At town hall, Delegate Miele unveils half a dozen bills aimed at ensuring school safety

Concerned parents, teachers and students showed up en masse to take part in Delegate Christian Miele's town hall on school safety last Thursday, Feb. 15, at Perry Hall High School, just over a month after a Perry Hall student was arrested for brandishing an air-soft rifle in the school's parking lot.

While the town hall was called in light of the Perry Hall incident and alleged ongoing disciplinary issues in Baltimore County Public Schools, it fell in the shadow of two other major incidents. The day before the town hall, 17 people were killed in a school shooting in Florida. The day of the town hall, Loch Raven High School was on lockdown after a student brought what turned out to be a pellet gun into the school.

"I'm mad, I'm scared and I'm concerned," said Darlene Graves, parent of a PHHS student. "I'm concerned because these kids are growing up thinking this is normal."

At the town hall, Miele unveiled a half-dozen bills aimed at helping curb school violence and disciplinary issues. The proposed legislation looks at a slew of issues from transportation safety and drug awareness to creating an anti-bullying task force and new punitive measures

- including revoking a person's driver's license for upwards of three years - for bringing a weapon to school.

Miele thanked the crowd of over 100 for attending, stressing that change cannot be made "unilaterally" by politicians. From there he dove into HB1600, which deals with the anti-bullying task force.

"What this bill is designed to do is create a task force comprised of all the relevant stakeholders in our education community," Miele said.

The bill would require a bipartisan committee to be established and comprised of four members of the General

With one bus stop problem solved, Dundalk activist hopes to tackle others

To say Angel Ball is frustrated is an understatement.

The Dunmanway Apartments property manager, known in the Dundalk community for tackling problems and getting things done, is doing her part to eliminate what many have long considered to be neighborhood eyesores: trashy, unkempt public bus stops.

And while she has a solution that many are willing to pitch in for, and she has the Maryland Transit Administration's blessing and support, she believes she is being ignored by perhaps the most important partner in the project - Baltimore County.

Ball's involvement in the issue began with the county's removal of two benches and a trash can at the bus stop at the corner of Dunmanway and Dunran Road, in front of the apartment complex. Ball had the benches built and installed and had a staff member empty the trash can three times a week.

Without any prior communication to Ball, a county Bureau of Highways crew picked up the benches and trash can on Jan. 29. With a little bit of detective work, Ball tracked down the benches and was told they would be returned that afternoon. When that did not happen, she took her case to social media, wondering why the county would take away something designed to keep the neighborhood clean and bus rider-friendly.

County officials clammed up, but MTA's

Janeen Kuser reached out to Ball and told her about the transit system's Adopt a Stop program, which encourages individuals, businesses, schools and other organizations to adopt a local bus stop. The program is similar to the state's Adopt a Highway program, according to Kuser.

The two women met on Feb. 8 to discuss the bus stop adoption program, through which MTA provides trash bags, gloves, cleaning tools and trash grabbers to volunteer crews that take responsibility for a particular stop.

Kuser told the East County Times she was excited about working with Ball and the potential for bus stop adoptions throughout Dundalk.

"What Angel is doing is amazing and I will do whatever I can to help her," she said. "But we don't own the land where bus stops are located - the local jurisdiction does - so we will need the county's approval to move forward."

The program has few rules, according

"We ask that they perform bi-weekly cleanups and let us know of any problems we need to take care of," she said. "Like if a mattress or something big were to be dumped at a stop, we would pick that up, the volunteers wouldn't be responsible for that. And we discourage picking up drug paraphernalia."

Ball said she is frustrated that, while she is working with state officials and fielding calls and messages from residents ready to volunteer for the program, Baltimore County officials have seemingly turned a deaf ear, first to her specific problem and then to her request for a meeting to discuss the program on a bigger scale.

While Baltimore County Councilman Todd Crandell did not personally communicate with Ball, he posted this comment to Facebook on Jan. 30 after she publicly complained about her benches being removed: "After receiving the initial complaint yesterday about the trash can and benches being removed at Dunmanway and Dunran, I am pleased to report that a resolution to the issue is coming together and I want to thank all those involved."

When that comment was posted, Ball had not yet been informed of any pending resolution and didn't have any idea who "all those involved" were, but she knew she was not among them.

"How can he be working on a resolution to my problem without involving me?" she asked. "This is just ridiculous."

Ball has since been informed that the Dunmanway stop will receive a countyapproved bench and trash can that her staff will install and maintain, though she has not been given a date when that will happen.

She is happy her stop will be restored, but wants the county to see the "big picture" solution the MTA partnership offers.

