultation with our county's senators and delegates, along with the leadership of the General Assembly, we have crafted important legislative initiatives that will greatly benefit the citizens of Baltimore County and the region," said County Executive Kevin Kamenetz. "We will work hard to make gains in education, transportation and public safety, and I look forward to a productive 90-day session in Annapolis."

City school board votes to close problem school near Dundalk neighborhood

Following the assault of a neighbor by students on April 22, 2015, and the subsequent uproar from the surrounding community, Baltimore City's school board voted on Tuesday, Jan. 5, to close Baltimore Community High School.

The school, located just inside the city near Dundalk's Harborview and Graceland Park neighborhoods, has for years been the center of complaints from residents about fights between students, destruction of property, intimidation and public urination.

But that all reached a boiling point with the incident last spring, which resulted in the hospitalization of 61-year-old Richard Fletcher and the arrest of seven students, all of whom were charged as adults.

"The whole situation escalated to an-

other level" when that incident happened, said Delegate Robin Grammer (R-6).

Fletcher has since recovered from his injuries, even attending the recent Legislative District 6 Town Hall with the area's state representatives where the issue was discussed and he was recognized.

In accordance with their constituents' wishes, Grammer and other elected officials initially advocated for the immediate closure of the school at the end of the 2014-15 school year. When that was not an option, they tried to reach a solution involving students riding MTA buses directly from the front of the school.

But that plan ultimately failed because only select demographic groups are protected federally with respect to transportation. So the buses could not be diverted from elsewhere specifically to serve the students and the things officials could do were limited.

Grammer noted that having no one step up to help solve the issue on behalf of city government sort of "tied our hands," and they could not pass a law to solve it. Therefore, the issue became much more about advocacy than legislation.

The area's elected officials met several times with the various stakeholders on the issue, Grammer explained, and some were advocating on behalf of the students. But the county representatives made the case that their attempts at solutions were not working for either the community or the students.

"We just had to make the case that the solution couldn't come from anything other than closing the school," he contended. Although the school had already been slated to close in 2017, Baltimore City Public Schools announced its proposal in November to close BCHS a year early because it "continues to experience low enrollment and low acheivement among students," along with "concerns about the school's ability to maintain a positive climate for teaching and learning," a BCPS report stated.

The Sixth District state delegation, as well as County Councilman Todd Crandell, testified in support of that decision before the city school board, and the board voted unanimously to carry out the proposal.

"And we're happy about that, that we were able to bring the community and school representatives together... to find a solution that works for all," Grammer said.

Local police officers honored by Sixth District delegation

Nowadays it seems like the only officers getting attention in the media are getting attention for all the wrong reasons. We've seen plenty of stories over the past two years all across the globe, with the death of Freddie Gray bringing Baltimore to the forefront of the discussions.

But members of the Sixth District state delegation and Councilman Todd Crandell went a different route on Jan. 7, opting to highlight the selfless and kind actions of two officers from the Essex Precinct.

Back in December, officer Canup was traveling along Eastern Boulevard as a mid-afternoon rain fell when he noticed an elderly woman in a disabled vehicle on the side of the road. Canup pulled over to the side of the road and was joined by officer Campbell and the two changed the elderly woman's tire, allowing her to get on her way.

Their actions were spotted by Essex resident Don Crockett, who in turn told elected officials and higher-ups at the police department about the officers' actions. After the delegation was informed, they decided to have citations printed up to honor officers Canup and Campbell.

"I greatly appreciate the acknowledgment. It's something so simple," said Campbell. "I don't even think it's worth all of this. Many of us have done so much more to deserve this [type of recognition]. But thank you very much for the acknowledgment"

Canup echoed Campbell's humble sentiments, stating that "this is just one of those things where it's more or less a small kindness act that you don't give too much thought about... I would have felt terrible driving past her."

Crockett stated that this was important to get out because it highlights the fact that officers, at their core, are simply people.

