The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources today announced plans for the 2018 walleye fishing season on Lake Mille Lacs that seek to maximize fishing opportunities for anglers while protecting the health and sustainability of Mille Lacs' improving walleye population.

When anglers hit the water on Mille Lacs for the fishing opener on Sat., May 12, catch-and-release only regulations will again be in effect. The lake's spawning walleye population has improved from last year, so no mid-season closures are planned.

Similar to prior years, night closure for the 2018 walleye fishing season will be in effect on Mille Lacs from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. beginning Monday, May 14. The night walleye closure remains in effect throughout the entire open-water season, which ends Nov. 30.

The catch-and-release summer season and night walleye closure are part of the DNR's continued strategic efforts to understand and improve the walleye population in Lake Mille Lacs.

According to the DNR, the population has undergone a

decline over the past two decades that has coincided with significant aquatic system changes including increased water clarity and decreased walleye productivity; the introduction of zebra mussels, Eurasian watermilfoil and spiny water fleas; a changing zooplankton community that may be altering the aquatic food web; and declines in certain forage species, including tullibee.

"Improving the walleye population on Mille Lacs is a top priority for the DNR," said Tom Landwehr, DNR commissioner. "We want to see as much walleye fishing on Mille Lacs as possible this year. Anglers have had a very good winter walleye season on the lake and we will be able to continue that trend into the open-water season with no mid-season closure planned."

DNR Fisheries Chief Don Pereira said DNR analyses as well as external review indicate that the walleye spawning stock has increased significantly in Mille Lacs and the lake can support a larger safe harvest level of walleye in 2018, as long as a catchand-release rule is in place.

"Implementing a catch-

and-release policy this season is important not only for the sustainable growth of Mille Lacs' walleye population, but for area anglers, businesses, and Mille Lacs area communities," Pereira said. "We want anglers to get out and enjoy the abundant fishing opportunities on Mille Lacs."

Pereira added that a catchand-release season should also allow the state to account for a portion of the excess walleye kill in 2016 and 2017. With catch-and-release measures in place this summer, some of the fish caught and returned to the water may die, a condition known as hooking mortality. The likelihood of fish suffering hooking mortality increases as water temperatures warm. Fish that die as a result of hooking mortality are counted against the state's harvest allocation. State and tribal allocations

The state of Minnesota and Chippewa bands that cooperatively manage Lake Mille Lacs have yet to set the safe harvest level for 2018 and discussions are ongoing. These discussions follow the process outlined in protocols and stipulations arising from the U.S. Supreme Court decision in 1999 to uphold the

bands' treaty rights. Seeking new solutions

In June 2017, the DNR announced that a new external review team of scientists would take a fresh look at Lake Mille Lacs walleye fishery. Led by walleye expert Dr. Chris Vandergoot of the U.S. Geological Survey, this review showed that the DNR's survey methods met or exceeded accepted best practices, and that interpretations of changes in the lake are correct. A summary of the team's conclusions and recommendations will be available later this year. DNR staff are currently exploring the feasibility of implementing some of these recommendations.

Other regulations

Mille Lacs is nationally recognized as one of the nation's top smallmouth bass and muskellunge fisheries. In 2017, Mille Lacs was named the number one bass fishing lake in the nation by Bassmaster Magazine. The lake hosted the Toyota Bassmaster Angler of the Year Championship in 2016 and 2017.

Bass season opens Saturday, May 12, but is catchand-release only through Friday, May 25. Beginning on

Saturday, May 26, Mille Lacs' bag limit will be four bass per angler. All smallmouth and largemouth bass between 17 and 21 inches must be immediately released. Anglers may keep only one bass over 21 inches.

For muskellunge, the season opens on Saturday, June 2, with the statewide rules of a one fish bag and a minimum length of 54 inches.

Beginning June 2, anglers may fish for muskellunge and northern pike at night, but may only possess and use artificial lures or sucker minnows longer than 8 inches. Bowfishing for rough fish also is allowed at night but possession of angling equipment is not allowed and only rough fish may be in possession.

