# Splinters along the journey

An odd title? Perhaps so, but if you think of life as one long journey, you can identify it not only as a beginning and an end, but as a totality of numerous, probably hundreds, of seemingly insignificant experiences or events. My husband likes to call them "splinters" since they are often parts or pieces of your life that do happen, but just don't seem to fall into the category of what you may regard as a major piece of life. Getting married and having children are certainly more than mere trifles or splinters and would qualify as a major piece of life.

Why? Because they represent or are a part of something larger or more significant than themselves. In a sense they add to or embellish a larger concept. One might argue that splinters make up the details of one's personality-they can refer to a "real" situation or development in our lives or something less obvious or defined. For example, a passing thought or feeling might quality as a splinter of a larger piece of life even though none might be regarded as a part of life in and by themselves. In most of our lives we can identify at least some of the various splinters that form the larger or more important pieces.

In looking back on a lifetime, if one were going to jot down an outline of some of the major groups of splinters that contributed to our lives, it might read something like this; childhood, family and early years, education, friends and lovers, aging and retirement, and self analysis. As you can see, each category grows fuzzy as it tries to depict its beginning or end. Like splinters, the phases or segments of our lives merge with time into new categories and/or segments of our lives.



# School update: EL-G administrator shares insights on projects, financing

School District Administrator The goal of the 2015 referendum was two-fold: 1) provide revenue flexibility to not only maintain current programs but continually expand learning opportunities to meet our student needs and state and federal mandates; and 2) replace the aged HVAC at the elementary and high school buildings, in addition to undertaking other maintenance projects when revenue flexibility allowed.

At the time the referendum was passed, a promise was made to the taxpayers that at the end of the referendum period, the 2018-19 school year, the District would again be debt-free.

This article will give you the current state of the District as we are almost through with year 3 of the 4-year referendum period.

The HVAC installation at the elementary building (including the 4th grade level, the daycare/art area, and the gymnasium in the 1938 building) is totally completed. At the high school, the infrastructure is completed with the 6 oldest Reznor units being replaced in the gym, the tech. ed. wing, and the auditorium area.

There are still 6 rooftop units remaining to be "pulled and replaced" when they stop working. This aligns with the original plan. A 5-year loan was taken out to pay for the original work done. As the District made a "double payment" in year 2, we are on track to make the final payment in April 2019—thus honoring our promise made to be debt-free.

In addition, using revenue flexibility, we have increased our fund balance designated for the replacement HVAC units to \$300,000 which should be more than ample to cover these future costs—as was also promised.

During this same time period, we have not only maintained our current programming but have continued to add to our student offerings. Updated curriculum materials have been purchased in the areas of math, science, and language arts; additional courses have been added in the agri-science areas; expanded youth options and work programs/partnerships have been developed, and updated technology and equipment has been incorporated in our CTE (Career and Technical Education) and fine arts areas.

We have adopted the Global Education Achievement Program (with our first recipient being Lauren Boos in 2017) and are very involved currently in developing our ACP (Academic and Career Plans) for our students (and parents) in grades 4-12. In addition to these enhanced program areas, the services required by our special education population have grown and we have worked hard to provide the staffing and services to meet these individual student needs.

Throughout this time, our students continue to do very well academically. We have maintained our high ratings on the state report cards of "Exceeds Expectations" as a District and at the high school level, and 'Significantly Exceeds Expectations" at the Elementary/Middle School level. We are proud of all we are able to do by working together with our students, our families and our community.

