Embracing the future: Santa Clara County 3.0

when it comes to the future, there are three kinds of people," says retired Santa Clara County Principal Planner Don Weden: "Those who let it happen, those who make it happen and those who wonder what happened. We have to be proactive... in planning our county's future and guiding how it evolves.'


Santa Clara County is projected to add 300,000 people—the equivalent of two Sunnyvales-by 2030. Rather than immigration or soaring birth rates, the majority of this population surge is due to the longevity of Baby Boomers. In fact, 65 percent of the population growth in Santa Clara County by 2030 will be from people age 65 and older.

Due to this population surge, the county is entering a new era in its growth and development: Santa Clara 3.0, featuring a hybrid of urban and suburban landscapes. To meet the

needs of the aging population, taller, denser buildings with convenient and walkable communities are recommended within existing urban areas in Cupertino, Palo Alto and San

However, Weden believes many residents are averse to dense, urban development and are inadequately prepared for the rapid changes ahead. He recommends that these residents stav optimistic and see this is an opportunity to design a better to-

City planners view land use and transportation as inseparable. "Affordable housing and public transit won't work unless we build denser," says Weden. "Density is a helpful tool in the city's tool kit if it's used in the right places." Weden suggests residents think positively and help the county decide where to place the units needed for an additional 300,000 people while keeping in mind that how and where future See WEDEN, page 18

Mousetalgia releases 500th Disney-themed podcast

ousetalgia, a San Jose-based audio podcast team, has recently released their 500th episode, a monumental effort that represents nearly ten years of regular weekly broadcasts. Mousetalgia is a Disneylandthemed show that is released every Monday morning which includes travel advice, news from the Disneyland Resort, interviews with Disney cast members, Imagineers and filmmakers, and a regular dive into the history of the Disney company and Walt Disney himself.

Even one head injury from loose baseballs is too many

Dear Editor,

If even one more athlete (coach or spectator) suffers a head injury from a baseball in the Leland track/football stadium that is one too many. We need the school board to take action for a higher barrier between the baseball field and stadium which are too close together

A baseball came hurtling down from over a 30-foot barrier and struck my track athlete in the head while she was in the stadium. She keeled over as pain exploded in her head.

This is not a freak accident. Our athletic director estimates 10-12 baseballs per game land in the stadium; athletes say balls fre-

quently come over, and I saw 3 baseballs rain down during a track meet.

A higher barrier would lower the risk of another hit. My athlete was lucky but the next athlete may not be so lucky. In a TRACK-TBI study*, 22 percent of concussion patients remained functionally impaired after one year. Some people never fully recover.

the founder of Mousetalgia (who may also be familiar to readers of the Times Newspapers, since he has been working for this newspaper since before Mousetalgia began.) "It's been a pleasure to track the changes at the Disneyland Resort over the past few years, as they've built Cars Land, added the World of Color spectacular and the Paint the Night Parade, and generally grown from a popular theme park into a 'country club' for southern California millennials with annual passes and quite a bit of spare cash." Baham seemed amazed at the park's expansion over the past ten years. "There really is no longer a 'slow season' at the Disneyland Resort any more," Baham said. "But that doesn't mean you can't have a fantastic time at the parks. It just takes careful planning, and the ability to manage your expectations.'

Never be completed

Tracking Disneyland's changes has been one of Mousetalgia's missions over the years, and listeners by the thousands tune in every week to hear the team's views on the latest updates to the park, the latest new dish in one of the park's restaurants, or the new merchandise on the shelves of the stores. "Walt Disney himself said that Disneyland will never be completed," said Kristen Pfeifer, another of the team of four co-hosts who record the show each week. "Our show is living proof that he was right."

