CRIME WAVE Recent spike in burglaries prompt public meeting

Arenas set a positive tone for the meeting by stating, "We want to give you an opportunity to ask questions. I would love for you to see me as a partner and a voice at City Hall."

Arenas stated that her office welcomes all calls and stated "we will do everything we can to help one feel safe in their home." She also stated, "A community that is well organized is less likely to be vandalized."

Traffic safety meeting held to discuss recent accidents

A traffic safety meeting was held to discuss recent accidents on Yerba Buena and Silver Creek Valley Roads at the New Season's Market on Monday Jan. 29.

In attendance were Councilwoman Sylvia Arenas, her staff members, Police Captain Randy Schriefer and Department of Transportation Deputy Director Laura Wells who explores traffic studies and data. Keeping streets safe

Arenas asked all in attendance for a moment of silence for the community resident who lost her life in a car accident. She was a vibrant lady going to law school with her whole life ahead of her and her passing personally affected and continues to impact many.

"Whenever there is a fatality in our streets caused by human error or speeding, it leaves a hole in our lives from people we have lost through those incidents," Stated Arenas. This meeting was arranged for the neighborhood to discuss the recent fatality of a person in a car and to review ways to help the City with improved methods of curbing traffic violations.

Police Captain Randy Schriefer explained that he lost three family members in fatal car collisions and thus the issue is close to his heart and he is very passionate about it. He stated to the group of residents that motor officers use analytics and locate the top 15 crash locations to do the bulk of enforcement. He expressed that a captain once instilled in him the value of education for the drivers the police interact with saying, "for every ticket you write, you should give five verbal warnings."

Cars traveling down Silver Creek Road as well as the entrance in going north on highway 101 and exiting on Yerba Buena road were discussed as hot spots for speed and running red lights as given by input from residents. Captain Schriefer See TRAFFIC, page 3

27 acre college land development meeting to be held Saturday, Feb. 3

The Evergreen community is invited to provide input at a planning meeting on how 27 acres located at Evergreen Valley College are to be used.

The meeting will be held at the Evergreen Valley College – Gullo II, 3095 Yerba Buena Road, San Jose on Saturday, Feb. 3, from 1 – 3 p.m. (Parking is free in the college lots).

Plans have already been submitted for a nine-acre parcel to the City of San Jose Planning department.

This means that the remaining 18 acres are also to be discussed with regard to the "vision and long term goals" of what is termed the "Evergreen Valley College surplus land site."

"The Evergreen Valley College charrette will allow Evergreen residents to learn more about the future of the college's land and share their vision for the site," said Sylvia Arenas, San Jose City Councilwoman – District 8. "Based on community feedback, I have requested this open and collaborative process event. I want this to be a reflection of what matters most to our community – so I hope you will join us on February 3." **Community input**

The proposed planned development also reviews the rezoning to allow for mixed use development "comprised of medical offices, assisted living, educational facilities and other neighborhood-oriented commercial amenities and services."

San Jose Public Information Manager for Planning, Genevieve Sing states: "The meeting on Feb. 3 is an opportunity for the community to get involved with the project. It is an example of how See DEVELOPMENT, page 20

also explained that perhaps drivers training programs are changing in that some high schools may not offer the kind of deep depth driver learning programs once offered in the past.

90 percent of accidents related to speed Like veins in a human body, maps were displayed and arteries of intersections and roads highlighted to show the spiked areas of car crashes and other accidents.

It was explained by San Jose

Transportation Deputy Director Laura Wells that each year there are about 2,500 traffic collisions in San Jose and that is one third the national average. She explained that they are working hard to combat fatalities because even one traffic collisions and have a "Vision Zero" program and approach to help curb accidents. Many traffic accidents are caused by the increasing use of cell phones.

In approximately 17 roadway areas in San Jose a clustering of many collisions are recorded each year. In the 2,400 miles of roadway in San Jose, the hot spot collision areas amount to three percent of the entire road areas and Wells stated, "We are tackling those areas."

Also of interest was the advent of the cell phone and how that distracts drivers like never before. In addition it was stated that increased traffic though not a good thing has a positive effect on cutting down on accidents due to the lowering of speed.

Ingenious ideas create less traffic accidents

There are many concepts and trials that occur on an ongoing basis to help reach a vision of zero auto collisions. When lanes are narrowed from 13' to 11' the speeds

Another implemented idea was to put in rumble carved road lines. This made too much noise near homes, so instead of putting them across the road they are cut parallel along roads so if a driver veers off the pavement they are warned with noise and a rumble. Installing plastic pylons also help influence driver behavior and create more safety resulting in fewer accidents. Wells explained they try to use proven measures that have worked in other cities too. Often the radar speed counter trailers are effective in slowing down drivers and they are being used more.

