It's a story that lairy tales are made of.

This particular story begins on Valentine's Day in 2011, when Desiree Harrison and Martez Cole had their first date.



While the couple's romance blossomed, there was nothing whirlwind about the courtship. In fact, it wasn't until four years later that Martez proposed to Desiree.

The proposal was well-thought out. Martez arranged for the couple to have professional photos made for Valentine's Day in 2015.

Desiree wasn't too sure about a photo shoot with her boyfriend, but one of her friends insisted she go through with it.

"He had arranged for someone to do my hair, my makeup," she said. "It was nice."

During the photo shoot, Martez "suddenly" remembered he had a gift for Desiree.

"He went downstairs and came back up with at least 50 of our family members and gets down on one knee with everyone there," she said.

Once the engagement ring was placed on Desiree's finger, one might think that the next chapter in the story would be planning a wedding.

That wasn't the case for our couple. Martez and Desiree decided to go through pre-marriage counseling through Desiree's church at the time, Bridge Builders Church International in Decatur.

"This was something we wanted to do," Desiree said. "Our foundation is Jesus Christ. He is the center of it all, and we felt this was the next step in our relationship."

The couple met with Pastor Darius Clayton for a year to discuss everything from finances to what each one expected in a marriage.

"You think you know someone, but you don't want to go into a commitment like this blindsided," Desiree said. "When it came to finances, we each brought in our credit scores and said this is where I stand and this is where he stands. "

The couple met with the pastor for one year.

"After we finished, we set a date," Desiree said. "We both love the holidays, but wanted to get married before the holiday

From there, the couple went into wedding planning mode. "Everything was going smoothly," Desiree said.

"It was the night of the rehearsal," Desiree recalled. "I was 25, and I was thinking, 'I can't believe I'm going to be somebody's wife tomorrow. Everything was changing. It's a lot. I was emotional."

Emotions, along with making last-minute preparations for the ceremony the next day, could have been one reason why the main character in our story was running late to her own rehearsal dinner.

"We had the rehearsal dinner at River Bottom by Stanfields at McFarland," she said. "Everybody gets there before I do because I'm so behind with wedding preparations."

It was a chilly and damp night, and Desire remembered hurrying up the ramp to the restaurant when she started to slip.

"It was really dark outside. I was hurrying and had on high heels," she said. "I felt like I was about to fall. I grabbed the rail and, as I slipped, the ring slipped off my finger and into the water."

Desiree explained that the ring was loose on her finger because, as many brides do, she had lost weight before the wedding.

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Desiree finally made her way into the restaurant, but her guests immediately knew something was wrong.

"I was about to have a nervous breakdown," she said. "I just kept saying, 'My ring. My ring. My ring is gone."

Desiree recalls Martez standing in front of her.

"I was saying, 'I'm sorry. I'm sorry. I can't believe this happened,'" she said.

Martez recalls the moment his bride-to-be walked into the restaurant.

"She was crying so hard, she couldn't speak," he said. "She kept pointing to the water. Eventually she said she lost the ring in the water."

Martez said he did what he could to calm Desiree, but thought the ring probably was gone for good.

Desiree said her husband-to-be wasn't angry or upset.

"He said, 'It's just a material thing. Listen, I still have you." Then I cried more than I did before," she said.

Even though friends and family attempted to search in the dark waters of the harbor, they couldn't find the ring. Employees wanted to return to the search in the light of day, but were informed that because of electricity in the harbor, it was too dangerous for them to continue the search.

With the ceremony just a few hours away, finding the ring

remained on Desiree's mind. She kept making attempts to find someone who might help her find the prized possession.

A Google search led to her a dive salvage company, which recommended she call scuba diver Amber Smith.

After talking to Amber, however, Desiree wasn't too encouraged. She said Amber took her information and telephone number and said she would see what she could do.

In the meantime, Martez and his brother were about to go shopping for a replacement ring the morning of the wedding.

Desiree tried to put the incident out of her mind. Her mother had taken her cell phone away to keep her from checking messages constantly. It was while she was getting her hair done before the ceremony that Desiree heard her mother screaming in the sanctuary of Launch Point Church in Tuscumbia.

"She was screaming 'Yes, yes," Desiree said. "I asked what was going on, and my mom kept saying 'She found it, she found it."

One hour before the ceremony, local diver Amber Smith, with wet hair and still clad in her wet suit, brought Desiree's engagement ring to the church.

From there, the ceremony went as planned, with Martez slipping Desiree's original engagement ring and wedding band on her finger.

"Everything was good," Desiree said.

The next chapter of our story takes place at the reception.