In addition to curricular enhancements and updates, for the first two years of the referendum, as the revenue flexibility was not needed for any "ongoing" expenses (as was projected when the referendum was passed), additional maintenance work was able to be undertaken along with making the double loan payment in year two. Projects completed since the summer of 2015 include the following:

Replaced exterior lighting fixtures at the elementary school

Installed new lighting in elementary/ middle and high school parking lot areas (also includes the new lighting in the front of the high school)

Resurfaced high school areas including front and back parking lot

Resurfaced tennis courts

Updated phone/paging system districtwide

Updated 1957 elementary and 1938 child care bathrooms

Updated Grinder pump at elementary school

Redid/updated storm sewer at elementary/middle school

Replaced electrical panel at the high school

Installed emergency lighting in high school tech. ed. area

Installed emergency shut-offs in high school tech. ed. and science areas

New generator at the high school

Added additional security cameras/ updated system for monitoring cameras district-wide

Increased/expanded wireless access district-wide

Updated Boy's bathroom on main floor of high school

Made both bathrooms on high school main floor ADA compliant (sink fixtures, stall area)

Replaced high school kitchen flooring with tiling; abatement done when removing old flooring

Replaced high school science lab faucets/ replaced work sinks in tech. ed and agri-science room areas Renovated front entrance at high school to make it secure

Redid high school front exterior – new fascia; new lettering

Replaced high school band room windows

Replaced door hardware in the middle and high schools to make ADA compliant and also to enable doors to be locked from inside the rooms (security feature)

Put new carpeting in the elementary/ middle school office area, 4th grade hallways/classrooms, balcony yes

Painted elementary/middle school gym Installed LED lighting in high school gym

Constructed "Makerspace" area in elementary/middle school IMC

Renovated Kohl Technology Center (moved to new location, new electrical, carpeting, improved electrical, shelving)

Installed Solar Panels at high school (resulted from student-led sustainable energy project done by Holly Francis under the direction of Mr. Travis Moore)

Replaced high school ceiling tiles – main hallway, office areas

Professionally repainted front doors (elementary/middle school) and middle school bathroom partitions

Purchased new school van in 2015 to reduce bus/employee transportation costs (Dodge Caravan)

Redid landscaping at Kohl Fitness Center

Fixed "void" under Day Care flooring; installed new carpeting

In addition to projects funded through the District budget, the following projects were undertaken with the majority or all of the cost being raised through very generous donations by individuals, businesses, community members, and/ or various foundations and organizations.

Constructed new Greenhouse/Aquaponics facility (approximate cost: \$250,000)

Renovated/Constructed Inclusive Playground areas at elementary/middle school (approximate cost for both phases: \$250,000)

New football/soccer scoreboard (Lions donation)

Updated auditorium lighting and electrical (Valeria Mauk Memorial Family Donation)

While the costs of the above-mentioned projects vary, they all add value to the buildings and the district.

Our goal has always been to continually

maintain, update and/or improve our facilities when funds are available through referendum dollars. As referendum monies are for a "fixed" period, if possible, we prefer to direct these funds to one-time expenditure projects. When funds are not available, we have been very fortunate to live in a community that has very generously helped us raise money to cover the costs of these additional projects.

The initial part of this article explains what has been done so far in the first 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  years of the referendum.

Unfortunately, due to the way the Revenue Limit formula is structured, we will not be able to continue to do as much in the way of additional projects, purchasing updated technology and equipment, etc. in the last 1 ½ years. In fact, for the first time in the referendum period, we will need to use the revenue flexibility provided to help us meet our annual regular budget expenses.

We had projected this need when we determined the amount and structure of the 2015 referendum question, but we were hoping more would change legislatively to assist with our school funding. While there were some funding increases this past budget, for our District, it does not offset the amount of revenue we have lost under the revenue limit formula the past years.

As the revenue limit formula is based on student enrollment, as our enrollment declines, the amount of revenue we can raise is reduced. For example, our base revenue (not including exemptions such as our referendum amount) has decreased from \$5,043,035 in 2014-15 (the year our referendum was passed) to \$4,685,109 this current year and a projection of \$4,518,831 in 2018-19 (the final referendum year). This would be a decrease of our ability to raise approximately \$525,000 less over a five-year period, or a loss of approximately 10%. This will have a major impact going forward.

