## Unselfish sacrifices for public safety

Having been in the active law enforcement profession for nearly 40 years, I feel compelled to comment on the current state of law enforcement that I have observed during my career. America's police are some of the most educated, professionally trained and highly regulated police officers in the world. I never cease to wonder at the dedication and selflessness of our sons and daughters who have volunteered for public service in a profession that, at times, is under-appreciated.

The loss of two New York City Police Officers to a cowardly assassin should be a time of reflection on the many sacrifices our police officers make to protect the public. In my career, I have witnessed incredible bravery and sacrifice by our police officers to bring to justice criminals who break our laws. It grieves me to see some of our highest elected officials create an atmosphere that fosters distrust of our police. Yes, our profession is not without a very small percentage of personnel who have proved unfit for service.

Yet the solution of some of our elected officials is to paint, with a broad brush, that our police are untrained and insensitive. Indeed, some legislators want to force police to carry around video cameras to monitor behavior. Really? There is no need for video-profiling of police, and I would hope our legislators understand that police are not the enemy, but our sons and daughters who have made many unselfish sacrifices to keep our public safe.

When law enforcement officers die, as recently happened in New York City, the very fabric of society is torn. Many wonderful citizens have spoken to us voicing their support for the police. I would hope that our elected officials are listening.



## Carozza appointed to Appropriations Committee

District 38C Del.-Elect Mary Beth Carozza (R-Worcester and Wicomico) was appointed to the Appropriations Committee in the Maryland House of Delegates by Speaker of the House Michael Busch (D-Anne Arundel). The appointment was made with the full support of House Minority Leader Nic Kipke (R-Anne Arundel).

Carozza will be one of 12 freshman delegates on the 26 member Appropriations committee, which will be involved in crafting the state's annual budget and in state spending decisions across the board. The Appropriations Committee, like all House Committees for the upcoming session, was balanced to reflect the demographic, geographic and party makeup of the House of Delegates.

Carozza's appointment to the Appropriations Committee also is of huge importance to the Eastern Shore given the departures of incumbent Appropriations Committee Chairman Norm Conway (D-Wicomico) and Del. Addie Eckardt (R-Caroline, Dorchester, Talbot and Wicomico) with her election to the State Senate. Following the appointment of

Carozza to the Appropriations Committee, Kipke said, "I encouraged Speaker Busch to appoint Del.-Elect Mary Beth Carozza to the House Appropriations Committee, and I am delighted that Mary Beth will serve there. She is in a key position to work on the priorities of the Shore while being a responsible steward of Maryland taxpayer dollars as we meet the challenge of closing the State's \$1.2 billion deficit."

After receiving news of her appointment, Carozza said, "I am excited and looking forward to the challenge of serving our Shore community on the House Appropriations Committee. I am committed to putting Maryland's fiscal house in order while supporting our Shore priorities by focusing on cost-effective, efficient and outcome-based results."

Carozza also is committed to working with her colleagues on both sides of the aisle and the Hogan-Rutherford Administration in closing the state's \$1.2 billion deficit.

The drive-in movie theater was the brainchild of Richard Hollingshead, Jr., an auto products sales manager at his father's Whiz Auto Products store. Hollingshead wanted to combine his passion for automobiles with his love of films. After testing different parking configurations and imitating weather conditions in his own driveway to simulate the drive-in movie experience, Hollingshead filed for a patent for the drive-in theater. He received the patent on May 16, 1933. The first drive-in was opened on June 6, 1933, in Camden, N.J. The price of admission was \$.25 for the car and each person inside. Drive-in theaters peaked in popularity in the 1950s, when there were roughly 5,000 drive-ins operating across the United States and Canada. According to Drive-Ins.com, currently there are about 365 drive-ins remaining in the United States and 55 in Canada.

# There's a lot that goes into naming a baby

Three baby girls were born toward the end of this year, each to a couple in the greater United States: residents of Massachusetts, Montana and Ohio. Well, you say, "So what?" For those who find numbers intriguing and sequences fascinating, these babies were born at 10:11 a.m. on 12-13-14. This represents the last sequential calendar date for at least 20 years and will not occur until January 2, 2034. (Even more interesting is that one baby's birth weight was 7.84 pounds, which almost moved into place with the other numbers. A fraction of an ounce more and she would have weighed 7.89 pounds.)

And what is the birth of a baby without all the thought beforehand

that goes into the decision of the most suitable name for that offspring? After all according to the Social Security Administration a boy born now will live until age 84 and a girl until age 86 while one out of those 10 will live past 95 so the name will be around for quite awhile. Naming a child presents a momentous decision for young parents. Some agonize on this until the moment of birth while others spend very little time. Society's newest members do not need preposterous names nor ones that are unpronounceable and a spelling nightmare, yet many parents want a name that will stand out in the crowd.

