

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING/PRESENTATION, BUDGET VOTE, CAPITAL PROJECT, SCHOOL BUS REPLACEMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND USAGE AND BOARD MEMBER ELECTION FOR THE KENDALL CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT TOWN OF KENDALL, COUNTIES OF ORLEANS AND MONROE, NEW YORK

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a public hearing/presentation of qualified voters of the Kendall Central School District, Orleans and Monroe Counties, Kendall, New York 14476 will be held at the David J. Doyle Kendall Junior-Senior High School, Library, 16887 Roosevelt Highway, Kendall, New York 14476 in said District on Wednesday, May 2, 2018 at 6:30 p.m. prevailing time, for the presentation of the budget document and introduction of Board of Education candidate(s).

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that said vote and election, will be held on Tue., May 15, 2018 between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. prevailing time, in the Kendall Elementary School, 1932 Kendall Road, New York 14476 in said District, at which time the polls will be opened to vote by voting machine upon the following items:

1. To adopt the annual budget of the Kendall Central School District for the fiscal year 2018 - 2019 and to authorize the requisite portion thereof to be raised by taxable property of the District.

2. PROPOSITION

Shall the following resolution be adopted to with:

RESOLVED THAT THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE KENDALL CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT IS HEREBY AUTHORIZED TO UNDERTAKE CERTAIN CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS CONSISTING OF CONSTRUCTION AND RECONSTRUCTION OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES, SITE IMPROVEMENTS AND THE ACQUISITION OF CERTAIN ORIGINAL FURNISHINGS, EQUIPMENT, AND APPARATUS AND OTHER INCIDENTAL IMPROVEMENTS REQUIRED IN CONNECTION THEREWITH FOR SUCH CONSTRUCTION AND SCHOOL USE, ALL AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM AGGREGATE COST OF \$14,970,000; AND TO APPROPRIATE AND EXPEND FROM THE EXISTING CAPITAL RESERVE FUND \$3,600,000 FOR SUCH COSTS, AND THAT THE BALANCE OF SUCH COSTS, OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY, SHALL BE RAISED BY THE LEVY OF A TAX TO BE COLLECTED IN ANNUAL INSTALLMENTS, WITH SUCH TAX TO BE OFFSET BY STATE AID AVAILABLE THEREFOR; AND, IN ANTICIPATION OF SUCH TAX, DEBT OBLIGATIONS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT AS MAY BE NECESSARY NOT TO EXCEED \$11,370,000 SHALL BE ISSUED.

NOTICE IS HEREBY FURTHER GIVEN that the text of the aforesaid proposition may appear on the ballot labels in the following abbreviated form:

Shall the proposition set forth in the legal notice of this annual voter meeting, authorizing construction, reconstruction and equipping of school buildings and facilities, site and incidental improvements, all at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$14,970,000; with the expenditure of \$3,600,000 from the existing reserve fund for such costs, the issuance of not to exceed \$11,370,000 of debt obligations of the School District therefor, and the levy of a tax in annual installments therefor, with such tax to be offset by state aid available therefor, all as more fully described in said notice, be approved?

3. Transportation

RESOLVED, to authorize the purchase of motor vehicles for use in the transportation program of the District, including passenger buses, and expend therefore an aggregate sum not to exceed \$250,000 and be it further RESOLVED, that the sum of \$250,000 being the aggregate of the aforesaid maximum estimated amounts, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the appropriation of the amount of \$250,000 from the School Bus Reserve Fund with the remainder to be raised by the levy of a tax upon the taxable property in the District and collected in annual installments as provided in Section 416 of the Education Law, and in anticipation of such tax, obligations of the District shall be issued: and be it further RESOLVED that the District shall be authorized to enter into one or more purchase contracts, installment purchase contracts or leases with a term of up to five years, and otherwise on terms satisfactory to the Board of Education, with respect to one or more of the vehicles hereby authorized to be acquired.