The good news is our student population is projected to stabilize at our current level (though growth would be better but that's a different subject for the direction of growth in our communities). However, under the revenue limit formula, this stabilization has negative financial impacts short-term. While a district is in declining enrollment, they are given flexibility annually. For example, last year we were

able to include a "declining enrollment exemption" of \$167,000; in 2018-19 this decreases to an estimated \$89,000 and in 2019-20 it is totally gone. As was stated, the amount of increased state support we will now be receiving, while appreciated, addresses only a small portion of the revenue we have had to reduce or will need to reduce under the revenue limit formula used to determine the tax levy for our school funding. While we will be fine financially as a District during the current referendum period, will meet the goals we set forth for that time frame, and will again be debt-free at the end, our financial needs going forward will not be able to be met or even maintained.

It appears we will need to go to referendum again to ask our taxpayers for continued revenue limit flexibility, which is what the legislature does want school districts to do.

Their goal is not to have the State raise local taxes, but to let individual communities make that decision locally by going to referendum. That is why you have seen such an increase in school referendums in the recent years. Most schools in our area have either had one, several or will be doing one soon.

It's become the way schools need to function to continue to do business. This is not a commentary on whether it's the right approach or not...it's just the way it is.

The good news for our community is, as we have had to lower our revenue limit, our school taxes have also continued to decrease.

As a result, our referendums have not had the same financial impact as others in our area. But please know, this does not mean the decision to go to referendum or determining the amount and/or scope of a referendum is taken lightly. Much planning, thought, and preparation is done before a referendum is decided. To that end, we will be including the community in the planning process by conducting a continued from page 4

community survey. We are working with School Perceptions to help us create and disseminate the survey which will get your general thoughts on how well the District has been doing, the direction in which the school district is heading or should be heading, and the areas/projects you feel should be supported in the future and would be willing to support. This is the same company that has done surveys throughout the state, including area school districts such as Plymouth, Sheboygan Falls, Sheboygan, Howards Grove, Random Lake and Oostburg. The tentative launch date is late spring or early summer. Additional information will be sent to you before this time. When distributed, your participation is totally anonymous and totally voluntary.

However, our goal is that all residents will, at the very least, read through the survey and hopefully most will take the survey. The more feedback the District and the School Board receive from the community, the more informed their decision-making can be going forward because, as always, the education of the students of ELGS has been a community effort and will continue to be so.







# Preserving the old racing circuit

### HRC of Elkhart Lake preserves awareness of early EL racing Historic Race Circuits of Elkhart Lake

Historic Race Circuits of Elkhart Lake is dedicated to preserving the history and supporting the care and enjoyment of the public road race circuit used in and around Elkhart Lake from 1950-52.

The group is an all volunteer organization and no officer or staff member receives any compensation. HRC volunteers are working through the community, local elected officials and Sheboygan County Highway Department to help preserve the historical attributes of the Elkhart Lake Historic Race Circuits, one of the few early open road racing circuits in America.

Through its continuing activities, HRC sponsors events and programs that raise public awareness of this valuable historical resource, to maintain the historical markers placed around the circuits and to promote maintenance of the roads comprising the circuits in a preservation sensitive manner.

Current serving directors are George Bruggenthies, John Calhoun, Tom Hollfelder, Jerry Liebetrau, Dick Lind, Clyde Morter, Mark Pfaller II.

Spencer Chapple is a director emeritus.

The open road sports car races held in 1950 through 1952 were conceived and operated by the members of the Chicago Region of the Sports Car Club of America (SCCA). Jim Kimberly is acknowledged as the person who selected Elkhart Lake and was the driving force behind organizing the races along with Fred Wacker, Karl Brocken and C. Bayard Sheldon.

According to the Historic Racing Circuit website, Elkhart Lake was at a low point in its economic history and Jim Johnson, President of the Elkhart Lake Bank, felt that the races would bring a new energy to the area. Joined by Fire Chief Ray Kramer and Resort owner Ollie Siebken Moeller, a strong community effort was mounted that resulted in dozens of volunteers coming forward to help organize the races. Governor Walter Kohler, who had a summer home on Elkhart Lake, helped pave the way.

The 1950 races, held on the 3.35-mile circuit north of the lake, had the flavor of a typical club event. All the drivers and cars came out of the Chicago Region and most cars were driven to the event, raced and then driven home.

