exciting afternoon sampling an elegant menu of outstanding gourmet food prepareed live by the area's finest chefs.



larger than an 18-inch cube at the start of the game. The robot may then expand to collect and stack cones on stationary high bases and movable low bases in various locations of an arena using autonomous control and driver control.

The Elkhart Lake-Glenbeulah Robotics Team is proud of their performance in their first competition of the year, but has already begun to make improvements for their next event at Xavier High School's VEX Fest. The bar has been raised and expectations are high.

Wade House hosts tales of quilts, coverlets

On weekends, beginning Jan. 27 and continuing through May 6, Wade House historic site will display a special exhibit titled "Over Land, Under Cover: Tales of Quilts and Coverlets and their Journeys to Wisconsin, 1830-1880" at our visitor center located on Highway 23 in Greenbush. "Over Land, Under Cover" shares how quilts and coverlets, two popular forms of mid-19th century bed coverings, traveled to Wisconsin with settlers from the eastern United States as they trekked west to the newly-formed territory and later state. The exhibit also highlights the craft and history surrounding these two types of bed coverings.

More than a dozen quilts and coverlets from the collections of the Wisconsin Historical Society will be on display as part of "Over Land, Under Cover." Guests will learn how these bed coverings not only kept their owners warm during cold Wisconsin nights, but also how they held sentimental memories of home and those left behind. The exhibit spotlights the journeys made by the bed coverings and the stories they tell about those who


owned them. For example, guests to the exhibit will learn how a pieced block quilt in the Courthouse Square pattern with signatures, traveled from Hartford, New York to Verona, Wisconsin in 1850 with the Stephen White family. The quilt was made by his two daughters to commemorate the trip.



The PAC presents ongoing performing art events, art classes, a gift shop featuring member artwork, as well as special signature events such as Northern Moraine Spring Art Tour in June, Cheese Capital Jazz & Blues Crawl, Paint the Towns, En Plein Air in September, and the nationally acclaimed, New Year's Eve, "Big Cheese Drop!" The PAC also serves as a popular community center setting for special events such as weddings, showers, private parties, corporate meetings, educational activities, reunions, and more.

To celebrate its important anniversary milestone, over the next eleven months the PAC will present a variety of enhanced performances and art shows. The Anniversary theme will culminate in December with the Holiday Membership Art Exhibition and Social and the New Year's Eve finale.

It all started back in 1993, when founding members and the first Board of Directors, Dena Adamson, Lori Beringer, Andrea Fenner, Roger Lahm, Susan McFarlane, Jody Schetter, Nancy Smith, Chris Schumacher, Peter Wright, and the late, Betty Pardee- Arendt, Joan Kohn, and Nancy Thackray, pooled their ideas and expertise to begin a grassroots effort to create an arts center in Western Sheboygan County. This dedicated and hardworking group along with the Gentine Family Foundation, rolled up their sleeves and invited their friends and associates to join them in this labor of love. They built

community awareness by presenting fundraising events, taking surveys, manning booths at the County Fair and Mill Street Fest, selling memberships, etc. The entire step by step process was highlighted in editorials and complimentary advertising in the Plymouth Review. With the financial backing of area businesses and individuals, and after extensive remodeling of the building, the PAC opened to the public with an inaugural art show featuring renowned artist, the late Robert Heuel III, O.P.A. The Founders had positioned the Plymouth Arts Center as a vital part of community life in Western Sheboygan County, and as one of Wisconsin's finest arts centers, as it remains today, 25 years later.

Originally, PAC's focus was on two-dimensional art in the Gallery, but within a few years, theater performances, concerts, and art classes were added. Over the years, more and more events were added, generating significant interest and participation in the arts by people of all ages and walks of life. The increased artistic needs of the community and the need to effectively and more efficiently use the space, led the way for a capital campaign and a renovation project. In 2011, the PAC was renovated and expanded to meet the needs of a growing organization. The \$1.5 million project was generously supported by local and regional businesses, foundations, and individual members and friends. The results of the project were a stunning, new Arts Center, a cultural showplace for artists and performers, a center for entertainment, and an important anchor business helping in the revitalization of historic downtown Plymouth, WI; while continuing to provide meaningful art related experiences for all. President Tom Slater said, "There were so many wonderful and talented people who gave of their time and fortune to make this dream a reality. The results are a world-class Arts Center that not only serves the needs ot the community, but introduces the Arts experience to everyone."

Today, the PAC produces over 150 events each year with annual attendance topping 20,000. Programs offer the community the opportunity to be actively involved either on the stage or behind the scenes. A wide variety of volunteer opportunities are available.

Winter Parking

After temporarily rescinding the winter parking ordinance over the New Year weekend, it is back in force. Little did we know that we would get hit with 8.5 inches of snow. It all worked out with few problems. If you want up to the minute information on village conditions you can go to the village website or the Facebook page for the Elkhart Lake Police Department

Winter Parking Regulations

(3) ALL-NIGHT PARKING REGULATED.

(a) No parking of any motor vehicle shall be permitted on either side of any Village street, or within six feet of the edge/curb of the street between the hours of 2:00 o'clock a.m. and 6:00 o'clock a.m. on the fifteenth (15th) day of November and ending on the first (1st) day of April of every year.

(b) No parking of any motor vehicle shall be permitted in any Village parking lot as posted on the fifteenth (15th) day of November and ending on the first (1st) day of April of every year.

(c) Any vehicle parked in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be removed from the parking lot or streets and stored, and such removal and storage shall be at the expense of the owner of said vehicle.

Snow Removal

Residents have 14 hours after a winter storm to remove ice and snow from their sidewalks. Snow cannot be blown or plowed onto Village Streets. Residents must also shovel out any hydrants near their home. You will not be notified. If sidewalks are not cleared on a timely basis, the village will shovel your walk and bill you.

Prescription Drug Drop Off Box

The prescription drug drop off box continues to be a huge success. Just a reminder, that the box is located outside the police department. Make sure you blackout your personal information, leaving the name of the drug intact. This will preserve your identity and help in the disposal of the drug.

Drop off anytime Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Community Development Committee

The CDA met in January to discuss and recommend a plan for the property next to the Brown Baer. A developer from Manitowoc requested permission to build three high-end apartments on that sight. The developer agreed to try and market the fourth unit for retail. The CDA agreed to give him six months to market the retail space. If unsuccessful then it would be the fourth apartment. Anyone interested in renting approximately 1000 sq. ft. of retail space should contact the village office at 920-876-2122. In addition to the commercial parcel, two single-family homes will be built on Washington Street.

Planning Commission

In December, Planning Commission saw the first layout for an apartment project on the Braun's Ranch parcel. It consists of three, 12-unit apartments. More information will be presented at the February meeting.

The Planning Commission approved TIF incentive for Compassionate Care Vet Clinic and Throttle Stop Phase 2.

At the January meeting the commission discussed the four-unit apartment project and began discussions for a new development agreement. The project will be situated on the land west of the Brown Baer.

Municipal Planning and Development Committee

The Municipal Planning and Development Committee are working on a plan to revitalize the village park. The park has five Ash Trees that will need to be removed. A new plan will look at upgrading park equipment, replacing Ash Trees and possibly build public restrooms.

Architectural Review Ad Hoc Committee

There is some interest by some of the Village Trustees to form an Architectural Review Committee. The purpose of this committee may be to approve any new construction in the village. The primary focus would be in the downtown neighborhoods. Trustee Geoff Bray, along with Trustees John Schott, Terri Knowles will serve on this ad hoc committee. 