Baham and Pfeifer are joined by husband and wife team Dave and Becky Breiland, who bring their own areas of expertise to the show. Dave, a technology project manager by day, engineers the recording of the shows and brings his love of trains and vinyl record collecting to the show. Becky, a certified body combat coach, hula dancer and travel agent, brings her insider knowledge of the resort and world travel to the table. Together, the four Mousetalgia hosts do the following: regularly discuss news from the Disneyland Resort; review recent Disney films; report on See PODCAST, page 6



events at the Walt Disney Family Museum in San Francisco; and interview people with intimate involvement with the history of the Disneyland Resort and the Walt Disney Company.

"The number of topics and potential stories we could cover is staggering," said Baham. "The Disney Company touches almost every part of popular culture. Disneyland is just the tip of the iceberg. We pride ourselves on making people's trips to the parks better by introducing them to some of the history behind the creativity that they will be witnessing when they walk through the park. People are always thanking us for giving them that extra layer of insight."

"There's just something unique about Disneyland," said Pfeifer. "It's like nowhere else on earth. Sure, there are other Disney parks. But Walt Disney himself walked on Disneyland's avenues, and stayed overnight in his private apartment on Main Street. A visit to Disneyland is like a walk through the history of the modern theme park. You can feel Walt in the five-eighths scale buildings, in the busy streets. His spirit pervades the place."

Favorite episodes

Baham points out a few of Mousetalgia's

highlights from the past decade. "Well, it's always fun to talk to people who were instrumental to our collective Disney memories. We talked to Bill Farmer (episode 231), who is the voice of Goofy, and it was a joy to hear about how he found that role. We also had the pleasure of speaking with Tony Baxter (episode 298), the Imagineer responsible for attractions like Big Thunder Mountain Railroad, and he has offered a lot of insight into what it takes to create these incredible experiences. And of course, the in-park shows are always very popular. We reported from Disneyland's big 60th anniversary in 2015 (episode 353), and that show was

The Mousetalgia podcast is a weekly audio broadcast – similar to a radio show – which can be listened to on any device connected to the internet. On an iPhone, search for Mousetalgia in Apple Podcasts; on other smartphones, you can find Mousetalgia via the Stitcher Radio or Castbox apps, or just visit Mousetalgia. com for more listening options.

a fun look at a very special day in the park."

"It's been a quick and crazy decade," Baham said. "But Disneyland has so much coming down the pike - they've recently opened Pixar Pier, and next year 'Galaxy's Edge: Black Spire Outpost' — a.k.a. 'Star Wars Land' — is opening. As far as Mousetalgia is concerned, well, it feels like we're just getting started."

Mousetalgia's top five ways to enjoy Disneyland at home

- 1. Have a youtube ride-along party: There are hundreds of first-person point-of-view Disneyland attraction videos posted to YouTube by fans that brave holding their cameras in front of them as they ride the rides in the park. You can build little ride vehicles out of chairs, pillows, sofas and sheets, and get settled in front of your smart television or computer screen and host your own "ride-along" party. (Bonus points awarded for wearing mouse ears or spritzing other riders with a mist of water when you go over the edge of Splash Mountain's waterfall.)
- 2. Eat a Disney treat. You'll find hundreds of Disneyland-inspired recipes online that will allow you to bring some of the flavors of the park into your home. Some are actual recipes from the park you are allowed to ask at City Hall in Town Square for recipes from the Disneyland restaurants, and for the most part, you'll find them there and some are recipes that are inspired by the park's flavors. Search around, and make yourself a tasty Disney dinner tonight. Personally, I like the Bengal Barbecue's Banyan Beef Skewers, a recipe for which is easily found via a quick Google search.
- 3. Those Dole Whips, though. Let's hone in on one specific Disney treat the pineapple-flavored Dole Whip. While associated with Walt Disney's Enchanted Tiki Room by just about everybody, Dole Whips are actually licensed treats made with a non-dairy premade commercial mix that can be found in treat shops nationwide. In San Jose, the Willow Glen Creamery is known for offering the Dole Whip floats so familiar to Disneyland fans. (And as of last year, you can now buy a

Dole Whip float with an added splash of rum over at the Disneyland Hotel. Just sayin'!)

