Dreamcycle's vision: Recycle unused bikes and pass them on

Persons who know how to pick up the ball and run with it.

Dreamcycle, a charitable organization since September 2017, is the brainchild of Nicholas Kenny. Along with cofounders, Bryan Kaing and Nicholas Harder, all three young men attend Evergreen Valley High School

Dreamcycle's vision is to recycle unused bikes in the community and pass them on to nearly 200 underprivileged families in the Bay Area. Bryan Kaing says, "we have successfully collected over 70 and have donated over 40 bikes since our inception. We refurbish the bikes by changing the tires, fixing the brakes, and replacing any other worn out parts to bring the bikes back up to speed."

"We had problems at first getting bike donations and funding. One hurdle was crossed as we organized a bake sale that allowed us to collect money and several bikes." Nicholas Harder said enthusiastically. Finding time to devote to Dreamcycle has become somewhat of a dilemma what with balancing sports, homework, and other interests of these busy youths. They hope to be able to spend more time on the project when

warm weather prevails.

Kaing stated, "Our organization gives to numerous lowincome individuals in our community. Some of these recipients are users of the Learning and Loving Center in Morgan Hill who helps immigrant women and children with education and child care. We also support the Bill Wilson Center in downtown San Jose who helps the homeless and underprivileged in the area."

Kenny related, "The program got off to a great start when we gave a bike to a recovering alcoholic in Willow Glen who needed a dependable source of transportation to her new job. We were contacted by her mother's co-worker who learned about the Dreamcycle program."

Kaing and Kenny are bicyclists, and Kenny is active in track and field. Harder is more the computer type. All three are sons of immigrants who wish to give back to their adopted communities.

The young men's enthusiasm gushed forth as they talked of future plans. They plan to host a bike workshop in the near future (as they get enough bikes) where kids will be able to learn how to repair a bike of their choosing and then take the bike home.

The group needs a sponsor, however they have received substantial donations from family and friends. Ideally, they would appreciate a permanent sponsor to help grow their organization.

Arming teachers will do more harm than good

he killing of the 17 students and school staff in Florida in recent weeks has left all of us reeling and the debate over what is needed to stop future incidents is alive and well. Should we enhance mental health services? Should we enact stricter gun control laws? As we see things, the answer is yes...to both. One thing that absolutely should NOT be done is arming school personnel.

School personnel are in the business of teaching, supporting, and encouraging kids; sharp-shooting is not within their professional skill-set. During an emergency, teachers and school support staff need to be with their students protecting and directing them to the safest possible place, not abandoning them to retrieve a weapon, which presumably would be locked up in some central location.

We are deeply saddened that this is something as educators we even have to think about but we do. We cannot bury our heads in the sand and pretend school shootings don't happen or can't happen here. Each year we work with our excellent San Jose Police Department officers to review Run, Hide, Defend protocols and our staff and students participate in drills, just as they do for fire and earthquake.

But fundamentally, we reject the idea that bringing guns into our classrooms would solve the issues we currently face. In fact we profoundly believe they would make the situation worse. While there is absolutely no research that shows this idea would do a single thing to reduce gun incidents in schools, we can meaningfully assert that bringing deadly weapons onto our campuses would increase the risk to our students and staff. Research shows {link to Harvard Injury Control Research Center study} that the presence of more guns increases the likelihood of gun deaths. When you factor in the low-success rate that even trained law enforcement professionals see when firing a weapon in a violent situation, how can teachers be expected to do even better, and ensure they don't hit something – or someone – they didn't mean to?

Just as law enforcement professionals have, educators from one end of the country to the other have rejected this absurd idea.

Avoid these top five bathroom remodeling blunders

While a bathroom might not be the first room a potential home buyer asks to see, it can make or break the sale. Here are five common mistakes rookie and seasoned flippers as well as homeowners make when renovating a bathroom.

Mistake 1: Ignoring proper spacing and layout

Bathrooms may seem straightforward, but a lack of spatial awareness in the renovation planning stages can lead to problems down the road.

Remember: Just because you can fit something into the bathroom design doesn't mean it can function within that space. Always keep function in the forefront of your mind and in your design.

For example, if you choose a shower with a door, your bathroom layout should leave plenty of room for it to fully open. No potential home buyer will want to squeeze out of a partially opened shower door every morning. Other considerations include providing enough space to comfortably get on and off the toilet, open cabinet doors, etc.

Spatial considerations also include making sure elements of the room are close enough together to function. For example, the toilet paper holder should be within a child's arm's reach of the toilet, and outlets should be easily accessible from the counter.