Friends and family of the couple enjoyed a catered meal with the newlyweds, and wished them well before they headed to the airport to board a plane to Puerto Rico for the honeymoon.

"I was tired," Desiree said. "It had been an emotional day, and our plane was leaving Nashville at 6 a.m."

Once the couple arrived at their honeymoon destination, they turned on their cell phones and started receiving dozens of text messages from guests at the reception.

"The text messages were, 'My stomach is hurting. Is yours hurting?' We hadn't eaten that much at the reception, so we weren't feeling ill. Mostly we were just tired," she said.

Eventually, the couple learned that more than 100 of their guests had gotten ill from food at the reception. Several people had been hospitalized, including Desiree's father.

"My dad was in the hospital for three weeks," she said. "I was thinking this was a nightmare," she said. "We tried to enjoy ourselves, but we felt so bad we couldn't fully enjoy the honeymoon."

As soon as they returned home, the newlyweds starting contacting with friends and family who had been ill.

"Of course, 1 felt kind of responsible," Martez said. "I wish there was something we could have done to prevent it."

Desiree and Martez tried to make amends with their guests. "We tried to visit those who were still in the hospital," she said. "We prayed with everybody, offered our apologies."

Desiree, herself, had to make a trip to the emergency room.

"I was a little overwhelmed," she said. "We went home (after visiting with people), I went into the bathroom and I passed out. I woke up at the hospital."





News of the food poisoning spread throughout news and social media sites. Not all the comments were supportive of the couple. There were some people who said the couple should have taken the incidents as signs from God that they shouldn't have gotten married.

"In an interview, my husband had mentioned that you could really feel God's presence in the wedding," Desiree said. "There were people who commented we should have felt God giving us signs that we shouldn't be together.

"They have no idea," she said. "If anything, all this brought us closer together. My feelings would get hurt easily, and my husband kept bring up Exodus 14:14 ... 'The Lord shall fight for you, and ye shall hold your peace.'



Fast forward to the next chapter in our story.

It starts with the one-year anniversary of Martez and Desiree Cole.

Reflecting on what they have gone through the past year, the couple say they are grateful they had committed one year to counseling before entering into marriage.

"I feel like if we didn't go through the counseling, if we didn't trust God, we could have easily folded," Martez said. "We could have gotten into arguments. There was never a thought in our

minds that we couldn't do this."

Desiree said she is thinking about writing a book about their experiences to encourage others.

"It's not the wedding ceremony that makes God happy," she said. "It's the marriage that makes God happy. He takes pleasure in a marriage that glorifies him. The ceremony is nice, but sometimes we get too caught up in spending all this money for 30 minutes.

"That's what I tell all my friends who are getting married. Just remember what is truly important."

Martez agrees with his wife.

"I hear people talking about going through things the first three months or six months of their marriage," he said. "We got ours out of the way. We were able to withstand the tough times.

Martez also had other thoughts about the incidents surrounding the wedding.

"Every time something miraculous or something good happens, there is going to be a trial or attack," he said. "We are able to pray and encourage and lift each other up whenever one was weak," he said.

"We overcame it all," Desiree said. "God is still faithful in all this."

And that ends Part One of this fairytale, but it's definitely not the end of the story.

When an engaged couple tells you they're searching for a wedding band, they usually aren't talking about the rings they will exchange at their ceremony.

More thought just might go behind the band that will play the songs that shaped their relationship than the band of gold they choose to wear around their left ring fingers.

The Midnighters of Muscle Shoals play about 25 weddings a year. They have played at every kind of wedding from country club settings to barns. The band plays a little of everything from old soul, blues, rock and Motown.

"In over 30 years, we estimate we've played over 600 weddings," said James Counts who plays drums.

He and his bandmates have seen and heard it all as far as requests for first-dance songs.

"When a Man Loves a Woman" by Percy Sledge and "At Last" by Etta James are favorites. In the last five years, Counts says couples have grown more innovative, dancing to heavy rock such as AC/DC.

"I'm not surprised by anyone's choices anymore," he said.

Nor is Ben Phillips of Second Creek of Rogersville.

His band specializes in early country music and 1990s country, particularly Garth Brooks. Brooks' tune about a wedding crasher, "Friends in Low Places," garners the most requests.

Oliver James Roy plays the saxophone with the Midnighters. The band is asked to play a variety of music from old soul, blues and rock and Motown at wedding receptions.

"I don't know why because it's about someone showing up at a wedding to tell her he's heartbroken, and that's the lowest point of his life seeing his love get married," Phillips said. "He's the guy who speaks up when the preacher asks, 'Does anyone object to this wedding?' He's that guy."