The event took place on Sunday, July 23 and five races were held with cars divided into two classes: under 1500cc and over 1500cc. Two 30-mile races for novice drivers were held, one in each class. A novice driver was defined as one who had never finished higher than fifth in any open road race. The novice races were followed by a 15-mile ladies race that combined both classes. The day was concluded with two 60-mile races for experienced drivers, one in each class. The event was very successful with an estimated 5,000 spectators in attendance.

The 1951 and 1952 races were held on a new 6.5-mile circuit that circumvented the lake and had a much different flavor. The Chicago Region of the SCCA planned, promoted and orchestrated the races and nationwide promotion attracted celebri-

ties and professional race teams from across the country.

The 1951 races were held on Sunday, August 26 and three races were scheduled with cars divided into four SCCA classes. The first event was a five-lap race (approximately 32 miles) for novice drivers mixing all classes in the same race. The second event was planned as a ladies race but was cancelled due to threatening weather. The third race was a 30-lap race (approximately 200 miles) for experienced drivers, again mixing all classes. John Fitch, driving a Cunningham CR2, won the race. Although no official attendance records were kept, spectator attendance was estimated to be in the area if 50,000. The 1952 races were held over the course of two days, Saturday and Sunday, September 6 and 7. The first race was held on Saturday, a 15-lap (approximately 100 miles) event for cars between 1950ccs and 4000ccs. The race was for the Sheldon Cup, named for one of the race founders C. Bayard Sheldon. Future F1 World Champion Phil Hill won in a C-type Jaguar. There were two races held on Sunday. The first race for the Kimberly Cup was a 15-lap (approximately 100 miles) event for cars under 1950ccs. The winner was Bill Spears driving an OSCA. The main event for the Elkhart Lake Cup was a 30-lap (approximately 200 miles) race for cars over 1950ccs. The winner was John Fitch in a Cunningham CR4. There were a total of 238 cars entered in the three races, a far cry from the 33 cars raced in 1950. Attendance


was estimated to exceed 100,000.

Although open road racing ended in 1952, it was not the end of sports carrelated activities in the Village of Elkhart Lake. In 1955, Road America, one of the premier closed circuit road race courses in the world, was opened just a little southeast of the original open road circuits.

The Village continued as a center for gatherings of sports car enthusiasts.

Concours and car club events are often held on the streets where sports cars once raced. These events frequently include formal police-escorted reenactment tours of the historic circuits. Many clubs and individuals informally tour the circuits throughout the year and the rumble of sports car engines are still heard where now vintage racers once roared.

# Preserving history has its challenges

Maintaining historic racing circuits doesn't come without its set of challenges. Sometimes the wheels of progress spin in opposite directions than that desire to

preserve history. In January 2002, the Sheboygan County Highway Department announced plans for "reconstruction" of a County Road A, a part of the race circuits.

The project called for straightening, widening, and leveling the road, changing its historic character. Broad-based opposition to the project sprang up immediately. Throughout 2002 and 2003 the opposition circulated petitions and filed protests with the County Transportation Committee and the County Board of Supervisors, but the Highway Department continued with its plan.

By the spring of 2004 the Highway Department began removing trees along the right-of-way to prepare for the next summer's construction.

Protests escalated in March, when the Road America Board of Directors voted and approved a resolution "... to preserve and protect the original road configuration." In April, the Milwaukee Region SCCA (Sports Car Club of America) asked the County for a halt to the project. Although the Highway Department had been advised of the existence of the race circuits, they seemed indifferent to the requests for preservation.


Since the County's funding plan for reconstruction on the historic circuit included the use of Federal highway, the project fell under the provisions of the National Historic Preservation Act. The Act was adopted by Congress to prevent the destruction of historically significant structures and sites. Early in 2004, acting for HRC, Road America filed a formal request for a Determination of Eligibility for preservation of the historic circuits under the Preservation Act. In July 2004, the historic circuits were declared eligible for preservation and all construction activity was suspended.

