## Almaden students walk out of class over gun violence

xactly one month after 17 people were killed in a school shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, students in Almaden Valley walked out of their classrooms to honor those killed and to protest gun violence.

The National School Walk Out in Almaden Valley lasted seventeen minutes starting at 10 a.m. for students to protest to be safe. Students chanted "Love Kids, Not Guns." The message of the students was to call out politicians' attention and cry out for them to make a change to keep them safe in their schools.

The protest was the largest student demonstrations since the Vietnam War. Each minute recognized each of the 17 victims of the Parkland, FL, high school shooting.

## **Congresswoman Eshoo speaks out**

"When will too much become too much in order for Congress to do something about the senseless killings in our country from guns? There is bipartisan gun safety legislation pending, yet the Speaker of the House will not allow a vote on it. And the killing goes on." -Congresswoman Anna Eshoo

Anna Eshoo, Congresswoman for the 18th Congressional District, spoke about the need for gun control at a recent Almaden Valley Community Association meeting.

"Everyone in the country is absolutely horrified over what has taken place, and continues to take place, relative to gun violence in our country," she says. "We're the only industrialized nation in the world that has this."

She notes that following a mass shooting in Australia, and their legislature passing key gun control laws, they have not had another mass shooting in about 20 years.

Eshoo is saddened that public places "we trust and hold sacred, like schools where we entrust our children...churches where people go to bow their heads and pray together," public events, movie theaters and shopping centers have been targeted. "All of these are places where there has not only been gun violence, but so many people have lost their lives," she says.

She regrets that the legislature failed to pass stringent gun laws after the shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School where 20 children

Congresswoman Anna Eshoo is saddened that public places "we trust and hold sacred" have been tarbetween ages six and seven were fatally shot, as well as six adult staff members. "I really thought that when those little angels, those precious little ones [lost their lives] in Newtown, Connecticut," she says, "that would be the tipping point for Congress to say, 'Enough is enough,' but it wasn't."

On Feb. 14, a similar tragedy occurred at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, when a shooter opened fire with a semi-automatic rifle, killing 17 people and wounding 17 more.

Following public outcry, on March 9, Florida Governor Rick Scott signed the state's first gun control legislation into law. Known as the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act, the law tightens gun control, raising the minimum age to purchase a firearm from 18 to 21 and bars mentally unstable people from possessing guns. In addition, a controversial provision allows for the hiring of school police and for qualified teachers to be armed. However, counties opting out of this provision can redirect those funds to hire more school officers.

"The hardest thing I've ever had to do as governor is try to find the words to console a parent who has lost their child," Scott says. 'There are just no words." Scott says that he wants these parents to be the last to lose their children in a school shooting and the families of the fallen teachers to be the last to lose their loved ones in schools.

Tony Montalto, who lost his daughter, Gina Rose, in the school shooting, read a statement on behalf of the victims' families after the bill signing: "When it comes to preventing future acts of horrific school violence, this is [the] beginning of the journey," he said. "We have paid a terrible price for this progress. We call on more states to follow Florida's lead and create meaningful legislation to make all schools safer."

Eshoo draws hope from the surviving students' passion and perseverance in speaking out about the need for gun control. "I think these high school students are not only eloquent," she says, "they're fearless. It's the young people saying to the adults: 'You have failed us. You have not done what needs to be done and we're demanding that you do.' I think they're taking our country to a higher moral ground with not only what they're saying but doing."

"The students of Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, you made your voices heard," says Scott. "You didn't let up and you fought until there was change...You made a difference."

On March 14, thousands of elementary, middle and high school students across the country walked out of class for 17 minutes to honor the 17 victims and to protest gun violence. Locally, students at Leland High School, Pioneer High School, Bret Harte Middle School and Castillero Middle School participated by walking out or observing a

few moments of silence. At Castillero, students joined in solidarity, speaking out against gun violence.

March For Our Lives is hosting a protest march in Washington, D.C., and across the nation on Sat., March 24, demanding the end to gun violence and school shootings. Locally, the protest will begin at 11a.m. at San Jose City Hall, 200 E. Santa Clara St., San Jose, CA 95113.

To effect real change, Eshoo says that an assault weapons ban is essential. Although Congress passed an assault weapons ban in the past, it was allowed to expire. Although she isn't against hunting, and comes from a family of sportsmen, she asserts that assault weapons are weapons of war. "No one hunts with an AR-15," she says.

In addition, Eshoo says the country's mental health system is broken and that an effective system is necessary for teachers and parents to be able to report those exhibiting questionable behavior.