Exempt from statewide new northern pike slot limits

Lake Mille Lacs has special regulations that exempt it from the new statewide northern pike zone regulations. The northern pike season opens May 12 and anglers may keep up to five fish. All pike between 30 and 40 inches must be immediately released. Only one northern over 40 inches may be included in the bag limit of five.



Minnesota DNR to change trout stocking in Lake Superior

Genetically screened steelhead will replace Kamloops to bolster fishing opportunities and protect steelhead

To protect Lake Superior's naturalized rainbow trout population, genetically screened steelhead-strain fish, originating from wild runs in the big lake itself, will replace the hatchery-raised Kamloops trout strain the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources now stocks to bolster fishing opportunities near Duluth.

New advances in genetic testing confirm Kamloops interbreed with wild rainbow trout. When that happens, fewer young survive and the overall steelhead population is reduced.

The change from Kamloops to stocking wild-sourced steelhead lets fisheries managers improve fishing opportunities on area streams while continuing the rehabilitation of the wild fish population.

"We have worked hard to develop a solution that respects what our diverse group of rainbow trout anglers have told us is important to them - harvest opportunities in both the stream and the boat fishery, as well as high quality catch-and-release opportunities for wild steelhead," said Cory Goldsworthy, the DNR's Lake Superior area fisheries supervisor.

Since 1976, the DNR has

stocked the Kamloops strain of rainbow trout in Lake Superior's waters near Duluth. Stocking increased angler opportunity and reduced harvest pressure on wild steelhead. The action helped Lake Superior's wild rainbow trout recover from the detrimental effects of invasive sea lampreys and overfishing.

Despite only localized stocking, the stocked Kamloops genetics have shown up in samples taken from many North Shore streams, the Wisconsin Bois Brule River and Michigan waters of Lake Superior.

Numerous genetic studies on the North Shore all point toward the negative

impacts of interbreeding on wild steelhead populations, but DNR researchers were never able to confirm genetic interbreeding in the wild even with genetics work done as recently as the 1990s.

"With new tools, we now know without question that we can't have a goal to rehabilitate wild steelhead populations while at the same time stock the Kamloops strain for harvest," Goldsworthy said. The steelhead the DNR stocks will have an adipose fin clipped off, just like Kamloops did. That process, which doesn't harm the fish, allows anglers to easily determine what can be harvested. Unclipped, wild steelhead will continue to remain catchand-release only – as they have been since 1997. Because of this, the stocking

change means anglers will see the same harvest regulations.

"There remains disagreement among experts as to whether the announced summer regulations should be more restrictive or that the catch-and-release approach is too conservative. While I am not an expert in this area, it appears that keeping the lake open for catch and release versus a more restrictive approach, risking shutting down the lake, is a reasonable compromise."

Lueck indicated other protective measures will be in effect on Mille Lacs this year, including restricting walleye fishing to daylight hours. Mille Lacs also offers a broad range of excellent fishing opportunities for northern pike and bass also beginning on May 12, he said. On June 2, the muskellunge season opens across Minnesota, with Mille Lacs having a history of providing some of biggest muskellunge taken in the state.

Lueck bill to improve sulfate standard clears House committee hurdle

A bill Rep. Dale Lueck, R-Aitkin, authored to put new energy and focus on protecting Minnesota's natural wild rice resources successfully completed its first step in the legislative process Thursday by clearing the House Environmental and Natural Resources Policy and Finance Committee

Lueck said the current nu-

meric-based sulfate standard the legislation is providing is obsolete and has gone unenforced. His bill (H.F. 3280) would replace it with a narrative standard he said would safeguard the water quality and aquatic habitat necessary to ensure natural wild rice is protected and our wild rice beds are not materially impaired or degraded. "An important element of

the DNR commissioner with the authority and funding to convene a wild rice work group," Lueck said. "State, tribal and public experts would collaborate to ensure the maximum benefit for natural wild rice is achieved through protection, restoration and enhancement activities."