Once the historic race circuits were declared eligible for preservation, a process of mitigation began under \$106 of the Historic Preservation Act. §106 required the Highway Department to seek input from the public and negotiate with interested parties, including HRC. After gathering input at a public meeting held in September 2004 and in consideration of the negotiation required, the County

withdrew its request for Federal funding in February 2005. This ended the \$106 proceeding.

Termination of the \$106 process meant that HRC needed to find another way to preserve the race circuits. In 2002, under similar circumstances, the historic open road race circuits located in Watkins Glen, New York, had been preserved by obtaining listing as a historic site on the State and National Register of Historic Places. Following the example of Watkins Glen, HRC sponsored and funded the nomination of the Elkhart Lake Open Road Race Circuits for inclusion in the Wisconsin Register of Historic Places. On September 23, 2005 the historic circuits were listed on the Wisconsin State Register and declared eligible for listing on the National Register. On February 17, 2006 they were listed on the National Register of Historic Places, joining Watkins Glen as the only other historic open road race circuit so preserved.

Despite listing on the National Register and the protections that the listing affords under Wisconsin historic preservation laws, in November 2008 the Sheboygan County Highway Department undertook an unauthorized cut and fill project removing portions of the banks on the north side of the CTH A section of the historic circuits in the area of Hamill's Hollow. HRC notified the Wisconsin State Historical Societies Preservation Officer who on investigation found that the unauthorized project had an adverse effect on the historic property. As partial remediation for this unauthorized action, the Highway Department was required to contract with an independent archeological historian to prepare a Preservation and Maintenance Plan for the Historic Circuits. Subsequently, the Highway Department contracted with Heritage Research, Ltd. of Menomonee Falls, Wisconsin for

After many false starts, lengthy negotiations and seemingly unending frustrations, Heritage completed a draft of the Plan late in 2009 and submitted it for review by the Historical Society.

In 2010 the Plan was approved by the Historical Society and subsequently formally adopted by the Sheboygan County Highway Department. Adoption of the Plan is a significant step toward insuring that the Elkhart Lake Historic Race Circuits will be maintained in their original unaltered configuration for the enjoyment of current and future generations.

# Serving meals to county shut-ins

Fresh Meals on Wheels efforts include county and village of Elkhart Lake

One of the Elkhart Lake Chamber of Commerce's newest members has been making an impact on Sheboygan County residents for nearly 50 years.

Bolstered by the efforts of an army of volunteers, Meals on Wheels reaches out to provide nutritional needs for its clients in communities throughout Sheboygan County, including Elkhart Lake.

Meals on Wheels of Sheboygan County is a 501 (c)(3) not for profit charitable organization, dating to its incorporation in 1970.

The program started with one route of six clients. Within two months, a third round was established. In 1971, the first Plymouth route was established.

. By 1978, the program was expanded to Kohler, Sheboygan Falls and Elkhart Lake. Today, Fresh Meals on Wheels serves 21

routes throughout the county. A major funding source for Meals on

Wheels is the United Way of Sheboygan County. Key to the fundraising effort are multiple fundraising events, including Love Bowls and June-A-Palooza.

#### Meals prepared daily

All meals for clients are prepared and portioned out in the kitchen at Fresh Meals on Wheels located on Taylor Drive in Sheboygan.

A complete kitchen facility allows the staff to prepare meals on site. Each meal is packaged according to client needs and tracked by a computer program to assure that individual nutrition needs are appropriately met. From the kitchen, the meals are kept warm in special transportation carts, then trucked to the outlying community locations for distribution by volunteers.

Clients can sign up for Meals on Wheels in as little as five minutes. A simple phone call to 920-451-7071 gets the process started.

Meals will ask several questions about the applicants background, including name, address, phone number, date of birth, doctor, dietary restrictions and any special delivery instructions.

It is also possible to order meals for a family member, neighbor or friend. Call the same number, and ask to speak with client coordinator Maureen about the request.

Meals on Wheels also offers gift certificates for purchase in any amount.

A week or month of Meals on Wheels makes a nice gift for special occasions. Special cards can be sent announcing a gift.