Laws regulating the choice of both first names and surnames are common around the world. Most countries ban names spelled in foreign alphabets as well as restrict the use of foreign diacritical marks. And many countries publish banned and approved name lists. Governments argue that all rules are meant to protect children from being saddled with names that may cause problems in later life and to block names that might cause offense to others. In comparison to other countries, America has the most tolerant naming laws: what can be spelled with standard letters (however eccentrically) is allowed.

Celebrities like to push this advantage. In the high-lighted past there was Frank Zappa who named his child Moon Unit and Gwyneth Paltrow who named her daughter Apple. More recently rapper Jay-Z and his wife Beyonce named their daughter Blue Ivy. He tried to trademark the baby's name for future use but the U.S. Patent Office turned down his petition.



But everyday Americans look for the unusual or outrageous too. For instance there is the couple in New Jersey who had named their boy Adolph Hitler and was reported to Social Services. (It is the state governments that impose restrictions and officials will step in when they consider a child "vulnerable.") According to Social Security records for girls in 2009, 328 of them across the nation were named ABCDE.

Special names will always be heard along with the more familiar ones like John and Mary. Back in 1954 a baby girl was named Condoleezza because it was similar to "musical direction meaning to play with sweetness." And in the early 1960s a boy, now Chief White House Correspondent with CBS News was named Major Garret. It is his proper name and does not indicate

any military rank.

The trend for the last few years has been toward using surnames as first names for either girls or boys and so we have Madison and Hunter. But according to Social Security records for 2013 the most popular names for boys, in descending order were, Noah, Liam, Jacob, Mason and William. And for girls it was Sophia, Emma, Olivia, Isabella and Ava.

As for the names of the 10:11 12/13/14 girls they are: Clare Elizabeth (Uxbridge, Massachusetts, which has a state law limiting any name to 40 characters), Hazel Grace (Cleveland, Ohio) and Quincy (Billings, Montana).

But then it was William Shakespeare through a character named Juliet many years ago who first asked that big question, "What's in a name?"

## Lifestyle Balance returns

The Lifestyle Balance Program, a year-long, healthy eating, physical activity and weight loss initiative, returns to the shore this January with group sessions offered in both Snow Hill and Berlin. The program has been proven effective in reducing the risk for type 2 diabetes and other chronic diseases, assisting in weight loss and maintaining a healthy bodyweight while also decreasing the risk for heart disease and stroke.

The first session with certified lifestyle coaches will be offered in Snow Hill beginning January 5. It will be sponsored by the Worcester County Health Department (WCHD) and Snow Hill Volunteer Fire Department. A session will also be offered in Berlin beginning January 14 and will be sponsored by WCHD.

Lifestyle Balance helps participants improve their food choices and increase their activity levels. Those diagnosed with pre-diabetes or with a family history of gestational diabetes can especially benefit from Lifestyle Balances; potentially losing 5- to 7-percent of bodyweight and cutting the risk for type 2 diabetes in half.

Since beginning the program in 2009, participants working with WCHD have lost a combined total of over 3,000 pounds and improved aspects of their health such as blood pressure and cholesterol levels. Some recent participants have stated that they "truly believe [Lifestyle Balances] helped save" their lives.

The Lifestyle Balances Program is taught by CDC National Diabetes Program Prevention trained instructors including a certified exercise specialist, registered dietitian and a health educator. The first group session will be held at the Snow Hill Volunteer Fire Department, 4718 Snow Hill Road, Snow Hill, starting Monday, January 5. The program will meet Mondays from 6 to 7 p.m. for 16 weeks. After that period, sessions will meet once per month for the following six months.

The Berlin sessions will be held at St. Paul's United Methodist Church, 405 Flower Street, Berlin, starting Wednesday, January 14, 2015. It will meet Wednesdays from 5 to 6:30 p.m.

This format, which adheres to the guidelines recommended by the Government Finance Officers Association, provides full accountability to Worcester County citizens and others with an interest in government finances. The CAFR outlines County finances and reflects a long-established history of prudent fiscal management practices.

Chris Hall of TGM Group, LLC, Certified Public Accountants met with the Commissioners on December 16, to review Worcester County Government's annual financial report for the year ending June 30, 2014. He advised that the findings of TGM's Independent Audit Report reveal that Worcester County's financial statements are both complete and accurate due to the exercising of tight internal controls, assuring that this required information remains compliant with generally accepted accounting principles.

Worcester County Government remains compliant with the internal policy requiring that a reserve fund be maintained at a level equal to 10% of budgeted annual General Fund expenditures.





ment at 410-632-0056.

Professionally trained instructors can help participants create a supportive environment to break the smoking addiction. Each individual will learn how to develop a customized plan for quitting. The smoking cessation course consists of seven sessions covering topics such as stress management, weight control, assertive communication, how to develop a quit plan, relapse prevention and physical activity.