4. To elect one (1) member of the Board of Education, one for a term of five years commencing July 1, 2018, and expiring on June 30, 2023.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HÉREBY GIVEN that a copy of the statement of the amount of money which will be required to fund the School District's budget for 2018-2019, exclusive of public monies, and the tax exemption report may be obtained by any resident of the District during the fourteen (14) days immediately preceding the school vote and election except Saturday, Sunday or holidays, at the offices of each of the following schoolhouses in which school is maintained during the hours designated: Kendall Elementary School, 1932 Kendall Road, Kendall, New York 14476, 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. prevailing time; Kendall Junior-Senior High School, 16887 Roosevelt Highway, Kendall, New York 14476, 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. prevailing time; and Kendall Central School District Office, 1932 Kendall Road, Kendall, New York 14476, 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. prevailing time; and Kendall Central School District Office, 1932 Kendall Road, Kendall, New York 14476, 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. prevailing time.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the Board of Education shall be filed with the Clerk of said School District at the Clerk's Office in the Kendall Elementary School Building, 1932 Kendall Road, Kendall, New York 14476, not later than April 16, 2018, between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. prevailing time. Each petition shall be directed to the Clerk of said District and shall be signed by the greater of at least twenty-five (25) qualified voters of the District or **at least 5% of the number of voters who voted in the previous annual election. This petition must** state the name and residence of the candidate.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that applications for absentee ballots will be obtainable between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. prevailing time, Monday through Friday, except holidays, from the District Clerk in the District Office at 1932 Kendall Road, Kendall, New York 14476. The District Clerk must receive completed applications at least seven (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election, if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. Absentee ballots must be received by the District Clerk not later than 5 p.m., prevailing time, on Tue., May 15, 2018 at the District Office, 1932 Kendall Road, Kendall, New York 14476.

A list of persons to whom absentee ballots are issued will be available for inspection to qualified voters of the District in the Office of the District Clerk at 1932 Kendall Road, Kendall, New York 14476, on and after May 15, 2018 between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. prevailing time, on weekdays prior to the day set for the annual election and on May 15, 2018, the day set for the election, and said list will be posted at the polling place at the election. Any qualified voter present in the polling place may object to the voting of the ballot upon appropriate grounds for making the challenge and the reasons therefore known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls. AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the qualified voters of the School District shall be entitled to vote at said annual vote and member election. A qualified voter is one who is (1) a citizen of the United States of America, (2) eighteen years of age or older, and (3) resident within the School District for a period of thirty (30) days next preceding the annual vote and election. The School District may require all persons offering to vote at the budget vote and election to provide one form of proof of residency pursuant to Education Law 2018-c. Such forms may include picture identification, a driver's license, a non-driver identification card, a utility bill, or a voter registration card. Upon offer of proof of residency, the School District may also require all persons offering to vote to provide their signature, printed name and address. AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that pursuant to a rule adopted by the Board of Education in accordance with Sections 2035 and 2008 of the Education Law, any referenda or propositions to amend the budget, or otherwise, to be submitted for voting at said election, must be filed with the Kendall Central School Board of Education at the District Office on or before April 16, 2018 at 4 p.m. prevailing time; must be typed or printed in English; must be directed to the Clerk of the School District in the District Office at 1932 Kendall Road, Kendall, New York 14476; must be signed by the greater of at least 25 qualified voters of the District or 5% of the number of voters who voted in the previous annual election; and must state the name and residence of each signer. However, the Board of Education will not entertain any petition to place before voters any proposition the purpose of which is not within the powers of the voters to determine, or any proposition, which fails to include a specific appropriation where the expenditure of monies is required by the proposition. Six students from Orleans/Niagara BOCES Niagara (NCTEC) and Orleans (OCTEC) Career and Technical Education Centers have been lucky enough to obtain a paid internship, also known as capstoning, at Voss Manufacturing, Inc.

The Sanborn company is a diversified manufacturer that specializes in the design and manufacture of tooling, equipment, machining and fabrications. General Manager Tom Kammerer ,and his son Alex, who is the company's Project Engineer, are giving the students real-world experience that will work in conjunction with their education in their career and technical education programs to boost their career success. "We have had a great relationship with BOCES for almost 40 years now. I am an advocate of BOCES. The facilities are good, the equipment is really good and the teachers do an excellent job at training. I can't say enough about it.'