While being embraced by many the legislation of loss of life is too many." California has yet to pass its use for San Jose.

It was thought that it may be valuable for San

Jose to implement such a camera ticket program on a pilot basis in the future however some are against it due to privacy concerns.

The meeting allowed everyone to have a question and answer session and was proactive in helping this community work to give its voice on how things can be changed to make the roads even safer in the future.

"Thank you to the Silver Creek Valley and Evergreen community for your questions and input about how to make our streets even safer," said Councilwoman Arenas. "I share the commitment of the Department of Transportation and the San Jose Police Department Project Zero to eliminate traffic fatalities because even one loss of life is too many.'

OP ED Evergreen School District Communications Director speaks out

There's never a time when we wouldn't rather be talking about learning instead of money. We're in the learning business. We're in the business of educating kids and preparing them for their future, full stop. But in order to focus on that teaching and learning, we also have to contend with the fact that it costs money – a fair bit of it – to do so.

How much do you know about school or District budgets? Likely not that much. There are a lot of numbers floating around covering a lot of categories and it can be overwhelming. In the following paragraphs we'll attempt to break down District funding and how it relates to all that learning. We'll also share information about our current financial picture and what it means to all of our stakeholders.

First off, it's important to note that every dollar the District receives goes toward something important – teacher salaries, cleaner classrooms, lunch programs, libraries, textbooks and other materials – all things that contribute to our key underlying mission of providing a world class education and learning experience for our kids.

Where does that money come

from? While some of it comes from parcel tax revenue and a little more from revenue-generating projects within the District, mostly it comes from the state government - more than \$94 million from around \$114 million in total revenue this year. The good news this year is The Governor's January Proposed Budget for 2018/2019 calls for full funding of the Local Control Funding Formula (the new funding structure the state brought in during the 2013/14 school year that changed how local Districts are funded) and an additional \$295 in per-pupil one time funding. This is a terrific development that provides more stability and more dollars.

But the news isn't all good. The key thing to know is our funding is in direct relation to the number of students we have in our schools. And it's no secret that we've seen the numbers of those students drop. A lot. More than 2000 over a six-year period. The bottom line is families with school-aged kids aren't moving into the community. With the cost of housing so high families are increasingly choosing to live in areas that are more affordable. And as Evergreen students grow up and move through their school years, ultimately moving on to high school and beyond, there aren't enough kids coming along behind them to keep the numbers up. It means we're getting a lot less money from the state, but costs keep going up. Operational costs are going up, special education costs are going up, required funding of pension plans keeps going way up everything costs more, but we have to make do with less. When you calculate budget expectations over the next few years we are looking at around \$109 million in revenue against \$127 million in expenses by 2020/21. Now, those numbers could change somewhat but we know a few things - again, costs are going up and there aren't 2000 kids about to enter schools in the District.

There are a few things we can do, but most of them aren't easy. We are looking at ways to attract students to the District or prevent some from leaving for charter or private schools through programming or more targeted marketing. However, the number of students who leave for those options number only a couple of hundred and we have about as many kids transferring in from outside the District already. It's important work that needs doing but it's just the tip of the iceberg. We're also looking at ways to better realize revenues from some of our underused property. We've just struck a Joint Use Committee charged with looking at ways we can use empty classrooms or other property in the District to raise money through options ranging from community kitchens to childcare.

But even if we find ways to raise more revenue, we're still looking at a sizable deficit and unfortunately that means looking for things we can cut. In October the Board used one-time funds and made a round of recommended cuts to things like professional development, travel and a senior administrator position that saw \$660,484 in ongoing savings. We knew then there would be more needed and that in January the Board would need to take another look at ways to save. As noted above, we're now looking at an \$18 million deficit and a \$20.6 million shortfall to meet our 3 percent state-required reserve, and these realities need to be addressed. On January 25th the Board discussed the possibility of consolidating some schools and reviewed a larger number of See DISTRICT, page 11

Continued from page 4 potential cuts with a goal toward making around \$7 million in ongoing reductions. These could include:

• \$1.5 million (approx.) in Supplemental spending (this would mean things like losing instructional coaches, site technology support, instructional assistants, and staff development)

• \$1.5 million (approx.) in General Fund spending (this would means things like losing a middle school assistant principal, two principals as a result of consolidating two small schools under one principal and another being run by a member of cabinet, a social worker, two custodians, and other administrative positions)

• \$3.8 million (approx.) in negotiated items

Proposing such reductions is the last thing we want to have to do but we also know we need to find savings somewhere. The goal is always to find ways to save money while causing the least amount of impact in the classroom. At the beginning of this article we mentioned that we were in the learning business. That hasn't changed a bit. The kids are still our top priority and when looking at changes that need to be made, we're looking for those things that will be least likely to touch their learning experience. We deliver a top quality education – one we'd happily compare to any others on offer and know we'd come out strong – and that's a commitment that remains rock solid. Even as we streamline, there will still be no better place to learn than Evergreen.

