STATE BRIEFS

WAKE COUNTY SCHOOL TEACHERS HIT HARD BY FLU

[RALEIGH] If you ant proof that this is an exceptional hard flu season in North Carolina, look no further than the Wake County Public School System. On Monday, 1,283 teachers, or 11% percent of the entire teacher force for the system, called in sick because of the flu. The closest to that number was 792 back on October 2, 2017. Like other school systems across the state, Wake depends heavily on substitute teachers to fill in during this time of the year when teacher absences are expected.

STATE LAWMAKERS WANT TO BREAKUP SCHOOL DISTRICTS

[RALEIGH] Bowing to some concerns that several public school districts across the state are too large, legislative Republicans say they want to study the situation in hopes of eventually breaking some school systems up into smaller districts. A newly-formed legislative study committee is scheduled to report back on May 1st. Republicans House members Bill Brawley and John Bradford of Mecklenburg County, and Chris Malone of Wake county, are the primary sponsors of the bill. Opponents say breaking up the school districts is just another way of reinstating racial segregation. Both Wake and Charlotte-Mecklenburg school districts are the largest in the state.

WILL GOV. COOPER VETO NEW CLASS-SIZE BILL?

[RALEIGH] State lawmakers have now ended their Special Session and gone home until the short session scheduled in May. But before they left, they pasted a controversial bill, HB 90, lowering class sizes, which many parents demanded. However, attached to the bill are things that Gov. Cooper doesn't like, like legislative control of a \$58 million mitigation fund for the Atlantic Coast Pipeline, which the governor is supposed to control. And yet another section of the bill, once again, merges the state Board of Elections with the Ethic Enforcement Board, adding one member to the eight-member board. Gov. Cooper favors the class size portion, but ha signaled he's not please with the rest of HB90. So the question remains, will he sign it into law?

NCNAACP MORAL MARCH A CALL FOR "RESISTANCE"

With the theme, "Taking Resistance to the Ballot Box," the 12th Annual Moral March/Historic Thousands on Jones Street People's Assembly in Raleigh Feb. 10 attracted thousands of demonstrators from across the State, despite heavy rains. With protest signs castigating everything from the Trump Administration, to North Carolina's legislative Republican leadership, the extraordinarily diverse crowd of young, old, Black, White, Hispanic, straight, gay and others, marched through downtown Raleigh from Shaw University to just outside the State Capital.

There they heard from a plethora of speakers, representing the unique coalitions involved, all imploring those gathered to make sure their voices and votes are heard come November for the midterm election.

Bishop Dr. William Barber, the former President of the NCNAACP, spoke to those gathered by phone, urging them to indeed turn out the vote, regardless of whatever barriers or restrictions are thrown at them.

However, the highlight of the event was the pointed remarks of the NCNAACP's new president, Rev. Dr. T. Anthony Spearman, who used biblical analogies to illustrate the need for justice and invoked inspiration from civil rights leader, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., to crystallize the societal evils that the NCNAACP leader said must be confronted.

"Moral Resistance is the means we use to dismantle the

Candidate filings begin but court battles still confuse

From now until noon, Feb. 28, candidates for all state offices, except judgeships, will be filing for the 2018 May 8 midterm primaries. Filing began Monday without a hitch, though at the end of last week, observers were concerned that another unexpected court order could possibly delay the process.

Indeed, on Friday, Feb. 9, the Fourth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals issued an order that candidates for the NC Supreme Court and State Court of Appeals could not file for the May 8 judicial primaries because they will not be held. Instead, those candidates will file during a special judicial filing period June 18-29.

That order stayed an original ruling by the federal judge who ordered primaries for State Supreme and Appellate Court can-

engines of destruction that drive us away from the mainlands of democracy while steering us toward the mountains of fascism," Rev. Spearman offered in a prepared speech.

Spearman said the three "...engines of destruction..." were "R.I.P." - "racism, impoverishment and persecution."

"The antidote to racism is representation," he continued. "Each human on this earth represents a spark of divinity. Representation begins with recognizing that every person has an equal spark of God within them. Representation is the reconstruction we seek when we resist racism at the ballot box."

Addressing impoverishment, Dr. Spearman said the antidote was "investment."

"Investment in our justice system is not only ensuring

access to counsel and reconstructing our bail system so that it is not a poor tax. Investment in our justice system means reconstructing the administrative process so that someone who needs a protective order from an abusive ex-spouse doesn't have to take two days off work to sit in the back of a courtroom waiting to be heard for ten minutes."

"Investment is the reconstruction we seek when we resist impoverishment at the ballot box."