Lueck said the 45-year-old numeric sulfate standard, if applied today, would create millions of dollars in unwarranted costs the states rural municipal waste water treatment plants in areas of the state where natural wild rice occurs. Lueck also said application of the numeric standard would also drive the cost of mining up to the point

that it would threaten economic survival of Northeast Minnesota which depends on mining, forestry and tourism as the base for those local economies.

"The task here is to refocus on protecting wild rice by considering the hydrological, biological and physical risk to wild rice health," Lueck said. "For far too long we have been focused on trying to develop and apply a numeric sulfate standard that frankly has little to do with the overall health of our rice beds. We need to approach this task in a holistic manner using the talents of the wild rice experts at the DNR, within tribal governments and in public sector to protect this valuable resource."

Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe opposes legislation that removes sulfate standard

Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe Executive Director Robert Budreau Jr., issued the following letter to Senator Justin Eichorn, R-Grand Rapids, and Representative Dale Lueck, R-Aitkin voicing the Tribe's opposition to recently introduced bills which would remove protections against sulfates in wild rice waters.

The bills, identified as HF3280 and SF2983 in the letter, would remove the current 10 parts per million limit on sulfate discharges into wild rice waters.

The Band also strongly disagrees with the current listing of wild rice waters compiled by the State of Minnesota.

The full text of the letter is below:

Dear Sirs:

The Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe that opposes HF3280 and SF 2983. To repeal legislation that ensures and maintains a level of sulfate entering our waters *is illegal as well as negligent.*

"As Anishinaabe people we have many traditions and cultural traits that we hold

sacred, none more than Manoomin (wild rice). Ojibwe prophecy, which we hold as natural law, states that we were instructed by Creator to follow the Miigis (cowrie shell) west along the great lakes until we reached the place where the food grows on the water. Our ancestors were told that this sacred food will sustain and provide life for the Ojibwe to live here (in what is now known as Minnesota) forever! For generations Anishinaabe people have kept these waters the Manoomin stronghold they are today - and it was not through legislation or research but through respect.

The significance that Manoomin holds to Ojibwe people cannot be overstated. When legislators ask if Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe was consulted on this legislation, tell them no. In this regard, the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe opposes HF3280 and SF2983. Before the State considers throwing out water quality regulations in order to satisfy industry or commerce, we urge the

State to honor the human rights of the Ojibwe Nations and people and treat us with respect.

Manoomin (wild rice) holds a unique, historical, and sacred place in the history and lives of the Ojibwe in Minnesota. So much so that today, the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe people still depend on the harvest and sale of this sacred food for our subsistence and income in the fall when the wild rice is harvested.

From an ecological perspective the State of Minnesota and Canada have the largest concentration of wild rice in the entire world. The importance to the State's water, wetlands, aquatic animals, and waterfowl cannot be measured. Today, natural wild rice faces many current and potential threats in the state. In general, many factors can affect water quality, among them: seasonal water levels, lakebed conditions, climate change, or genetic research or cloning of wild rice which the tribes in Minnesota already vehemently oppose. Of immediate concern is the State's attempt to throw out protective water quality standards and the arbitrary list of wild rice waters through the actions of HF3280 and SF2983. Just because Minnesota doesn't enforce its own regulatory standard doesn't make it right or safe to repeal it with

no replacement. The Clean Water Act rules cannot be replaced without replacing them with more protective standards.

During the process the State went through to research and create the new standard it was stated many times that the Anishinaabe are the Manoomin experts. To protect, preserve, and properly care for Manoomin, it is imperative that the state recognize the ecological, historic, spiritual, and cultural importance of Manoomin and to treat the Manoomin and the Ojibwe nations and people with respect. The Leech Lake Band finds the current list of wild rice lakes insufficient and continues to

question the arbitrary listing of current wild rice lakes. The State has demonstrated willful intent to ignore tribal documentation of wild rice lakes previously when consulted during the sulfate rulemaking process. To claim in legislative sessions that there is Tribal buy-in on this legislation is disingenuous and should be proven with letters of support from Tribal Nations.