- 4. Build a Haunted Mansion. Ray Keim, a dimensional designer who has worked for Universal theme parks, created a near-exact 3-D likeness of Disneyland's Haunted Mansion which he has converted into a paper model, and you can download and build one for free. The highly-detailed model may prove to be a daunting task at first, but the clear instructions and incredible sculpture you'll be left with at the end make this project one worth undertaking (see what I did there?) Just visit www. bit.ly/papermansion to get started.
- 5. When in doubt, ask the Mouse: of course, the Walt Disney Company itself has compiled hundreds of ways to allow you to experience the magic of the parks any day and every day. Whether you want theming ideas for an upcoming summer party, or just a few coloring pages to while away a hot afternoon, Disney has you covered. Just visit family.disney.com/activities for a list of all sorts of ideas, plans, and assorted magical memory-making moments.


Graduates recognized at the ceremony include those who completed their degree requirements in August and December of 2017, as well as January and May of 2018.



So deeply connected to God there was no room for hate



The 5th Guru of the Sikh Religion Arjan Dev Jee

A Martyr lays down their life for a cause. Their community honors their Godly actions and nobility for the rest of time.

In the land of India there is a word which in translation means "Teacher."

When such a "Teacher" casts a special light in creating a better world by imparting deep wisdom, they are referred to as "Gurus."

400 years ago there was a man whose words continue to live on today. His name is Arjan Dev Jee. He was the fifth Guru of Sikhism. Sunday. June 17. Sikhs from across the world honor this Guru. His life parallels other Holy persons in centuries past.

As his fame and notoriety grew, an equal measure of hatred entered the heart of a new emperor towards him and the acceptance of the Sikh religion. But why?

The growing number of converts to Sikhism concerned other religious leaders. A plot was hatched to end his life so that the Holy book would be corrupted along with the foundation of Sikhism. Perhaps it was thought that if a revered leader could be removed quickly then perhaps the religion would wither.

Arjan Dev Jee bestowed bright ideas of thought combined with humbleness which allowed him to be extremely approachable

by the masses. People of different religious beliefs in India began to change direction and embrace Sikhism leaving some or all of their previous views of religion behind. With converts growing and devoting 10% of their income to the cause, rulers became alarmed and wasted no time in working to stop Sikhism.

Mukh Granthi (Priest) of the San Jose, Gurdwara, Mohinder Singh Bajwa explained that there was a light about him and it was passed forward from each Guru to the next. Bajwa said, "He was so deeply connected to God, there

was no room for hate."

Being looked upon as a Saint, without warning. Arian Dev Iee was arrested and tortured for days. He was forced to sit on a hot surface with fire below. Scorching sand was poured over his head. All attempts in the torture were put in place for the purpose of convincing him to add texts to the Holy Book as directed by the ruler. The Granth is written with words that came from God. In the text there are no short sentences to protect the flowing meaning of the sentiment of the lines. By not having short sentences it is very hard for an outside source to add to the Granth. Arjan Dev Jee considered the words not his because they came from God. Whatever was written he was getting directly from the Creator so he didn't want any ruler of the day to force him to change any of the words and meaning.

Sikhism is pure

Why did Arjan Dev Jee have to be tortured to death. Perhaps because Sikhism no longer embraced the Caste System. A new way of viewing God's word was being developed. All men and women were looked upon as being equal no matter what color or background. The Guru Granth Sahib Ji is one of the world's greatest scriptures. It is today considered the Supreme Spiritual Authority and Head of the Sikh religion, rather than any living person. It contains the works of religious founders and also writings of people from other faiths. Sikhs reject idol worship so their Holy book is not worshiped as an idol but instead emphasizes the respect of the book for the writings. It is the only Holy book fully written by the ten messengers of God while they were still alive, unaltered and pure.