Lastly, Dr. Spearman warned about militarism, which he called "persecution."

"The antidote to persecution is peace, he said. "Our people are gunned down in the streets in numbers that exceed the numbers who were lynched and are imprisoned in numbers that exceed the numbers who were enslaved."

"Peace is the reconstruction we seek when we resist persecution at the ballot box."

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didates but not for District and Superior Court candidates.

The Republican-led NC Legislature last year passed a law eliminating the 2018 judicial primaries for all judicial candidates because of judicial redistricting, but Democrats successfully challenged that law. The federal judge reinstated the judicial primaries for the State judicial races but not for District and Superior Court races. Now, that's to the Fourth Circuit Appellate Court, there will be no May judicial primaries, and the special June filing period will go forward unless a court stops that as well.

The legal back and forth has State Republican legislative leaders seeing red.

Thus far, a three-judge federal panel has had Republican 2011 legislative redistricting maps redrawn twice, finally ruling that the maps drawn by a court-ordered special master be used for the 2018 elections. Republicans successfully petitioned the US Supreme Court, in part, to stay that order for Wake and Mecklenburg counties alone, pending review.

Republicans also were successful in getting an order by another three-judge panel, striking down their 2016 partisan congressional maps, stayed by the US High Court. That stay is pending review of two other partisan gerrymandering cases the US Supreme Court is considering elsewhere in the nation.

Just this week, a three-judge State panel refused to take up the issue of Wake and Mecklenburg counties' being blocked by the US Supreme Court in the legislative redistricting case involving the special master. The judicial panel cited, "...significant practical difficulties, if not jurisdictional impediments, exist when one court is called upon to construe and enforce another court's order that was made upon a distinct and separate record by distinct and separate plaintiffs."

Rep. David Lewis (R-Harnett), Co-chair of the Joint Redistricting Committee, held an angry press conference last Friday, demanding that Democrats

drop their court cases, and simply allow Republicans, who are in the legislative majority, to carry out the will of their supporters.

"These Democratic groups

"Let's take our resistance," Dr. Spearman concluded, "...to the ballot box."

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Access to safe, decent and affordable housing threatened across the Nation

Civil rights advocates unite in opposition to rollbacks

(TriceEdneyWire.com) - In recent days, threats to the nation's housing finance system have emerged. At the center of the controversy are two key issues: the obligation of mortgage lenders to ensure broad mortgage credit for all credit-worthy borrowers, and secondly, whether the nation will enforce its own laws banning unlawful discrimination.

On February 2, a leaked Senate proposal to overhaul the secondary mortgage market's government-sponsored enterprises (GSEs), Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, would drop important access and affordability provisions that now govern the system. For example, the GSEs now are required to always serve all markets, as well as have in place affordable housing goals.

The proposal from U.S. Senators Bob Corker (R-Tenn.) and Mark Warner (D-Va.) was quickly and unanimously rejected by a broad coalition of civil rights and housing advocates that included the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law, Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights, NAACP, UnidosUS (formerly the National Council of La Raza), National Coalition for Asian Pacific American Community Development, National Fair Housing Alliance, National Community Re-investment Coalition, National Urban League, and the Center for Responsible Lending (CRL).

"Ten years after the 2008 Housing Crisis, it is disheartening to turn the secondary mortgage market back over to Wall Street," wrote the coalition. "Who can forget the 7.8 million completed home foreclosures and trillions of dollars in lost family wealth?"

"Many American still face immense housing challenges," the leaders continued. "This ill-conceived approach places the risk on the backs of hardworking families who already rescued the big banks."

The draft legislation also fell short for Massachusetts Senator Elizabeth Warren, a member of the Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs.

"I appreciate the dedication Senators Warner and Corker have shown to address this critical issue, but this draft isn't even close to a solution that works for families who hope to buy homes, said Warren. "This bill would end up creating more problems than it solves."

As early as 2008, Congress moved swiftly to enact the Housing and Economic Recovery Act. This bipartisan legislation provided strong regulatory oversight of the housing finance system and brought forward important affordable housing goals to ensure that hardworking families would be able to access mortgage loans. But with the housing market's lengthy path to recovery, many have renewed

calls for legislative reform of Fannie and Freddie. And just as the GSEs are now pledged to serve the entire market, some want to take away the system's access and affordability requirements. That kind of change would harm Black families and communities, as well as other low-wealth families.

"The big-ticket items that we are looking for is the national duty-to-serve and affordable housing goals that have a regulator able to enforce those," said Scott Astrada, CRL's Director of Federal Advocacy.