Eshoo contends that federal gun laws that apply to every state, county, city, town and village are needed. "Right now,



we have a patchwork quilt," she says. Although states like Connecticut and New York have strong gun regulations, a resident of these states can take advantage of loopholes and go to another state to purchase guns. "The accessibility of all this is as easy as buying M&M's," she says, "I can go online and buy a sweater on sale and just as easily buy assault weapons and ammunition with no background check whatsoever. Up to 40 percent of non-licensed gun sales are not subject to a background check. One of the bills I'm on closes those loopholes and requires a full background check."

The National Rifle Association (NRA) filed a federal lawsuit against Florida, challenging that the federal constitutionality of the age requirement clause violates the Second and 14th Amendments. The NRA also contends that federal law already prevents many Americans 21 or younger from buying certain types of guns.

Eshoo agrees that the Second Amendment is "something we need to honor," and that every piece of legislation has to meet the standard of constitutionality.

Recently, a bipartisan bill to stop the online sales of ammunition and armaments has been introduced to Congress, as well as a bipartisan background check bill. There is also legislation to ban the sale of assault weapons and high-capacity ammunition magazines.

"This would go a long way in our country towards making our communities safer," says Eshoo. "These are key bills introduced to the House, but it's hard to tell where the president is." When asked if she would keep going to the White House and advocating for gun control even though the president keeps changing his mind, she answered, "Of course. We have to."

When asked why Congress doesn't go after gun manufacturers and dealers, Eshoo says that as the NRA is funded by ammunition and weapons manufactures, having these bills become laws would address it. However, this is more easily said than done. "[Congressional] members are really terrified of the NRA," she says. "I've been threatened by them." Still, she is against demonizing them. "There are a lot of good people who belong to the NRA," she says, "...but they are the lobby for these interests."

Eshoo notes that the law enforcement community and the NRA were tight partners until the creation of 'cop killer' bullets, which could penetrate the safety vests police officers wear. "Law enforcement said to the organization, 'We have to do something about this. We're losing our own people," she says, but the NRA refused, and they parted ways.

When asked how can campaign finance laws be changed to lessen the NRA's power, Eshoo says that there are two things that would change our government and the way we operate if they were reformed: how federal campaigns are financed and gerrymandering. "If we take these huge contributions out of the system, it would change the Congress dramatically," she says.

"The Citizens United case opened the floodgates because the Supreme Court—in one of the worst decisions of any Supreme Court in the history of our country because it goes right to the heart of democracy—because the Supreme Court found that corporations are people with the freedom of speech," she says. "They can give as much as they want with secret donors. That has exacerbated special interests with money pouring in that we have no control over. If citizens think all votes are bought and paid for, it's highly corrosive."

Regarding gerrymandering, in California, the state legislature no longer draws its own lines; a citizen's commission does. "Campaign finance reform and fixing gerrymandering would go a long way towards bringing about a more democratic system," she says, "and one citizens would have far more faith in."

### IRS says it's looking for these red flags this

#### tax season

IRS agents are saying simple mistakes can warrant an audit from the Internal Revenue Service. IRS software programs can ran-

domly select the taxpayer and compare the return to other similar returns to detect any anomalies.

Here are red flags tax experts say you should avoid:

#### Are you generous?

One of the most common reasons for an audit is when the taxpayer is taking higher-than-average deductions in relation to his income, which can include charitable contributions, real estate interest or student loans interest.

The IRS has a sense of what's a fair amount of deductions based on income brackets. For example, if someone earned \$125,000 and claimed more than \$50,000 of charitable contributions, that could lead to IRS scrutiny. However, if you were indeed generous, just make sure you have receipts in safe keeping in case of an audit.

**Claiming a loss from a hobby** The IRS allows hobby deductions for expenses, up to the amount of income generated by that hobby. If you claim deductions for the expense greater than the amount earned, that can trigger a red flag.

## Withdrawing from a retirement account early

Taking withdrawals from a retirement account prior to 59 ½ years old — when, for example, the taxpayer uses a portion of that money for a first-time home, qualified education expenses or emergency medical costs can trigger more scrutiny of your return.

A sudden avalanche of business expenses

Everyone wants to squeeze in as many potentially reimbursable expenses as they can for their returns this year. However, if someone submits a thick wad of restaurant and Uber receipts for business trips compared to previous years the IRS will notice.

The moral of this story, keep good records and keep them safe.

#### Cupertino library offering U.S. Passport Services

Just in time for summer vacation planning, the Santa Clara County Library District (SCCLD) is adding passport services to the long list of reasons to visit the library.

Starting April 3 at the Cupertino

Library, new passport acceptance facility offices will be open to the public during specified hours.