The company offers a shadowing program in the students' junior year and if they do well they are asked back for the capstoning program in their senior year. They work at Voss in lieu of attending their BOCES program for several months. "It's a great way for them to go into the workforce and see what it is all about," says Mr. Kammerer. "For us, it's like a prolonged interview process. We put them to work with all the basic skills and see if they can master them and if they fit in as part of our team."

The students currently capstoning there are Colby Sortore (Welding Program/NCTEC), Kyle Toth (Electricity and Electronics/NCTEC), Austin Cox (Advanced Manufacturing and Engineering/OCTEC), Ethan Kujawa (Advanced Manufacturing and Engineering/OCTEC), Tom Culmo (Auto Body/OCTEC) and Steven Schumacher (Welding/OCTEC). Mr. Kammerer says he and his employees progressively give them exposure to higher level training. "The analogy I use is that if you don't master algebra, you can't take calculus. All the skills they are learning here in the shop are the building blocks and they have to master the basics and then we will move them up. They will rely on those basics the rest of their lives in their trade so they are very important."

Welding teacher Eric Farrell says he is grateful to Mr. Kammerer. "Tom is very interested in working with students and training them. Voss tries to train the students in many different areas so that they understand the workings of the company and the processes that take place at the company. Voss is a big believer in education first, work second and with that being said, they are very flexible with our students. Voss is a great place for the students to learn and start their career." Advanced Manufacturing and Engineering teacher, Bill Rakonczay says, "The opportunities they give my students year in and year out in the capstoning program is tremendous. They are taking what they learn here in class and applying it to real state-of-the-art advanced manufacturing machines such as CNC mills and lathes. It reinforces that the skills we are teaching here in class apply directly out in the workforce."



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Jackie Coyle, a Work Based Learning Coordinator at BOCES states that "Voss is an excellent partner for Orleans Niagara BOCES. They understand that students are young and need to learn from experiences in the work world." Mrs. Coyle ensures that these partnerships are successful and hope to continue with many local businesses. A Work Based Learning Coordinator collaboratively engages employers and schools in providing structured learning experiences for students. These experiences focus on assisting students to develop broad, transferable skills that are needed in the workplace.

All the students say they have loved the opportunity to be at Voss. Kyle says, "I saw a future opportunity. I want to go into a field starting like this. I wanted to get the gears moving for my future. So far I love it. It is going to be a good future if I can get a job here." Coby echoes his sentiment. "I love everything here. I love learning everything, I love learning how the shop works and I love being able to weld. Everyone is super friendly and willing to teach. The guys I have met here are awesome." Steven, another welding student, says he has a cousin that works at Voss and credits him for leading him to welding. "I wasn't sure what I wanted to do when I was younger and he told me how good the Medina BOCES welding class was and how successful the students are there and I knew that is what I wanted to do. My teacher, Mr. Farrell, has taught me a lot about the basics and the capstoning has taught me so much more. I plan to go to NCCC for my Welding certification after graduation, but I will stay here and work while I do that if they let me." Ethan says it is the best job he has ever had. "It is the first stepping stone. I hope to continue working here after graduation."

Mr. Kammerer says he is hoping that some of the students stick with Voss. "We are expanding and we could really use them. They start their capstoning with us in December. At the end of it, around June, if they are performing well and we have a job opening, we will offer it to them. I really wish more students were going into the trades. Manufacturing is cool again. It is a fantastic career and it is growing. The work is difficult and demanding, but it's different and it is more computer based. I would say 40 to 50% of our workforce is from BOCES. Our shop foreman is even a graduate from BOCES. It is our lifeline for our future."

MORE WHITE BIRDS!

There was a message on my cell phone "two huge flocks of snow geese just south of Lyndonville, now!" The camera was grabbed and I was off. When I got there they were still there but the one flock was moving over to the other flock at the other end of the block so that is where I headed. Getting into a good position on that second flock there were a lot of good

opportunities for birds in flight and on the ground. Eventually most of the birds from both flocks had joined but were further back. Soon there were a couple of shotgun blasts and ALL the geese got up and flew across the road in front of me. Needless to say it was quite a sight and a thrill to witness this. This sight was also accompanied by the loud clamor of those snow geese that was extremely loud.