Vouchers are available if a participant would like to add nicotine replacement therapy to their behavior change efforts. Nicotine replacement therapies covered by the voucher program include the patch, gum and lozenge. Vouchers are also available to help offset the cost of CHANTIX for individuals meeting specific program requirements.

Instructors will teach a step-by-step method for changing behavior and quitting smoking. A registered dietitian will teach participants how to reduce weight gain when quitting smoking. The group approach uses positive thinking, alternative behaviors and group support to help participants stop smoking.

As part of the course, the participants will learn how to identify triggers for relapse and how to develop a plan to prevent it. The course will teach you how to quit smoking and how to stay quit.

# 'Auld Lang Syne' is a New Year's tradition

New Year's Eve festivities peak when the official countdown of the clock begins. After the ball drops and midnight has arrived, revelers cheer to the new year and exchange kisses and well wishes.

Once such wishes have been exchanged, many people begin to sing "Auld Lang Syne." But few know what "Auld Lang Syne" means or why it is sung on New Year's Eve. Confusion regarding this song is almost as notable as the tradition of singing it. Many people mumble through the lyrics because they never bothered to learn them.

"Auld Lang Syne" is a Scottish composition that is well over 200 years old. Written by Robert Burns in the 1700s, the author never intended for the song to become a staple of the holiday season. It was originally a poem that was later put to the tune of a traditional folk song. The title translates roughly in English as "old long since," or "long, long ago." The song pays homage to times gone by and past experiences.

The song has been performed at group jamborees, funerals and other special occasions all over the world, but it is best known for its affiliation with New Year's festivities. The man behind that affiliation may be Canadian musician Guy Lombardo, whose band used "Auld Lang Syne," as a bridge between two radio programs during a live New Year's Eve performance in 1929. Coincidentally, the song was played directly after the clock struck midnight, laying the groundwork for a New Year's Eve tradition. Now "Auld Lang Syne" has forever been tied to well-intentioned resolutions and sappy slaps on the back. Despite selling millions of records, Lombardo became more famous for his New Year's Eve song than anything else.

Confusion over "Auld Lang Syne" remains to this day. It has been the butt of jokes in popular culture, even

earning a nod in the movie "When Harry Met Sally." Harry laments to Sally that he never quite understood what the song meant and ponders whether it is about forgetting about friends or remembering them. Sally

sums it up by saying the song is simply about old friends.

That is the interpretation many New Year's Eve celebrants embrace as they toast to the new year and sing their hearts out. For those who never bothered to learn or have forgotten the words to this staple of New Year's celebrations, here is the

popularized English translation sung most often.

## "Auld Lang Syne"

Should old acquaintances be forgotten,  
and never brought to mind?  
Should old acquaintances be forgotten,  
and days of old lang syne.

### Chorus:

For auld lang syne, my dear  
For auld lang syne,  
We will take a cup of kindness yet  
For auld lang syne.

We two have run about the hillsides  
and pulled the daisies fine,  
But we have wandered many a weary  
foot for times gone by.

We two have paddled (waded) in the  
stream from noon until dinner time,  
But seas between us broad have  
roared since auld lang syne.

And there is a hand, my trusty friend,  
And give us a hand of yours,  
And we will take a goodwill drink  
For auld lang syne.

And surely you will pay for your pint,  
and surely I will pay for mine!  
And we will take a cup of kindness yet  
for auld lang syne.

# The origin of Baby New Year

People from around the world celebrate to mark the arrival of the new year. One New Year tradition that has survived through the centuries is that of Baby New Year and its image of a toddler wearing only a diaper, sash and top hat.

Baby New Year can be traced to 600 B.C. in Greece and Egypt. Historians note that Greeks believed Dionysus, their God of fertility and wine, was reborn every New Year as a spirit of fertility and luck. Greeks would celebrate with parades featuring a baby in a cradle to represent the birth of Dionysus.

Ancient Egyptians used a baby as a symbol to represent rebirth as well. The child symbolized the birth of the new year and the passing of the old one.

Over the years, the tradition of Baby New Year has taken on

another meaning as well. Some people believe the baby begins as an infant in January and then quickly ages until he is elderly at the end of December. Some stories even suggest Baby

stood behind the imagery of a baby representing rebirth. The Christian Church allowed members to celebrate the new year with a baby, and it was believed the practice symbolized the birth and hope offered by baby Jesus.

Baby New Year symbolism has even been used for marketing purposes. Retailers realized the cherubic image would attract consumers, which is why it is now used to promote New Year's sales.

But Baby New Year is more than just a successful marketing tool. Each year, many cities and villages name their own Baby New Year, which is the first child born on January 1. Some attempts to name a Baby New Year for an entire country have been made, but there have been no official pronouncements, as so many children have been born around midnight on New Year's Eve that it has been too close to call which baby arrived first.