2017: A year in review

2017 will $\hat{b}e$ a memorable year for Santa Clara County, especially for water resources management. It was the year that broke our state's longest dry streak with record-setting precipitation. A year of transition between extremes – from drought to floods. A year for big decisions on the future of our water supply. And it was a

year to redouble our commitment to preparing for wet and dry years to ensure safe, clean water for a healthy life, environment and economy for the Silicon Valley. As Board Chair of the Santa Clara Valley Water District, I am proud to reflect on some of the year's highlights.

A historic flood along Coyote Creek was a vivid reminder that flood risks persist in our county, and our hearts go out to those affected. Despite our investments of close to \$1 billion in flood protection projects over several decades protecting nearly

100,000 parcels, our work is far from completed. The Coyote Creek flood has ignited a new urgency in our fight to reduce flood risks and help keep communities safe.

This year, we completed the Lower Silver Creek Flood Protection Project in east San José. The project extends approximately 4.4 miles from its connection at Coyote Creek to Cunningham Avenue. When the Lake Cunningham detention basin is completed it will protect approximately 3,800 homes and businesses. Flood protection projects are large, complex undertakings, requiring intense coordination with local, state, federal and regulatory agencies.

After the Coyote Creek flood in February, my colleagues and I led advocacy efforts in Washington D.C. to seek federal funding and support changes to the regulatory permitting process which has delayed many important flood protection projects. At home, we took immediate action to build short-term flood barriers at the Rock Springs neighborhood, remove invasive vegetation along Coyote Creek, remove downed trees and potential creek blockages, and partnered with the City of San José to approve a Joint Emergency Action Plan which outlines a detailed strategy for preparing and responding to potential flood threats in San José waterways. The board also approved new operating parameters at Anderson and Coyote reservoirs to create more storage space, further reducing the chance of flooding.

In one of the most critical decisions of the year, the water district board voted to conditionally participate in the California WaterFix project to improve the infrastructure that carries water from the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. Our board developed a list of seven guiding principles to work with state and water agency partners to examine a less costly, scaled-down and staged project that would serve Silicon Valley's needs, as well as our partner agencies'.

To further improve reliability of our

for \$484.5 million in state funding for the potential expansion of the Pacheco Reservoir. Located about 13 miles southwest of San Luis Reservoir near Highway 152, this project offers emergency and drought-year supply, fish habitat enhancement, flood protection and other benefits. Another way we are preparing for the future is through expanding use of recycled water. This year we celebrat-

ed the completion of 2.5 mile

water district board voted to pursue a public-private partnership (P3) for our purified

water program in which one entity would finance, build and operate a new facility to produce highly purified water. In December 2017, the board voted to expand the list of qualified P3 entities by issuing a new Request for Qualifications and ultimately selecting a P3 entity through a Request for Proposals by the end of 2018, which will set us up for a busy year working to ensure we meet our water supply needs.

No doubt about it, 2017 was a forwardmoving year. I wouldn't expect anything less for the Silicon Valley and I am humbled to have led the efforts this year. Follow more of what we accomplished throughout the year in our 2017 annual report available on www.valleywater.org.

Council votes to remove statue of Christopher Columbus from City Hall

ollowing several hours of debate the

San Jose City Council voted to remove a controversial Christopher Columbus statue standing in the City Hall lobby.

More than 60 residents voiced their opinions; some wanting the statue removed while others wanted it to stay. Many people from both sides cheered and booed while addressing the council members.

The statue, created by a student, was vandalized when someone poured red and black paint on it, and in 2001, a man a man

smashed the statue's face with a sledgehammer.

"He belongs in history books," said Sylvia Arenas, Councilwoman, District 8. "I don't believe he belongs in our City Hall."

The Italian American community will have six weeks to find a location for the statue — a symbol that has ignited a

storm of controversy - or the city will place it into storage.

"It's a complex issue," said San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo. "People honor presidents who owned slaves. "I'm not a fan of simply burying history."

"Columbus was a very brave navigator," said Tony Zerbo, who sits on the board of directors of the Italian American Heritage Foundation and wanted the statue to stay in City Hall. He acknowledged the controversy around Columbus but

said his actions weren't out of character for his time.

"No matter what, I think that we're going to insult somebody," said Councilman Johnny Khamis.

A COMMUNITY TAKING ACTION 'Coffee with a Cop' Breakfast and Clean Up at Welch Park

The San Jose Police Department has a new community outreach effort called Coffee with a Cop.

These community meetings make local connections with the SJPD officers. For Sgt. Donohue, coffee was not enough.