Mistake 2: Choosing the wrong materials

Because of the sink, toilet and shower, bathrooms deal with more moisture than any other room in the house. Homeowners also use many of the strongest cleaning products on bathroom surfaces. Both of these factors, if not taken into consideration, can lead to significant damage if you don't select the right materials for the job.

Go with materials that can stand up to harsh cleaners and are not highly susceptible to mold, warping or distortion. Avoid porous materials that will retain moisture and allow hidden mold to grow.

Mistake 3: Ignoring storage space

No one complains about having too much storage in the bathroom. When planning a bathroom remodel, incorporate plenty of storage space into the design.

Consider how many people will use the bathroom. Don't make the mistake of providing only enough bathroom storage space for one person in a 4-bedroom house.

Additionally, most people prefer a bit of privacy with bathroom storage, so a set of floating shelves, while helpful, will not be sufficient on its own.

Mistake 4: Forgetting about ventilation

Ventilation isn't a glamorous part of a bathroom renovation, but it is essential. Forgetting to work in enough ventilation can lead to mold, mildew and other costly problems in the future. It can also make a bathroom uncomfortable if it's not proper-

ly ventilated during or after a shower.

If possible, work in a combination of natural and artificial ventilation sources. A well-placed window can go a long way, but it won't be very helpful during cold winter months, when a homeowner won't open it. Make sure to install a quality ventilation fan that can handle the size of the bathroom.


Mistake 5: Putting off lighting plans until the end

Many people think of lighting as a finishing touch to a renovation. While lighting is often installed later in the process, you should plan your lighting fixtures at the beginning of the renovation.

Bathrooms are often where people get ready for the day, which is why lighting is essential. Recessed lighting can create shadows on your face in the mirror, and the last thing you want when trying to sell a bathroom is unflattering lighting. Waiting until the end to address lighting can also lead to dark patches within the bathroom.

Depending on your preferred shower style, you may or may not need lighting above the shower or tub.

Similarly, no one wants to use the toilet in darkness. When drawing up your plans, consider what type of lighting will best accommodate your space and room design. Making adjustments in the planning stages will be much easier than making them at the end of a project.

East Side Alliance announced its partnership with Landed, a company that helps educators buy homes by assisting with a down payment. The announcement held recently at Cedar Grove Elementary School (Evergreen School District) featured speaker **Marissa Hanson**, ESUHD Union President.

East Side Alliance Partners with Landed to help local teachers with housing

Peachers in the Evergreen School District struggling to afford the high cost of housing in Silicon Valley attended the launch of a new initiative that could help many purchase a home.

A special meeting was held at Cedar Grove Elementary School in Evergreen to announce that East Side Alliance (a coalition of eight San Jose school districts) has partnered with the company Landed.

Startup Landed, based in San Francisco, assists local teachers with their down payments totaling 10,000 educators in eight school districts, including Evergreen.

Whenever possible, Landed assists teachers by contributing to the down payment — with the teacher contributing a payment of 10 percent of the home's value, and Landed matching the deposit.

Where does the money come from?

The money comes from investors, who get their 10 percent back when the teacher sells the home, plus 25 percent of any appreciation (or depreciation) in the home's value.

Landed says it's working with the East Side Alliance, a partnership of eight local school districts that serve 85,000 students. Teachers, administrators, and staff that have worked in the school district for at least two years is eligible to receive up to \$120,000 from Landed toward a down payment on a home.

These are the folks who know and understand what this would mean to their classrooms; these are the folks some are proposing take up arms in the classroom, and they are ones saying: No. They are ones saying: Let us do our jobs. Let us teach. If you want to invest in us, then invest in our classrooms. It's time we actually listened to the people at the center of this discussion.

Current proposals to arm as many as 20 percent of teachers across the country, would mean arming as many as 700,000 educators. It's remarkable to consider the costs and time that would go into this mammoth project, time and

resources that could be spent in America's classrooms, on supplies, on technology, on the actual purpose of our life's work – educating our children.

This entire topic is a distraction from the real issue of how to make our schools and our communities safer. Let's have that conversation, let's look toward real solutions and leave a nonstarter like incentivizing our teachers to "pack heat" in the reject bin where it belongs.



Spring season and allergies in pets

pring is the air and so are the allergies. Most pets experience allergies during the spring and summer; so I will try to help you understand allergies in pets.

What is an allergy?

