




Amith's favorite quote is from Michael Jordan:"Some people want it to happen; some wish it would happen, others make it happen."



History comes alive in New Almaden

A lmaden's vibrant history is being brought to life through the restorations of Casa Grande, the Almaden Chinese Ting and the New Almaden Quicksilver Mining Museum.

Traveling along Almaden Road in New Almaden is like taking a trip back in time. There, you will find an outdoor mining museum, historic adobe homes and Casa Grande, the crown jewel of the community.

"New Almaden is a gem," says Casa Grande docent Mike Boulland, "and people don't even know it exists."

I start my exploration at Casa Grande, where Boulland leads me through its corridors, asking me to see through an adventurer's eves.

We journey to the basement, where he points out doorways topped with square lintels and adobe brick walls. "There are old stories the bricks are telling," he says. "Here there was a doorway," he says, pointing out its outline in the bricks and a thick block of wood inlaid between them. "Here is where the old staircase was," he says, indicating two parallel diagonal lines etched into the opposite wall. "Understanding brings history alive."

The Ting

When we come across an old picture of the Ting, a pagoda-like structure which adorned the Casa Grande garden around 1861, Boulland's eyes sparkle. The planned restoration of the Ting positively thrills him.

Currently, eight intricately-carved wooden poles are all that remain of the structure, but a project committee, made up of members of the Almaden Rotary Club, New Almaden Quicksilver County Park Association and the Chinese community, is working to raise funds to restore this piece of New Almaden and Casa Grande's history.

"It's one of the most fantastic things I've ever come across," says Boulland. "I feel like Indiana

Jones in discovering the Ting's craftsmanship and what the objects represent. The poles have a significant history because of the symbol of the huge long (dragon), carved on them. They tell the story of the emperor and the history of the Chinese people. It's important to tell its story."

One day in August, the committee gathered to examine the poles and try to discover the meaning of the 166-year-old Chinese carvings. "The tremendous excitement in everyone's bodies was created and felt with each pole uncovering," says Boullad in a pamphlet. "Jennie Chan-Yeung and Adam Min, two Chinese community representatives, began to read the wooden carvings imprinted on each pole and decode the centuries-old Chinese legend."

The koi jumping the Dragon's Gate, along with the dragon's eyes and claws, tell the story of the transformation of the mighty long, while the clouds depict the emperor's journey from the earthly ground to the heavens. "The Chinese are descended from the emperor," says Boulland. "On the dragon poles, they're looking up their ancestry."

Boulland believes the Ting was gifted to the

New Almaden mine manager by 9th Qing Emperor of China in the mid-1850s. "...the gift acknowledged the kind treatment the emperor's son or the emperor's dignitaries received when they visited the Almaden Mines, seeking to obtain information regarding cinnabar," says the pamphlet.

Research is underway to determine the Ting's origins. "The carvings are reminiscent of Hong Kong, but the wood may not be from China," says Min. "It's a mystery who created it." Min notes that the dragons on the poles have four claws, indicating a prince or high official. "Only the emperor's dragon can have five claws," he says. Min has sent photos of the poles to professors in China asking for their assistance.

Seeing the carvings firsthand means a lot to Min. "It's wonderful to know that about 160 years ago Chinese culture was preserved in the United States," he says. "It makes Chinese immigrants feel a relationship with the past. Almaden has been my home for 20 years and this makes me feel close to the Chinese heritage here."


"Chinese people worked the mines and contributed to the economy and the mining area,"

says Boulland. "There's a story of Chinese Sam who spoke three languages and became a Chinese boss working the mines with his crew."

"But, as the Ting isn't there," says Michele Dexter, Council Liaison to Councilmember Johnny Khamis, "there's a gap in fully telling the story of the Chinese contribution to history. The vision is to restore it and put it where it belongs and include this history with school children visiting Casa Grande."

"It would be a great way to highlight the diversity of our community," says Councilmember Johnny Khamis. It's important to me to highlight the contributions of all ethnicities to our city and especially to our district."

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

About the National Geographic Bee



The New Almaden Quicksilver Mining

We catch up with Kitty Monahan, President for the New Almaden Quicksilver County Park Association, at the New Almaden Mining Blacksmith, now located in Casa Grande's carriage

Throwing open the doors to the blacksmith, Monahan reveals artifacts from the mining days, including enormous bellows, tools, wooden water pipes and a saddle from when Virl Norton and his mule, Leroy, raced across the country from New York to California in the Great American Horse Race in 1976.