The new Passport Acceptance Facilities at the Cupertino library will provide first-time passports for adults and children, renewals for passports issued before the applicant was 16 years of age, renewals for expired passports issued more than 15 years ago, replacements for lost, stolen, or damaged passports, and provide passport photo services.

"Our libraries provide high value to the community," stated County Supervisor and library Joint Powers Authority board member, Joe Simitian. "Bringing passport services to the Cupertino Library is just another example of how we are always focused on providing important and relevant services to our residents."

Once submitted, passport applications typically take between four to six weeks to be processed, with the option of paying a \$60 expedite fee to cut that time down by two weeks. Passports will be mailed directly to the applicant by the U.S. Department of State, Bureau of Consular Affairs.

To book an appointment, go to sccl.org/passport and select a time and location. Cupertino's service will be offered Tuesdays and Thursdays between 1-7 pm and Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 11 am to 4 pm.

## ASK THE LAWYER When do 'relationships' cross into the realm of financial elder abuse?

I am concerned for my elderly friend and his mental and financial welfare. A new "friend" has entered

his life in the form of a woman twenty-five years younger than he is. He buys her whatever he can, whenever he can. He might just give her everything one day. How do we know if or when financial elder abuse has occurred? **Bryan G.**,

Almaden Valley

The situation you describe is all too common, especially in Silicon Valley. The legal keys are the intent and conduct of the new friend and potential wrong-

doer, and the evidence of the wrongful conduct you can obtain. First, let us take a look at the law surrounding financial elder abuse in California, and the requirements to prove financial elder abuse.

California Welfare and Institutions Code § 15610.30 provides that "Financial abuse" of an elder or dependent adult occurs when a person or entity does any of the following: (i) takes, secretes, appropriates, obtains, or retains real or personal property of an elder (age 65 or older) or dependent adult for a wrongful use or with intent to defraud, or both; (ii) assists in taking, secreting, appropriating, obtaining, or retaining real or personal property of an elder or dependent adult for a wrongful cause or with intent to defraud or both; or (iii) takes, secretes, appropriates, obtains, or retains, or assists in taking, secreting, appropriating, obtaining, or retaining, real or personal property of an elder or dependent adult by undue influence, as defined in Section 1575 of the Civil Code."

Therefore, in a nutshell, financial elder abuse occurs when a person (1) takes, secretes, appropriates, obtains or retains; (2) the real or personal property; (3) of an elder or dependent adult; (4) for a wrongful use, or with intent to defraud, or both. A person is also liable for financial elder abuse if the "assist" another in doing any of the above. The "wrongful use" may be demonstrated by showing that the person knew, or should have known, that this conduct was likely to be harmful to the elder. Winning or losing all comes down to the evidence supporting the wrongful conduct and wrongful taking of or retention of assets.

Of course, financial elder abuse is not limited to a new friend or companion. Home improvement contractors, service providers, and other seemingly legitimate businesses, as well as an army of morally and spiritually devoid predators, that we can all simply call ball people, can and do regularly commit elder abuse. After all, no one ever thought Eric Madoff was committing elder abuse in

taking financial investments from the elderly ... and it ended up being one of the biggest cases of fraud in U.S. history.

This writer's simple advice: Stay alert and stay involved to protect your friend, and encourage his family members to do so. His best protection is your and his family's relationship with him, as is the case with any elderly person one seeks to protect. If you genuinely care about your friend, make sure you or family members visit him often, keep an eye on the

people around him, help with his finances to monitor expenditures for anything suspicious (without taking any money!), and just stay involved. It will keep his trust with you and give you access to the information you need to determine whether this new person is actually a threat. Open dialogue is best if possible, and in my experience this only works where there is genuine trust by the elderly person in the family members, friend or other person seeking to protect such elderly person. Where the alleged perpetrator is able to dig in roots and strengthen their position well beyond that of the family members or other protector, sadly it is often too late ... the elderly victim will turn a blind eye as they do not want to lose this person in their life nor believe there was any wrongful intent by their "friend" or dare I say, "lover." The fight happens after the elderly person dies, with a multi-year lawsuit over the trust or will the family members never saw, drafted under the influence of the perpetrator.

Again, proactivity in protecting your elderly loved ones or friends is your best approach. Keep them close. If you truly suspect something is wrong, consult with legal counsel.

On top of gaining extra experience, switching has the potential to bump up your pay considerably. But, there are often times when you need a raise at your current employer.

