Dental problems in pets explored

Special to the Times \mathbf{T} n this article I will discuss the most common disease among dogs and cats known as "periodontal disease".

Periodontal disease is caused by bacteria due to poor oral hygiene. It results in plaque and tartar accumulation leading to redness and swelling both above and below the gum line.

This local infection from mouth can further spread into the body and hence causing oral infection, pain and teeth loss. Signs of dental disease

 Most common symptom reported by pet owners is bad breath.

• Red, swollen, bleeding gums Tartar, plaque buildup on

teeth(seen as brown deposit) • Eating less than usual/decreased

appetite(as it hurts when pet eats) Weight loss due to less nutrition



• Behavior changes(pet may cry or try to bite when touched on face due to tooth pain)

• Difficulty in chewing/chewing on one side of mouth/dropping food when eating

• Swelling on face/under eye(due to an abscessed/infected tooth)

• Nasal discharge How to determine if your pet has periodontal disease

Just like you, your pet needs regular oral exams too. During oral exams your family vet will examine teeth and look out for tartar/plaque buildup on teeth and check

gums for bleeding/swelling/redness (gingivitis).

Your vet will also look for any fractured/broken teeth.

How to treat it

Your family vet will recommend profes-sional dental cleaning under anesthesia which includes ultrasonic deep teeth cleaning, hand scaling above and below gum line, polishing the teeth and rinsing mouth with oral solution afterwards. Additional Therapy may include:

• Dental radiographs

• Extraction of loose/infected teeth/oral surgery

• Antibiotics and pain medications.

• More frequent dental cleanings

How to prevent periodontal disease

• Brushing your pet's teeth is one of best ways to prevent dental disease. Your family veterinarian can show you how to brush your pet's teeth and recommend toothbrush/toothpaste, mouth wash made for pets, etc. • Dental chews/treats can be

given on daily basis to reduce plaque and loosen tartar.

• Regular professional teeth cleaning on annual or semiannual basis before symptoms of periodontal disease appear.

• Oral exams for your pet once every six months.

This all will ensure that your pet always have nice, pearly white teeth and no more stinky breath.

Remember a healthy body starts from a healthy mouth.

The new large granite monument is part of a nationwide tribute to Gold Star Families who have lost loved ones serving in the military. Locally, this monument is the result of a partnership between private sponsors, my office, the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors and Oak Hill Memorial Park. Oak Hill has provided a permanent site, and the County and sponsors pro-

vided the funding. There are 33 monuments installed across the U.S., and 44 others under way.

The movement was started by Hershel "Woody" Williams, a U.S. Marine Corps veteran who served in the battle of Iwo Jima in World War II and was awarded a Congressional Medal of Honor in 1945. He wanted the monuments to honor the Gold Star Families for their sacrifice in losing a son, daughter, sister, brother or parent. After the war, he worked for the Department of Veterans Affairs for 33 years, continuing to serve veterans and their families. He still serves on the Governor's Military Advisory Board in West Virginia.

Tips on how college students can parlay internships into good paying jobs following their graduation

he job market appears a bit more promising for soonto-be college graduates than it has been for most of this decade

Just four years ago, CNN Money reported that 260,000 college grads held minimumwage jobs. Barely 25 percent had a job related to their college major. But this year, the National Association of Colleges and Employers projects, U.S. companies will hire four percent more new college graduates than they did from the Class of 2017.

Yet with more optimistic employment prospects, there's still stiff competition for those first "real" jobs. Who stands the best chance of getting them?

Several studies show that college internships make a significant difference. According to Gallup, for example, recent graduates who had an internship in college were more than twice as likely to be hired for a good, career-related job immediately after graduation.

"The solution for college students is to increase job experience while still in school, and that means obtaining a hands-on internship every summer while in college," says Matthew Stewart, co-founder of College Works Painting, which provides business experience for thousands of college students each vear.