Phillips, who plays acoustic guitar and sings lead, says the pre-recorded songs couples choose to walk out as husband and wife to continue to surprise him. Al Green and Maroon 5 are favorites. He's also played "I'd Like to Check You for Ticks" by Brad Paisley. As for current country, you won't hear Second Creek play any Luke Bryan.







"We stay away from it," Phillips said.

Though he's played at many a wedding, the pressure is on to be close to perfect.

"It's so scary because it's the most important day of anyone's life, and when we get loaded up and the bride and groom walk up and say, 'That's exactly what we wanted at our reception' it's incredible."

Counts say wedding gigs are win win.

"There's a lot of nice people there, there's a lot of good food," Counts said. "Most of the time you make a few coins, so you go away feeling pretty satisfied."

Custom wedding cake designed by Laura Smith, of Aunt Bea's bakery in Tuscumbia. Whether sculpted in fondant or accented with a simple hydrangea, the wedding cake is the belle of the ball in the buffet line at a reception.

Today's cakes depend on the style of celebration, from elaborate to simple.

Cakes at a modern wedding reception come decorated fit for any taste in edible sequins and crystal geodes, while others at more rustic barn affairs go for a crumb coating or nothing at all. Naked cakes with less icing showcase batter in its natural state, crumbs adorning the edges of their layers serving as decorative accents.

"The newest trend would be a naked cake or lightly iced cake," said Laura Smith, owner of Aunt Bea's Bakery in Tuscumbia. "You can see the cake through the icing."

And to adorn those naked cakes?

"Fruit is the new trend," Smith said."Flowers are more of a traditional element for the frosted cakes."

Still other cakes go for flash with bold colored or even metallic icing.

"A lot of people are going for maroon, gold and black and white," said Shoals baker Janna. Sequin cakes have sprinkles often

airbrushed gold.

"They look really good when they're done

right," Prestage said.

Brides still request large tiered cakes," she added, though some are less ornate and are stacked with flowers.

"A three-tier is most popular," Prestage said. According to the all-encompassing wedding website, theknot.com, cake trends include no frills buttercream confections and all-chocolate cakes — formerly reserved for grooms' tables — in varying shades of cocoacolored fondant in square and round tiers.

The traditional white cake with white icing is giving way to cakes with a little more flavor.

"Most of the brides are choosing different flavors now," said Smith. "Our most popular are red velvet and strawberry.

"It's a new thing, I really like it. Visually, it's something different."

A bride need not choose between a cake and cupcakes when she can have both, which is what many brides do to accommodate two different cake flavors.

"Cupcake tiers appeal to every age group," Smith said."It's a lot easier if you're not having to cut and serve a cake. And it's very popular with small receptions and casual weddings, instead of having a wedding cake."

For those who really want something different at the reception, there are cheesecake

towers and pies.

"We've done a lot of cheesecake towers and pies lately," Smith said. "The cheesecake tower is decorated just like a wedding cake, but can offer a variety of flavors. Same with pies."

Groom's cakes, typically nontraditional, are simple and classic these days.

While Smith said she still gets a few requests for cakes with Alabama or Auburn motifs, it's not as popular as it was 10 years ago. She said most grooms' cakes these days are simple and classic.

"The general theme at the moment is simple and rustic. But our most popular groom's cake is a chocolate cake with peanut butter icing and decorated with Reese's Cups and a ganache drip."

But no matter if you want a traditional wedding cake or something a little different, Smith advises that you place your order early.

"We only do one wedding cake a weekend," she said. "I've already booked to make cakes for fall weddings."







Nancy Rutchik and Flossie Pack are flower girls extraordinaire. Not only did the outgoing and energetic 80-somethings draw cheers as the surprise flower girls at their granddaughter Lucy Schanzer's wedding, but they reprised the role to further acclaim at the wedding of Schanzer's younger sister the next year.

Being close with her arandmothers, Schanzer, 31, wanted to involve them in her wedding ceremony in a way that was prominent and unique. "Grongong" Nancy and Grammy Flossie embraced their chance to be flower girls, which was kept secret until the two, wearing pearls and big smiles, began scattering petals from antique silver baskets to the "I Love Lucy" theme song. They walked down the aisle before an adoring crowd just before Schanzer married Kyle Schanzer in 2015 in a redwood forest in Carmel, California.

"When they saw us, they started laughing," said Rutchik, 87, of Dallas. "Then they had whistle calls, and they called our names and 'Go girl! We broke up the wedding. It was really a fun thing."

