



· Keep charger cords from fraying by slipping on a spring from an ink pen. You also can cut a straw in half and make a slit down the side. Then slip the straw over your charging cord.

• Dried-out markers are the worst, but they don't have to be. Refresh your dried-out washable markers with a little marker therapy — something that your kids can do! 



• On April 8, 563 B.C., Gautama Buddha, the founder of Buddhism, is thought to have been born in what is now Nepal. Buddhist tradition had placed his birth in the 11th century B.C., until modern scholars determined he was likely born in the 6th century.

The weekend of protests ended with demonstrations and parades in other cities.

• On April 2, 1979, the world's first anthrax epidemic begins in Ekaterinburg, Russia (now Sverdlosk), killing 62 people. The Soviet government blamed tainted meat, but in 1992 the real cause was found: Workers at the weapons plant had failed to replace a crucial filter.

 On April 4, 1982, hockey sensation Wayne Gretzky of the Edmonton Oil-ers finishes the NHL season with 212 points, the only player in NHL history to break the 200-point barrier. He went on to repeat the feat three more times.

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Egg-actly Right for Easter During the Easter season, hardcooked eggs act as a creative canvas for children and adults to decorate. Using natural food dyes to color eggs became popular during medieval times. English kings distributed hundreds of decorated, goldleaf eggs during Easter. Russian Czar Alexander took this holiday custom to high art when he commissioned the famous Faberge eggs as a gift for his wife, the Empress Maria, from goldsmith Peter Carl Faberge.

NOTE: The greenish color around the yolk of hard-cooked eggs is a natural result of sulfur and iron reacting at the surface of the yolk. It may occur when eggs are cooked too long or at too high a temperature, or when there is a high amount of iron in the cooking water. Although the color may be unappealing, the eggs are still wholesome and nutritious, and their flavor is unaffected.




glitter, beads, ribbons and pieces of felt or stickers. Use white or craft glue to attach the materials.

3. To make your own dye: Combine 1/2 to 1 tablespoon of food coloring with 2 teaspoons of white distilled vinegar in a large cup or deep bowl. You can experiment by mixing the food coloring to create a variety of hues. Add water until the cup or bowl is half full

4. Gently place the eggs into the dying liquid in the cup or bowl using a soup spoon to avoid cracking the shell. The longer the eggs are left in the dye, the darker the color will become 5. When the egg is the desired color, remove it from the dye, pat it dry with a paper towel and place it back into the egg carton or on an egg-holder. Refrigerate until ready to use.

For the perfect, hard-cooked eggs for your Easter holiday, follow the directions below. Happy Easter!

PERFECT EASTER EGGS

1. Bring eggs to room temperature. 2. Place eggs in room temperature water in a large pot.

3. Bring to a boil, then turn down to a low boil for 12 minutes.

4. Quickly chill the eggs in ice-cold water.

5. To decorate successfully, the eggs must be completely cool and dry.

6. Hard-cooked eggs should be kept refrigerated and used within one week.

Greenish yolks can best be avoided by using the proper cooking time and temperature (avoid intense boiling), and by rapidly cooling the cooked eggs. Occasionally, scrambled eggs can develop a greenish tint if they are overcooked at too high a temperature or left too long in a metal pan.

Decorating Tips:

1. Use crayons to gently color a design on the hard-cooked Easter eggs. If you want to dye the crayon-decorated eggs, the crayon wax will resist the dye and the design will show through.

2. You also can decorate the eggs with craft supplies, buttons, sequins, ***

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

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What Women Need To Know About Heart Disease

(NAPSA)—Women may need to take the latest research about heart disease to heart

What many don't know is that heart disease kills more Ameri-can women than all forms of cancer combined, including breast cancer. Nearly half of all women are at risk for developing heart disease, and as a woman ages, her risk increases.

A heart attack can occur with-out warning. More than 60 percent of women who died suddenly from coronary heart disease had no previous symptoms.


Women of color, including Black American and Latino American women, are more likely to develop risk factors and are at a higher risk of death from heart disease, yet research has shown they are less likely to recognize their risks.