"Unless you graduate college with a significant amount of realworld job experience, finding a job will be incredibly difficult." Stewart gives college students four tips on maximizing their



college internship in order to improve their post-grad job prospects:

• Find an internship that challenges you. An internship experience that will be meaningful on a resume should make demands of the student, Stewart says. Ideally, they're getting a preview of their chosen profession and an idea of the skills they'll need to succeed. "College students should be looking for experiences that will challenge them," Stewart says. "When they get out of school they will be competing with thousands of other graduates. They need to ask themselves, 'Will the internship offer real experience that will separate me from my peers?"

• Treat your internship like a career. "The easiest way to treat vour student job like a career is

to ask your boss to mentor you," Stewart says. "Under the mentorship of your supervisor, you can expand your basic job functions."

• Be proactive, take initiative. Going above and beyond in your internship will set the foundation for your career. "You'll gain confidence by taking initiative, which is a core skill in the business world," Stewart says. "It's important to set goals and have a plan of action around those goals."

• Seek promotion opportunities. "Again, the mentor factor comes in," Stewart says. "Build a strong relationship with your mentor, and let him or her know you are eager for more responsibility and that you're up for the challenge. Always check the company job board."

"College is not the time to relax," Stewart says. "You need to treat college and an internship seriously; it's your future. College consists of three summers of internships, and by the fourth summer students should have what it takes to find a career."

LinkedIn recently found that over half of companies say they are very or extremely focused on diversity. This is good news, especially when you consider this. The World Economic Forum recently estimated that it will take 217 years for women to reach complete equality in pay and employment opportunities

The transparency now available, especially as it relates to employment, is a gold mine for job seekers. Sites such as Glassdoor, LinkedIn, and Indeed.com provide important data points, including how much workers are paid and how employees rate their workplaces.

To further the mission of diversity, Indeed.com recently announced a partnership with three other websites that focus on inclusiveness in the workplace. This partnership with Fairygodboss.com, InHerSight.com, and Comparably.com will help to provide additional information to job seekers.

The information will show up on the not available years ago is the internet. Indeed "Company Pages." It will allow

job seekers to better evaluate the diversity and inclusiveness of an organization. Today's Company Pages include ratings for work/life balance, compensation/benefits, job security/advancement, management, and culture. In the future, there will also be scores from InHerSight. Comparably, and Fairygodboss that will rank the companies from one to five stars and as a number from one to 100.

The internet still remains an unlikely place to land your next job. But, the data available will help you to decide whether or not you want to accept a job offer from a particular company.

Salary data will also help you to know what is considered fair pay in your industry. In corporate roles, employers setup pay bands. It can be surprising to know that for one job, the pay band can sometimes vary as much as \$40,000 or more. That means that one person doing the job may make \$65,000, and another person doing the same job may make over \$100,000. In theory, this range allows companies to compensate employees based upon experience. In reality, how much you make is often tied to how skilled you are at negotiation.

Using the data available online will help vou to ensure vou're getting a fair deal. It will allow you to verify that your future employer is a healthy place to work. And, it will give you a view into your employer's values and priorities.

This sort of valuable feedback is often not something you can typically find out during a job interview.

Long story short, we still have a long way to go on issues related to diversity and pay equality for all people, including women and men from all backgrounds. But, this level of increased transparency will help you to be your own advocate. Perhaps together, we can shorten the time it will take to reach complete equality in the workplace.

EVERGREEN HISTORY: Montgomery Hill 4-H Club

Times staff writer ometimes our heroes and heroines go unsung as they do not like to toot their own horns.

One unsung hero is the founder of the Montgomery Hill 4-H Club in Evergreen, Phyllis Karsten.

The now defunct, Montgomery Hill 4-H Club was founded in 1976. There was already an established 4-H Club in Evergreen, but there was quite an age difference between the 'old timers' and the youngsters from the elementary grades.

Phyllis Karsten, who was resident of many years at 6274 San Felipe Road in Evergreen suggested, "Why not start our own 4-H out here in the country!" South San Felipe Road was considered country at that time. So for lack of a proper place to have 4-H meetings, Karsten decided to organize her own group and, of all places, have it in her own home, her own patio.