Why evil rears its ugly head is a mystery. Today both men and women under the five K's of the Khalsa are "Soldier Saints" and stand up to all things evil in this world. With the teachings of the Khalsa both mental and physical strength are harnessed to care and protect everyone in the world. This is why Sikhs are known as "The Protectors." This


quote from Winston Churchill aligns with the view of the the Khalsa (I added the word women). "We sleep safely at night because rough (tough) men (and women) stand ready to visit violence on those who would harm us."

It is believed at the last moments of his physical presence on Earth when his innocence and pure human body were coming to a close, the illustrator, illustrious poet, practical philosopher and celebrated Saint repeated the four syllable words of Waa he Guroo, Waa he Guroo, Waa he Guroo. Waheguru means Guru is great, it is praising Guru. It is believed by repeating Waheguru, God is ever present in the mind of the person.

Keeping Holy words alive

Today, as was in the past, the precious treasure of words, sentences, and hymns contained in the Granth (Holy Book) are not tarnished, distorted nor altered. As time went by after the martyrdom of Arjan Dev Jee, the future five Gurus would add to the Granth holy words of wisdom bestowed to them from up above. Then something happened that would solidify the depth and understanding of the Sikh religion (Sikhism) for eternity. The tenth Guru stated there would be no more people to be given the title of Guru but instead the guiding light of Sikhism would now and forever become the Granth (Guru Granth Sahib Ji-Holy book) for all to learn from.

Arjan Dev Jee protected the Granth. He gave his life for his deep religious beliefs.

As a rock of strength, Arjan Dev Jee's words resonate today in the daily sung hymns (many written in his hand). The radiant light from up above glitters in the hearts and souls of those who have the deep thirst to quench the understanding of life.

Today, all are welcomed to visit the San Jose Gurdwara (largest and some say, the most beautiful in the U.S.A.). As you enter the kitchen food serving area (langar) where complementary food is served to all 365 days of the year, there is a light that reflects off the spacious saffron colored walls. This luminescence reminds many of the Golden Temple in India which Arjan Dev Jee built with followers. The warm sunshine (light) allows all to release any pain inside themselves and to be closer with the illumination of the Creator.

ayor Liccardo was reelected. Some races resulted in runoffs in the upcoming November election. 



THE WISDOM TOOTH **How diet affects** children's teeth

Q: Can diet affect my child's teeth? A: The food and drinks you give your child can affect their oral health. Everyone, including your child, has plaque-- a sticky bacteria that forms on teeth. Plaque can build up if it isn't removed from your child's teeth every day. The plaque bacteria feed on the sugar that's found in the food and drinks you give your child. The bacteria create acids from the sugar supply. These acids can attack the hard, protective layer of enamel on your child's

teeth for up to 20 minutes after they finish eating and drinking. Repeated acid attacks can affect your child's teeth, causing problems like erosion or decay, which can lead to infection in other parts of the body. growth occurs also determines its impact

'Things will be very different a decade from now if we like it or not," he says, "and we have the oppor-tunity to shape that. We can't run from the future. We need to embrace it."

Quoting the Rolling Stones, he adds, "You can't always get what you want. You can't always get what you want. But if you try sometimes, well you just might find, you get what you need."

Weden is hopeful that Santa Clara 3.0 can be even better than its 2.0 version. He views Silicon Valley as "an extraordinary place," filled with creativity and vision. "Imagine better transportation making it easier to walk places," he says. "Think of aging seniors who can't drive.'

Acknowledging the tension between residents' current wants and the county's future development needs, Weden asks that residents be less selfish and think of teachers and others who can't find affordable housing. Weden notes that healthcare workers needed for an aging population also require affordable housing. "This isn't only a future problem," he says, "but one that currently exists: A Sunnyvale nonprofit which offered services to seniors for 40 years, recently closed as workers can't afford to live in Santa Clara County."