Many modern couples

are tinkering with tradition as they personalize their weddings, and that includes placing grandparents in more visible positions like flower girl or ring bearer, best man or bridesmaid. It's a loving way to celebrate grandparents who were involved and influential in their upbringing.

"It honors the legacy of a family and the extension of a family and how the family is growing, because that's fundamentally what marriage is about," said San Francisco wedding and event planner Alicia Falango, who estimates that about 30 percent of her couples include grandparents in a unique way. "It's not the norm per se, but it's gaining popularity," she added.

These unexpected, highprofile roles are a departure from what many brides and grooms have done for years: quietly recognizing grandparents with a corsage or boutonniere, and having them walk down the aisle ahead of the bridal party to take front-row seats.

Recent wedding seasons have seen an Indiana groom who tapped his 90-year-old grandfather as best man, a Minnesota bride who chose her 92-year-old grandmother as her flower girl, and a

"It resonates with a lot of people," Falango said. "When you are an adult, it's a blessing to have a living grandparent. It's so emotional for people. They go inward and say, 'Wow, I wish my grandma or grandpa were still here.'"

Beyond including a grandparent in the bridal party, couples can ask one to officiate, like Nadine Gorand did with her grandfather Raymond Oddi. Gorand and her fiance, Pat, wanted an officiant they loved and respected for their wedding at the Art Institute of Chicago. They immediately thought of Oddi, then 89.

"His work ethic and his family values are definitely things we both look up to and admire," said Gorand, 28. She added that her Gramps made the ceremony feel "really intimate and personal and just very loving and genuine."

At the reception, couples can also mention their parents' parents in speeches, display their old wedding photos or honor them on the dance floor.



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



in West Bend, Wisconsin, the couple's seven grandparents proudly walked down the aisle before the wedding party, and later, the disc jockey played a snippet of a slow song from decades ago to honor their weddings.

"We know how rare it is to have that many grandparents alive for a big life event like this," said the bride, 23. "They have set a really great example for my husband and me on life after 40 years of marriage. They're all very honest about the fact that there are some days you want to kill each other and other days you love each other, and it's just worth it." Schanzer's grandmother Grongong Rutchik allows that grandparents are sometimes overlooked at weddings, and having such a special place in her granddaughters' celebrations made her feel loved.

"It made me feel awful special, and I loved being part of such a happy occasion," she said.


Schanzer loved it, too. "I feel like it made the ceremony," she said. "Even though I didn't see it, I feel like that's the wedding detail that I remember the most."

Alison Kelly felt she had enough on her plate dealing with her own wedding gown and all the details of her mountain getaway nuptials without micromanaging how her bridal party would dress.

So instead, she asked her maid of honor — her sister — and the rest of her bridal party to choose natural tones to honor the informal Vail, Colorado, location that she and her husband had picked for their autumn nuptials, and to wear styles that made them feel good.

"I'm surrounded by women who make their own decisions and are strong and independent. There's no way I could tell any of them what to wear. It just wouldn't even work," Kelly laughed. "I know that they know their own bodies."

She was thrilled with the results, a soft mix of rose blush, light red, ivory and taupe that proved the perfect complement to her own white gown. The bridesmaids wore matching rings of flowers on their heads. The groom's party was also not matchy-matchy. He wore light gray, his best man was in black and the other groomsmen were in darker gray. Identical boutonnieres tied their looks together.

While brides have been giving their stand-up loved ones greater freedom from the constraints of more traditional — often hideous — matching confections, they now seem to be taking the mismatch bridesmaid trend a step further. Matching colors in different silhouettes or identical dye lots for different styles of dresses have given way to completely different cuts, textures and colors.

"They did so well," said Kelly, who lives in Colorado Springs, Colorado, and works as a librarian. "They kept showing me the pictures of what they were thinking. I thought that was really nice because I was just too busy doing my own thing and planning my own stuff. I trusted them, and it ended up being much better than I imagined."

The trend is well represented on the retail side. David's Bridal, with more than 330 stores in the United States, Canada, Mexico and the United Kingdom, has an online section of mismatched bridesmaids options with advice on how to make the concept work, from using the same color in different styles to choosing wildly different fabrics, lengths, silhouettes, colors, prints and embellishments.

One suggestion from the company: Select different shades of the same color, but include light, medium and dark shades to allow for an ombre gradation. For large wedding parties, mix in some pale neutrals that will offset the overall palette.

While mismatching is more visible these days, it hasn't completely taken over. According to the most recent Bridal Fashion Study by the wedding site TheKnot.com, done in 2015, 51 percent of bridesmaids still wear the same dress as others







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


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in their wedding party, while 33 percent wear the same color in different styles, 11 percent wear different dresses and 5 percent wear the same style in different colors.