Karsten, who is now in her 90's, living in Los Gatos, recalls, "There were several children from the Evergreen School District who rode Mr. McMillon's bus. Since classes were dismissed early one day a week, I suggested that those who were old enough could be dropped off at my house and start a new 4-H Club." Of course, Mr. McMillon insisted on parent approval to drop off the children at a different address.

Richard and Linda Parola, also residents of the San Felipe Road area, were strong supporters of the club, often taking their vacation time to coincide with the Santa Clara County Fair. This assured that there would always be adult supervision of the children who brought their projects and animals to be judged."

The membership fluctuated at around 10 members. Some of the project groups were: Electricity, Horticulture, Leather Craft, Photography, Sheep, Goats, Pigs and Chickens. Different parents volunteered to lead these project areas, and actively assisted greatly by furnishing transportation to the club and also to the regional events.

Mrs. Karsten remembered, "When we tried to decide upon a name, we wanted a name that would reflect our area's history. After much discussion it was decided to honor John J. Montgomery, who did so much aeronautical experimentation on the near-by hill, so we named our group Montgomery Hill 4-H Club." (The hill is now a city landmark with a monument and pocket park at the intersection of San Felipe Rd and Yerba Buena Rd.)

When a sign was needed for the club, instead of sending out for a sign, Phyllis took it upon herself to make one. "My husband had a router so I just went ahead and worked out all the letters in the sign." The sign, reading 'Montgomery Hill 4-H Club', still exists until this day along with the official metal sign. These

signs are hung by the chimney in the patio of her home on San Felipe Road.

This feisty nonagenarian further recollected, "My son, Carl, had a Dairy Goat project in the Club. When his goat kids reached weaning age, we would make arrangements to take the kids, along with the doe, to the Kindergarten classes at Evergreen Elementary School for the children to experience at least one farm animal. While there, along with petting and feeding the kids, we allowed each child to experience milking the doe. This was a very lively day at the kindergarten class!" She cheerfully recalled.

After the Karstens left the area, the Parola family stepped in and became the club leaders. Richard and Linda Parola served until the members were of high school age, and scattered to pursue other interests. Having served its purpose, the club was dissolved.

Karsten still participates in walkathons and other sporting events not allowing her age to prevent her in any way. Hopefully this remembrance will bring joy to some of the past members of the 'Montgomery Hill 4-H Club'! Mrs. Karsten stated, "This is just a very nice recollection of a great activity for the children of Evergreen."

Who knows, Karsten may pass along some other fascinating stories in the future about the earlier days in Evergreen.



MOVIE REVIEW I Can Only Imagine

Most faith-based movies have had limited appeal at the box office.

[^]Since 2014, God's Not Dead, Heaven is for Real and War Room have made some progress at the box office for faith-based movies.

We've had six or seven of these movies that have made \$50- or \$60 million. For an \$8- or \$10 million movie, that's a great return on investment (ROI).

Over the last few years, the quality of faith-based movies has continued to

improve. And here's another good one; I Can Only Imagine... the best faith-based movie I've ever seen.

The Movie is based on the 2001 song, "I Can Only Imagine" bv MercyMe. The song has nearly 29 million views on YouTube. Every song tells a story, but sometimes the story behind a given song is more dramatic than the song itself. That's the case with "I Can Only Imagine." The song surged seemingly out of nowhere to become the biggest-selling Christian single of all time.

But "I Can Only Imagine" didn't come from nowhere. And even though that band's lead singer; Bart Millard, scribbled out the tear-jerking tune about being with Jesus in heaven in just a few minutes on one emotion-filled night, its inspiration was a lifetime in the making. A painful lifetime.

The song was dedicated to his father, Arthur. His father would always yell at Bart. "I'm gonna teach you something, Bart. Dreams don't pay the bills. Nothing good comes from it. All it does is keep you from all this," he says, waving his hands around at their rural home in Greenville, Texas, "from knowing what's real." And with that, he picks up Bart's helmet, takes it out to the garbage barrel that's already burning with the trash, and tosses it into the flames as tears stream quietly down Bart's cheeks.