Fortunately, there are lifestyle changes you can make to lower your risk. The first step is to understand which risk factors affect you and what actions you can take to lower your risk.

For example, the risk is higher for women who have a family history of heart disease or diabetes. Increasing age is another risk factor. Women are at a higher risk when they reach 55 or become postmenopausal. These are risk factors vou cannot control.

Risk factors you can control are diabetes, smoking, blood pressure of 140/90 mmHg or higher, and total cholesterol over 200. If you don't exercise, there's also a risk. Being 30 pounds or more over your recommended weight and having a waist measurement greater than 35 inches are also risk factors.

"It's important to take action to minimize your risks," said Dr.



Aim for 30 minutes of moderateintensity activity every day.



• Aim for a healthy weight. • Get moving. Make a commitment to be more physically active. Every day, aim for 30 minutes of moderate-intensity activity such as taking a brisk walk, raking, dancing, light-weight lifting, housecleaning or gardening. •Eat for heart health. Choose

a diet low in saturated fat, trans fat, sodium and cholesterol. Include whole grains, vegetables and fruits.

•Know your numbers. Ask your doctor to check your blood pressure, cholesterol (total, HDL, LDL and triglycerides) and blood glucose. Work with your doctor to improve any numbers that are not normal. To learn more about heart dis-

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

Herbed Potatoes Au Gratin

"This rich, creamy side is incredibly versatile. At Easter I add thyme and parsley, and at Christmas I use rosemary and serve it with prime rib. I like the chunky potatoes better than the traditional thinly sliced ones, plus they're easier to prep." - Ree Drummond

- 3 tablespoon unsalted butter
- medium onion
- 1/2 cup heavy cream Kosher salt Pepper
- ounces cream cheese 8 ounces Parmesan
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley
- tablespoon fresh thyme pounds russet potatoes, sliced 3 thin or cut into chunks Chopped fresh chives

1. Heat oven to 350 F. Butter a 3-quart shallow baking dish.

2. Melt the butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the onion and cook, stirring occasionally, until beginning to soften, about 5 minutes.

3. Add the milk, cream, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper and bring to a bare simmer. Add the cream cheese and cook, stirring, until melted, about 3 minutes; stir in 1/2 cup Parmesan. Remove from the heat and stir in the parsley and thyme.

4. Place the potatoes in the prepared baking dish and pour the milk mixture over the top. Sprinkle with the remaining 1/4 cup Parmesan and cover tightly with nonstick foil.

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Sobered By Childhood Hunger, Pioneering Educators' Approach To Serving School Breakfast Pays Off

(NAPSA)—An overwhelming three in four teachers and principals report regularly seeing hungry kids in their schools, says a new report released by Share Our Strength's No Kid Hungry cam-paign. As Americans gear up for back to school, the report high-lights the on-the-ground view of hunger as told by public school teachers and principals and points to an unlikely program—in-the-classroom breakfast—that's in-creasing academic achievement and reducing childhood hunger at the same time.

The new report, "Hunger In Our The new report, "Hunger In Our Schools: Teachers Report 2013," generously supported by C&S Wholesale Grocers Inc., asks front-line educators to explain the hunger they see in school, steps they take to address it, and what's working to help their students access food and succeed academically.

Half of teachers surveyed say hungry children in their class room is a serious issue—the highest level measured in the four years of conducting this research. These teachers and principals are spending more out of their own pocket to help hungry kids. According to the new report, on average, teachers who buy food for hungry students spend \$37 a month—up from \$26 a month in 2012. Principals report spending about \$60 a month to buy food for their students.

Educators surveyed saw bright spots, too. Nine in 10 see break-

Making A Difference Early experience with breakfast after the bell shows it's working in surprising ways. Teachers and principals who have breakfast in the classroom say they've seen improvement in alertness (76 percent), better attendance (57 per-cent), fewer disciplinary problems (54 percent), fewer visits to the school nurse (55 percent) and fewer tardy students (49 percent). More than half of teachers report seeing behavior and health improvements in students since implementing the program. Importantly, these are benefits that improve the entire classroom dynamic



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

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