Days later, on February 5, Mick Mulvaney, the White House hand-picked Acting Director for the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau

(CFPB) announced he would move the Bureau's staff for its Office of Fair Lending and Equal Opportunity (OFLEO) directly under his control.

The Dodd-Frank Act mandates that OFLEO perform "oversight and enforcement of federal laws to ensure the fair, equitable, and nondiscriminatory access to credit"

By moving fair lending experts to the CFPB's Director's office, to focus instead on consumer education and coordination, there are real concerns that the OFLEO will be unable to perform its enforcement and oversight mission.

"This action could open up the floodgates on lending discrimination, which would damage the ability for people of color to build wealth," noted Debbie Goldstein, CRL's Executive Vice President. "One of the reasons the CFPB was established was because lending discrimination targeted people of color with predatory, high-cost loans that led to foreclosures."

Mulvaney's personnel shift is yet another consistent sign that the nation's financial cop-on-the-beat is walking a new patrol.

Since assuming unlawful leadership at CFPB, Mulvaney has also dropped a lawsuit against predatory payday lenders, supported repeal of the Bureau's auto lending guidance that took direct aim at pervasive and discriminatory practices. He has also made clear his plans

to reopen rulemaking under the Home Mortgage Disclosure Act (HMDA).

HMDA is a federal law that requires most financial institutions to provide mortgage data to the public. It ensures that mortgage lenders are serving the credit needs of communities in which they are located. The annual HMDA report is the only comprehensive one that enables a comparison of private mortgage lending compared to that of government-backed mortgages like FHA, VA and USDA. This report is also unique for its tracking of mortgage lending and denials by race and ethnicity. This unique feature enables policymakers to discern discriminatory trends.

As 2018 commemorates the 50th anniversary of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s assassination, we must remain vigilant in the fight for access to safe and affordable mortgage loans - for many consumers, the single, largest investment of their lifetimes.

With hard-fought anti-discrimination laws now under assault, this generation has a duty to protect and defend all civil rights laws. Failure to do so would be to forget that the nation enacted the 1968 Fair Housing Act for this very purpose.

"Wilmington Ten." Rev. Chavis is presently President and CEO of NNPA.

This special event is free and open to the public, but tickets are required. Tickets can be obtained, or reserved for pick up, through the theater's box office. Box office is open noon-6:00 p. m. weekdays for in-person orders or by calling 910-738-4339.

The documentary recounts the history surrounding the troubled desegregation of

New Hanover County Public schools during the late 1960's through 1971, which evolved into the false prosecution of eight Black male students, a White female community organizer, and a fiery civil rights activist, Reverend Benjamin Chavis, who protested racial injustice. The proud history of Williston Senior High School, the all Black school in Wilmington, which was unceremoniously closed in 1968, will also be honored.

Against the backdrop of the Wilmington 1898 race massacre and the forced

desegregation of Southern schools in the 1960's, the documentary also traces how the Black Press, led initially by *Wilmington Journal* publisher, Thomas C. Jervay, Sr., and over 40 years later by his daughter and publisher-editor, Mary Alice Jervay Thatch, through the National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA), ultimately pushed for, and achieved the official exoneration of the Wilmington Ten.

Special appearances in the film include The Reverend Dr. Benjamin Chavis, Jr. leader of the Wilmington Ten; Joseph

McNeil, Williston Senior High School alumnus and a member of the Greensboro Four, who integrated a downtown Greensboro F. W. Woolworth store in 1960; The Reverend Dr. Jeremiah Wright, Pastor Emeritus of Trinity United Church of Christ in Chicago, and one of the ministers who lobbied Gov. James Hunt in 1977 to pardon the Wilmington Ten, and former Gov. Beverly Perdue, who ultimately pardoned the Wilmington Ten in December 2012.

The documentary, which premiered in 2014, has also

been released on DVD for public schools, grades 9 through 12 (with academic guide); colleges and universities, and the general public.

The NNPA, also known as "The Black Press of America," is a 74 year-old federation of more than 200 Black community newspapers across the United States. In 2011, led by *The Wilmington Journal*, the NNPA, and NNPA Foundation, led by Dorothy Leavell, Publisher of the *Chicago Crusader*, adopted seeking pardons of innocence for the *Wilmington Ten* as a project.

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

Urban Leaguers are ready to fight for a fair and accurate 2020 census

"Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three fifths of all other Persons. The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct." – United States Constitution, Article 1, Section 2

Earlier this week, Massachusetts Secretary of State William Galvin accused the Trump administration of attempting to sabotage the 2020 Census, and from all indications, we have reason to be concerned.