"Policing is not just about handcuffs and jail. It's about the relationships we build and foster in our communities. We chose to hold the Community Cleanup and Breakfast because there are few better ways to share time with people than breaking bread," said Sgt. Donohue.

Sgt. Donohue approached Ms. Trowbridge with the idea to clean up the Welch Park and neighborhood and serve every one of the volunteers breakfast. And, excuse the police officer cliché, but he didn't just want doughnuts – it was going to be a pancake, egg, and bacon breakfast made by SJPD officers. Ambitious, but the idea took off.

the City of San Jose is collaborating with partners to ensure we are building a balanced community for us all to live, work and play in. We encourage community members to attend the meeting, ask questions and provide feedback."

Project location

The project is to be located in the 27 acres located at 4750 San Felipe Road. This area is adjacent to the shopping center with the McDonalds next to the Evergreen Valley College. To get an idea of the size of the project area, it looks to be about four times larger than the current retail shop location that includes McDonalds, CVS Store and other retail establishments. Thus the entire 27 acres is very large and this can be discerned as one views the map of the entire area and proposed projects. The plans are extensive and mock up drawings help convey the actual look of the proposed medical offices as well as the assisted living facilities.'

Statement from the developer

The following information was sent to the Evergreen Times from the developer who will be working on the project.

"Republic Urban Properties is a full service real estate investment, management, and development team located in San Jose and on the east coast. good for all to call in suspicious cars or people in the neighborhood and those calls make a big difference for the police.

Police Captain Randy Schriefer was reassuring in how he and the police are involved in helping prevent more burglaries

Police Captain Schriefer strategies

Hot spots of crime change and the police use data to plan and cover areas in San Jose. Captain Schriefer explained that the police department has been focusing on breaking up some burglary rings where the thieves break in usually when residents are at work

"The best information we can go on is the formation we get from you," said Schriefer.

The police successfully caught two burglars and extra units were deployed along with more visibility of officers to beef up the needs in push back of such crimes.

"By August 2018 we will have an additional 150 officers on the street," said Schriefer. This increase in police officers graduating out of training was due to Mayor Liccardo and the councilmembers such as Arenas in creating and pushing for the passage of Measure F to put more monies into the police force to help begin to change the low numbers of officers in San Jose.

Evergreen Valley College assists

San Jose-Evergreen Community College District Police Chief, Tom Morales stated, "If we can organize a group we can establish more power to prevent burglaries. We are on your side. I am here tonight to help support you."

We submitted a competitive proposal to work with the San Jose Evergreen Community College District to create a thoughtful, sustainable, long-term source of funding that will generate revenue every year from ground rent to the District.

The 27 acres of surplus land will complement EVC's campus both in look and feel, and in purpose, as plans for the campus continue to evolve. Working with EVC, the District, and community members, we will build a new community resource that Evergreen residents, students, and faculty will be proud to call home. We look forward to collaborating with everyone and we look forward to gathering input from the community in our workshop on February. 3rd."

The following additional information was taken from the "applicants" meeting overview. The site plans state that it is a 'Mixed Use Development by Republic Evergreen LLC."

"Republic Urban Properties has been chosen as a trusted and experienced local developer to present a vision for the future of the SJEVCC District's underutilized 27 acres of land. Working with Evergreen Valley College (EVC), the SJEVCC District, and community members, we will build a new community resource that Evergreen residents, students, and faculty will be proud to have in District

In its earliest phases, the surplus land was envisioned as an opportunity to meet the region's housing shortage and was imagined as a mixed-use residential project that could support the campus community's wish list of an Olympic-sized swimming pool, athletic field, and student services. However, the (Continued, next page)

Morales explained that some burglaries occur with groups or teams of people and they can make it their business in how they operate. He encouraged people to be good witnesses and call in suspicious information but the police are trained and have the resources so call the police for help.

A crime prevention specialist that covers Neighborhood Watch programs presented a PowerPoint and encouraged the neighbors to form a group and start Neighborhood Watch programs where they live. Tips were given such as, if you know you are going to come back after work in the dark to put on a light before you go to work so that the house is not dark upon vour return.

The meeting was helpful in educating all and it was stated by the speakers that "you are not alone in this and everyone should be proud in coming out and participating. The police solve crimes due to the public providing a piece of the puzzle in what they need so if you see something suspicious, report it and as data is collected, it can solve a crime by fitting into a part of a puzzle.'

Captain Schriefer and the increased police presence in the area succeeded in apprehending four more members of a burglary group just days after the meeting was held. Thus such meetings are important and succeed in helping improve situations.

The meeting was constructive and allowed for the 200 in attendance to find out some critical information and come together to collaborate with knowledge.

Arenas and her team set up the meeting in response to calls to her office, thus she is acting and reaching out to residents by holding meetings to make a difference on key areas of need.