"My bus stop is not the only problem here - once they opened this can of worms - and this partnership was handed to me through the MTA," Ball wrote in a message to the Times. "It is a much larger picture than just the bus stop on Dunmanway."

Kuser said that, other than complaints about buses missing a stop or being late, littered bus stops generate the most complaints made through MTA.

"We know our bus stops can be a downfall, we know they can be a problem," she said. "That's why the adoption program was started - to work with community residents to clean up these problem spots."

But MTA's hands are tied because they

do not own the land, she said. MTA does not install benches or trash cans - where they exist, local jurisdictions have undertaken the effort.

After meeting with Kuser about the adoption program, Ball sent an email on Feb. 13 to Crandell and County Executive Kevin Kamenetz, explaining the state's adoption program and requesting a meeting with them to discuss how the county could embrace the concept.

Crandell has not formally responded to the email, according to Ball, but he did send a text message to her private cell phone the evening that she sent the email which stated, "I've been in touch with Bryan Sheppard consistently and spoke with him today after seeing your email. I agree that you have been more than patient. He will be in touch with you shortly - a solution is coming."

Ball and Kuser are both mystified at the lack of communication and the perception that the county is not willing to support a program that will beautify many local areas while also putting the responsibility for cleanup in the hands of volunteers. That volunteer effort would theoretically free up county workers to do other work, both believe.

"Angel's effort here is making the county and the councilman look good and I don't understand the lack of response to the request for a meeting," Kuser said.

Ball said she has verbal commitments from at least five parties willing to adopt a bus stop but needs the county's stamp of approval to move forward.

She understands there might be budget limitations to having benches installed, as Sheppard - an assistant to Kamenetz - pointed out, but believes tackling the problem has to start somewhere.

"I just want an agreement with the county to support us and then I am willing to do the work to get this rolling," Ball said. "This could be a good partnership that benefits the county, neighborhoods and MTA - it should be a no-brainer.

"And I've got plenty of good samaritans lined up and ready to go."

'Rec-storation' happening in two east-side state parks

Restoration of water quality in recreational spaces is happening on Baltimore County's east side in the form of two stormwater management (SWM) projects in area state parks.

As part of Governor Larry Hogan's regional cabinet meeting in Baltimore County on Feb. 12, Department of Natural Resources Secretary Mark Belton visited one of the projects, a bioretention and living wall facility, located in the Hammerman Beach area of Gunpowder State Park in Middle River.

The facility consists of a SmartSlope living wall and a bioretention pond populated with native plants to capture and treat stormwater runoff from the adjacent parking lot before it makes its way to the tidal Gunpowder River and the Chesapeake Bay. It was designed and planned using \$81,500 in seed money

from the Chespeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays Trust Fund's Innovative Technology Fund, and constructed, beginning in October 2017, with roughly \$106,000 from the CACB fund itself.

SmartSlope is a vegetated retaining wall system that utilizes open-celled precast concrete modules and polymeric reinforcement strap, according to a fact sheet for the project. It was constructed by Furbish which produces the concrete blocks that make up the wall.

The tiered, open-celled retaining wall creates habitat for native plants not only on top of but growing within the wall itself.

Michael Furbish said the idea is to create the structure, but to also allow plants to grow through it to reduce the impervious surface. This also helps mitigate the urban heat island effect associated with paved and concrete surfaces in summer.

"All these pockets will be filled with

plants," Furbish said. "And when things go right you won't see any concrete at all."

Bryan Seipp, watershed manager with the Center for Watershed Protection, said planting on the wall is about 85 percent complete, and when the weather becomes more agreeable in the next month or so, they will finish the job.

The project is expected to be fully complete by this spring.

Ranger Dean Hughes, assistant manager for Gunpowder Falls, North Point and Hart-Miller Island state parks, said prior to the project the entire area was a steeply declining slope from the parking area down to the public beach.

"What we had was a lot of clay and densely compacted soils. And the visitors had made their preferences known for where they wanted to go," he said, referencing the path worn into the slope where beachgoers traversed from the building or parking lot to the beach instead of using the path built for that purpose.

Hughes said during storm events the water would run off the parking lot down the slope and erode the beach below, as well as the slope itself due to the worn path.

"Big channels would get cut right through [the sand] into the water," he said. He was happy to see the project completed to slow down the runoff water, reduce the beach erosion and create a positive, aesthetically pleasing addition to the park.

The second project, currently under construction at North Point State Park in Edgemere, involves replacing the main gravel parking lot with pervious pavers that allow storm water to permeate through rather than run off, according to Seipp.

That lot, Seipp said, is close to the water and has been a "constant" problem for the park due to its condition and their inability to properly manage the parking there because of the lack of striping or lane markers on the lot.