The Census Bureau has been without a director since June and remains critically understaffed and underfunded.

The Bureau plans to discontinue the practice of hiring non-citizens with legal work permits – who have been crucial in the past for communicating with hard-to-reach non-English-speaking communities.

The administration has rejected requested changes that could improve the accuracy of the 2020 Census, declining to include a combined question format for collecting Hispanic origin and race, or a separate Middle Eastern or North African category on the Census form.

The administration's reported choice for deputy director, Thomas Brunell, is a hyper-partisan gerrymandering advocate with no political experience.

The U.S. Conference of Mayors this week warned in a letter to Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross, "We are troubled by the administration's reported intent to appoint a candidate for Census Bureau deputy director whose body of professional work largely centers around achieving partisan advantage in the use of census data."

Since census data is used to draw Congressional districts, the choice of Brunell seems a deliberate attempt to skew census data to give one party an unfair advantage in the 2022 elections.

The decennial census is among the most crucially-important undertakings, with far-ranging implications for legislative redistricting, civil rights laws and distribution of opportunities and resources. A fair and accurate census is of paramount importance. The National Urban League has been a powerful advocate for accurate African American representation in the census for generations. In 1970, then-executive director Whitney M. Young testified to Congress about the drastic undercount of African Americans, estimated at 15 percent.

As chair of the Census Bureau's 2010 Census Advisory Committee, I urged the Bureau to expand its paid advertising to areas that have high percentages of hard-to-count residents, who often distrusts of government workers. I also pushed for more census funding specifically targeted at Black communities.

Despite our efforts, the 2010 Census missed an estimated 1.5 million people of color. Unless the Census Bureau makes immediate, drastic changes, the results of the 2020 Census will be much worse.

As part of our efforts, the National Urban League has enlisted civic engagement expert Jeri Green, who will serve as a Senior Advisor for the 2020 Census. In her former position as Senior Advisor for Civic Engagement with the U.S. Census Bureau, Green educated diverse stakeholders on the benefits of Census participation and engaged Hard-to-Count communities to ascertain their unique challenges to obtaining an accurate count.

Politicizing the census, particularly at the expense of the nation's most vulnerable citizens, violates the foundational principles of representational democracy. The National Urban League will continue forcefully to advocate for a census that reflects the diversity of our nation.



Diplomacy toward North Korea is an opening, not a surrender

The picture of Vice President Mike Pence standing stiffly next to the trusted younger sister of North Korean dictator Kim Jong-Un at the Olympics in South Korea spoke a thousand words.

After weeks of escalating tensions, the North Korean dictator decided to use the Olympics to reach out to South Korea and to the world. He sent North Korean athletes to the games. The two Korean teams marched into the Olympic arena under a unified flag.

They fielded a joint women's ice hockey team for the first time. Kim's sister not only attended the ceremonies, but also issued an invitation to the South Korean president to make an official visit to the North after the games. Vice President Pence came to the games to enforce the administration's no-talk policy.

He stiffed Kim's sister on the podium. He and his wife refused to join the crowd in standing when the Koreans marched in. "We will not allow North Korean propaganda to hijack the message and

imagery of the Olympic Games," he said, vowing to focus on North Korean provocations and human rights abuses, while promising new and harsher sanctions. But the "message and imagery" of the Olympic Games is that athletes of all nations put aside bitter conflicts to compete in contests.

The space for peaceful sports competition could create the opening for serious talks. When campaigning for the presidency, South Korean President Moon Jae-in promised an opening to North Korea. The jarring North Korean tests of nuclear bombs and ballistic missiles cast a pall on that. President Donald Trump responded with a characteristic combination of insult and bluster. He famously strutted that he had a "bigger (nuclear) button" than the North Korean president.

The administration ratcheted up sanctions, pushed China to get Kim under control, declared that North Korean possession of nuclear weapons was a dire national security threat and ramped up military exercises to the very borders of the North. For our South Korean allies, the escalating threats are bone chilling. There is no rational military "option" against North Korea. A preemptive attack would be an illegal act of aggression that would lead to massive casualties in both North and South

Korea and make the U.S. a pariah among nations. Worse, the military threats only make the North Korean leadership less likely to negotiate away their nuclear weapons program.

The U.S. sees North Korean nuclear weapons as offensive, threatening the U.S. and our allies. North Korea clearly sees its nuclear weapons as defensive. For an isolated dictatorship that is denounced by the U.S., a nuclear weapons capacity may serve the same purpose the U.S. claims for its own nuclear arsenal - deterring any country from attacking. President Moon would clearly like to lessen tensions and move toward better relations. He has no desire to distance himself from the U.S., but would like to bring the U.S. and North Korea to the negotiating table. What do Trump and his advisers want?