In the next 15 years, the world's population is projected to increase from 7.8 billion to 8.8 billion as people are living longer. In 1900, life expectancy was only 30 years, but by the year 2000, it increased to age 67 around the world and 77 in the United States.

In the next 15 years, California is projected to grow by five million people. About ¾ of this growth will be in the Over 65 category. From 2000 to 2015, for every young person under age 18 in the United States, there were about eight senior citizens. In 2030, for every young person under 18, there will be 24 seniors. In Santa Clara County, during the next 15 years, it's projected that 2/3 of the population growth will be age 65 or older. By 2030, seniors will make up ¼ of the local population.

"As we age, our needs change," says Weden, "and as communities change, housing, transportation and the economy are affected." While the suburbs were created for people able to drive, statistics show that 1 out of 5 Americans over age 65 don't drive. "Life expectancy for women is another 21 years," says Widen, "so during their last 10 years they won't be driving. Men won't be driving their last 6 years. This leaves seniors trapped in suburbia."

For some seniors, Weden says, "the stairs look steeper every year and a big house with many rooms and a yard to maintain is no longer suitable, making a condo or apartment more attractive than a house in the suburbs." The aging Baby Boomers are adding to the pressure of building walkable urban neighborhoods.

Interestingly, millennials (born 1980 to 2000) have much in common with seniors. They also prefer a walkable urban lifestyle versus a drivable suburban one. "The millennials have the lowest percentage of driver's licenses of any generation since the 1960s," says Weden.

Weden suggests imagining letters from both of these groups to realtors. A senior might write, "We've lived in a nice family home for the past 40 years, but now we want to move to a neighborhood where we can live an active lifestyle without driving. Does your city have a neighborhood like that we can move to?" In their letter, millennials might say, "We're young, Silicon Valley professionals the hi-tech economy depends upon. We prefer a vibrant, urban neighborhood where we can live an active lifestyle without driving a car. Does your city have a neighborhood like that we can move to?" Weden believes that if the answer to these questions isn't "yes," the city isn't prepared for the future and the changes happening today.

Weden is in favor of creating livable mixed-use neighborhoods quickly, as there is an affordable housing crisis in California: The median price for singlefamily homes in Santa Clara County is \$1.29 million, while people pay \$42,000 a year in rent. According to the Department of Housing and Development, this year an average of 180,000 units are needed statewide, while California is only building about 80,000. "Every year we add a shortfall of 100,000 units," says Weden, "New homes for middle-income families are virtually non-existent. Where's the workforce going to live?"

The state is beginning to step in. "A law was passed last year allowing developers to pull a permit from the building department [without all red tape]," he says, "as long as they meet the General Plan requirements. We have to plan to be more urban ourselves, or the state will do it for us."

Looking back

Santa Clara 1.0 was a pre-suburban, agricultural age, while 2.0 was a suburban era. In the 1930s, with its abundant orchards, Santa Clara County was known as the "Valley of Hearts Delight." It was the also the time of the Great Depression. Weden says that in 1939, something amazing happened: The New York World's Fair featuring "The World of Tomorrow." "It was a magical place," he says, "almost like Disneyland and there they saw... a vision of what the U.S. could become.'

General Motors' "Highways and Horizons" exhibit featured a Futurama diorama of cars driving on a highway between farmland. Ford Cars Pavilion displayed a busy cross-street with cars, trucks and buses resembling a traffic jam. This was such a novelty, people wore pins they received from General Motors proclaiming: "I have seen the future."

"People were presold on having a house in the suburbs where they could drive wherever they wanted," says Weden. During the transition from a wartime to a peacetime economy, housing was needed housing, as well as jobs. Land was plentiful and gasoline was cheap, leading to the creation of the suburbs and interstate highways. Many WWII veterans came back to California as its climate and landscape were alluring. Jobs were available in the aerospace and electronics industries, construction and real estate. Santa Clara's population grew rapidly. In 1950, there were 290,000 people living in the valley, but by 1970 there were more than a million. The region changed from being the agricultural "Valley of Hearts

Six myths about respect debunked

A re you concerned that your child doesn't respect you? Does he talk back, roll his eyes, or walk away while you're talking?