"The people only see one side of things, but there's so much more to it," said Crockett "If they did that for one car without thinking about recognition, imagine how many other cars they've done it for."

"It's not about a tire or one specific act," said Delegate Robin Grammer. "You guys are always working out the kinks with the community and hearing their concerns, and this is just one of many acts and we just wanted to stop by to show that you can count on our support."

State Senator Johnny Ray Salling offered kind words to the officers, highlighting the fact that countless others had driven past the woman and opted not to help. Crandell cited Police Chief Jim Johnson, stating that Baltimore County police are relationship builders, and the reason why we don't have many problems in the county is due to the fact that the officers build and maintain relationships in the communities.

Delegate Bob Long praised the officers by saying "I'm sure it's not the first time, and I'm sure it won't be the last time. We need to shed some good light and show people what you're all about. I thought about it, and it could have been my mom out there

Joining the politicians and officers were Captain Andre Davis and Major Steve Hlavach. Hlavach recently headed up the Essex Precinct before he was promoted

"I'm grateful to be in this precinct," said Davis. "I've just been tremendously impressed by all the officers and their efforts. I hope people see the kinds of good works we do, and hopefully this leaves an impression on the younger officers."

Major Hlavach also joined in, adding that this is "just a very small example of the professionalism of the agency.'

When all the photos were taken, officer Canup offered up a much simpler explanation for his actions. "This is just how I was raised," he said humbly.

national arena."

After his remarks, Moore unveiled a new video that highlights the past of the 3,100-acre property, as well as what the future holds for Tradepoint Atlantic and the surrounding community.

Kamenetz also spoke highly of the Tradepoint team and their vision for Sparrows Point, as well as the relationship between Tradepoint and Baltimore County government.


"We share their vision, we share their commitment to the Baltimore region," said Kamenetz. "Now with its new branding, our vision is finally being realized."




Moore finished off the unveiling by providing some answers in regards to how long the construction of the property will take as well as when it's expected that businesses will start moving to the area.

A preview of coming attractions - The 2016 session

- By Delegate Eric Bromwell (D-8) -

On Wednesday, Jan. 13, the 436th session of the Maryland General Assembly will convene. We can expect hundreds of bills and resolutions, some old and some new, to be introduced and considered.

One aspect of the 2016 session will be different from most: the Assembly will attempt to override Governor Hogan's veto of measures dealing with criminal asset seizures, voting rights for former inmates, marijuana laws and taxes for online hotel booking sites. A veto override takes 29 Senate votes and 85 House votes. There are 33 Democrats in the Senate and 91 in the House. The Senate President said it is likely that new versions of the bills will be passed. Indeed, all the bills deal with matters important to a majority of the legislature or they would not have been approved in the first place.

I will say that, having served under Governor Ehrlich, starting off a session with veto overrides will create a very different political atmosphere than was present this time last year. But as I said after the 2014 election and I reiterate now, I will not take part in partisan fights. My job as a delegate is to move our state forward, whether that means working with a Republican governor or a Democratic legislature.

The 2016 agenda also includes bills to establish an independent committee to determine where redistricting lines are drawn. I continue to be a strong supporter of redistricting reform, and believe that politics MUST be removed from the process in order to begin to win back the trust of the electorate.

task force dealing with the statewide heroin epidemic will be considered. Those recommendations include more emphasis on overdose prevention, a pilot recovery unit for inmates addicted to drugs and mandatory tracking of prescription data to help identify people who may be abusing powerful pain medications. I support not only these measures, but any others that effectively address the problem. Governor Hogan has already increased access to Naloxone and other similar drugs that are used to reverse the effects of an overdose. As was announced recently, a prescription for these drugs will no longer be needed in Maryland - a step that I strongly support - and will increase access to these treatments of last resort. The fact of the matter is, while they are NOT the solution to this epidemic, these drugs will save thousands of lives in Maryland.