The no-talk, big-stick policy leads to a dead end. North Korea already has nuclear weapons. Severe sanctions have not slowed its development of intercontinental missiles. The Chinese suggest that talks could start if the U.S. suspends its regular joint military exercises with South Korea and North Korea responds by suspending nuclear and missile tests. Neither the U.S. nor North Korea has expressed support for that. Kim vows to "mass produce" nuclear weapons;

Pence demands that North Korea begin "denuclearization," the dismantling "permanently and irreversibly" of North Korea's nuclear and ballistic missile programs before there are any negotiations or loosening of sanctions or suspension of military exercises.

A no-talk, all-swagger policy has produced nothing. If escalating military exercises and threats don't produce a war by miscalculation, they end up advertising the impotence of U.S. policy. Diplomacy isn't a surrender; it is an opening. The only way North Korea will give up its nuclear weapons is if it can receive concrete guarantees against foreign attack. The only way we can live with North Korea having nuclear weapons is with dialogue and mutual steps to build trust and security.

North Korea is a ruthless dictatorship with a failed economy. South Koreans are understandably fearful of war, but not exactly eager to bear the cost of rebuilding the North. Kim has made an opening gesture at the Olympic Games. Both South Korea and the U.S. have every reason to call his bluff, to seek discussions rather than to continue an o-talk policy that leads only to greater tension and frustration.

Super Bowl ad using Dr. King's voice: Crass exploitation

It is incredibly sad to watch how the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, whose life and legacy inspired and changed the lives of millions, is now being used to hawk trucks.

The ad for Dodge Ram Trucks used words from one of his most inspiring speeches, "The Drum Major Instinct", which he delivered on Feb. 4, 1968.

This ad was so unlike Dr. King. If he had involved himself at all in football, he and perhaps even Mrs. King who continued the movement after his death, would have joined the NFL protest movement who have been taking a knee against social injustice.

What next? Dr. King ads for sleeping bags, tennis shoes? If this is not exploitation or "pimping," what else could this be? And the Super Bowl ad was not the only act that had me holding my breath and my nose, it was a group led by Isaac Farris, Jr. the nephew of Dr. King. He showed up at the White House to celebrate Dr. King's birthday with President Trump, only days after the president announced that

Africans had lived in "s.....holes" countries. This show up by a King relative, which was aired continuously, provided cover for a president to claim he was in sync with people of color.

Ironically there was a time when the King family fought valiantly to protect Dr. King's intellectual property from the very deconstruction we are witnessing today.

In my recent memoir of Coretta Scott King, "My Life, My Love, My Legacy", I explain the background of how Dr. King's name, images, writing and speeches that embody his message were the intellectual property that the family spent millions challenging because they felt other entities were either using it for their own gain or maligning his works. There were several suits involved. In one case, for example, with CBS, Dr. King sued and then after his father's death Dexter sued over an infringement of copyright, which a court of law ruled in their favor.

Mrs. King explained, "The network had included footage of virtually the entire I Have a Dream speech along with other speeches in a five part series that they sold for profit. They used my husband's words, name, image and speeches to make money, but Martin' heirs received nothing. It was

unfair but a court of law upheld the conclusion, ruling that the copyright protected Martin's words.

Mrs. King, who died in 2006, had made protecting the integrity of her husband one of her top priorities. "As I shifted into retirement, from the Center, Dexter took on the challenge of safeguarding Martin's property. The goal was not to make ourselves rich but to pass on a sacred legacy for future generation."

Despite the wishes of their parents, the question is often raised are the King siblings protecting the legacy or getting bogged down in "get rich" schemes?

While Bernice King, Dr. King's only surviving daughter, president of the King Center, took some of the heat for the commercial, in a tweet she quickly distanced herself from any decision-making involving the ad. "Neither myself nor the King Center is the entity that approves the use of Dr. King's words, imagery in merchandise, entertainment or advertisement, which included the Super Bowl."

As it was explained to me, Bernice only manages the estate of her mother and Dexter is CEO of the Martin Luther King corporation responsible for approving the licensing for his father's intellectual property—s bifurcation that is ripe for

misunderstandings.

Each of the siblings—Martin Luther King III, Dexter and Bernice reportedly have one vote which means any two of them can cancel out the desires of the other. For example, last year, the King siblings had feuded in court over whether or not their father's travel Bible and Nobel Peace Prize should be sold to a private bidder. Reports show Dexter and Martin wanted to sell the Bible, Bernice, who argued the property was sacred, did not. She was outvoted and the matter is still being settled out of court.