#### **Eligibility criteria**

Eligibility to receive meals does not depend on age or income.

A client is determined to be eligible if they fit the criteria below—if the person

■ is primarily homebound

- has difficulty in preparing a nutritious meal
- has no consistent day time help with meal prepartion

■ is able to accept meals between 11:15 and 12:30 on weekdays, and



Meals are individually packaged for client needs at Fresh Meals on Wheels, and trucked to the corresponding community, where volunteers distribute the nutritious contents.



■ needs a minimum delivery of three meals per week.

Short term service is available to people who need home-delivered meals while recuperating from an illness, recovering from an injury, or to provide caretakers a break.

The average start time once an application is received is 2 working days.

#### **Costs structure**

Meals On Wheels charges \$6.50 for the noon meal, or for \$9.45 you can receive the noon meal and a light evening meal. Invoices are sent out at the end of the month for the meals you've received during the month.

Someone other than the client can be billed for the meals with prior arrangements. Please call 920-451-7011 for more details. Gift certificates are available also.

#### Volunteers key to service

Volunteers are the lifeblood for Fresh Meals on Wheels of Sheboygan County.

Every weekday, volunteers from all over Sheboygan County help deliver the meals. Various churches, businesses and service organizations sponsor routes as well. Volunteers not only deliver the meals, they also provide a daily safety check for homebound individuals.

Volunteers come from all walks of life, students, retirees and working people on their lunch breaks.

Meals on Wheels of Sheboygan County is deeply grateful to the many business, churches and service organizations that volunteer their time to deliver meals.

Other volunteer opportunities are also available, including office help—assisting with mailings, preparing bags for evening meals or lending an extra pair of hands on small office projects.

In the kitchen, volunteers can assist by helping to package dessert or other items in the Meals Produce Processing center. Extra help is always needed during the growing season.

Volunteers are also needed for the two major fundraising events - Love Bowls in February and June-A-Palooza near the end of June.

#### Grow a row

Fresh Meals on Wheels of Sheboygan County is a trailblazing organization, being one of the first such agencies nationwide to include fresh donated purchases in our meals.

All of this is possible because of the friends of the organization that make it a priority to care for neighbors in need.

Those interested in participating are encouraged to "grow-a-row" in their vegetable garden.

From asparagus to zucchini, Fresh Meals on Wheels is glad to accept any contribution from a handful of tomatoes or peppers to a trailer full of squash.



#### **False Alarm Ordinance**

The Village Board has passed a false alarm ordinance. Each time the Village of Elkhart Lake Police Department, Fire Department, or First Responders respond to a false alarm arising from an intrusion alarm and/or fire and/or emergency medical alarm, the Village Clerk's Office should be notified to determine what, if any, service charge is applicable.

- A service charge for excessive alarms shall be charged for false alarms in a 12-month period (January-December of the same year) as follows:

a. No service charge shall be charged for the first alarm occurring within a calendar year.

b. 2nd occurrence shall result in a service fee of \$100

c. 3rd occurrence shall result in a service fee of \$175

d. 4th occurrence shall result in a service fee of \$200

e. 5th and subsequent occurrences shall result in a service fee of \$400 per occurrence.

- There are certain cases when no service fee shall be assessed.

last few years, so the Village is taking a few steps to help this issue. The Village has placed signs between the Osthoff's beach and the resident's beach. The Village is also reminding people that the Village beach is for residents of the Elkhart Lake-Glenbeulah Joint School District only, per Village Ordinance. The police will be monitoring beach use more frequently. The prices of the passes increased to \$5 for residents and \$30 for school district residents. The Village Board also raised the price of replacement passes to \$25 for Village residents and \$50 for school district residents. We are encouraging rental properties to have their guests use Fireman's Park. This is the public access to the lake that should be used for guests. Beach passes will be available at the beginning of May. Some of the other regulations include:

• No person shall allow a dog to be on any public beaches owned or leased by the Village.

• No person shall use or possess beverages containing alcohol on the public beaches owned or leased by the Village.