Requiring employers with 10 or more employees to provide paid sick leave for their workers will be back again for consideration. Having grown up in a family-owned business, this is something that I cannot support. Business owners are struggling to make ends meet in this fragile economy, and another government requirement is just about the last thing they need.

The Senate President and the Speaker of the House both support legislation which establishes universal voter registration. Universal voter registration automatically places eligible residents on the state voter rolls by using government databases to identify eligible voters. California and Oregon have universal voter registration which automatically registers voters when they get or renew driver's licenses. This is a new idea for Maryland to consider, and I look forward to hearing from constituents to help me decide if this is something you want to see.

We can also expect to see legislation dealing with Fantasy Sports, sports betting and online gambling. In addition, the topic of concussions received in sports and the brain injuries that result will be discussed in my committee, Health and Government Operations.

I will be reporting to you regularly on these and many other issues. Please do not hesitate to contact me on any issue of concern to you. I value your input as it enables me to bring your voice to Annapolis. As always, I look forward to hearing from you soon.





Winter heating safety tips from the state fire marshal

As we are experiencing the first severe cold snap of the year, we depend on multiple types of heating sources to stay warm inside our homes. "Elements of heating resources continue to be a significant factor in home fires in Maryland," according to State Fire Marshal Brian S. Geraci. "Following these guidelines, we can work together to reduce the number of residential fires."

- * Ensure chimneys are cleaned annually or more frequently if used as the primary heating source. Also have your furnace inspected and serviced annually.
- * Use properly sized fireplace screens or enclosures. Never use a flammable liquid to start a fire in a fireplace or woodstove.
- * When disposing of cooled ashes, do not use paper, cardboard or plastic containers to remove them; instead use a metal container with a lid. Ashes will insulate hot embers long after the fire is considered
- * Make sure fuel burning stoves are installed according to local fire codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Check portable electric heaters for frayed or damaged wires and ensure the appliance is clean and placed on a flat level surface. Use only "listed" appliances by an approved testing laboratory and follow manufacturer's instructions.
- * Do not use extension cords with portable space heaters. The extension cord can overheat and cause a fire.
- * If you use kerosene fuel fired heaters, use only "K-1" kerosene fuel. Never fill the unit inside, remove it to the exterior of the structure after it has cooled before refueling.
- * Open a window enough to provide proper ventilation.
- * Keep combustibles (furniture, curtains, clothing, paper goods, etc.) at least three feet from all heat sources.
- * Fuel burning appliances can produce the deadly, tasteless and odorless gas known as carbon monoxide (CO). Install and maintain carbon monoxide alarms inside your home to provide an early warning of carbon monoxide levels.
- Always turn off portable heating equipment when leaving the room for extended periods. Portable heaters should never be operated unattended.
- * Place safety barriers around the device to keep children and pets away from the heat source.

Along with these heating tips, check to make sure your smoke alarms and CO detectors are in good working order. These devices should be replaced every 10 years to ensure they operate as they are de-

On Oct. 23, Baltimore County Police served a search and seizure warrant on Cofflin's Dundalk home and vehicle. Recovered from Cofflin's vehicle during the warrant service were the parts needed to make an AR-15 assault rifle, two bags of ammunition for the rifle, and two bullet proof vests. Cofflin told investigators that he planned to take back his residence in Pennsylvania and his ultimate goal was to kill his girlfriend and police.

Howard Cofflin has been charged with a firearms violation and illegal possession of ammunition. He is being held without bail at the Baltimore County Detention Center.

This incident is under investigation by the Baltimore County Police Homicide Unit. Detectives will be working to determine if this was targeted crime.



