# Independent 74-year old with health issues gets a completely free home renovation

Publisher CB (Inspired by patients, driven by science), a global biopharmaceutical company, along with Rebuilding Together has donated free home renovating for local San Jose resident, Marilyn.

Marilyn, a 74-year-old widow with no relatives in the area, endured a hip fracture six years ago and then suffered additional rib fractures three years ago when she fell from standing position. In addition to these injuries, she has major hearing loss and is often on oxygen for COPD.

Despite these several rather serious health issues and use of a cane and walker, Marilyn remains determined to be independent and loves to volunteer in the community.

More about the Build & the Recipient Marilyn's home underwent structural repairs and maintenance, including replacing steps and carpeting, roof repairs, bathroom safety updates, power washing the exterior of the home, painting and more.

• UCB's goal was not only to help "fall proof" Marilyn's home, but also to help her stay active and independent in a safe home she feels proud of.

• The team consisting of 30 volunteers from UCB and O'Connor Hospital per-

formed many duties including but not limited to repairing and recovering front steps, building a new back stair case, creating a walkway from driveway to front steps, adding grab bars in bathroom, removing carpet and replacing flooring with hardwood are some of the tasks. Before the projects were performed, an occupational therapist volunteer from O'Connor Hospital came by to assess and recommend the myriad of changes.

Part of Verity Health System, O'Connor Hospital is a nationally recognized, 358bed acute care facility offering a full range of inpatient and outpatient medical, surgical and specialty programs to the residents of San Jose.

In addition to UCB team members volunteering for the day - long project, members of the O'Connor community will also join the Rebuilding Together efforts at Marilyn's home in the future. Together, the teams look forward to having an impact and raising the profile of living with her osteoporosis post – fracture to allow Marylyn to do well in her life! # Embracing the future: Santa Clara County 3.0

66 When it comes to the future, there are three kinds of people," says retired Santa Clara County Principal Planner Don Weden: "Those who let it happen, those who make it happen and those who wonder what hap-pened. We have to be proactive... in planning our county's future and guiding how it evolves."

Santa Clara County is projected to add 300,000 people—the equivalent of two Sunnyvales—by 2030. Rather than immigration or soaring birth rates, the majority of this population surge is due to the longevity of Baby Boomers. In fact, 65 percent of the population growth in Santa Clara County by 2030 will be from people age 65 and older.

Due to this population surge, the county is entering a new era in its growth and development: Santa Clara 3.0, featuring a hybrid of urban and suburban landscapes. To meet the needs of the aging population, taller, denser buildings with convenient and walkable See WEDEN, page 2

communities are re-commended within existing urban areas in Cupertino, Palo Alto and San Jose.

However, Weden believes many residents are averse to dense, urban development and are inadequately prepared for the rapid changes ahead. He recommends that these residents stay optimistic and see this is an opportunity to design a better tomorrow.

City planners view land use and transportation as inseparable. "Afford-able housing and public transit won't work

#### unless we build denser," says Weden. "Density is a helpful tool in the city's tool kit if it's used in the right places." Weden suggests res-idents think positively and help the county decide where to place the units needed for an additional 300,000 people while keeping in mind that how and where future growth occurs also determines its impact on traffic.

"Things will be very different a decade from now if we like it or not," he says, "and we have the oppor-tunity to shape that. We can't run from the future. We need to embrace it."

Quoting the Rolling Stones, he adds, "You can't always get what you want. You can't always get what you want. But if you try sometimes, well you just might find, you get what you need."

Weden is hopeful that Santa Clara 3.0 can be even better than its 2.0 version. He views Silicon Valley as "an extraordinary place," filled with creativity and vision. "Imagine better transportation making it easier to walk places," he says. "Think of aging seniors who can't drive."

Acknowledging the tension between residents' current wants and the county's future development needs, Weden asks that residents be less selfish and think of teachers and others who can't find affordable housing. Weden notes that healthcare workers needed for an aging population also require affordable housing. "This isn't only a future problem," he says, "but one that currently exists: A Sunnyvale nonprofit which offered services to seniors for 40 years, recently closed as workers can't afford to live in Santa Clara County."