So, where do you start? If you want the best chance of landing a raise of more than two or three percent, do it at a time when your role has evolved quite a bit. This would be the case if your work has grown into a new area, has expanded significantly in scope, or has added management responsibilities. For example, if you were hired as an individual contributor and are now managing a team of seven, the scope of your job has changed.

It's easier to ask for more money if your job has changed significantly because you aren't asking for more money for your existing job. That may sound silly, especially if you're doing more than your peers. You may be smarter, saving more money, or getting more done. But, it's hard for a manager to justify paying you much more for any of these things.

When your job has changed, you're essentially asking for a fair amount of money for a new job. While you're making the case, it may also be a good time to request a new title and an updated job description. This way, you are officially taking your current position to the next level. *See RAISE, page 20*

## 'My uplifting experience in Tijuana'

Times Staff Writer In my recent trip to the impoverished border city Tijuana, Mexico, I was privileged to work with the non-profit DOXA in an unparalleled opportunity to construct a home for an underprivileged family.

Initially, when my travel group crossed the San Ysidro port of entry at the San Diego – Tijuana border, we immediately noticed the drastic change in demographics and lifestyle. This was no surprise to me; I was aware of how the city would look. We arrived at the orphanage where we would be staying for the following four days. Wasting



no time, we began our work at the construction site the very same day.

Despite being winter, the Tijuana heat was relentless. As an athlete, I thought I was well-equipped to tackle the physically demanding work. However, I faced unprecedented soreness from working long hours. Although we only worked for four days, this experience helped me catch a glimpse of the working conditions for numerous laborers in Tijuana.

I met the family we were building the house for and other neighboring families. These people were very grateful, kind, and offered their assistance wherever they could. Carmen, a twenty-one year old married woman that I befriended stayed at home and tended to chores, because she had not received an education and didn't have a job.

I watched several children playing and racing on obstacle courses made of old car tires, sticks, and buckets alongside our construction site. They too did not have the privilege to attend school. A set of parents I met managed to live with their eight children in a small, two bedroom house. Every day I saw yet another aspect of my life I had never taken to be so precious. I had an education, my own bedroom, and my drawers are filled with clean clothes; all things these children may never get to experience.

Along with a reality check of how difficult it is to make a living in some parts of the world, I experienced Mexican culture and hospitality. On the last day of construction when it came time to hand over the house key to the owners, with tears in their eyes they expressed their gratitude to our group.

Having lived in California my entire life, I hadn't realized how precious little things that I hadn't considered to be so valuable were to the families that resided in Tijuana. Many of us living in the United States do not realize the value of the resources and opportunities that are readily available to us. This experience only made me feel more grateful and blessed to be living in America. With that said, this trip reminds me of the bigger picture in life that had begun to be blurry to me. We often get lost in our world of technology and the commotion of our jobs, classes, peer pressure and so much more, but this trip tied all my loose ends and explained to me what I had been missing.

I hope this article serves as a reminder that adjusting the focus is in our hands.

Once you've decided you're ready to make a case for more, you'll want to find the perfect time. It may be during your annual performance evaluation. Or, you may want to lobby for more money at another time, in hopes that your manager won't be restricted by a certain pool of money.

Whenever you decide to do it, plan ahead. Request a meeting in advance, so your boss won't be caught off guard. Prepare your case in such a way that your manager can easily advocate for you. In other words, don't make it hard for your boss to give you more money. Do as much of the work for them as you can. Consider preparing a presentation that shows how your job has changed. Highlight your accomplishments. Include any numeric results you can show, including how much you beat your goals, and how much revenue you saved the company. You put this much work into everything else you do at work. Why wouldn't you take the time to put it into your own presentation?

Remember this. Your boss may say no. It may be out of their control. Be careful not to come across in a way that may jeopardize your current job. And, if your company isn't willing to value you, be ready to begin looking for another one that will.

After a dismally dry February, March has come in like a lion.

Rain and snow has fallen in the mountains surrounding Santa Clara Valley, and the forecast shows several more storms on their way. While unanticipated stream or storm drain blockages could always cause localized flooding during a rainstorm, we do not currently anticipate any creek flooding issues.

Santa Clara Valley Water District crews have worked all year to prepare our creeks for winter rains. We are

dedicated to keeping residents and businesses safe through our flood protection programs.

In preparation for this series of storms, all five of our sandbag sites have been fully stocked. In addition, cities around the coun-

ty operate an additional 18 sandbag sites. Our maintenance staff stands ready

with heavy equipment to respond to reports of downed trees or large debris flows in locations where we have property rights. We are monitoring streams for blockages at key bridges and culverts. We need the public's help as our eyes and ears to alert us to obstructions in the creeks and to prevent flood-