Returning to Casa Grande, we enter the mining museum, which features display cases filled with cinnabar, life-sized dioramas of mine tunnels with ore cars, mining equipment, period clothing, and medicinal mercury. Photographs and artifacts from Cornish, Mexican and Chinese mining families depict the diverse community which lived and worked together.

The original site of the Almaden Mining Museum was the Carson-Perham Adobe, built around 1848. The adobe was owned by George Carson, postmaster and bookkeeper for the mines. From 1949 to 1983, Constance "Connie" Perham and her husband Douglas ran the museum from their home, featuring their collection of mining artifacts. Behind the museum was the blacksmith shop, with the Ting's poles forming its entrance

Wandering into the house proper, we journey through an antique-furnished parlor, library and drawing room reflecting the lifestyle of a mine manager's family.

In 1854, mine manager Henry Halleck hired Francis Meyers to redesign the threeroom Casa Grande as it was too small for a man of his stature. The ensuing 27-room mansion served as the official residence and office for a succession of mine superintendents, as well as a country weekend retreat for wealthy mine investors until 1892. The grounds were landscaped by John McLaren, who designed San Francisco's Golden Gate Park.

In the 1900s, Casa Grande was sold to Ben Black, who made it into a resort. Casa Grande served as a tourist resort known as Club Almaden from the 1920s to 1950s. Families came from San Francisco to swim in its pools and relax on its sprawling lawn. In the late 1930s, Black added a bar with a brass rail and a beveled mirror, along with a platform for dancing. It became a theater in the '30s, continuing to

From 1964 to 2000, it was home to The Opry House. In 1997, the Santa Clara Parks Department bought the property, relocating the mining museum there. In 2009, they renovated Casa Grande, adding period rooms and removing the opera house and bar.

A rich history: The New Almaden Quicksilver Mines

The New Almaden Quicksilver Mines were the largest mercury-producing mines in North America and fueled California's gold rush. The rock they were mining was cinnabar, and when you cook cinnabar and condense the vapor, you get liquid mercury.

From 1845 to 1976, the mines made about \$70 million in profits from producing 84 million pounds of liquid mercury. Quicksilver was the leading reduction agent used to separate gold and silver from its ore and used for everything from Civil War explosives to Victorian glass and 20th century battery cells and thermometers. Mercury was once thought to contain medicinal properties, and perhaps even grant immortality.

The New Almaden mining area encompassed 4,000 acres and included seven mines and three communities, including English Camp, for Cornish and other English-speaking miners and Spanish Town, for Mexicans and Chileans miners. Single miners lived in boarding houses, while families lived in homes on the hills. Miners could also pitch tents or build cab-

While stopping at the Santa Clara Mission, Mexican Cavalry Officer Captain Andres Castillero discovered that the red rock used as paint by the local Ohlone was cinnabar. At New Almaden, the natives brought him up a trail to Deep Gulch and a red cave. Excited by this discovery, he started the main mercury mine right below it and set up camp on the valley floor for two years, taking a donkey trail to English Camp.

In 1847, he hired additional workers from Mexico and started the main tunnel outside Spanish Town to access the rich cinnabar vein. When Castillero returned to Mexico, he was drafted into the Mexican-Spanish War and had to surrender his

Castillero sold the mines to Barron, Forbes Company, an English textile company based in Mexico. Alexander Forbes built much of New Almaden, and is responsible for its name, but eventually gave up the mines to set up Forbes Mill in Los Gatos. In 1863, acting on information that title to the mine was in dispute. Abraham Lincoln attempted to seize it, but

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

the federal agent and deputy federal marshal were met at the mine gates by armed miners. Not wanting to risk the loyalty of California during the Civil War, the federal government withdrew, allowing Barron, Forbes Company to sell it to American investors for \$1.75 million. The mines changed ownership many times throughout their 131 years of operation, including ownership by María Zacarías Bernal de Berryessa.

The Outdoor Mining Museum

The Outdoor Mining Museum is situated at the base of the New Almaden Quicksilver County Park at the former site of the Hacienda Reduction Works. It contains a collection of equipment from the New Almaden and Guadalupe mines, including a wooden Cornish pump used to pump water out of the mine shafts and a rotary furnace used for extracting mercury from crushed cinnabar ore. It also includes several life-sized paintings of mine workers, Maude the Mule and a dwarf-like figure called a Tommy Knocker. Cornish miners believed that when tools went missing it was because a Tommy took it. During an earthquake, if they heard knocking, they ran out of the mine saying it was the Tommy Knockers warning them.