In the next 15 years, the world's population is projected to increase from 7.8 billion to 8.8 billion as people are living longer. In 1900, life expectancy was only 30 years, but by the year 2000, it increased to age 67 around the world and 77 in the United States

In the next 15 years, California is projected to grow by five million people. About 3/4 of this growth will be in the Over 65 category. From 2000 to 2015, for every young person under age 18 in the United States, there were about eight senior citizens. In 2030, for every young person under 18, there will be 24 seniors. In Santa Clara County, during the next 15 years, it's projected that 2/3 of the population growth will be age 65 or

older. By 2030, seniors will make up 1/4 of the local population. "As we age, our needs change," says Weden, "and as communities change, housing, transportation and the economy are affected." While the suburbs were created for people able to drive, statistics show that 1 out of 5 Americans over age 65 don't drive. "Life expectancy for women is another 21 years," says Widen, "so during their last 10 years they won't be driving. Men won't be driving their last 6 years. This leaves seniors trapped in suburbia.'

For some seniors, Weden says, "the stairs look steeper every year and a big house with many rooms and a yard to maintain is no longer suitable, making a condo or apartment more attractive than a house in the suburbs." The aging Baby Boomers are adding to the pressure of building walkable urban neighborhoods. (Continued, next page)

Interestingly, millennials (born 1980 to 2000) have much in common with seniors. They also prefer a walkable urban lifestyle versus a drivable suburban one. "The millennials have the lowest percentage of driver's licenses of any generation since the 1960s," says Weden.

Weden suggests imagining letters from both of these groups to realtors. A senior might write, "We've lived in a nice family home for the past 40 years, but now we want to move to a neighborhood where we can live an active lifestyle without driving. Does your city have a neighborhood like that we can move to?" In their letter, millennials might Valley "We're young, Silicon say, professionals the hi-tech economy depends upon. We prefer a vibrant, urban neighborhood where we can live an active lifestyle without driving a car. Does your city have a neighborhood like that we can move to?" Weden believes that if the answer to these questions isn't "yes," the city isn't prepared for the future and the changes happening today.

Weden is in favor of creating livable mixeduse neighborhoods quickly, as there is an affordable housing crisis in California: The median price for single-family homes in Santa Clara County is \$1.29 million, while people pay \$42,000 a year in rent. According to the Department of Housing and Development, this year an average of 180,000 units are needed statewide, while California is only building about 80,000. "Every year we add a shortfall of 100,000 units," says Weden, "New homes for middle-income families are virtually non-existent. Where's the workforce going to live?'

The state is beginning to step in. "A law was passed last year allowing developers to pull a permit from the building department [without all red tape]," he says, "as long as they meet the General Plan requirements. We have to plan to be more urban ourselves, or the state will do it for us."

#### Looking back

Santa Clara 1.0 was a pre-suburban, agricultural age, while 2.0 was a suburban era. In the 1930s, with its abundant orchards, Santa Clara County was known as the "Valley of Hearts Delight." It was the also the time of the Great Depression. Weden says that in 1939, something amazing happened: The New York World's Fair featuring "The World of Tomorrow." "It was a magical place," he says, "almost like Disneyland and there they saw... a vision of what the U.S. could become.'

General Motors' "Highways and Horizons" exhibit featured a Futurama diorama of cars driving on a highway between farmland. Ford Cars Pavilion displayed a busy cross-street with cars, trucks and buses resembling a traffic jam. This was such a novelty, people wore pins they received from General Motors proclaiming: "I have seen the future."

"People were presold on having a house in the suburbs where they could drive wherever they wanted," says Weden. During the transition from a wartime to a peacetime economy, housing was needed housing, as well as jobs. Land was plentiful and gasoline was cheap, leading to the creation of the suburbs and interstate highways. Many WWII veterans came back to California as its climate and landscape were alluring. Jobs were available in the aerospace and electronics industries, construction and real estate. Santa Clara's population grew rapidly. In 1950, there were 290,000 people living in the valley, but by 1970 there were more than a million. The region changed from being the agricultural "Valley of Heart's Delight" to suburban Silicon Valley. "We have a very healthy economy," says Weden. "About 7,000 more jobs were added in one month (April 2018) in Silicon Valley. Jobs are people magnets and a healthy economy is key to our quality of life."

Weden urges residents to prepare for Santa Clara County 3.0. "Vibrant urban neighborhoods are needed," he says. "How can we be intelligently more urban? Urban is about infill, convenience, livability and complete neighborhoods where you can get what you need without getting in the car."