Until recent years snow geese were kind of a rarity to see around here in the spring but that is beginning to change. Several years ago a number of large flocks of these birds began to show up in Orleans and Niagara Counties. One of the reasons is that the snow goose populations have exploded from approximately 50,000 birds in the mid 1960s to more than one million birds in recent years.

Why have snow goose populations increased so dramatically? First, the availability of waste grains on agricultural fields provided a vast new food supply for these birds. Second, continuation of restrictive hunting regulations during the 1970s and 1980s allowed the population to grow while hunter harvest rates declined. These large numbers of snow geese feeding on natural vegetation can also destroy large areas of coastal marshland during migration and winter. Serious damage to agricultural crops, such as hay, winter wheat, barley and rye, occurs on migration and wintering areas as well. These factors resulted in a higher reproductive rate, a higher adult survival rate, and offspring that were in much better condition to survive. However the overabundance of these geese, which nest in far northern regions of North America, is harming their fragile arctic breeding habitat. The damage to the habitat is, in turn, harming the health of the geese and other bird species that depend on the tundra habitat.

From mid March to mid April, more than 100,000 snow geese may spend time in New York, fueling up for their return to the arctic breeding grounds in May. Waterfowl managers were concerned about the impacts of too many snow geese and have recommended a population goal of 500,000 - 750,000 in the whole east coast Atlantic Flyway. The only practical way to reduce the population to that level is to increase hunter harvest so in 2008 Federal and State snow goose regulations were changed to hopefully reduce this high population.

Before 2008 the snow goose season closed on March 10 but now it runs until April 15. Along with that these new late season snow goose season has new regulations that allow the use of certain methods that are illegal for other waterfowl hunting. These special regulations allow for shooting times to be half hour before sunrise to half hour after sunset (normally shooting hours are from sunrise to sunset), a increase bag limit of 25 snow geese per day with no possession limit, and electronic calls and unplugged shotguns (normal waterfowl seasons only three shells are allowed to be loaded in the gun). Non-toxic shot is still required. One of the other reasons we are seeing more snow geese in Orleans County is that the hunting pressure in the eastern part of the State (the Finger Lakes region, the St. Lawrence Valley, and the upper Hudson and Champlain Valley regions) where most of these geese normally migrate through is pushing the birds this way looking for feeding areas. Snow geese are difficult to hunt because they normal move around in huge flocks so there are more eyes to spot trouble and then when there is trouble a lot of birds get educated real fast! Hunting snow geese also requires a much larger decoy set up than Canada geese as that is what they are use to seeing. Right now they don't see much hunting pressure in this area but that will change if their numbers keep growing and they keep showing up here. Is the snow goose populations being reduced? Not as much as the managers had hoped for so we will just have to wait and see or come up with another plan. In the mean time if you get the chance to observe these birds by all means go for it, I guarantee you will be thrilled by the sight and sound of so many white birds. If you hear of a flock some where go right then as they move around a lot and may not be around the next day.



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
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What to Do When a Project Stalls

Upon embarking on a home improvement project, homeowners who have never before lived through such undertakings are often told to expect their projects to take more time than initial estimates suggested. Unforeseen complications can compromise project timelines, and some homeowners may find their projects stuck in neutral.

Stalled projects can make life at home difficult, and homeowners may feel helpless with regard to getting a project back on course. But there are ways for homeowners to get stalled projects back on course.


• Start off on solid financial footing. It's important that homeowners who want to upgrade their homes enter the home improvement process with a realistic grasp of their finances. Many home improvement projects stall when homeowners run out of money. Homeowners can avoid such unfortunate situations by only beginning a project they know they can afford. Whether funding a project with a loan or savings or a combination of both, homeowners should make an honest assessment of what they can afford to commit to a given project. If the amount of money available does not add up to the estimated cost of the project, delay the project now or you might be facing a stalled project down the road.