"So it takes a lot of effort for them to sort of manage people parking during busy times," he said.

The new pavers, while providing a more manageable parking structure, will allow storm water to seep into the lot itself and into the ground or make its way slowly to an existing SWM facility that has reverted into a wetland, rather than running off into the bay.

"So where people park is essentially pavers with big gaps in them and large gravel beds underneath that allow water to be stored and infiltrate into the ground," Seipp said.

The project is mandated to be completed by Memorial Day to avoid the peak park visitation season. And while Seipp was confident they will meet that deadline, he was concerned that the cold, rainy weather has already slowed their progress.

"I think as the weather is projected to be this week, we're really struggling," he said Tuesday, Feb 20. "We're still working, but it slows us down a bit."

Still, he anticipates finishing the project by the end of March or in mid-April.



Due to the design of the blocks, all of the spaces within the wall can be seeded with plants to grow in and actually make it stronger. And a new path directs visitors around the wall.

Assembly, multiple BCPS administrators, board of education representatives, principals, teachers and PTA members.

The bill, which has unanimous support in the Baltimore County House Delegation, would charge the task force with studying current disciplinary actions for students found responsible for violations of the Baltimore County Public Schools' bullying policy, and studying the range of disciplinary sanctions for those violations.

"What we're aiming at is uniformity," said Miele. "A lot of parents feel that some sanctions are a little bit too lenient, some are a little more severe. What we're really driving at is making sure that uniform disciplinary policy is applied across Baltimore County."

The bill would also charge the task force with determings whether creating a county-wide anti-bulying campaign is necessary.

"This is sort of civility training, goldenrule type training," said Miele. "We all want a good education for our kids, but after what happened in Florida, after a gun was brought to this campus, after a gun was brought to Loch Raven... safety is the most important thing. Kids can't focus on learning if they're too worried about whether or not they're physically safe, or whether or not they're going to be emotionally abused by their classmates."

The task force will also look at the possibility of expanding e-learning to more egregious and repeat offenders. Current policy does not allow for a student to be expelled outright. Instead, the child is either placed in an alternative school for up to the remainder of the year or they are placed in home and hospital

learning. But, according to Miele, some offenders have already been given too many chances.

"We don't want these kids to get kicked out of the system and ruin their life; that's not our goal," he said. "But if they demonstrate over a period of time that they're just not equipped to behave in a way that's conducive to everybody else's learning... then they probably don't belong in a general student population and we need to explore what that looks like - whether or not we're going to expand our e-learning abilities so they can get their degree online."

While Miele would like the antibullying task force to make disciplinary recommendations, the first-term delegate already has one punitive measure in mind - revoking an offender's driver's license.

The proposed legislation, HB 1474, would require the Motor Vehicle Administration to revoke a person's driver's license or privilege for one to three years if the person is convicted of carrying or possessing a firearm on school property under certain circumstances. While bringing a firearm or replica onto school grounds is already illegal, Miele thinks there needs to be more of a disincentive.

"We have to be innovative and creative in how we are going to think about solutions, and how we're going to think about deterrents to disincentivize kids from bringing firearms to school," he said.

While Miele and other lawmakers look to come up with new solutions, some parents are calling for more drastic measures.

"We had a shooting at this school, but what have we done to make this not happen here again?" Graves asked. "Maybe we need metal detectors. D.C.

has metal detectors in their schools."

While disciplinary issues continue to plague BCPS, many - including parents, board of education members, teachers and legislators - have called for an examination of students being sent to county schools while residing in the city. Before addressing his transportation safety issues, Miele threw cold water on the notion that the ills of BCPS should be put on the shoulders of purported city students illegally attending county schools.

Addressing comments on a social media post regarding the recent Perry Hall gun incident, Miele said that accusations that offenders were from outside the Perry Hall area were not factual, noting that every student involved in the incident except one lives in the Perry Hall area.

"Our community values are such that every Baltimore County resident and parent has the same dreams for their kids," he said in an impassioned aside.

On March 2, the House of Delegates Judiciary Committee will hold a second hearing on the driver's license revocation bill at 1 p.m. On March 9, Miele has a triple-header in front of the House Ways and Means Committee. The committee will hold hearings on the anti-bullying task force bill, a new drug awareness campaign bill and a bill aimed at punishing the falsification of residency records for the purpose of attending county schools with a fine.

Other area legislators have bills pertaining to BCPS slated for upcoming hearings. Delegate Robin Grammer (R-7) has a hearing scheduled on March 8 in front of the House Appropriations Committee for his bill seeking to enact a legislative audit of BCPS. Delegate Bob Long (R-6) also has legislation being considered. Long has been pushing his bill, requiring active assailant training and drills at schools, since 2016. That hearing will also be held on March 2.