"Our world is changing. We have serious challenges and great opportunities. We have to act with a sense of urgency," he says, "if we want to guide our future and take charge of the changes happening in our communities. We need civic imagination to envision and create something better than today. As Lewis Mumford says, 'Each generation writes its own biography in the cities it creates.' We need to write ours responsibly for our own sake and the sake of future generations.'

"It's been a quick decade," said Jeff Baham, the founder of Mousetalgia (who may also be familiar to readers of the Times Newspapers, since he has been working for this newspaper since before Mousetalgia began.) "It's been a pleasure to track the changes at the Disneyland Resort over the past few years, as they've built Cars Land, added the World of Color spectacular and the Paint the Night Parade, and generally grown from a popular theme park into a 'country club' for southern California millennials with annual passes and quite a bit of spare cash." Baham seemed amazed at the park's expansion over the past ten years. "There really is no longer a 'slow season' at the Disneyland Resort any more," Baham said. "But that doesn't mean you can't have a fantastic time at the parks. It just takes careful planning, and the ability to manage your expectations.

### Never be completed

Tracking Disneyland's changes has been one of Mousetalgia's missions over the years, and listeners by the thousands tune in every week to hear the team's views on the latest updates to the park, the latest new dish in one of the park's restaurants, or the new merchandise on the shelves of the stores. "Walt Disney himself said that Disneyland will never be completed," said Kristen Pfeifer, another of the team of four co-hosts who record the show each week. "Our show is living proof that he was right."

Baham and Pfeifer are joined by husband and wife team Dave and Becky Breiland, who bring their own areas of expertise to the show. Dave, a technology project manager by day, engineers the recording of the shows and brings his love of trains and vinyl record collecting to the show. Becky, a certified body combat coach, hula dancer and travel agent, brings her insider knowledge of the resort and world travel to the table. Together, the four Mousetalgia hosts do the following: regularly discuss news from the Disneyland Resort; review recent Disney films; report on *See PODCAST, page 6*

The Santa Clara Valley Water District knows how critical it is to keep this key source reliable. A new project under way in Morgan Hill will help do just that

Earlier this year, the water district broke ground on the Main Avenue and Madrone Pipeline Restoration Project. The project will install 2.7 miles of raw (untreated) water pipeline. When completed, the project will allow us to replenish our groundwater basin in South Santa Clara County with water from Anderson Reservoir via the Main Ave-

nue percolation ponds and Madrone Channel. The water district is working to ensure a reliable water supply no matter what extreme weather the changing climate brings.

The pipeline portion that will be replaced was originally built in 1955. Over the years, the pipe has deteriorated and overgrown tree roots have made it unusable. Restoring the damaged segment will allow us to improve our groundwater refilling operations. Using water from local water sources helps ensure our water supply meets future needs.

The project also improves district green efforts by reducing our carbon footprint. Currently, these ponds are refilled with imported water pumped through the Pacheco Pumping Plant from the San Luis Reservoir, nearly 40 miles away. When completed, the project will save energy and lessen operating costs by reducing the need to pump water from San Luis.

Construction began in February and will happen in three phases to minimize impacts to the community. Approximately 2,200 linear feet of pipeline have been installed as part of the first phase. This consists of pipeline installation along Cochrane Road from the Ander-son Reservoir outlet. In addition to restoring the damaged pipe-lines, the project will improve our capacity to refill ponds by replacing them with larger diameter ones; in some cases, more than double the size.

The Main Avenue and Madrone Pipe-line Restoration Project is just one of 61 capital projects the water district has in store to maintain and preserve our critical infrastructure. This month we observe National Infrastructure Week during May 14 - May 21. It's an important time to highlight the significance of investing in our country's framework

> country, the roads, bridges, airports and pipeline systems that support everyday life, need maintenance. According to the American Society of Civil Engineers, most of the nation's water systems have been in operation for 75-100 vears, far exceeding their intended lifes-

pipelines in Santa Clara County is 40 years, with our oldest pipelines installed in the 1950s. Aware that these are quickly approaching their lifespan, the water district is investing in maintaining and restoring these critical pieces of infrastructure. With restoration and modernization projects like this one, the water district is building now for a reliable future.

events at the Walt Disney Family Museum in San Francisco; and interview people with intimate involvement with the history of the Disneyland Resort and the Walt Disney Company.