So, it's no surprise that my top two picks ended up being hopeful movies. Both were the most amazing personal journeys - one to return home to Earth, the other to find a home on Earth. Both will be movies I will return to many times in the years to come whenever I need a pick-me-up. I start with my No. 1 pick:

- 1) "Brooklyn" No movie in 2015 so thoroughly transported me into its world than "Brooklyn" did. This was one of those rare films in which I fell completely in love with the characters and was with their story from the very first second of screen time to the very last.
- 2) "The Martian" This is a marvelous testament to what a big-budget Hollywood movie can be. It's a great star vehicle for Matt Damon, yes. But even more important, it is a great film about so many things that movies are NOT about these days: teamwork, science, intelligence and problem-solving.
- 3) "Spotlight" Another movie about teamwork, problem-solving and smarts. Only instead of rocket science, it's journalism. Evil must always be rooted out,

wherever it festers. And that's why we will always need a strong, well-trained and incorruptible Fourth Estate.

- 4) "Paddington" This movie was a tonic. A warm, witty, wonderful tonic. I loved the artistry of this film. I loved the human characters and the London setting and Tabago Crusoe serving as the film's whimsical de facto Greek chorus. Most of all, I loved that bear!
- 5) "Inside Out" Pixar's best film since "Toy Story 3." I firmly believe this flick will be taught or at least referenced in psychology classes for decades. And for decades, I believe its admirers will return to it again and again to get through everything from childhood to parenthood.
- 6) "Mad Max: Fury Road" Just a crazed, demented, amazing adrenaline rush of a movie. Amazing for its visuals... amazing for its real stunts and crashes... amazing that it has been getting legitimate Best Picture consideration. How can Max stay angry after this?!
- 7) "The Big Short" I've heard this movie categorized as a comedy. And, yeah, it has its share of laughs. But the chuckles are there to hide the pain of a government, financial system and real estate industry that pulled off perhaps the biggest systemic criminal scheme in world history.
- 8) "The Walk" I am still shocked flabbergasted, really that this epic movie barely cleared \$10 million at the North American box office. "The Force Awakens" makes more than that each week just by people clicking and buying the wrong tickets on Fandango! Those who saw it on the big screen were treated to the year's most spectacular big-screen entertainment.
- 9) "Cinderella" I reserve the No. 9 spot on each year's end-of-the-year list for a flick I am fairly sure won't make it onto most, if not all, of the other reviewers' Top 10 lists. In previous years, I have put everything from "Blades of Glory" to "Zombieland" in this spot. This year, it's "Cinderella." Director Kenneth Branagh brought a fairy tale to wondrous, entertaining life with the year's best costumes and art direction.
- 10) "Bridge of Spies" Steven Spielberg's Cold War thriller was just too good to leave off. It's saying something when a film like this, which is maybe the great director's 14th or 15th best film, would be other filmmakers' best work.

'Spotlight' shines a harsh light on some terrible crimes

It was a bit of a surprise that "Spotlight" did not take Best Drama honors at the recent Golden Globes. It had been named top flick by at least a dozen different critics groups, is an actors' showcase and is a movie in which journalists play the heroes.

Probably the only two things holding the film back are 1) its very grim subject matter and 2) its almost complete absence of flash. This a "meat-and-potatoes" movie, folks. Co-writer/director Tom McCarthy doesn't try to impress you with his technique. The target audience is not going for the cinema. They are going for the great writing and acting. It truly is one of the best movies of the year.

"Spotlight" centers on the team of four investigative journalists at the *Boston Globe*, who in 2001 broke the story of a massive cover-up on the part of Beantown's Catholic Archdiocese. For decades, dozens of priests had been abusing their position and status in molesting hundreds of Catholic children. Instead of ex-communicating them, turning them over for prosecution and caring for the victims, the Church cut deals with those who did come forward as accusers, hired shady attorneys to keep the settlements off the books and then (unbelievably) moved the offending priests to other parishes.

I want to make clear that the film is NOT anti-Christianity. Interestingly, the four journalists are all "believers" on some level. The film is about the search; the search for truth, justice and accuracy - all the things that the best journalism is and too often falls short of in this age of partisan, corporate-run media.