"This is a good bill that ensures we continue to work together, and this provides accountability to the School Board," said Long. "We must do everything in our power to ensure the safety of our schools and to provide a safe learning environment."

Bevins plans continued focus on constituent service, bettering district if reelected

Two-term Sixth District County Councilwoman Cathy Bevins, a Democrat, filed for reelection to her post last Thursday, Feb. 15. And if reelected, she plans to continue doing much of what she believes has gotten her elected twice already.

Bevins frequently touts her focus on and accomplishments with regard to constituent service since that is how she got her start in local government and a large part of what she has done while in office.

"My first job in government was serving as the constituent services coordinator for former County Executive Jim Smith where I was able to personally assist 5,000 east-side residents," she said in a statement announcing her reelection campaign. "As a councilwoman, constituent services remains a top priority and my office has successfully handled 5,500 constituent issues since 2010."

On the legislative side, Bevins told the *East County Times* she has also sponsored and helped pass several pieces of legislation to improve the quality of life in the district, which includes Middle River, White Marsh, Rosedale, Parkville, Overlea, parts of Perry Hall and some more western communities.

One bill in particular that stuck out in her mind was the one that instituted background checks for recreation council volunteers, which passed in 2014.

"How can we have tens of thousands of volunteers in Baltimore County and not know who they are or where they've been," Bevins remembered thinking at the time. "Even the lunch ladies in schools have to get background checks."

Some may not have thought it would be a difficult bill to pass, but it was for her, she said, because County Executive Kevin Kamenetz opposed the measure on the grounds that it would be an added financial burden for the county.

"But I stood my ground," she said, "and I think it was the toughest thing I've ever done since I've been in office."

The councilwoman added that she is happy to support other councilmembers' bills if they make sense to her.

"I support legislation that I think is a good fit for my district," she said, no matter the sponsor's party affiliation.

Bevins said she has been able to successfully attract businesses and high-paying jobs to her district, mostly in the area of the Route 43 extension in Middle River.

Route 43 was built for jobs, she said, particularly those projected through the federal government's military Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) program.

But when that fell through, the county had to figure out another way to attract them. So the County Council created an overlay district for the area around the highway which allowed residential uses and paved the way for the massive Greenleigh at Crossroads development now under construction.

Naysayers said, according to Bevins, that it would lead to the area being developed entirely for residential and not bringing the desired jobs.

"But I knew that wasn't true because I knew how it worked at Maple Lawn," she said, referring to the Howard County project after which Greenleigh was modeled.

There are now some 6,000 jobs located along the Route 43 extension in Middle River, with major employers including coffee and liquor distributors, a candy manufacturer and Stanley Black and Decker which recently announced its relocation to the area.

Bevins has faced criticism in recent years for the amount of development happening in the Sixth District since she took office, as well as the amount of campaign donations she has received from developers, with some saying she is beholden to them to grant approval for their projects.

But the councilwoman called that "absolute nonsense."

"I wish that people knew how many times I've said no" to developers, she said.

Bevins pointed out that she declined in 2012 to rezone several properties along Ebenezer Road in Middle River to allow for 1,200 new homes to be built.

In 2016, she similarly denied a development plan for 80 new townhomes off Allender Road in White Marsh, instead obtaining Project Open Space (POS) funds to purchase and preserve the land for public use as part of a larger 100-acre tract. Bevins pointed out that Michael Paul Smith, son of Jim Smith, was the

development attorney for that project.

"The community didn't want it and I said no," she said. "So now there's 100 acres of contiguous land in front of the Bowerman-Loreley Beach community that can never be developed."

While she said she could not stop development of what is known as the Tito property along Bird River Road in Middle River, admitting that the owner of that property has donated to her campaigns, she did turn down what could have been a much more dense project there. She also obtained POS funds for a nearby 12-acre property at Wampler Road which already had an approved development plan and the needed zoning.

Regarding the donors to her campaigns, Bevins advised critics to look at the campaign finance reports of her colleagues on the County Council as well, noting that they have many of the same donors, including developers.

"People who are doing business in Baltimore County, whether they are real estate, big business or small business, they want good representation on every level of government, [especially at the local level]. They want a person who is making good decisions," she said, adding that they will support them and want to keep them in office.

As for her plans for the future, Bevins said she will push for a new Police Athletic League (PAL) center for Middle River, as well as a new technical high school for the area.