• No person shall ignite nor maintain fires of any kind on the public beaches owned or leased by the Village.

#### **Planning Commission**

The Planning Commission met on April 11. The Commission recommended to the Village Board that we enter into a development agreement with Mark Leibham and Jesse Berg to build a four-unit building that would accommodate apartments and retail space. WAKE" at all times when operating a motor boat between the shoreline and the NO WAKE buoys and within 100 feet of any craft at anchor, adrift or not operating under engine power.

4. No boat towing persons skiing, tubing or the like can come within 100 feet of swimmers, divers, rafts, other boats or restricted areas.

5. All boats engaged in towing skiers, tubers or persons in similar activities must have a competent person, other than the pilot, observing the towed person(s).

6. NO SUNDAY operation of motor driven boats, beginning the 2nd Sunday of June and ending the 3rd Sunday of September. Note: Only electric trolling motors allowed.

7. There is a radar-enforced speed limit of 35 m.p.h. on the water.

8. A counter-clockwise course should be maintained while water-skiing, jet skiing, etc., and during the times of high-volume boat activity.





We received three entries for the April photo contest, all good entries. The following was the submission of the

April winner—Gina Kauer.

The April mystery photo is of the Villa Gottfried. Our sons' cottage is on the actual site of the villa and we live just to the east of the old Villa site and now own the Villa's boathouse, which was purchased and restored by Harry and Sis Bremer in the early 1950s. Harry chose to restore the boathouse instead of tearing down what was then an almost unsalvageable building. Our property has stonewalls from the Villa era and our driveway curb is the original curb from the Villa's carriage way. Our powder room has an original Gottfried Villa marble sink that was salvaged by Harry Bremer.

Gottfried Villa was built by Matheus Gottfried in 1890. He reportedly spent \$200,000 to build his summer home. The dwelling was a wooden replica of a castle on the River Rhine in his native Germany. The turreted mansion of countless rooms had circular staircases and marble fireplaces along with marble bathroom floors. Guesthouses, servant quarters, a floating pavilion, an aquarium, conservatory and boathouse also existed. He also had a bandstand on stilts, where German actors and musicians performed, plus a coffeehouse on the lakefront. Mr. Gottfried made his fortune from patents on an iron rim bunghole for beer barrels and barrel pitching machine. It was a grand home with estimates of 400 acres of property on which he kept herds of deer, elk and purebred horses and cattle. Mr. Gottfried also owned other property in the Village of Elkhart, which included a horse race track and power plant.

The ornate structure in the picture just to the west of the boathouse is the bandstand, which stood on pilings offshore

The two other entry submissions are also published her for their historical and anecdotal value.

"I think that is a photo of the Villa Gottfried, probably taken from the outlet. There is a floating bandstand at the right of the photo next to the boathouse. Although the villa was gone long before my time, my grandparents had photos and postcards of it, and talked about the bandstand. I think the boathouse still exists, and I use to swim across the lake to it every morning from Camp Brosius when I was working there as a waitress in the 1970s."

"The photo is of the Gottfried estate. More interesting is the structure on the lake to the right, the Gottfried Pagoda.

Mr. Gottfried built the Pagoda in 20 feet of water. He built it on pilings . On Sundays he hired bands to play for the enjoyment of all the people of Elkhart Lake.

When the ice finally brought it down, the pilings fell to the bottom. My brotherin-law (Jim Benson) and I would dive on the area when we were just teenagers. The pilings rose 10 feet from the bottom and made an ideal habitat for fish. We would see large walleye and huge bluegill. The pilings are still there today.

The large home of the Gottfried estate stood for many years longer. Mr. Gottfried built the first electric generating plant in the area. He shared the electricity with the village. There was also a horseracing tract.

My wife of 53 years, who was then France Benson, told me her grandmother and her aunt would walk from their farm on Garton Road north of HWY 67 (then 57) to work as maid and cooks helper at the estate. They would take the path around the lake. If you walk around the lake you can still see the foundation of the main building.

This was really a grand era in the history of Elkhart Lake."