The team of journalists who serve as the main characters comprise the *Globe's* Spotlight team include editor Walter Robinson (the truly great Michael Keaton) and staff writers Mike Rezendes (Mark Ruffalo), Sacha Pfeiffer (Rachel McAdams) and Matt Carroll (Brian d'Arcy James). Over the course of several months in 2001 and 2002, these four come in contact with all sorts of shifty, oddball Bostonians. The most memorable include crusading attorney Mitchell Garabedian (Stanley Tucci), power lawyer Eric Macleish (Billy Crudup) and disbelieving *Globe* managing editor Ben Bradlee Jr. (John Slattery).

Some will quibble that the Catholic Church itself has almost no representation here, as the film is told completely from the standpoint of the Spotlight team. But "fair and balanced" can't really apply here. The deeds of these monsters are not in question. And, largely because of the efforts of these journalists, many are answering for their crimes - heck, let's call it for real their sins in this world and the next.

Kenwood High School soccer player invited to IMG Academy

It's every young soccer player's dream to represent their nation at the highest level. But with over three million players registered through the U.S. Youth Soccer Association, the odds of making the roster for the United States Men's National Team (USMNT) are slim. But for Kenwood High School star Quantrell Jones, the odds are in his favor.

On Jan. 6, Jones left Essex and Kenwood High School to pursue his dream of soccer stardom and take part in the under-17 residency program at the IMG Academy in Bradenton, Fla. One of 40 players selected from across the nation, the 6-foot-2 goalkeeper will train and do his schooling at the immaculate Bradenton facilities for the next six months.

"I was really excited to get that call up," said Jones, who plays his club ball for Baltimore Celtic. "I've just worked so hard for this and this is what I want to do with my life."

Before his invitation to take up residency, Jones was a highly regarded goalkeeper due to his size, athleticism and strong awareness. At the IMG Academy, he will receive top training year round while participating in youth national team events.

Jones leaves behind his family and friends, but knows that this is a once-

in-a-lifetime opportunity that he needs to take advantage of in order to make it to the top level in the game.

"I'm dealing with the transition nicely," said the affable Jones. "I've been away from family and friends for somewhat extended periods in the past - like two or three weeks at a time because of traveling for soccer. I'm a very friendly guy, and I can adjust to any environment."

That will be important for Jones, as this opportunity isn't just about his ability to showcase his skills and grow as a player, but it's a way for coaches to see how a player handles the challenges of being away from home, something that happens frequently when playing at the highest level.

The opportunity to train in the IMG program is one that often leads to future success. Started in 1999, the program has churned out over 100 professional players who ply their trade in the MLS and abroad. The most notable alumnus is USMNT goalkeeper Tim Howard, who currently plays for English club Everton and formerly played for Manchester United. Since 2002, Howard has tallied over 100 appearances for the national team. Many others have been through the program as well, including DeMarcus Beasley, Eddie Johnson, Kyle Beckerman and Santino Quaranta.



Jones began playing soccer at the age of 4, starting out as a defender. At age 8, he made the transition to goalkeeper.

Jones originally played club in the Bays program in Baltimore, but a shift in the youth soccer program nation-wide saw the beginning of Academy programs, which bar players from participating for their high school teams. Steve Nichols, a coach in the Bays program and former coach of McDonough school, disagreed with the Academy's decision and founded Baltimore Celtic, taking coaches and players with him. Jones was one of those players.

"It wasn't necessarily because I want-

ed to play for Kenwood, but because I had a sense of loyalty to my coaches," Jones said.

And while Jones has his sights set on making it big, he also has a very good head on his shoulders. When pressed about whether or not he would forgo college in favor of going pro, he immediately replied that he'd like to go to college.

"I'm going to keep on working as hard as I can to make it as a player," said Jones. "But I want to go to college because, if soccer doesn't work out, I have something else to rely on."