Programs at the school, she told the

Times, could include an automotive program focusing on boats, as well as marine biology and even the science of farming since those are disciplines highly related to the area.

"With 200 miles of waterfront between Dundalk and Middle River, I think that would be something that could really serve a huge population," she said.


Although there have been rumors that Bevins could see a primary challenger in this election, none had filed as of press time. However, the councilwoman has said in the past that as an incumbent she believes she should not have a primary challenger.

"I just feel like I'm doing a good job," she said. "I'm a Democrat in a purple district that has survived two elections."

She added that, at the end of the day, regardless of her party affiliation, she's just Cathy Bevins who works with communities to address their needs. And the 5,500 constituents' issues resolved is "proof that we do the work," she said.

Bevins said she does not currently have a time in mind when, should she continue to be elected, she would decide to retire or move on. But she is only nearing the end of her second term and "things take time," she noted.

"I'm running in 2018, I'm enjoying this job, my staff wants to continue to do the work and I don't know what I'll do four years after that," she said. "At the end of the day, people just want someone they can count on, and I think people know they can count on Cathy."

Rosedale man sentenced for false imprisonment

Nicholas Hipley, 37, of Rosedale was sentenced on Feb. 16 to 30 years in prison for False Imprisonment and Assault in the Circuit Court for Baltimore County.

Hipley was convicted by a jury on Jan. 17. Hipley had become enraged with his girlfriend because she suggested that he shouldn't brag about being previously in prison. Hipley put a knife to the victim's throat and then duct taped her wrists together. Hipley told the victim he was going to kill her and was calling people to help clean up after he did so. The victim was able to break free and fled with her two year old daughter.

Hipley has been previously convicted of second degree arson in 2014, reckless endangerment in 2007 and possession of an unregistered shotgun in Maryland. In addition he was convicted of possession of a regulated firearm in an incident involving shots fired at police officers in New Jersey. He was sentenced to seven years in prison for that offense.

The thirty year sentence imposed on Feb. 16 was by Judge Susan Souder. The case was prosecuted by Ian Wright

Police still searching for suspects in Rosedale assault of 14-year-old boy

State police warn of prank callers using MSP number

After receiving multiple calls on Feb. 15 from people as far away as Hawaii, Maryland State Police investigators are making this public notification that unknown suspects are apparently using a web-based service to make prank calls throughout the country that appear as if they are from the State Police Criminal Enforcement Division.

Some people are reporting they received an automated message informing them that an "internet crime has been committed" and they are instructed to contact the Maryland State Police Criminal Enforcement Division at 410-953-8200. Others reported that when they answer the phone, they are met with silence and the number on their caller ID is 410-953-8200. While the number shown on caller ID is the correct phone number for the Criminal Enforcement Division, the Maryland State Police is not making any such calls. Persons receiving this phone call should hang up and ignore the instructions.

There is no apparent connection to extortion or theft, but the calls do cause unneeded concern and inconvenience for the victims and for police.

Current crime trends

Since Jan. 27, there have been four residential burglaries in the area of Punjab Drive in the Essex Precinct. Most cases occurred between 6:20 a.m. and 6:51 p.m. Entry was by breaking glass, prying and physical force.

Since Jan. 7, there have been three commercial burglaries in the Dundalk Precinct that appear to be related. There has been no new activity since Feb. 4. Anyone with information should contact the police.

Dundalk woman testifies in Annapolis on opioid epidemic

Sherri Weems of Dundalk testified in Annapolis on the growing opioid epidemic. Ms. Weems is a volunteer at One Voice/On Our Own Center at 6718 Holabird Avenue where she has been a volunteer for the past three years. She assists by collecting men's and women's clothing, shoes, food and personal hygiene products.

One Voice Center provides peer recovery support services for persons with substance use disorders.

On Our Own promotes wellness and recovery by empowering individuals with psychiatric disabilities to reach their maximum potential through advocacy and peer support.

Ninety-five percent of the people are homeless. Some sleep in tents, alleys, people's porches or wherever they can spend the night. There have been house and car break-ins in the surrounding area. The house next door to the center experienced a break-in and a fire.

In June, Ms. Weems was at the center when a 50 year old homeless man stated, "I am ready for treatment, I am ready today."

The Peer Specialist who was handling this man's case spent half of the morning looking for treatment centers that would have a placement and accept his insurance. She found Mountain Manor in Emmitsburg that would take him. The only problem that remained was

how to get him to Emmitsburg since there was no money in the budget to transport him there.

Since June, this man was in and out of jail and hospitals many times. He was out of control and the center had banned him. She learned that he had recently been released from jail within the past two weeks.