Shelley Brown, fashion and beauty editor for The Knot, said the idea of mismatched bridesmaids dresses is picking up speed as more brides look for ways to personalize their weddings.

"Over the past few years, designers have picked up on this trend, adding new colors and styles and patterns so brides can mix and match," she said. "It's a really easy way to make your bridal party stand out."

It's also a great way for brides to be more sensitive to the shapes, sizes and skin tones of their bridesmaids, Brown said.

Complete freedom of choice can go wrong, so Brown suggests that brides provide some broad guidelines.

"Offering no guidelines can create a more stressful process for the bridesmaids," Brown said. "So don't just say, oh, buy a blue dress. Is it strapless, is it floor length, what material is it, what shade of blue?"

If it's a super-formal wedding, for instance, a short dress likely wouldn't work, Brown said. Nor would a more informal fabric like jersey, she said. Some brides who want to offer choice in color without losing control altogether may want to offer paint chips as a guide.

"One of my favorite ways to interpret this trend is to pick a really subtle, neutral color like blush or nude or even a very soft pewter and then let your girls choose what embellishments or silhouettes they like," Brown said. "They could do rose gold sequins if they want to, maybe someone else has a lace dress and someone has some kind of separates happening. That way your girls get to show some of their personalities. They're definitely spending a lot of time on your wedding. They're invested in the process. They want to look good, too."

Sydney Broadhead of Nashville, Tennessee, is a graduate student in public health and health policy. She was married in May 2016 in a historic home in Asheville, North Carolina. She went way out of the box when it came to her bridesmaids' dresses.

"I had several bridesmaids of varying sizes, different body types, and I wanted dresses that were going to make them feel more comfortable and weren't run of the mill," she said.

She wanted romantic tones, but the overall vibe was eclectic. She went shopping with a couple bridesmaids who live near her. Out-of-town bridesmaids sent her photos and questions as they made their selections.

"I had one girl in gold and another in pink. One was in metallics. My sister was in red. One had a beaded top. It came together very organically," Broadhead said.

She set few guidelines on styles and fabrics, but made it clear she preferred longer dresses. She was the final arbiter before selections were finalized, and she anchored the bridal party by putting groomsmen in the same suit with matching red ties and boutonnieres to help ground the mismatch on the other side of the aisle.

"It was more of a conversation than a free-for-all," Broadhead said. "The traditional everybody-matching idea felt a little uninventive. I was fine with trying something new."







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Getting engaged? Tell an insurance agent about the ring

If you recently got engaged, the first person you might want to tell about your beautiful ring is an insurance agent. Engagement ring insurance isn't exactly romantic, but it's a relatively inexpensive way to make sure you can repair or replace your ring if something happens to it.

TWO WAYS TO INSURE

• Buy extra "scheduled" coverage – often called a rider, floater or endorsement – through your homeowners or renters insurance company. Standard homeowners insurance and renters insurance includes some coverage for jewelry, but theft coverage is often limited to \$1,500.

• Buy a stand-alone policy from a company that specializes in jewelry insurance. You'll generally get reimbursed for the full value if your ring is stolen, lost or damaged.

Your insurer might require an appraisal to finalize your policy. The National Association of Jewelry Appraisers website has a list of appraisers in each state.

Don't assume a jewelry warranty will cover you. Those apply only to defects.

JEWELRY RIDER COST

The cost of a jewelry rider depends on how much coverage you need. A stand-alone engagement ring insurance policy typically costs \$1 or \$2 for every \$100 in value. A study by The Knot, a wedding planning website, found the average cost of an engagement ring in 2016 was \$6,163. That puts the annual premium for insurance at around \$60 to \$120.

You could earn a discount on your policy by:

- Having a monitored home-security system.
- Storing your ring in a safe at home or in a bank.
- Using a gem identification registry such as Gemprint.

COVERAGE

Make sure your policy covers the following common ring claims:

• Theft: This would pay out if your ring were stolen • during a home burglary, for example.

• Mysterious disappearance: This would pay out if you lost the ring.

• Damage: This would pay out if your ring were damaged or destroyed, for example in a house fire.

If you buy engagement ring insurance before you pop the question, your soon-to-be fiancee must be named and covered by the policy, especially if you don't already live together. Otherwise the policy could be voided as soon as you give the ring away.










After a honeymoon in the quiet Cape San Blas in Port Saint Joe, the couple is now at home in Courtland.





After a honeymoon in Panama City Beach, Fla., the couple is now residing in Cypress Inn, Tenn.






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


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