· Honestly assess whether or not you can finish the job. Do-it-yourselfers may have the abilities to complete a project, but they should not let their pride get in the way of their ultimate goal, which is the completion of the project. In addition to money, time or lack thereof, is often the culprit behind stalled projects. Homeowners with full-time jobs, families or both may not be able to find the time to complete a job in a timely fashion. If the project has been stuck in neutral and no sudden windfall of free time is on the horizon, start contacting contractors to finish the job for you.

• Ask for help. There's no shame in asking for help to complete a project. Some homeowners may underestimate the scope of a project until it's too late. Asking family, friends or neighbors for help might be the only way to get a stalled project back on track. Certain home improvement projects may not require advanced skills, and even friends or family with little or no home improvement experience can pitch in to complete such projects. When more advanced projects stall, homeowners may want to hire contractors to complete the work. If budgets have not left much room for hiring a contractor, homeowners can perform some of the labor on their own.

• Be mindful of permits. Some home improvement projects require permits, and these permits often have expiration dates. Homeowners must keep permits in mind when projects start to stall, recognizing that they may need to reapply for permits if projects go unfinished for especially long periods of time.

Stalled home improvement projects can be a nightmare. But homeowners can address such delays in various ways to get projects back on track.





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Use Renovations to Create Healthier Homes

Home renovation projects are done for several different reasons, whether to update styles, repair damaged or broken items or to achieve more living space. More than ever before, homeowners are choosing improvement projects geared toward making their homes healthier.

Establishing a healthy home means different things to different people. For example, to an environmentalist, a healthy home may incorporate eco-friendly or green products. To those with young children or mobility-impaired seniors, a healthy home may be one free from potential hazards. Others may view a healthy home as one that alleviates allergies.

The World Health Organizations says inadequate housing conditions, such as poor ventilation, radon, urban pollution, and moisture issues, can contribute to many preventable diseases and injuries — especially respiratory problems, nervous system disorders, cardiovascular diseases, and cancer. Furthermore, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency ranks indoor air quality as a top five environmental risk to public health. EPA studies have found that indoor air pollution levels were roughly two to five times greater than outdoor pollution levels.

People interested in making their homes healthier can embrace these renovations and lifestyle changes.

• Be aware of furniture materials. Toxic PBDEs, which are chemicals used as flame retardants on furniture fabrics produced prior to 2006, can send toxins into the air. Some manufacturers may still use these flame retardants in new forms, but with similar risks. Before purchasing furniture, ask if a product is treated, and select naturally fire-resistant materials like wool and cotton.

• Lighten up. Lighting is often underappreciated but can have a dramatic impact on whether a home feels inviting, warm and/or uplifting. Experiment with different types of bulbs and lighting fixtures to turn drab and dreary environments into brighter places. Lighting may improve mood and productivity.

• Let the sun shine in. Modify window treatments to let more sunlight into the house. There is evidence that the sun, particularly UV light, is a potent bactericide. The Sunlight Institute advises that there's no harm in letting natural sunlight do its work, as bacteria within eight feet of low-intensity UV light can be killed in 10 minutes.

• Inspect and service wood-burning appliances. A study published in the American Journal of Respiratory Cell and Molecular Biology has found regular inhalation of wood smoke limits immune activity and function, and anyone who burns wood indoors should be aware of these potential health risks. Ensuring proper ventilation of smoke and routinely cleaning the chimney can help cut down on particulate matter.

• Turn to nontoxic cleaning products, pesticides and insecticides. Always opt for nontoxic, natural products when cleaning in and around the house.

• Declutter the home. A cluttered, hectic space can affect emotions and mental state, never mind attracting dust and making a home harder to clean. Spending time in spaces that do not elicit stressful feelings is healthier and can help residents to rest and recharge. Making a home healthier can be on the list of this year's renovation plans.









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
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
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Major Changes Coming to New Home Building Methods

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
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What to do After Incurring Storm Damage

The 2017 hurricane season proved especially devastating for millions of people in both Texas and Florida. Upon making landfall in Texas in late August, Hurricane Harvey became the first Category 3 or higher hurricane in the United States since Hurricane Wilma in 2005. In its wake, Harvey left damage that Texas governor Greg Abbott estimated could cost as much as \$180 billion to repair.

