

this musically rich part of Alabama," said Wayne Taylor, bass guitar, vocals for Blue Highway. "Blue Highway doesn't play in Alabama very often, so this is a real treat for me. Not to mention the opportunity to see Jake Landers himself perform. This should be a great night of music."

Blue Highway has earned 27 collective International Bluegrass Music Association Awards and three Grammy nominations as a band, plus two Grammy Awards among its current members. Blue Highway's #1 album, Original Traditional, was nominated for a 2017 Grammy Award for Best Bluegrass Album.

"Blue Highway absolutely the crème de la crème of bluegrass music," Robertson said. "They write, they perform, and they are virtuosos on their instruments. It's going to be a heck of a show with these guys. They bring everything to the table."

Iron Horse performs at concerts across the U.S. and Canada. The group creates much of its own music and is known for the ability to cross genre to bluegrass. Iron Horse performs with a spirit and sense of style that pays the most gratifying compliment to acoustic and bluegrass lovers.

The concert will open with special performance from the Jake Landers Reunion which includes

My ex-husband was ordered at our divorce hearing to pay child support in the amount of \$186 every two weeks for our two children and to keep them on his insurance. He hasn't done either one. The children are on All Kids and Medicaid health insurance. He is over \$10,000 past due on child support. He is not working right now and hasn't paid child support in several months. Is he in contempt? I've been told no. He never helps with the kids. He can see them anytime he wants to, but he chooses not to see them much at all. He never helps out with buying their clothes or anything they need. I've been told that there is nothing I can do. Would you please advise me on what rights I have?

Holly, Florence, AL

Your children deserve better and it must be very frustrating to see this happening.

You have raised a number of issues and they are, unfortunately, more common than they should be. First, the fact is that the children are covered medically and that is great. If they were not eligible for publicly funded programs and you purchased commercial health insurance you could potentially make your ex-husband pay you back for the cost you incur.

I say potentially because he is not paying anything now. Back when I did divorce work I always advised my clients to turn their case over to DHR after the divorce became final. It costs little and they are aggressive. They have so many cases that they can not be as fast as a privately paid lawyer, but good lawyers are expensive.

To answer your question as to whether or not he is in contempt of court would require more information than I have but I will give you the legal analysis that the courts typically use:

• If the father is working and not paying he is in contempt. His bills and living expenses are not a factor, child support comes first.

• If, on the other hand, the father is injured or disabled to the extent that he can not work then he can not be held in contempt.

• If the father is voluntarily not working, he can be held

• If the father is voluntarily under employed, i.e., a dentist choosing to work in a car wash, he can be held in

All of these must be proven in court. I hope I have given the information that you need to answer your

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

been quaking with the news of flaws that were discovered in the Central Processing Units (CPUs) made by Intel, AMD and ARM (the chips used in most cell phones). Put simply, researchers found a way to trick

your processor into giving up personal data. Malicious software has to be installed on your computer for this to happen. These flaws have been ominously been

named Meltdown and Spectre. Every computer you own is affected; Mac, PCs, iPhones, Android devices-everything. It sounds scary but, as usual, some of this fear is a bit exaggerated--at least for us little people.

of millions of rivers of data that eventually empty into an ocean called Operating System. There are many dams along these streams that control the flow of information. Information in those little streams is normally strictly isolated from the less secure operating system.

But chip makers have been working on ways to supercharge the transmission of data in those little rivers so much that the dams sometimes overflow. That excess data is put into a separate reservoir called a cache that is eventually released back into the stream after the blockage

is cleared. That cache is less protected than the tributaries. Someone found a way to access that cache. Most of that cached data is indecipherable but some of it, under analysis, contains snippets of secure data such as passwords, websites visited, and your secret chicken and dumplings recipe.

Some cool facts about this: The flaw is 20 years old. It was only recently discovered by Google employees and at least three other independent researchers—all within weeks of each other which is very strange. So strange that they

gave it a name: Bug Collusion. It is certainly possible that some hacker somewhere discovered this flaw years ago and has been using it all this time.

In a statement responding to flaws, Intel noted that, "these exploits do not have the potential to corrupt, modify, or delete data," though they do have the ability to spy on privileged data.

Is this something you should worry about with your own PC? Not really, unless you are North Korea, a high-value spy, terrorist, or the ČEO of a company that stores sensitive data that hackers find juicy. All the major players have already released software patches making this whole thing fairly innocuous. But big companies such as Amazon, Google, and the Federal Government certainly are a bit worried because they have been high value targets for many years and no telling what,

if anything, was already stolen.

There is not much that you as an individual can do about this other than making sure your operating system` is up-to-date on your phones, computers, and tablets. 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
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What Do You Do On A **Snow Day?**

We could go on, but hopefully the point has been made. What should do on a snow day? Enjoy it- - and thank God for it!

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



Eventually, your money, your investments and your financial plans need a good cleaning and

reorganizing. "Financial "Financial products, investments and plans have a shelf life," says Mark Fried, president of TFG Wealth Management (www.tfgwealth.com) and author of Road Rules for Retirement. "You have to be aware of that and focus on it. The reason they have a shelf life is because your life changes – you have kids, lose jobs, have parents to take care of, or you make

• Missing Money As in a garage, things go missing. The workforce of the twenty-first century is highly mobile. Every time you change a job there is a 401(k) or pension that has

to be tracked. "Now there are software packages that allow you to track all your investments or retirement accounts," Fried said. "You can easily track your old employer plans.'

• All Insurance Policies for life insurance, health, auto and homeowners all are worth a careful review. Fried points out that these reviews can lead to money savings. Empty nesters may want to restructure their auto policy since the kids aren't driving the parents' cars anymore; or a whole life insurance policy could be tweaked to bring more value. "A good insurance agent is reviewing your policies every year," Fried

• Estate Plan. Wills may need updating. "A lot of people have a will, but they did it when their kids were very young. Now the kids are 27 and 31. The estate laws change. The power of attorney language could be out of date. Or maybe you have gotten divorced and not changed the beneficiary. It all has to be coordinated."

'You've collected all this stuff over the years," Fried said, "and you need to see what serves a purpose and what does not."



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
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












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

Medicare Minute

"Signing up for Medicare Part 2"

Most Americans qualify for Medicare by turning 65 but there are other ways to qualify such as being disabled, having End Stage Renal disease (ESRD) or ALS. Today we are going to look at how you would sign up if you are disabled.

If you are under the age of 65 and disabled, you will automatically be enrolled in Part A and Part B after you have received Social Security or Railroad Retirement Board (RRB) benefits for at least 24 months. If you are disabled, covered by your or your spouse's group health plan and wish to stay on that plan, my suggestion is to contact the plan and confirm that you can remain on the plan even though you have Medicare. This may allow you to delay your Part B until a later date.

You are eligible for Medicare if you have End Stage Renal Disease and you've worked the required amount of time under Social Security, RRB or as a government employee OR you're already getting or are eligible for Social Security or RRB benefits OR you're the spouse or dependent child of one of the previous requirements. You should contact Social Security or the RRB for the amount of time worked to be eligible for Medicare.

of time worked to be eligible for Medicare.

If you're under 65 and have ALS your Medicare benefits should begin the first month you start receiving your Social Security or RRB benefits. Again contact Social Security or RRB for a list of the benefits.

Whether it's SSI or RRB disability, ESRD or ALS, I would encourage you to NEVER voluntarily leave your current health plan until you have covered all your bases with your current plan and Medicare. In most cases once you leave you cannot go back!! If you are faced with any of these 3 situations and need additional assistance feel free to contact our office.