In an interview last year Dexter told me: "Land is the real estate of the past. Intellectual property is the real estate of the future. If you stand back and let others steal Dad's material, then you are affecting every minority writer, every songwriter, every composer, every storyteller, every creative person."

But Dr. King's legacy commercialized and hoisted on a Ram Truck sloshing through the mud in a super bowl ad does not feel like protection; Just plain old crass exploitation to me.

The catfight between Trump and the FBI

As a Malcolmite watching the cat fight between Donald Trump and his Trumpettes, especially Sean Hannity and the FBI, I am inspired to say "Smash each other up!"

Neither the Trumpettes - many of whom are the blood and/or ideological descendants of those who fought against equal rights, equal justice and equal opportunities - nor the FBI have ever shown any concern for Black folks. In fact, they have been responsible for any number of hostile, deadly acts against us.

I don't remember all those people who are now weeping and wailing about the way the FBI is being treated by Trump and his Trumpettes weeping and wailing when J. Edgar Hoover and his boys were consistently and brutally attacking those fighting in the war against White supremacy. The Washington Post has a front page headline, "At FBI, fears of lasting damage" which led me to wonder where are the articles and commentary about the lasting damage done to the civil and human

rights movements by the FBI in the 1950s and 1960s. The agency launched a Counter Intelligence Program (COINTELPRO) whose expressed mission was to harass and destroy people who they considered a threat to the status quo.

In his book, "Official and Confidential: The Secret Life of J. Edgar Hoover", Anthony Summers noted, "Although King had been in the public eye for some five years, Hoover lumped him together with advocates of violent struggle such as Malcolm X, 'We wouldn't have any problem, he had once grunted over lunch with (Lyndon) Johnson in his senatorial days, 'if we could get those two guys fighting, if we could get them to kill one another off...'"

Those two guys were Brother Malcolm X and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., towards whom Hoover had a special hostility. He feared that they could launch a national movement. According to reporter Tony Capaccio in the August 28, 2013 Washington Post, "The Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s 'I Have A Dream' speech inspired the world. It also galvanized the FBI into undertaking one of its biggest surveillance operations in history."

A 1976 report of the Select Committee to Study Government Operations with

Respect to Intelligence Activities states, "The FBI program to destroy Dr. King as the leader of the Civil Rights Movement entailed efforts to discredit him with churches, universities and the press."

The FBI files on the Organization of Afro-American Unity (OAAU), which was launched by Brother Malcolm in 1964 includes the following, "A recording of the remarks of Malcolm X at this meeting indicates that the aim of the OAAU is to eliminate differences between Negroes so they can work together for human rights, while the initial objective is to 'internationalize' the American Civil Rights Movement by taking it to the United Nations." (italics mine)

On another of the FBI file pages, it is noted that "This report is classified 'confidential' since revelation of information furnished by all sources might reveal sources of continuing value and impair their future effectiveness and such impairment might have an adverse effect on the national defense interests of the government." (italics mine)

The FBI OAAU files also declared, "The goal of the Counter Intelligence Program is "to prevent the coalition of militant Black Nationalist groups...An

effective coalition of Black Nationalist groups might be the first step towards real 'Mau Mau' in America, the beginning of a true black revolution."

Another goal was "to prevent the rise of a 'Messiah' who could unify and electrify the militant Black Nationalist movement. Malcolm X might have been such a 'Messiah'." After the assassination of Brother Malcolm, Hoover reportedly considered Dr. King as a candidate to be the "Messiah" they so feared.

What really caused Hoover to have nightmares was a possible coalition between Brother Malcolm and Dr. King. Their assassinations conveniently did away with his nightmares.

The FBI's fear of lasting damage to them by attacks from Trump, Sean Hannity and the rest of the Trumpettes is absolutely nothing compared to the damage done to the civil and human rights movements' war against White supremacy/racism by the FBI. Rather than taking sides in the current catfight, we should hope they scratch each other's eyes out.

Watching the good ol' boys up close

With the most recent confusion swirling out of the Trump White House, the potency, power and arrogance of white supremacy is giving off a glaring light.

African Americans who have gone up against white police officers and in fact, a justice system which is disproportionately white, have seen it for decades. There has seemed to be a feeling amongst police officers - mostly white but not all - that they can do anything they want and get away with it, and their assumption has been mostly correct.

White men with power and white men who think they have power, or should have it, because they are white, are dangerous. The justice system is filled with white men who believe they are morally and racially superior; many of them do what they want with impunity and they are not afraid of being called to accountability.