Allergy is a condition in which pet's immune system overreacts to foreign things like fleas, pollen, grass, mold and certain foods etc. These foreign substances are known as allergens that can cause allergic reaction when inhaled or eaten. Just like people, pets may be sensitive to several types of allergens.

Signs of allergies in pets

The most common sign in pets with allergies is itchy skin. Other symptoms include:

- Scratching, biting and chewing at skin, back and feet.
- Rubbing body and face against things like walls.
 - \bullet Excessive licking of paws and belly
 - Hair loss around face, tail and ears
 - Red, swollen ears and ear infections.
- Scooting/rubbing/dragging anal area Why does my pet get allergies?

Most pets inherit allergies from their parents. Also after prolonged exposure to offending allergens your pet might start to experience signs of allergies like biting, chewing and scratching.

How to determine if my pet has allergies?

Your family vet will diagnose allergies based upon physical exam of your pet, symptoms, history and ruling in or out other causes of itching such as fleas, mites, lice, dry skin, bacteria etc.

Your vet may also recommend other diagnostics such as blood tests, skin scrapes, or fungal culture, etc. to pinpoint the problem. Blood tests can determine what exactly your pet is allergic to.

How to treat allergies?

Keep in mind there is no cure for allergies but many different ways to control and treat allergies. For mild allergies like sneezing and coughing, avoiding the

offending allergens like dust may be all that is needed to control allergies. If the pet has more severe symptoms like biting, chewing, scratching etc. then a veterinarian may prescribe medications like steroids, antihistamines, medicated shampoos, fish oil etc.

In some cases, your pet might be put on a special food or a custom diet to rule out food allergy.

Immunotherapy or allergy injections might be recommended by your vet to help

your pet tolerate allergies as prolonged use of steroids might cause serious side effects.

If your pet is allergic to grass or pollen then it might be a good idea to wipe him down with pet wipes after being outdoors. A new drug called Apoquel has shown promising results but the cost can be an issue for pet owners.

Conclusion: Allergies can be painful and uncomfortable for pets, so the goal of treatment is to keep your pet happy, healthy and itch free.

The problem is a difficult concern for the city to address, since the highways are under the jurisdiction of the State of California and must be maintained by Caltrans.

One way to alleviate the problem is for residents to file a Maintenance Service Request (MSR) online www.csr.dot.ca.gov when you see litter, debris, or other maintenance issues on and along our highways.

strength of its gun laws.

California boasted the highest score nationwide due to the state's continued emphasis on background checks, prohibiting access to guns by hate crime offenders, and funding urban gun violence reduction programs, among other measures.







IRS says it's looking for these red flags this tax season

RS agents are saying simple mistakes can warrant an audit from the Internal Revenue Service.

IRS software programs can randomly select the taxpayer and compare the return to other similar returns to detect any anomalies.

Here are red flags tax experts say you should avoid:

Are you generous?

One of the most common reasons for an audit is when the taxpayer is taking higher-than-average deductions in relation to his income, which can include charitable contributions, real estate interest or student loans interest.

The IRS has a sense of what's a fair amount of deductions based on income brackets. For example, if someone earned \$125,000 and claimed more than \$50,000 of charitable contributions, that could lead to IRS scrutiny. However, if you were

indeed generous, just make sure you have receipts in safe keeping in case of an audit.

Claiming a loss from a hobby

The IRS allows hobby deductions for expenses, up to the amount of income generated by that hobby. If you claim deductions for the expense greater than the amount earned, that can trigger a red flag.

Withdrawing from a retirement account early

Taking withdrawals from a retirement account prior to 59 ½ years old — when, for example, the taxpayer uses a portion of that money for a first-time home, qualified education expenses or emergency medical costs can trigger more scrutiny of your return.

A sudden avalanche of business expenses

Everyone wants to squeeze in as many potentially reimbursable expenses as they can for their returns this year. However, if someone submits a thick wad of restaurant and Uber receipts for business trips compared to previous years the IRS will notice.

The moral of this story, keep good records and keep them safe.

When to ask your boss for more money

Who wouldn't like to make more money?

If you've read my column before, you probably know that I'm an advocate of changing companies every three to five years (for many industries). On top of gaining extra experience, switching has the potential to bump up your pay considerably. But, there are often times when you need a raise at your current employer.

So, where do you start? If you want the best chance of landing a raise of more than two or three percent, do it at a time when your role has evolved quite a bit. This would be the case if your work has grown into a new area, has expanded significantly in scope, or has added management responsibilities. For example, if you were hired as an individual contributor and are now managing a team of seven, the scope of your job has changed.