In 1970, Monahan moved to New Almaden and became hooked on its history. She and a friend regularly rode their horses to the mines. "They'd kick me out again and again, until one day they agreed to teach me about it," she says smiling. "I have a history degree and it's something I like to be a part of. There's so much to learn about how the United States was formed and California came into being and New Almaden is a part of that.

"It's extremely important for kids today to realize what happened in New Almaden, the Silicon Valley of its time," says Boulland. "I've also fallen deeply in love with the history of the area. It's very colorful and leads kids on a treasure hunt of adventure"



LEGAL ADVICE

How important are the terms of a contract for my small business transactions?

This week's question:

"Dear Steve, I have a small business and routinely enter into contracts with clients, vendors, etc. How important are the terms in these agreements, or will any writing do?"

While perhaps a bit biased since I am a lawyer, contract terms are very important. Generally speaking, for a small business, you can create a set of strong forms on the front end that can then be filled in for each contract you enter into with clients, vendors, etc. Without appropriate terms in your contracts, you can definitely be left holding the bag, so to speak.

This writer gets a lot of litigation work from contracts (including wills and trusts) that were not properly drafted, whereas some diligence at the time of drafting would have greatly reduced the probability of litigation. With that said, let us have a look at what the elements of a binding contract are under California law, as well as what is required in court to prove a breach of contract.

When one party to a contract files a complaint in court to seek relief for wrongdoing against another party, the typical legal actions are based on negligence (in a nutshell, breach of a basic duty of care), or breach of contract (breach of a written or oral agreement). Here we shall discuss written contracts only, and oral contracts are a whole other ball game, and much tougher to enforce in a court of law. After all, without a writing signed by both parties setting forth all the terms, it is truly a "he said, she said" fight. And court actions are expensive, so you want to have a strong chance of prevailing should you ever have to set foot in a civil court of law over a business or personal contract dispute.


Legally speaking, a contract is a binding obligation between two or more persons based on a mutual understanding, or agreement, of the parties. If one of the parties fails to meet its obligations under the contract, this is termed a breach of the contract.

To prevail in court on a breach of contract claim, one must prove the basic elements of the cause of action. First, the parties must have intended to create a binding obligation between them. Second, the parties must contract to perform a legal act. Third, each party must either give up something or transfer some benefit to the other party, which is referred to as consideration – both parties must get something of benefit from

the other, although the exchange need not be equal. Fourth, the basic essential terms of the contract must be agreed between the parties, which typically includes the parties, and what each will give the other, and when.

Once it is established that a binding

contract exists, the party bringing the lawsuit alleging breach of the contract must show that the other party did not perform its obligations, and also must prove that damages were suffered as a result of same. For example, if I agree to pay my friend Mike \$35,000 for his used Ford F150 Raptor truck, and I pay him and then he fails to give me the truck and tender title, I have clearly been damaged. However, most breach of contract lawsuits will result



Another key factor in breach of contract actions is whether the party that wins can get attorney's fees from the losing party. In most breach of contract actions, this will not be available absent a contract term that specifically provides attorney's fees to the prevailing party. Without this clause in a contract, bringing a lawsuit can be very challenging due to the cost of hiring an attorney to fight the battle in court, as it will eat into any award.

As per my usual advice in this column, some proactivity on the front end will give you much more protection in the event of your having to file a breach of contract lawsuit. Often, you can use the strong contract terms to get the other party to perform, with their seeing they will likely lose in court, and pay the winning party's attorney's fees, in addition to their own.


March comes in like a lion

After a dismally dry February, March has come in like a lion.

Rain and snow has fallen in the mountains surrounding Santa Clara Valley, and the forecast shows several more storms on their way. While unanticipated stream or storm drain blockages could always cause localized flooding during a rainstorm, we do not currently anticipate any



Santa Clara Valley Water District crews have worked all year to prepare our creeks for winter rains. We are dedicated to keeping residents and businesses safe through our flood protection programs.

In preparation for this series of storms, all five of our sandbag sites have been fully stocked. In addition, cities around the county operate an additional 18 sandbag sites.

Our maintenance staff


stands ready with heavy equipment to respond to reports of downed trees or large debris flows in locations where we have property rights. We are monitoring streams for blockages at key bridges and culverts. We need the public's help as our eyes and ears to alert us to obstructions in the creeks and to prevent flooding. To report issues in creeks, residents can call 408-630-2378 or submit a service request to Access Valley Water.