We are seeing this phenomenon in the Trump White House and in our society in general, and we are seeing the broad reach of white supremacy. White men have not only disrespected black men, but black and white women as well. While they touted the sanctity of white women, they historically abused their women, even as they raped black women at will. They have done it for decades

Their confidence in the system to protect them has caused their capacity moral behavior to suffer. They always deny that they are racist, and they are quick to call a woman who is brave enough to expose their sexual indiscretions liars. They have become expert at claiming victimhood as real victims have called them out, and for too long, their abuses have gone unaccounted for.

Black women who were raped by white men were told to be quiet or they might be lynched. White women who were raped by white men remained quiet as well, because to expose the men would compromise too much of what white women wanted in life, and also be a cause for them to fear for their lives.

White men could and did order black women around and the women had no choice but to obey if they wanted to live. In the case of Ella Ree Jones, for example, the driver of the bus noted that a white man was standing. He demanded that Jones get up; Jones said she was sick and said she didn't think she could stand up, but the bus driver wasn't having it. To make a long story short, this young woman, a college student, was taken to City Hall and was badly beaten by police officers. She wasn't raped but she was accosted by law enforcement officers - and no officer was ever charged.

The president has been accused by multiple women of sexual misconduct but has not been held accountable. The president and others defended Roy Moore when he was accused of sexually accosting young teens, and the good ol' boys resorted to calling the women liars. Now we have a high-ranking White House official, Rob Porter, accused of domestic abuse and the good ol' boys - and only now, since the picture of one of his wives with a black eye, are the good ol' boys having to admit that perhaps he was wrong. If reports are to be believed, all of the White House people who knew about his beating his wives chose to be quiet and just let him get away with it. It's classic white supremacy.

John Kelly praised this man until he was forced by the revelation of the beaten wife, to denounce him, but clearly, he didn't care that women had been beaten. Some have voiced anger that Kelly's judgement is being questioned because is a military veteran. He is, they say, a war hero and because of that, we should leave him alone.

That's the same line that is given about corrupt police officers; they risk their lives (which they do) and if they do something wrong, we should all keep quiet about it. They are heroes to many.


But a hero is not necessarily a good person. The police officers who have participated in violence against blacks and browns and Muslims and immigrants ...and women ... might have done some really good work on the streets in fighting crime, but their treatment of innocent people is not heroic. It is criminal.

The more I watch what this administration, the more I see in a clear way the depth and breadth of white supremacy. Those who are getting caught - not only for sexual and domestic violence offenses, but for alleged criminal offenses - are whining and claiming to have been victimized by those who have spoken out.

That's what the white supremacist culture nurtures - a group of people who think they are above the law and who know that they really do not have to worry about the "rule of law." They make the laws and they change them to fit their purposes. It has been their way for so long that one wonders if they can ever learn to understand that all people, not just white men - have value.

A parade? What's next?

Our 45th President wants a parade. He wants it in November, probably before the mid-term elections, as a way of mobilizing his base and glorifying himself more than, as he suggests, celebrating the military.

He went to the zoo, would he next want zebras and tigers roaming the lawn behind 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue?

The last parade we had in Washington was in 1991, when we "won" the Gulf War. That parade cost \$14 million (\$21 million in today's dollars), and drew 800,000 people. Given 45's propensity for wanting the biggest and the huuuugest, he'd probably want to spend twice what George H.W. Bush spent in 1991. That \$42 million represents less than a millionth of one percent of the nearly \$500 billion federal budget increase that the Senate pro-

posed in bipartisan legislation on February 7.

I am among the many who will look askance at the cost of a parade. There are lots of things we could do with \$42 million, like job creation, small Pell grant increases, or even more amenities for our armed forces. But in the scheme of things, some will argue that \$42 million is not "that much money". They might suggest that a parade is more about symbolism than anything else.

What does a show of military might signal in these times? There has been no significant military victory, nothing to celebrate except 45's already-inflated ego. France's Bastille Day parade is a response to the fact that France has been invaded twice, most devastatingly by the Germans in World War II.

Their parade is as much a show of military might as it is of European unity. These days troops from several countries, including Germany and the United States, participate in the parade. Some carry the flag of the European Union, even though the EU has no military. Would 45's parade include others? Or is this just about us?

Instead of a unity-type Bastille Day parade, 45's parade is likely a reflection of his braggadocio. His button is bigger, so is his parade, and so is the US military. 45's parade sounds like a show of muscle, but to what end? Even the inhabitant of the world's smallest country must know that the US has the world's "greatest" military. So why do we need to show off? Because 45 is a show-off, a blowhard, and an Electoral College-selected buffoon.