Within 24 hours after his release, the man died from an overdose. Ms. Weems believes that he would have had a good chance of recovery. It would have meant being away from that environment and in a treatment center for thirty days.

Ms. Weems was asked about services from the local Health Department. She responded by saying that she was part of a coalition with the Baltimore County Health Department, local churches and other concerned individuals. However, she said that this coalition is at a stalemate with drug addiction because the community doesn't have treatment centers, homeless shelters or emergency stations.

Delegate Ric Metzgar (R-6) attended this hearing and realized that other counties were addressing the opioid epidemic but could not recall if Baltimore County had addressed this problem. Then Delegate Metzgar decided he was going to do something about it. He is planning an Opioid Town Hall Meeting and waiting for confirmation on a date, time and location.

Marks to introduce bill providing more review of CE's legal settlements

I have decided to introduce legislation that provides greater scrutiny to settlements negotiated by the Baltimore County Executive.

Over the past several years, the Kamenetz administration has negotiated legal agreements that bind taxpayers to millions of dollars. These include settlements from employee lawsuits, as well as a \$30 million agreement that advances affordable housing goals.

The county charter gives the county executive broad power over many governmental decisions; as an example, the County Council can only cut from - not add to - the proposed budget. I believe, however, that we need more scrutiny of these legal agreements that commit the county to hundreds of thousands, and sometimes millions of

dollars in future obligations.

For that reason, I will introduce legislation that would require the county attorney to provide periodic reports of significant litigation to the County Council. It would also require notification to the council of a proposed settlement of any significant litigation, and would allow a council member to object to a proposed settlement and have the matter placed on a council agenda for a vote. The bill also provides a definition of the terms "significant litigation" and "settlement" and provides for a notification process.

I believe this is simple "good government" - taxpayers and their elected representatives should have far greater scrutiny of the settlements negotiated by the county executive and his senior staff.

Impallaria responds to Parkland shooting

The shooting in Parkland, Florida was a tragic and sad loss of life. I can't even begin to imagine the pain those kids, families, and that community are going through. After seeing the worst of humanity, I'm certain we'll now witness the best of it in how that community pulls together and supports each other. I was particularly touched by the story of Aaron Feis. Mr. Feis, who died in the shooting, was the school's Assistant Football Coach and Security Guard. He used his own body as a human shield to protect kids and save lives. His selflessness is commendable and he died a hero.

As I watch the news reports and keep an eye on the situation, I cannot help but be concerned that something like this could happen in Maryland. Aaron Feis defended the students heroically with the only weapon he had: his body. He was defenseless and on the wrong end of the barrel from a deranged, evil, and troubled coward. I can't help but ask, what if Mr. Feis had been armed? Would he have been able to neutralize the gunman? Would the gunman, who decided to live, have even committed this act if he was concerned about being shot back? Would Mr. Feis still be with us? These are all valid questions that contribute to the safety of our schools and kids. It's important to take action and learn from past incidents. Expressing remorse only goes so far and doesn't protect our children.

Two weeks ago, I introduced my bill, HB 760, entitled "Handguns - School Employees - Handgun Permits and Carrying Weapons on School Property." In my view, this is the legislation Maryland needs to protect students from evil and insanity. HB 760 is enabling legislation. It would allow local County Boards to decide whether a designated school staff member may carry a handgun on school grounds under certain circumstances. This staff member would still be required to carry a permit and have sufficient

training. Often times, schools employ retired police or veterans and perhaps they could serve as the safeguard. It would be up to the county school board whether or not to allow an employee to carry in the first place, and then to designate an employee that meets the training and permit criteria, should they so decide. This bill doesn't say all school staff may carry. It simply allows the county boards to designate an individual should they choose to do so.

I understand the challenges faced by our fantastic police officers. They do their best with response times and are incredibly heroic, but when all is said and done, there are also times where seconds count, when the police are minutes away. In the rural parts of my district, it can take up to forty-five minutes for police to be able to mount an appropriate response. Allowing designated, trained, and proficient staff members chosen by the County Board to carry would have multiple affects. Primarily, in the event of an incident, the staff member could meet the gunman with force. Additionally, the school no longer becomes a soft target as gunmen won't know who, if anyone, is carrying. The man in Florida didn't want to die. He ran out of the school like a coward. Perhaps others won't commit such acts if they think their life may be in imminent danger. In this case, the faculty member would act as a deterrent.

We've been witnessing numerous school shootings over the years. It's a sad situation and we need to act before Maryland lives are lost. This bill doesn't mandate that there will be armed staff in schools. It merely enables local elected officials to enact a program in conjunction with county police, if they so decide. It also then allows them to determine who they will trust with this duty. My staff and I are fighting for the safety of our kids. What happened in Florida is sickening and action is required to prevent this type of senselessness from happening in our schools.