It's easier to ask for more money if your job has changed significantly because you aren't asking for more money for your existing job. That may sound silly, especially if you're doing more than your peers. You may be smarter, saving more money, or getting more done. But, it's hard for a manager to justify paying you much more for any of these things.

When your job has changed, you're essentially asking for a fair amount of money for a new job. While you're making the case, it may also be a good time to request a new title and an updated job description. This way, you are officially taking your current position to the next

level.

Once you've decided you're ready to make a case for more, you'll want to find the perfect time. It may be during your annual performance evaluation. Or, you may want to lobby for more money at another time, in hopes that your manager won't be restricted by a certain pool of money.

Whenever you decide to do it, plan ahead. Request a meeting in advance, so your boss won't be caught off guard. Prepare your case in such a way that your manager can easily advocate for you. In other words, don't make it hard for your boss to give you more money. Do as much of the work for them as you can.

Consider preparing a presentation that shows how your job has changed. Highlight your accomplishments. Include any numeric results you can show, including how much you beat your goals, and how much revenue you saved the company. You put this much work into everything else you do at work. Why wouldn't you take the time to put it into your own presentation?

Remember this. Your boss may say no. It may be out of their control. Be careful not to come across in a way that may jeopardize your current job. And, if your company isn't willing to value you, be ready to begin looking for another one that will.

The March rains came roaring

After a dismally dry February, March has come in like a lion.

Rain and snow has fallen in the mountains surrounding Santa Clara Valley, and the forecast shows several more storms on their way. While unanticipated stream or storm drain blockages could always cause localized flooding during a rainstorm, we do not currently anticipate any creek flooding issues.

Santa Clara Valley Water District crews have worked all year to prepare our creeks for winter rains. We are

dedicated to keeping residents and businesses safe through our flood protection programs.

In preparation for this series of storms, all five of our sandbag sites have been fully stocked. In addition, cities around the county operate an additional 18 sandbag sites.

Our maintenance staff stands ready

with heavy equipment to respond to reports of downed trees or large debris flows in locations where we have property rights. We are monitoring streams for blockages at key bridges and culverts. We need the public's help as our eyes and ears to alert us to obstructions in the


creeks and to prevent flooding. To report issues in creeks, residents can call 408-630-2378 or submit a service request to Access Valley Water.

Our ten reservoirs have a combined storage of just 26 percent of their full capacity. This leaves a significant amount of storage space to capture the expected storm runoff. Therefore, we do not anticipate any possibility of our large reservoirs reaching capacity this week or next. The exception is the relatively small Vasona Reservoir in Los Gatos, which regularly

reaches capacity during the rainy season.

Tijuana heat was relentless. As an athlete, I thought I was well-equipped to tackle the physically demanding work. However, I faced unprecedented soreness from working long hours. Although we only worked for four days, this experience helped me catch a glimpse of the working conditions for numerous laborers in Tijuana.

I met the family we were building the house for and other neighboring families. These people were very grateful, kind, and offered their assistance wherever they could. Carmen, a twenty-one year old married woman that I befriended stayed at home and tended to chores, because she had not received an education and didn't have a job.

I watched several children playing and

racing on obstacle courses made of old car tires, sticks, and buckets alongside our construction site. They too did not have the privilege to attend school. A set of parents I met managed to live with their eight children in a small, two bedroom house. Every day I saw yet another aspect of my life I had never taken to be so precious. I had an education, my own bedroom, and my drawers are filled with clean clothes: all things these children may never get to experience.

Along with a reality check of how difficult it is to make a living in some parts of the world, I experienced Mexican culture and hospitality. On the last day of construction when it came time to hand over the house key to the owners, with tears in their eyes they expressed their gratitude to our group.

Having lived in California my entire life, I hadn't realized how precious little things that I hadn't considered to be so valuable were to the families that resided in Tijuana. Many of us living in the United States do not realize the value of the resources and opportunities that are readily available to us. This experience only made me feel more grateful and blessed to be living in America. With that said, this trip reminds me of the bigger picture in life that had begun to be blurry to me. We often get lost in our world of technology and the commotion of our jobs, classes, peer pressure and so much more, but this trip tied all my loose ends and explained to me what I had been missing.

I hope this article serves as a reminder that adjusting the focus is in our hands.

Three speakers, Sameena Usman of CAIR, Minna Holopainen professor San Jose State University and Dr. Indermohan Singh of the San Jose Gurdwara of Sahib each helped with their wise words so that the faith leaders could select and possibly implement ideas and grow in what they know. 