"The number of topics and potential stories we could cover is staggering," said Baham. "The Disney Company touches almost every part of popular culture. Disneyland is just the tip of the iceberg. We pride ourselves on making people's trips to the parks better by introducing them to some of the history behind the creativity that they will be witnessing when they walk through the park. People are always thanking us for giving them that extra layer of insight."

"There's just something unique about Disneyland," said Pfeifer. "It's like nowhere else on earth. Sure, there are other Disney parks. But Walt Disney himself walked on Disneyland's avenues, and stayed overnight in his private apartment on Main Street. A visit to Disneyland is like a walk through the history of the modern theme park. You can feel Walt in the five-eighths scale buildings, in the busy streets. His spirit pervades the place."

# Mousetalgia's top five ways to enjoy Disneyland at home

**1.** Have a youtube ride-along party: There are hundreds of first-person pointof-view Disneyland attraction videos posted to YouTube by fans that brave holding their cameras in front of them as they ride the rides in the park. You can build little ride vehicles out of chairs, pillows, sofas and sheets, and get settled in front of your smart television or computer screen and host your own "ride-along" party. (Bonus points awarded for wearing mouse ears or spritzing other riders with a mist of water when you go over the edge of Splash Mountain's waterfall.)

2. Eat a Disney treat. You'll find hundreds of Disneyland-inspired recipes online that will allow you to bring some of the flavors of the park into your home. Some are actual recipes from the park — you are allowed to ask at City Hall in Town Square for recipes from the Disneyland restaurants, and for the most part, you'll find them there — and some are recipes that are inspired by the park's flavors. Search around, and make yourself a tasty Disney dinner tonight. Personally, I like the Bengal Barbecue's Banyan Beef Skewers, a recipe for which is easily found via a quick Google search.

**3.** Those Dole Whips, though. Let's hone in on one specific Disney treat - the pineapple-flavored Dole Whip. While associated with Walt Disney's Enchanted Tiki Room by just about everybody, Dole Whips are actually licensed treats made with a non-dairy premade commercial mix that can be found in treat shops nationwide. In San Jose, the Willow Glen Creamery is known for offering the Dole Whip floats so familiar to Disneyland fans. (And as of last year, you can now buy a

highlights from the past decade. "Well, it's always fun to talk to people who were instrumental to our collective Disney memories. We talked to Bill Farmer (episode 231), who is the voice of Goofy. and it was a joy to hear about how he found that role. We also had the pleasure of speaking with Tony Baxter (episode 298), the Imagineer responsible for attractions like Big Thunder Mountain Railroad, and he has offered a lot of insight into what it takes to create these incredible experiences. And of course, the in-park shows are always very popular. We reported from Disneyland's big 60th anniversary in 2015 (episode 353), and that show was a fun look at a very special day in the park."

The Mousetalgia podcast is a weekly audio broadcast – similar to a radio show – which can be listened to on any device connected to the internet. On an iPhone, search for Mousetalgia in Apple Podcasts; on other smartphones, you can find Mousetalgia via the Stitcher Radio or Castbox apps, or just visit Mousetalgia. com for more listening options.

"It's been a quick and crazy decade," Baham said. "But Disneyland has so much coming down the pike - they've recently opened Pixar Pier, and next year 'Galaxy's Edge: Black Spire Outpost' — a.k.a. 'Star Wars Land' — is opening. As far as Mousetalgia is concerned, well, it feels like we're just getting started."

4. Build a Haunted Mansion. Ray Keim, a dimensional designer who has worked for Universal theme parks, created a nearexact 3-D likeness of Disneyland's Haunted Mansion which he has converted into a paper model, and you can download and build one for free. The highly-detailed model may prove to be a daunting task at first, but the clear instructions and incredible sculpture you'll be left with at the end make this project one worth undertaking (see what I did there?) Just visit www. bit.ly/papermansion to get started.

5. When in doubt, ask the Mouse: of course, the Walt Disney Company itself has compiled hundreds of ways to allow you to experience the magic of the parks any day and every day. Whether you want theming ideas for an upcoming summer party, or just a few coloring pages to while away a hot afternoon, Disney has you covered.