Dundalk boys basketball lone top seed from the east side

Shortly after noon on Feb. 20, the tournament seedings for boys and girls basketball were released. While there are multiple teams on the east side who have the talent to reach the final, only one was given a top seed - the Dundalk Owls boys basketball team.

Elsewhere, the Chesapeake girls basketball team locked up a No. 2 seed, setting up an opening round contest against Sparrows Point, time and date to be determined. The Bayhawks enter their contest with the Pointers riding a 13-game win streak, with one of those being a 54 - 27 win over Sparrows Point back on Feb. 12. Pikesville, who gave Chesapeake one of two losses on the season, secured the No. 1 seed in the region.

Joining the Dundalk boys in Section 1 of the 3A/ North region are Kenwood (No. 3) and Patapsco





(No. 7). Patapsco will travel to C. Milton Wright for a tough opening contest on Feb. 23, while Kenwood will host Aberdeen on the same date. Kenwood enters the tournament having won three of their last five contests, though the two losses came against strong Franklin and Woodlawn teams. However, the Bluebirds played both of those teams hard, taking their matches to the final buzzer. Franklin just barely slipped past Kenwood by a score of 53 - 52, while Woodlawn won by just six. This is a Kenwood team that is certainly worth keeping an eye on.

In Section 2 of the boys 3A/North region, Parkville will play host to Franklin in an opening round matchup slated for Feb. 23.

On the girls' side of the 3A/North region, Kenwood will host Dundalk in a 4/5 matchup. Kenwood bested Dundalk by nine in their matchup earlier this season, but that took place back in December. Joining Dundalk and Kenwood in Section 2 is Patapsco, who will travel to Bel Air for a first round fight. Rounding out the region is Parkville, who will travel to Lansdowne for their opening match. As of press time, the dates and times for this set of matches have yet to be determined.

In the 1A/North region, the Overlea boys and Chesapeake boys will host Loch Raven and Carver, respectively. Sparrows Point has the unenviable task of taking on a very strong Randallstown team.

The Eastern Tech girls locked up the No. 3 seed in the 2A/North region, securing a bye to the second round where they will travel to take on Forest Park. That game is set for Feb. 27. The Maverick boys, securing a No. 6 seed, will have to travel to face a familiar foe in Hereford in the first round on Feb. 23.

As far as projecting the tournament goes, the Dundalk boys certainly have the easiest path to the finals. They were fortunate enough to get paired up with C. Milton Wright as the No. 2 seed in their section, as opposed to Woodlawn who took the No. 2 seed in Section 1. While C. Milton Wright is no easy matchup, being able to avoid Woodlawn and Milford Mill for a while should have the Owls smiling. Then



Don't be late in checking out 'Early Man'

There is something quite refreshing and even wonderful about seeing a film from Aardman Studios and director Nick Park. In this era of hyper-slick, computer generated animation, to view that rare film that is completely old-school, stop-motion animation - it just fills me with appreciation. And on top of that, you get good dialogue; cheeky, British humor; and a quirky, involving plot. Those are almost bonuses!

The film is set in prehistoric times. In a nutshell, it follows a tribe of primitive hunters and gatherers who are displaced from their valley by invaders from a distant empire who have mastered the art of bronzemaking. One tribesman named Dug (voice of Eddie Redmayne) attempts to win his home back (and the coveted bronze deposits that go with it) by challenging his conquerors to a game of soccer.

This is the actual plot, folks! And while it's a bit thin, it's definitely enough of a story for Park and his animators to populate with their usual band of oddball characters and hang a wealth of silly gags on. Where other films would try and graft onto this Stone Age vs. Bronze Age tale social or political statements about any number of modern-day slights and outrages, "Early Man" is content to make the bulk of its story about... well... soccer!

Park is the talent behind the great "Wallace and Gromit" franchise. So, if you are familiar with those films, you'll know what kind of a vibe this flick grooves to from its goofy opening sequence showing the extinction of the dinosaurs to its end credits.

The good guys are all varying degrees of dimwit, with Dug having only slightly more intelligence and gumption - enough to allow him to propel the plot. He is certainly winning as the lead, but Timothy Spall's tribal leader Bobnar is the more perfect idiot that you'll want in the form of some fast-food kids' meal toy. Also having a ball in the studio sound booth is Tom Hiddleston, who voices the bad guys' leader Lord North with a faux French accent that is one of the film's biggest delights. Maisie Williams' Goona as a pan seller who turns out to be an exceptional soccer player is also a delight.