Just a couple of weeks after Hurricane Harvey touched down, Hurricane Irma hit Florida as a Category 4 storm, knocking out power to nearly seven million people.

Severe storms like hurricanes do not discriminate, and when such storms finally dissipate, people from all walks of life are left to deal with the often devastating consequences. Property damage is one such consequence, and the following are some things people can do in the aftermath of storms that caused damage to their property.

• Contact your insurance provider. • Document the damage. People whose property has been damaged should use their smartphones and cameras to document the damage as extensively as possible. Take photos from various angles before you begin cleaning up. Providers may require visual evidence of the damage before they begin processing your claim, so ask about those requirements when contacting your insurance agent.



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
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to try to do some electrical work around their homes after their homes have been damaged by storms. Electricians are likely busy and might not be able to assess or repair damage for days, if not weeks. But it's still best to wait and allow professionals to do the work. Build escape moments into the plan and make sure everyone else at home is on board. During the real grind of the project, a night or two at a hotel may be a welcome respite.

Home improvement projects ramp up when the weather warms up, as homeowners channel the rejuvenating feelings of spring and tackle their home to-do lists. 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

• Update kitchen or bathroom hardware. Replacing hardware is a fast and easy project, but one that can have immediate impact. Swap out tired or outdated hardware for newer brushed metals and more impactful shapes and designs.

Home renovations do not need to take weeks or months. Many projects can be completed over the course of a weekend.





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Did You Know?

Lead is a naturally occurring element found in the earth's crust that can be toxic to both humans and animals. Lead can be found in air, soil and water, and human exposure to lead can often be traced to human activities, such as the one-time use of leaded gasolines and previous use of lead-based paints in homes. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency notes that lead also may have been used in ceramics, pipes, plumbing materials, and even some cosmetics. Perhaps the most troubling aspect of lead is its potential effect on children. The still-developing brains and nervous systems of children are more sensitive to the harmful effects of lead because their bodies absorb more of it than the bodies of adults. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention notes that the use of lead in house paint, on products marketed to children, including toys, and in dishes or cookware was banned in the United States in 1978. However, lead may still be found on toys imported from countries that have not yet banned lead. In addition, toys and collectibles that were produced prior to the ban in the United States may still contain lead that can be harmful to children and adults. Parents who suspect their children have been exposed to lead can speak with their youngsters' pediatricians, who may order blood tests to check for lead exposure.



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

Did You Know?

According to the United States Department of Labor, single men and women are having an easier time finding work in the slow economy than their married counterparts.

A survey conducted by the Labor Department found that single men and women had lost roughly 5 million jobs during the financial crisis. However, the same survey revealed that single men and women, in spite of the slow job recovery across the country, regained about 90 percent of those jobs.

Married people have not fared nearly as well. Since the onset of the financial crisis, married people lost more jobs (6 million) than single people and have not been nearly as successful regaining those jobs, recouping only about 22 percent.

The disparity could be due to a host of factors, but economists feel married people, many of whom live in dual income households, have had the freedom to be more selective when choosing their next jobs, a freedom not afforded to single men and women.

When the workday is done, workers can turn their computers off completely to save even more energy.

• Reduce paper consumption. Hard copy documents are increasingly going the way of the dinosaur, and that's a good thing for businesses who want to be more eco-friendly. In lieu of storing hard copy documents in filing cabinets or other antiquated storing systems, companies can encourage employees to store files digitally in easily accessible folders on their computers or on company servers. Internal memos need not be printed out and distributed as hard copies when it's just as easy and far less taxing on the environment to share such memos via email. Reducing reliance on hard copy documents can drastically reduce paper consumption and free up space around the office. Plug leaks. In fact, the DOE estimates that taking care of air leaks can save businesses as much as 10 percent off their energy costs. Make sure air ducts and filters are routinely cleaned to ensure heating and cooling systems are operating at optimal efficiency.

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