Bart's father reminded me of my father, because he didn't tell me until I was eighteen that he loved me. My father told me when I was 21 that if I ever talked about Christ or the Bible, he would never speak to me again.

One day the doctors told my father that he was going to die. It changed his life. On his death bed, our entire family prayed and sang our favorite songs with him until he took his last breath. His Bible was completely worn out and scribbled with yellow markers and notes from the Words he had memorized. He told me that before he died that he wanted to memorize the Scriptures better than me. I wrote and sang a song called "There is Love". I dedicated the song to my father and our family.

Everyone has broken dreams. Over time they become distorted.

In the movie, his father's disappointments shattered his soul, and he has no time for the dreams of others. Now he spends his days as a mechanic, his nights verbally and physically working out his bitterness on his wife, Adele, and poor little Bart. Adele ships Bart off to church camp, where he meets a young girl named Shannon who's quite taken with him. When Bart returns home after a spiritually transformative week, however, his mother has gone. Abandoned him to a father who growls more than he speaks, one who's more prone to hit than hug. "Mom left," his dad says simply. "Just you and me now."

It's a sad fate for a boy, a tender dreamer being raised by a man whose dreams are dead.

But Bart strives mightily to earn his crusty father's approval anyway, notably by playing football in high school. But when a terrible tackle breaks both of Bart's legs, the teen's sole path to pleasing his father smacks into a dead end. This film brought a lot home to

me emotionally by trying to please my earthly father and spiritually by trying to please my heavenly Father.

The doctors tell Bart's father that he is dying. Arthur becomes changed man, and is forced to decide whether he could forgive his dad for the lifetime of pain that he's inflicted upon him. Near the end of his life. Arthur offers Bart a remarkable blessing, saying, "I told you not to follow your dreams, but that's only because mine never came true." Then he tells his son that he's been saving money and

has a life insurance policy that should sustain Bart while he pursues his musical career. "And I want you to have that so you can pay attention to your singing; you'll get a check every month. So you can chase your dream. And I want you to catch it. Don't you ever look back. You promise?"

Amy Grant (played by actress Nicole DuPort) plays a surprisingly poignant role in the film's conclusion. She's been given the chance to sing and record "I Can Only Imagine." During a performance where she's supposed to debut the song as her "comeback single," she can't bring herself to sing it, inviting Bart onstage (he's in the audience) instead. She says it's his song, and that it wouldn't be right for her to take it from Bart.

In the end, Bart's painful-but-redeemed relationship with his father becomes the primary inspiration for writing "I Can Only Imagine," a song about what it will be like to be with Jesus in heaven.

Faced with death, faced with his loneliness, faced with his failure, Arthur finds that he's not beyond the reach of God's grace and forgiveness, grace that remakes him. Bart says of his dad, "I saw God transform him from a man that I hated into the man I wanted to become."

I'm not gonna cry, I told myself. I'm not gonna cry. I'm not gonna ... and, I cried throughout the entire film.

All of us have broken places inside. All of us stand in need of redemption. All of us have hurt others and have been hurt by them. And I Can Only Imagine paints one picture of what working through that hurt admittedly, a very dramatic variety of it might look like. It challenges and inspires us to forgive others and to ask for forgiveness in the ways we've failed others.

And I imagine I'm not the only one who's going to have that kind of response.

Pusaka Sunda is a gamelan degung ensemble dedicated to performing traditional and contemporary gamelan degung music from West Java, Indonesia.

In Indonesia, the word "pusaka" means "heirloom"; a pusaka object serves its owner as a concrete symbol of authority, legitimacy, lineage, and succession. "Sunda" is the historical placename for the highlands of the western part of the island of Java in Indonesia, the homeland of the Sundanese people. The Sundanese are patriotic Indonesians, but also look back to the medieval kingdom of Sunda and the Pajajaran Empire to define their identity.

When Sundanese musician and composer Burhan Sukarma formed a gamelan degung group, he named it "Pusaka Sunda" (heirloom of Sunda). Burhan wanted to stress the connection of the group and the music it plays to his