The initial soccer (or "football") sequences are hysterical, like when Dug tells his fellow tribe mates to "attack the ball," and they take him literally. Then there is the nutty bit about not being able to use your hands during game play... meaning you can't touch the ball OR punch your opponent in the face and steal the ball while he lies unconscious.

Nitpicks? A few. I am not one of those Americans who elevates British humor as SO much funnier or more sophisticated than the yuks we generate on this side of the Atlantic. So, honestly, there were gags and one-liners here that the literature professors in the audience chuckled at that I just didn't get. The film is also a bit leisurely paced for my tastes.

But all in all, "Early Man" is a highly enjoyable movie with a mix of broad and heady humor that will appeal to both the knuckle-draggers and the firestarters among us.

'Black Panther' roars like a lion

I'm starting to marvel at how Marvel Studios is finding new beats and rhythms to play nearly 20 films into the Marvel Cinematic Universe. The last several flicks in the MCU have actually been some of the best comedies of their respective years - everything from "Thor: Ragnarok" to "Ant-Man" to "Guardians of the Galaxy." But this universe is now big enough to hit audiences with some meaty, character driven drama too, as evidenced in stretches of "Captain America: Civil War." So far, it's pretty much all worked.

And it's still working in "Black Panther," a film that skews more towards drama than comedy and throws in a good bit of social commentary too. Directed and co-written by Ryan Coogler of "Creed," it's set primarily in the fictional African nation of Wakanda that centuries earlier was struck by a meteorite containing the alien metal vibranium. Back then, a warrior ingested a special herb that had been mutagenically affected by the otherworldly alloy and gained superhuman speed and strength. He became the first Black Panther, and he and his offspring have ruled benevolently ever since.

Over time, the Wakandans also used vibranium to develop highly advanced technology. Fearful of a world that for centuries had been marked by greed, warfare, bloodshed and bigotry, the Wakandans have chosen to isolate themselves, using their tech to essentially cloak their country and pose as a Third World nation.

The film picks up after the events of "Captain America: Civil War" in which King T'Chaka is killed and Prince T'Challa (Chadwick Boseman) must assume the throne AND the Black Panther responsibilities. T'Challa answers the call. However, elsewhere in the world is a bitter man named Erik (an absolutely sensational Michael B. Jordan), who also has royal blood but has grown up without a father in '90s-era South Central Los Angeles. He eventually joins the American military to escape his gang-infested surroundings and becomes an exceptional killer.

It's not long before he adopts the moniker "Killmonger" and challenges for the throne. But unlike T'Challa, he believes in world change by any means necessary and is bitter to learn that Wakanda has thrived for centuries in secret while people of color have struggled under slavery and oppression.

One of the only problems I have with "Black Panther" is it makes the title hero the blandest character in the film. There are many times where he is the least interesting character in a scene. Honestly, Jordan's Killmonger in this film is a vastly more compelling character. I can't

recall a Marvel movie in which the "bad guy" was quite this justified in his motivations and eventual actions. Now, of course, Erik is also a stone-cold murderer who must be stopped by the film's end. But there's real hurt and drive to the man. And he's wonderfully cocky and inappropriate throughout to all he sees as



Chiefly, there's Okoye (Dania Gurira), a Wakandan general and the country's fiercest warrior; Nakia (Lupita N'yongo), T'Challa's former lover; Shuri (Letitia Wright), T'Challa's snarky kid sister and tech guru, who serves as Q to his James Bond; and Queen Ramonda (Angela Bassett), T'Challa's newly widowed mother.

It's a wealth of good characters who, again, often minimize Black Panther in his own movie. My only other nitpick with "Black Panther" is that there is too little of Killmonger for the first half of the film. If anything, we're led to believe Andy Serkis' kooky arms dealer Ulysses Klaue is the main bad guy. But it feels more like the producers fell in love with having Serkis (the magnetic actor known for motion capturing Gollum, King Kong, Supreme Leader Snoke and Caesar the ape) in their film in a live-action role and just turning

The problem is, Serkis almost thinks he is making a CGI film here. He's so over animated in his gestures. You know how Johnny Depp can no longer believably speak in real life? He sounds like a guy who had a stroke a few years back and has used daily shots of Scotch as part of his physical therapy. I don't know if Serkis knows how to move and react in a normal fashion anymore without wearing a motion-capture suit.

All is forgiven, though, in a second half that features some very sweet payoffs. I already want to see these characters back in the next "Avengers" film! I want to see a mash-up of Wakanda and Zamunda with shameless McDowell's and Soul-Glo product placement throughout! I want...

Ahem, I just want a "Black Panther 2."