Our ten reservoirs have a combined storage of just 26 percent of their full capacity. This leaves a significant amount of storage space to capture the expected storm runoff. Therefore, we do not anticipate any possibility of our large reservoirs reaching capacity this week or next. The expception is the relatively small Va-

sona Reservoir in Los Gatos, which regularly reaches capacity during the rainy season

California ranked first in honoring gun safety laws

California received an A for its gun safety laws, the highest score of any state according Giffords Law Center.

Giffords Law Center released the latest edition of its Annual Gun Law Scorecard, which grades and ranks each state on the strength of its gun laws.

California boasted the highest score nationwide due to the state's continued emphasis on background checks, prohibiting access to guns by hate crime offenders, and funding urban gun violence reduction programs, among other measures.

This comprehensive, 50state analysis clearly shows how stronger gun laws like background checks help reduce gun death rates and save lives.

Of the 10 states with the

lowest gun death rates, eight have some of the strongest gun laws in the country, receiving a B or better. All eight also have passed private-sale background checks. Those eight states are:

- New Jersey
- Washington

The 10 states with the highest gun death rates have some of the weakest gun laws in the nation—with all 10 receiving an F the Gun Law Scorecard.

and the Rat Pack," Cash Johnson, "Lt. Brannigan," reviewed. This show "has the best chorus numbers by far" of the recent shows we've done, outside of 'Les Miserables' but it's not trying to be 'Les Mis;" Jack Johnson shared.

Production comes to life!

Producer and Director, Mrs. Ashley Coleman, brings this production to life in part as tribute to the rebirth of the PAC. Back in 2006, this was the same show that debuted Pioneer's Performing Arts Center to the public. Partly for the nostalgia of it all, she's chosen this production. "It's a special show and it has a special place in my heart. We of course have the talent to pull it off, and it's turning out brilliantly well," Mrs. Coleman reflected. "In tribute to the multitude of acting talent in this show, Coleman said "watching this come together, I believe this show is shaping up to be even better than the one all those years ago!"

Pioneer productions are known regionally for their high level of delivery. Patrons share their disbelief that high school teens can perform at such levels reminiscent of the real deal. Perhaps that's because all of the student cast and crew are fully invested. As Senior Jessica Ventura describes, "As a freshman, I compared all the local schools for their drama programs and settled on Pioneer. I made the right choice and never looked back."

To the last, each of the students interviewed talked about the family-feeling aspect of the program, the mutual respect and support between each of the very large 84 person cast and crew, and especially how that's all evident in the finished product. Sophomore Emily Nguyen caught drama fever as a freshman accidentally entered into Beginning Drama. Embracing it as the opportunity it was, she went on to audition for her first musical, even convincing her older sister to do the same, sang in a huge four-part harmony chorus and was hooked.

Much like the performers, audience members attending "Guys and Dolls" fall in love with the characters. Differentiating this drama program from all the rest comes down to character development. The cast learns about their character thoroughly from leads all the way through ensemble members, developing every one of those characters both before and through the plot, and it shows. Audience members believe in the characters and story losing themselves in it because of this rich portrayal.

Quintessential Broadway

"Guys and Dolls" originally debuted on Broadway, transitioning to the big screen with Vivian Blaine reprising her role as "Miss Adelaide," and Marlon Brando, Frank Sinatra and Jean Simmons rounding out the lead roles. What many don't know is Frank Sinatra was apparently jealous that Marlon Brando was cast as "Sky Masterson," and to soothe his hurt pride took Brando's signature song "Luck Be A Lady" to Las Vegas and made it one of his best known hits. Another perhaps surprise, Sinatra did not care at all for Brando. Mrs. Coleman shared that Nathan Lane, who originally portrayed "Nathan Detroit" on Broadway, changed his original legal first name to "Nathan" just because he loved the character so much.

"You'll see a number of performers you've watched develop over their years shine in their given roles in this production." said Mrs. Coleman. Seniors Halliona Bacon, Blake Bertolin, and Jack Johnson take the helm along with junior Isabella Osborne. "This is probably my favorite part of the year," Isabella shared as she gets to know others in a better way outside of school. "I love how many people come out for the show whether a beginner or someone who's been acting since they were eight years old." Describing her character Adelaide: "... for a dumb girl she's pretty smart!"