Teaching respectful behavior (and correcting disrespectful behavior) takes consistency, calm, and follow-through. A good place to start is by considering how you define respect and what respectful communication means to you.

Many of our ideas about respect are red herrings, distracting us from the basic idea of treating all of humanity with honor and dignity. The dictionary defines the word in terms of admiration and esteem, but America's Supernanny, parenting expert Deborah Tillman, prefers defining it as something everyone deserves, based on the idea that that every individual is a person of worth. "Respect is about the attitude we have, the attention to others that we give, and the acceptance that we show," she says.

So what do you do to create more respect in your family? The first step, Tillman says, is to model it. Next, teach kids how you expect them to treat you and others. It's never too early to start. You may think your precociously smart-mouthed 3-year-old is adorable and laugh at her sass, but you're setting yourself up for more of the same behavior as she grows up. Instead, tell your child (respectfully) that you expect them to use a respectful tone and language. Teach them to say please and thank you and to hold the door for the person behind them. And consider what you mean when you say "respect."

- 6 myths and misconceptions about respect
- 1. Respect is not about liking or admiring; nor is it about reverence, esteem, or awe, as most dictionaries say. It's not putting someone on a pedestal or about certain people deserving respect. It's about treating all human beings with care and courtesy.

2. Respect is not obedience, compliance, or agreement. When your children spread their wings or test their boundaries or argue with you, it may feel like disrespect. But disagreement is not the same as disrespect.

How you disagree — for instance, by insulting someone's intelligence or disparaging their opinion — may show a lack of respect. Parents can help their children learn this distinction, Tillman says, by encouraging kids to voice their own unique opinions and teaching them that while their opinion won't necessarily change your mind, they are welcome to express it in a respectful way.

- 3. Respect is not fear. A parent who gets obedience by instilling fear may get results, but that's not respect. Instilling fear in your child can breed a lot of other feelings, such as hate, contempt, or irritation, but it's unlikely to develop into respect. And it doesn't teach a child about why they are or are not allowed to do something. Fear-based parenting is a poor communication method, Tillman says.
- **4. Respect is not earned.** "I have worked with many teens who say respect has to be earned. I don't know where they got that idea," Tillman says. "It's not easy but you have to be accountable for what you do, and let God deal with the other person."
- 5. Respect is not eye contact. Eye contact is a cultural norm in the United States, where it is considered a sign of interest, honesty and respect. However, in some Middle Eastern countries, it can get you in trouble especially if you're a woman looking at a man. It can get you in trouble in some Latin American, African, and Asian countries as well because it's almost a challenge. So be aware that people of different backgrounds may find eye contact confusing and disrespectful.
- 6. Respect is not common courtesy and manners. These things can convey respect, but they don't encompass what respect is at its root. Respect is not just a learned habit. What is considered courteous may differ from culture to culture, region to region, generation to generation, and family to family. But respect treating each human being with care and consideration is the same thing universally.

Delight" to suburban Silicon Valley. "We have a very healthy economy," says Weden. "About 7,000 more jobs were added in one month (April 2018) in Silicon Valley. Jobs are people magnets and a healthy economy is key to our quality of life."

Weden urges residents to prepare for Santa Clara County 3.0. "Vibrant urban neighborhoods are needed," he says. "How can we be intelligently more urban? Urban is about infill, convenience, livability and complete neighborhoods where you can

get what you need without getting in the car."

"Our world is changing. We have serious challenges and great opportunities. We have to act with a sense of urgency," he says, "if we want to guide our future and take charge of the changes happening in our communities. We need civic imagination to envision and create something better than today. As Lewis Mumford says, 'Each generation writes its own biography in the cities it creates.' We need to write ours responsibly for our own sake and the sake of future generations."