Meanwhile, consider the impact a parade might have on the District of Columbia, the used-to-be majority Black city that is mostly occupied by Democrats. How will the streets survive huge tanks rolling down Pennsylvania Avenue, and who will pay for repairs? How extensive will this parade be, and will it happen on the weekend or a weekday? What will it mean for workers, transportation, and the District's infrastructure? 45 probably neither knows nor cares. He passed the hot potato of the parade to the Secretary of Defense, and now General Jim Mattis and his team are stuck with the task. Both Democrats and Republicans have verbalized opposition to

the parade, and they are likely to be labeled "treasonous" by 45, since anyone who disagrees with him, or fails to clap (or bow) when he speaks is obviously a traitor. He is behaving like a despot like his rival, North Korea's "Supreme Leader" Kim Jong-un.

While 45 finds it convenient to idolize the military and insist that the rest of us do so, as well, he didn't find it convenient to serve in the military. He was excused from military service during the Vietnam era because he had flat feet or bone spurs or something like that. More likely, he was excused from military service because his family had money.

45 wants a parade to celebrate the military and glorify our country's military might. Next he will want to have someone crown him as King. Yes, it is a good thing he doesn't go to the zoo, because we might end up with a menagerie in the back yard at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue.

Since the World Bank is exempt from US laws and courts, women in the World Bank can be sexually harassed and assaulted without any legal recourse.

In 1992, an official World Bank report (The Stern Report) attributed sexual harassment in the World Bank to "cultures with different standards for male-female relationships." Women who challenge the status quo risk getting fired and losing their World Bank sponsored visa. This entails uprooting their family and leaving the US within 60 days.

In 1999, a US Congressional report found the Bank's internal justice system that is supposed to protect women from sexual harassment unfit to adjudicate sexual harassment claims. The World Bank pushed back, stating that "The report fails to capture the unique challenges of a large inter-governmental organization composed of

181member countries." Chief among the challenges was the Bank's obligation to "take into account the institution's multicultural needs."

A 2001 World Bank report gave further explanation. "While unwelcome behaviors are seen from the perspective of the person on the receiving end, the standard for judging whether a behavior is inappropriate is not purely subjective." Situations which initially may appear to constitute sexual harassment may not rise to the level of legal offense when "the particular sensitivities required in the World Bank multicultural environment" are factored in.

What "cultural sensitivities" are factored in? In 2016, a comprehensive World Bank study of 173 countries found that over 100 of them have three or more discriminatory laws against women. For example, take Iran where, according to the Women's Forum Against Fundamentalism in Iran, Article 209 of their constitution stipulates that "a woman's life is valued only half as much as a man's life."

In Nigeria, the penal codes dictate that "unlawful assault of any male person is a

felony." By contrast, "Unlawful assault of a woman or girl is a misdemeanor!" In March 2016, the Nigerian Senate rejected a bill introduced to grant women equality under law. Sound familiar?

When such "cultural sensitivities" are factored, coercive sexual harassment is merely regarded as a manifestation of the Bank's multicultural environment. This is disclosed in the Stern Report that identifies a rampant culture of "General sexual harassment," including "unwelcome touches, repeated requests for dates, and posters and jokes demeaning women."

Of those who were interviewed for the Stern Report, 325 revealed they were subjected to "unwelcome sexual advances" and 75 said they were victims of "coercive sexual harassment." The Report concluded that its findings "may seem laughable, but they are a reality to many women at the World Bank."

The Report stated: "Women generally are not willing to complain about such behavior for fear of retribution. Most simply try to escape their situations as soon as possible. The lack of attention to the issue, the absence of secure and supportive channels to discuss

problems, and the uncertainty that remedial action will be taken are seen as official tolerance of such behavior."

Little has changed since the Stern Report was released in 1992. In 2016, in DN v. World Bank, the Bank's Administrative Tribunal reviewed a case involving a male staff member who was terminated for placing his iPhone "under the skirt of a female staff member to take inappropriate photographs and/or record a video of her, without her consent." The Tribunal established that "the Applicant's misconduct has been established" with sufficient evidence; yet, it ordered the World Bank to reinstate him because "the disciplinary sanction of termination was significantly disproportionate" to the offense he committed or the peculiar culture he manifested!

The only protection his victim has is coming to the office wearing pants! I call upon you to say #SheToo for every woman everywhere when she can't. The World Bank is one of those places.


TELL SOMEBODY

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
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
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