Jack Johnson shares a take on his character: "Sky Masterson is a cool character; he's always calm, a bit sarcastic, and always prideful. He always believes he's right, and lays it all out there. I see myself a bit in him - when he makes that final pass (in the show) that's



what I'd do. He comes across as prideful, arrogant and suave, but he meets a girl who humbles him, opens his eyes and shows him there's a lot more to life than dice and money."

"This is a quintessential Broadway-type show with something for everyone," Mrs. Coleman observed. "Whether the professional sets, costuming, casting, high-energy show tunes, dancing, or gangster-era draw is your thing, you're sure to find something to love in this show!" She reminds everyone that producing a show like this gives back to the community by providing positive escapism and a joyful night out that is always family-friendly at Pioneer. And, by attending, you're giving back to the arts and supporting the community by showing these teens their endeavors to put positivity into this world is well worth the extremely long hours and hard work.

Student performers give their best!

Many don't realize how much the student performers put into these shows. Most of the participants not only have their normal school day, but they rush off to sports, or rush to their work commitments every day, followed by three hour rehearsals four nights a week. Some try to fit in homework when they're not on stage but many, as Zach Morcate shared, "...I find it too difficult to study here in this environment. You want to focus, you want to know what's coming and you definitely don't want to miss a cue." Somehow they squeeze in homework when they get home and (albeit a very little) sleep, too. They're often up until midnight or 1 a.m. and wake back up at 7 a.m. or earlier. All of the hard work is to share the joy of the finished product with everyone. In this world of so many disturbing sights and sounds we're bombarded with daily, it's a welcome and refreshing break to come together to enjoy this high-energy, fun and funny work of art.'

"The set and the costumes put it all together...The set looks really good this year, and I've heard from others not in the show that they're interested in coming to see this show just because of how amazing and cool the set looks," Halliona shared. "My favorite part of playing my role ("Sarah Brown") is I'm opposite of Jack, and Jack is my best friend. So it makes it easier to interact

with him. Zach is one of my really good friends; too, so playing the with them well...although we've got so many inside jokes we have to work especially hard to portray the serious lines with the serious delivery they deserve."

"It's a really funny show with funny scenes," muses Maxwell Moiseff. "One of my favorite parts is acting along with Blake and Jack - both two years his senior even getting to yell at Blake onstage.'

Costumes and music capture the mood

"I was really excited for the costumes in this show, all the dapper suits and the hat I have is amazsaid Blake Bertolin. ...because of the great costuming this show looks really good. His character, 'Nathan Detroit,' "is a guy in it for the money, but because he grew up in the way of a gangster, he eventually became the head of the crap game and he initiated a way to do things with his life, even if life didn't give him an easy way."

Blake, as well as Jack and Zach, also have previously had a director change in eighth grade and now here in their last year at Pioneer. "Change is hard for everyone. And changing directors, especially in your last year in a program, is challenging. But as I did then I've learned what Mrs. Coleman wants now and I've been able to adapt" which is a great prelude for what they're about to do as they graduate and embrace the change college brings.

Mrs. Marissa Bacon shares her love of music and blending chorus harmonies to the vocal directing of this show. "Making sure everyone feels just as important as anyone else" is an important part of the overall success of this show. To a tee each of the seniors mentioned not only wanting to provide a great performance for Mrs. Coleman's first spring musical, and for themselves, but that they also wanted to continue Mr. Dini's legacy and make sure the level of this show was as good if not better than where he left off."

"Mrs. Coleman doesn't let you get away with messing up. She calls you on it - like if you make a mistake or forget your line. That's great because for me, if I'm not told I've made a mistake I might not know to fix it," shared Ricky Covey. He went on to explain because of this approach, the show is very solidly coming together. "I hope to take the joy of being on stage with me. I'm not planning on pursuing any of this in college, so I just want to stand in the spotlight and soak it all up before it's gone" Halliona mused. Zach shared "Even though it can be tough to balance all the things we have to do in life, it's so important to me that people really try hard and enjoy the time here

within these four years while they have it. Frankly this school provides such an amazing opportunity for all of us" and they give the end product of that back to the community. "I want to leave a longing behind in other students to hopefully inspire them to come be a part of this great, big team we have here," senior Sierra Dallas hopes to leave as her legacy from her experiences.

Alina Petty, seen most recently in a self-choreographed number in "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat," likes challenges, and this show provides her with many. There are multiple lifts and partner work, things she usually does not experience. "I like the fact I get to be sassy and really 'show-offy' in this show", explained Petty "It's been a lot of pressure for her to learn the dances in front of everyone and nerve-wracking for all of the dancers to perform in high heels. 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
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
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
